PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir George Gipps, Knight, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c. &c. &c.

WHEREAS, by an Act of the Governor of New South Wales, with the advice of the Legislative Council, passed in the second year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled, "An Act for repealing so much of an Act, intituled, 'An Act to continue until further provision shall be made, certain duties, Tolls, Rates, Fees, and other sums of money imposed by the Governors of New South Wales,' and for other purposes as relates to the levying of tolls in New South Wales, and for raising a fund towards making, repairing, and upholding Public Roads, Bridges, and Ferries, and for regulating the collection of Tolls thereon;" it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for the Governor of the said Colony for the time being, by any Proclamation or Proclamations under his hand, from time to time to appoint places at which Tolls shall be collected, and to cause the same to be collected upon any line of road which has been, or shall be, wholly or partly made, and which is repaired at the public expense; and to cause Toll to be collected at any Bridge built, purchased, or repaired at the public expense; and at any Ferry constructed or upheld at the same; and to cause such Gates, Bars, Chains, Rails and Fences to be built and set up, as shall be deemed necessary for preventing Passengers, Beasts, and Carriages from passing unless there shall be then paid such Toll as shall be due or demandable under the authority of the said recited Act; and whereas by my Proclamations, bearing date the 20th day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty-two, and 8th day of June, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, certain places were appointed for the collection of certain Tolls whereat they have been collected, and it has become necessary to appoint a place on the River Hastings, in the County of Macquarie for that purpose; Now, I the Governor aforesaid, in pursuance of the authority vested in me by the said recited law or ordinance, do by this my Proclamation appoint Blackman's Point, on the River

Hastings, on the line of road to Bellyngarra in the district of Port Macquarie, to be a place in addition to those formerly named, at which a Ferry shall be established, and at which Tolls shall be collected to the amount and under the regulations, restrictions and provisions of the said recited ordinance; of which Ferry all persons concerned are hereby required to take due notice according to the provisions of the said recited law or ordinance.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir George Gipps, Knight, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS, by a certain Act or Ordinance of the Governor and Legislative Council, passed in the fourth year of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, "An Act to amend an act intituled, 'An Act to repeal an act of the Governor and Council of New South Wales, intituled, an Act to authorise the erection of Pounds, and for regulating the impounding of Cattle, and to make further and other provisions in lieu thereof, and to extend the provisions thereof,'" it was, amongst other things, enacted that whenever the Governor or Acting Governor for the time being shall deem it expedient and advantageous to extend the provisions of the said Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of His late Majesty King William the fourth, so far as the same relate to any person suffering any Cattle belonging to him or in his charge, to stray or go about, or to be tethered or depastured in any street or public place within the limits, or reputed limits of the several Towns in the said Act mentioned, to such other Towns now erected, or hereafter to be erected or established, at any place within the said Colony, as may hereafter be deemed

necessary to any other Town in the said Colony, it shall or may be lawful for the said Governor, or Acting Governor for the time being, to declare the same by Proclamation, to be published in the Government Gazette. Now, therefore, I the Governor, in pursuance of the power and authority so vested in me by the said recited Act, by this my proclamation do hereby declare that so much of the provision of the said Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of His late Majesty King William the fourth, as is herein before particularly specified, be extended to the Town of Goulburn, in the County of Argyle.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir George Gipps, Knight, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief, of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c. &c. &c.

WHEREAS, by a certain act or ordinance of the Governor and Legislative Council, passed in the second year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, "An Act for regulating the police in the towns of Parramatta, Windsor, Maitland, Bathurst, and other towns respectively, and for the removing and preventing nuisances and obstructions, and for the better alignment of streets therein," it was amongst other things enacted, that whenever the Governor, or Acting Governor for the time being, shall deem it expedient to extend the same to any other town in the said Colony, it shall and may be lawful for the said Governor, or Acting Governor for the time being, to declare the same by Proclamation: Now, therefore, I, the Governor, in pursuance of the power and authority so vested in me by the said recited act, by this my Proclamation, do hereby direct that the provisions of the said act be extended to the town of Campbelltown, in the county of Cumberland."

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR is pleased to direct, that the general objects of the following Bills, now under consideration of the Legislative Council, be published for general information.

By His Excellency's Command,
E. DEAS THOMSON.

1.—A Bill to enable the Proprietors of a certain Joint Stock Company, carried on in the Town of Melbourne, in the Colony of New South

Wales, under the name, style, and firm of THE MELBOURNE FIRE AND MARINE ASSURANCE COMPANY, to sue and be sued in the name of the Chairman of the said Joint Stock Company for the time being, and for other purposes therein mentioned.

Several persons having formed themselves into a Joint Stock Company, or Society, under the style and firm of "The Melbourne Fire and Marine Assurance Company," for the purpose of effecting Insurances against Fire, Maritime Assurances, and all other risks upon Ships, Vessels, and Goods on board, whether in Harbour or at Sea; and also for the purpose of effecting Insurances on Houses, Warehouses, and other buildings, Goods, Wares, Merchandize, Stock, Effects, and all other kinds of property whatsoever, within the Australian Colonies, from damage or destruction by Fire; and also for the purpose of Discounting Bills and Promissory Notes, payable within the Colony of New South Wales; and also making Advances and granting Loans on Bonds or other securities, not being mortgages of real estate, except as collateral security for money due to the Company; and, it being expedient to enable the Company to sue or be sued at law or in equity, it is proposed—

That all Actions or other proceedings, at law, or in equity, by or against the Company, shall be commenced and carried on in the name of their Chairman.

That a Memorial of the Chairman's name shall be recorded, on Oath, in the Supreme Court, within 30 days after the passing of the proposed Act.

That no Action shall be brought until such Memorial be recorded.

That not more than one Action for the same cause shall be brought by or against the Chairman, after the merits shall have been once tried.

That the Chairman or any other Officer of the Company shall be a competent witness, notwithstanding his interest in the result.

That execution upon any judgment may be issued against any Member of the Company; and that such member shall be indemnified out of the Funds of the Company.

That no change in the Members of the Company shall affect the validity or operation of the proposed Act.

That the Company shall not be incorporated by the proposed Act.

That Bonds, &c., taken in the name of any Chairman, may be put in suit in the name of the Chairman for the time being.

That no Plaintiff shall be non-suited for want of proof of the Record of the Memorial of the name of the Chairman.

That a list of the names of the then existing Members of the Company shall be recorded in the Office of the Registrar of the Supreme Court, within 15 days from the first day of January in each and every year; and all persons whose names appear on such List shall be liable as Members of the Company, until a new List be recorded, or until they have given notice in the New South Wales Government Gazette, of their retirement from the Company.

That nothing in the proposed Act contained shall affect the rights of Her Majesty, or others not mentioned therein.

That the proposed Act shall take effect from and after the day on which the notification of the Royal approbation, shall be published in the *New South Wales Government Gazette*, and shall thereafter be deemed and taken to be a Public Act.

2.—*A Bill to provide for the periodical Publication of the Liabilities and Assets of Banks in New South Wales and its Dependencies, and the Registration of the Names of the Proprietors thereof.*

It being expedient that all Banking Companies, Firms, and Individual Bankers should, for the information and better security of the Public, furnish periodical statements of their Liabilities and Assets, to be published in the *Government Gazette*, and copies of their respective Charters, where there shall be Charters, and of their Deeds of Co-partnership and Settlement, to be recorded in the Supreme Court; it is proposed—

That from and after the commencement of the proposed Act, the Managing Director, Manager, Chief Cashier, or Clerk, of every Banking Company, Firm, or individual Banker, in the Colony of New South Wales, shall, on Monday in every week, make up a correct account and statement, in writing, exhibiting the Assets, Property, Credit, and Securities, respectively, belonging to such Banking Companies, Firms, or Individual Bankers; and, also, the respective Debts, Engagements, and Liabilities of the same, in a form set forth in a Schedule to the proposed Act annexed, marked A.

That from such Weekly Accounts, there shall be prepared, at the close of every quarter in each year, by the parties aforesaid, a General Abstract in writing, of the Assets, Property, Credits, and Securities, of every such Banking Company, Firm, or Individual Banker, and of their Debts, Engagements, and Liabilities, in the form particularly set forth in a Schedule to the proposed Act, annexed marked B; to which shall be subjoined a statement, exhibiting the amount of the Capital Stock of every such Banking Company, Firm, or Individual Banker, paid up at the close of the quarter for which such General Abstract respectively shall be so made up, the rate and amount of the last dividend that may have been declared, and the amount of the reserved Profits at the time of declaring such Dividend: and, copies of the same, shall, within one month after the close of every quarter, be transmitted, by the parties aforesaid, to the Colonial Secretary, to be laid before the Governor and Legislative Council of the said Colony, and the parties aforesaid shall verify such Quarterly Abstract and statement on oath, if required so to do by the said Governor, on receiving notice to that effect from the Colonial Secretary—and such Abstract and Statements shall be published in the *Government Gazette*, for public information.

That if any of the parties aforesaid shall omit or neglect to furnish any such Quarterly Account and Statement, or Abstract, in the manner and within the time aforesaid, he shall be subject and liable to a Penalty of _____ for every day of such omission or neglect.

That a copy of the Charter, where there shall be a Charter, and of the Deed of Co-partnership, and Settlement of every such Banking Company or Firm, attested by the Managing Director, Manager,

Chief Cashier or Clerk for the time being of such Banking Companies or firms respectively to be true Transcripts of the original charter and of the Deed of Co-partnership and settlement respectively, of such Banking Company or firm, shall be registered in the Office of the Registrar of the Supreme Court of the said Colony, by the managing Director, Manager, Chief Cashier or Clerk of such Banking Companies or firms respectively, within thirty days from and after the commencement of the proposed Act; and the same shall be open for public inspection at all reasonable times on payment of one shilling for every such inspection; and if any of the parties aforesaid shall omit or neglect so to register such attested copies of such Charter and Deed of Co-partnership and settlement, he shall be subject and liable to a penalty of One Hundred Pounds.

That attested copies of every new Charter which may issue and of every new Deed of Co-partnership and settlement which may be entered into, shall also be registered in manner and within the time aforesaid, under a like penalty for neglect or omission of any of the parties aforesaid.

That the names of all persons who shall be then existing members or Proprietors of every such Banking Company or firm, shall be entered on a List within thirty days from and after the first day of January in each and every year, such List to be recorded on oath in the Office of the Registrar of the said Supreme Court by the parties aforesaid, under a penalty of One Hundred Pounds for neglect or omission.

That all persons whose names shall appear on such Lists shall be deemed to be, and held liable as, members or Proprietors of the Banking Company or firm on whose List their names shall so appear, until new Lists shall be made out and registered as aforesaid, or until such persons shall give notice, in the *New South Wales Government Gazette*, of their retirement from such Banking Company or firm.

That the proposed Act shall take effect from and after the _____ day of _____ 1840.

3.—*A Bill to remove doubts as to the Validity of certain marriages had and solemnized within the Colony of New South Wales, by Ministers of the CONGREGATIONAL or INDEPENDENT, and BAPTIST DENOMINATIONS, and to regulate the Registration of certain MARRIAGES, BIRTHS or BAPTISMS, and BURIALS.*

It being expedient to quiet any doubts which may hereafter arise as to the Validity of Marriages which have been solemnized within the Colony of New South Wales, by Ministers of Congregational or Independent, and Baptist Denominations—it is proposed,—

That all Marriages had and solemnized by Ministers of either of the above denominations, before the passing of the proposed Act, shall be of full force and effect.

That all Marriages which may be had and solemnized by Ministers of either denominations, after the passing of the proposed Act, shall be of full force, provided one or both of the persons so married shall have first signed a declaration that he, she, or they, is or are a member or members of such denomination, and certificates, in duplicate, of all such Marriages shall be made by the Ministers solemnizing the same, one Copy of

each of which shall be given to the parties married, and the other shall be transmitted for record to the Registrar of the Supreme Court.

That a certificate of every birth, baptism, or burial, solemnized or performed by any Minister of either of the above denominations shall be transmitted by him to the Registrar of the said Supreme Court, within one Calendar Month after the solemnization or performance of the same, under a penalty of Ten Pounds for each neglect or omission.

That such respective certificates, so transmitted to the said Registrar, shall by him be safely kept; and alphabetical Lists of them shall be made out for public inspection, on payment of a fee of one shilling for each name searched for; and certified copies of such certificates shall be received as conclusive evidence of the marriage, baptism, or burial of the parties respectively named therein; and for every such certified copy of any such certificate, the sum of one shilling, and no more, shall be charged.

4.—“A Bill further to amend an Act, intituled ‘an Act to provide for the conveyance and postage of Letters.’”

It being expedient further to amend the Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of New South, Wales 5 Wm. IV. No 24, and to make provision for the conveyance of Mails, Letters, and Newspapers, by Steam Boats, and other vessels trading between Post Towns, and other places situated on the sea coast, or on the banks of navigable rivers in the said Colony, appointed for the receipt and dispatch of Mails—it is proposed;—

That all Mails, bags, boxes, or packets of Letters, or Newspapers on board any Steam Boat or other vessel trading as aforesaid, at the time of her arrival at any such place as aforesaid, shall be delivered, on demand, to any Post Officer, or Post Master of such place, or to any other person duly authorised to act for him or them, under penalty of not less than _____ nor more than _____ pounds, to be paid by the Master, Commander, or other person in charge of such Steam Boat or other vessel.

That any person conveying Letters or Newspapers without being duly authorised thereto by the proper authorities, shall be subject and liable to the like penalties as would, under the 22nd clause of the said Act, be inflicted on persons conveying Letters for hire or reward.

That the Masters, Commanders, or other persons having the charge of Steam Boats or other vessels trading as aforesaid, shall receive Mails on board their vessel, and give receipt for the same, under a penalty of not less than _____ nor more than _____ pounds.

That the Masters, Commanders, or other persons having the charge of Steam Boats or other vessels trading as aforesaid, shall give notice of approach of their vessel, to any place appointed for the receipt and dispatch of Mails, either by ringing a bell, or by such other concerted signal as may be reasonably expected to be distinctly heard or seen by the Post Master at such place, a sufficient time before the actual arrival of such Steam Boat, or other vessel, to enable him to be prepared to receive or dispatch any Mail, under

penalty of not less than _____ nor more than _____ pounds.

That the Masters, Commanders, or other Persons having the charge of Steam Boats and other Vessels trading as aforesaid, shall receive for each and every Letter which may be contained in any Mail so conveyed by them as aforesaid, the sum of _____

That if any Post Officer, Post Master, or other Person duly authorised to receive or dispatch any Mail, shall neglect or fail to deliver, or retard the delivery of such Mail, he shall forfeit and pay a penalty of not less than _____ nor more than _____ pounds.

That any Post Master, or other Person duly employed in the business of the Post Office, who shall offend against, or fail to comply with, the provisions of the proposed Act, shall forfeit and pay a penalty of not less than _____ nor more than _____ pounds.

As to the Recovery and Appropriation of fines.

5.—A Bill to authorise the election of Commissioners of Highways and Public Works, in the Colony of New South Wales.

It being considered expedient and necessary, for the greater safety and convenience of the inhabitants of New South Wales, that provision should be made for the construction and keeping in repair of Highways, Roads, Bridges, and other Public Works, or Buildings within the Colony—it is proposed,—

That in each Police District of the Colony, certain Commissioners shall be elected—such Commissioners to be called, and known by the name of the COMMISSIONERS OF HIGHWAYS AND PUBLIC WORKS.

That the number of Commissioners to be elected in each District, shall depend upon the population of such District, and shall be regulated as follows—that is to say, for a District whose population, according to the census taken last before such election, shall be less than seven thousand souls, the number of Commissioners shall not exceed nine; for a District where population shall be seven thousand, but not more than ten thousand souls, the number of Commissioners shall not exceed twelve; for a District whose population shall be ten thousand, but not more than twenty thousand souls, the number of Commissioners shall not exceed fifteen; and for a District whose population shall be twenty thousand, but not more than forty thousand souls, the number of Commissioners shall not exceed twenty-one.

That Meetings for the purpose of electing such Commissioners shall be holden in each Police District, on the first Tuesday in the month of September in every year.

That every Male Inhabitant in each District who shall be possessed of Property to the amount of Five Hundred Pounds, or who shall be in the bona fide occupation of premises within his District of the yearly value of Twenty Pounds, shall be entitled to vote at all elections of Commissioners for his District.

That the Magistrates in Petty Sessions assembled in such District shall nominate some fit and proper person to preside at every such election, and also two Assessors to assist such pre-

aiding Officers, together with Clerks and other necessary Officers.

That every such election shall be had before the presiding Officers and Assessors aforesaid; and the voting thereat shall commence at nine o'clock in the forenoon, and finally close at four o'clock in the afternoon of the same day, and shall be conducted in manner prescribed by the proposed Act.

That the Commissioners shall not act until they make declaration of their acceptance of Office.

That every person elected to the Office of Commissioner shall accept such Office, or pay a fine of Fifty Pounds.

That any Commissioner who shall be declared Bankrupt or Insolvent shall lose his Office.

That if any person shall act as a Commissioner without having made a declaration aforesaid, or without being duly qualified at the time of making such declaration, or after he shall cease to be qualified, under the provisions of the proposed Act, he shall forfeit the sum of Fifty Pounds.

That one third of the number of Commissioners shall go out of Office annually.

That vacancies in the Office of Commissioners shall be filled up by the same process as for ordinary Elections.

That the Commissioners of each District may sue and be sued in the name of the Chairman, a memorial of whose name shall be recorded in the Supreme Court.

That Commissioners may appoint Treasurers, Surveyors, Clerks, Collectors, Valutors, and all other necessary Officers, and assign and order payment of reasonable Salaries to them.

That Commissioners may enter into Contracts for the performance of any matters pertaining to their duties, under the provisions of the proposed Act, provided they have no personal interest therein.

That the Commissioners shall order and direct the levying of Rates in their respective Districts, and for such purpose shall cause an accurate valuation to be made of all property therein, including Cattle, Horses, and Sheep; and such valuation shall set forth the annual value of all the property so valued.

That all Land, whether waste, or cultivated, shall be included in such valuation; provided no waste land shall be rated at less than per acre per annum.

That Commissioners or Valutors or Surveyors, appointed by them, may enter upon any Land, for the purpose of making such valuation, giving three days previous notice in certain cases.

That, after valuation made, Commissioners may determine Rates, and direct the same to be levied.

That Male Convicts shall be rated at shillings each.

That the Monies so rated shall be paid to the Treasurer for the District in which the same shall be levied; and shall be applied towards the construction and repair of Highways, Roads, Bridges, and other Public Works and Buildings.

That the several Rates so to be levied as aforesaid shall be paid to the Collectors appointed by the respective Commissioners, and shall by them be paid over to the Treasurer of

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the District in which they shall be so levied; and if any Proprietor, Tenant, or Occupant shall refuse or neglect to pay any such Rates to any such Collector for the space of fourteen days next after the same shall have been demanded, the same shall be levied by distress and sale of the Defaulter's goods &c. and in default of sufficient distress, such Defaulter may be committed to any House of Correction, there to remain without bail or mainprize, for any term not exceeding three Calendar Months, unless such Rates and the costs and charges incurred in levying the same be sooner paid.

ABORIGINES.

WITH reference to the various notices respecting the treatment of the ABORIGINAL NATIVES of this Colony, which have been issued from this Office, and particularly to those published in the *Government Gazette* of 18th May, 1836, and 22nd May, 1839; the GOVERNOR desires that the following Extract from a Despatch addressed to him by Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonial Department, on the 31st December, 1839, be published for general information.

(EXTRACT)

"You cannot overrate the solicitude of Her Majesty's Government on the subject of the Aborigines of New Holland. It is impossible to contemplate the condition and the prospects of that unfortunate race without the deepest commiseration. I am well aware of the many difficulties which oppose themselves to the effectual protection of these people, and especially of those which must originate from the exasperation of the Settlers, on account of aggressions on their property, which are not the less irritating, because they are nothing else than the natural results of the pernicious examples held out to the Aborigines, and of the many wrongs of which they have been the victims—still it is impossible that the Government should forget that the original aggression was our own, and that we have never yet performed the sacred duty of making any systematic or considerable attempt to impart to the former occupiers of New-South Wales, the blessing of Christianity, or the knowledge of the arts and advantages of civilised life. It is, I know, superfluous to stimulate your zeal in this service. Yet, I cannot be satisfied to quit the subject without commending it to your renewed attention. I am convinced that you may confidently reckon on the advice and co-operation of the Ministers of Religion of every Christian Deno-

mination; and you may calculate, with the utmost confidence, on the cordial support of the Crown, in every well directed effort for securing to the Aboriginal Race of New Holland, protection against injustice, and the enjoyment of every social advantage which our superior wealth and knowledge at once confer on us the power, and impose on us the duty, of imparting to them. For this purpose, you will use every effort to afford instruction to their children and young men. You will seek out persons, whose humanity leads them to be kind to the Native Races; and you will take means to reward the Missionaries who may engage in this good work."

GOVERNMENT NOTICE.—To Mariners. After the 1st of August, 1840, a plain stationary Light will be shown from sunset to sunrise from a Light-house erected on the extremity of Gellibrand's Point, William's Town, Hobson's Bay, visible five leagues in clear weather, from any safe position to the Southward.

All Masters of Vessels entering the Port are requested to notice the following Bearings by Compass:—

From the N. end of the Western Channel, the anchorage at William's Town bears N. 14° E.

From the N. end of Symond's Channel, the anchorage at William's Town bears N. 6° E.

From the N. end of the Pinnacle Channel, the anchorage at William's Town bears N. 5° E.

From the N. end of the South Channel, the anchorage at William's Town bears N. 6° W.

The courses indicated will give Vessels a fair berth from the Shoal off Gellibrand's Point. Care must be taken after bringing the Light-house to bear N 67° 33' W. by compass, not to stand into less than four fathoms water on the western shore, and also to guard against a Bank which lies off the eastern beach, bearing from the Light-house from about N. 22° E. to N. 7° E. 1½ mile. After rounding the Light and bringing it to bear about S. 14° W. 1' the anchor may be dropped in four fathoms water, in good holding ground of stiff clay and mud.

In order to avert the calamities which must necessarily follow if the small-pox be introduced into the Colony, and to keep up a constant supply of Vaccine Lymph, His Excellency the GOVERNOR directs it to be notified, that children will receive Vaccination gratis, if taken to any of the Public Hospitals, or Colonial Surgeons, throughout the Colony, every Tuesday, at Eleven o'clock in the forenoon. But as the operation itself, without any proof of its having taken effect would be insufficient security to the public mind, His EXCELLENCY has been pleased to direct, that a charge of one shilling shall be deposited for every child vaccinated, which sum will be returned on the presentation of the child on the next Vaccination day.

His EXCELLENCY very strongly recommends to parents and guardians to avail themselves as early as possible of the means thus afforded to them of taking this necessary and proper precaution, with respect to all children not already vaccinated.

This Horse was found in the Bombay Ranges, near Dr. Anderson's farm, in this District, where, a few days previous, four mounted and armed bushrangers were captured by the Mounted Police stationed at Braidwood. The Horses found in possession of the bushrangers were since claimed by their owners.
