PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE GIPPS, Knight, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS HER MAJESTY was graciously pleased, by Letters Patent, under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date the fifth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-seven, to constitute and appoint Me, Sir George Gipps, Knight, to be Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief in and over the Territory called New South Wales, comprised within the limits therein mentioned; And whereas, by certain other Letters Patent under the Great Seal of the said United Kingdom, bearing date the fifteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, Her said Majesty has been pleased to alter and enlarge the limits of the said Territory in manner herein-after mentioned, and to revoke so much of the said first mentioned Letters Patent as relates to the limits of the said Territory under my Government, and to constitute and appoint Me, Sir George Gipps, Knight, to be Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief in and over the Territory called New South Wales, extending (save and except as therein is excepted) from the Northern Cape, or extremity of the coast, called Cape York, in the latitude of ten degrees thirty-seven minutes south to the southern extremity of the said Territory of New South Wales, or Wilson's Promontory, in the latitude of thirty-nine degrees twelve minutes south, and of all the country inland to the westward as far as the one hundred and twenty-ninth degree of east longitude, reckoning from the meridian of Greenwich, including all the Islands adjacent in the Pacific Ocean, within the latitude aforesaid, of ten degrees thirty-seven minutes south and thirty-nine degrees twelve minutes south; and also including Norfolk Island, lying in or about the latitude of twenty-nine degrees three minutes south and one hundred and sixty-eight degrees of east longitude from the said meridian of Greenwich; and also including any Territory which is or may be acquired in sovereignty by Her said Majesty, Her Heirs, or Successors, within that group of Islands in the

Pacific Ocean, commonly called New Zealand, lying between the latitude of thirty-four degrees thirty minutes and forty-seven degrees ten minutes south and one hundred and sixty-six degrees five minutes, and one hundred and seventy-nine degrees east longitude from the said meridian of Greenwich, and of all Forts and Garrisons erected and established, or which shall be erected and established within the said Territories, or within any of the said Islands except that part of Her Majesty's said Territory which is called and known by the name of the Province of South Australia, and which lies between the meridians of the one hundred and thirty-second and the one hundred and forty-first degrees of east longitude, and between the Southern Ocean and twenty-sixth degree of south latitude, with all and every the Islands adjacent thereto, and the Bays and Gulfs thereof, as therein is excepted as aforesaid; Now I, the said Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief aforesaid, do hereby Proclaim and Declare that Her Majesty has been pleased to extend the said Territory accordingly.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE GIPPS, Knight, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice Admiral of the same, &c. &c. &c.

WHEREAS HER MAJESTY was graciously pleased, by certain Letters Patent under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date at Westminster, the fifth day of October, in the year One thousand eight hundred and thirty-seven, to constitute and appoint Me, Sir George Gipps, Knight, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Territory of New South Wales, com-

prised within the limits therein mentioned : And whereas Her Majesty, by certain other Letters Patent under the Great Seal of the said United Kingdom, bearing date the fifteenth day of June, in the year One thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, was pleased to revoke so much of the said first recited Letters Patent as describes the limits of Her Majesty's said Territory of New South Wales, and to further extend the limits thereof, so as to include any Territory which is or may be acquired in sovereignty by Her Majesty, Her heirs and successors, within that group of Islands in the Pacific Ocean commonly called New Zealand, and lying between the latitude of thirty-four degrees thirty minutes and forty-seven degrees ten minutes south, and one hundred and sixty-six degrees five minutes and one hundred and seventy-nine degrees east longitude, reckoning from the meridian of Greenwich : And whereas Her Majesty, reposing especial trust and confidence in the prudence, courage, and loyalty of William Hobson, Esquire, Captain in Her Majesty's Navy, has been pleased, by a Commission under the Royal Signet and Sign Manual, bearing date the thirtieth day of July, in the year One thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, to constitute and appoint the said William Hobson, Esquire, to be Her Majesty's Lieutenant-Governor in and over that part of Her Majesty's Territory so described, as aforesaid, in the said last recited Letters Patent, which is or may be acquired in sovereignty by Her Majesty, Her heirs or successors, within that group of Islands in the Pacific Ocean commonly called New Zealand, to have, hold, exercise, and enjoy, the said office of Lieutenant-Governor during Her Majesty's pleasure : And whereas Her Majesty was pleased to command that in the execution of such his Office he, the said Lieutenant-Governor, should obey all such lawful instructions as might be from time to time addressed to him by Me, the said Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief, or in the event of my death, or absence from the limits of my Government and Command, by the Officer for the time being administering the Government of the said Territory and its Dependencies : Now I, the Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief aforesaid, do hereby proclaim and declare that I have this day administered the prescribed oaths to the said William Hobson, Esquire, as Lieutenant-Governor of such parts of the said Territory as is or may be acquired in sovereignty as aforesaid : And I hereby call upon all British subjects to be aiding and assisting the said William Hobson, Esquire, in the execution of his said Office.

PROCLAMATION.

✓ *By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GIPPS, Knight,*
Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief, in and over Her Majesty's Territory of New South

Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS, Her MAJESTY has been pleased, by instructions under the hand of the most noble the Marquis of Normanby, one of Her Majesty's principal Secretaries of State, and bearing date the fourteenth day of August, One thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, to Command that it shall be announced to all Her Majesty's subjects in New Zealand, that Her Majesty will not acknowledge as valid any title to land which either has been or shall be hereafter acquired in that country, which is not either derived from or confirmed by a grant to be made in Her Majesty's name, and on Her behalf, but that care shall be taken at the same time to dispel any apprehension that it is intended to dispossess the owners of any land acquired on equitable conditions, and not in extent or otherwise prejudicial to the present or prospective interests of the community, to be investigated and reported on by Commissioners to be appointed by Me, with such powers as may be conferred upon them by an Act of the Governor and Council of New South Wales : Now I, the Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief aforesaid, do hereby Proclaim and Declare such to be Her Majesty's Commands, for the information and guidance of all parties interested ; and I do further Proclaim and Declare that all purchases of land in any part of New Zealand which may be made by any of Her Majesty's subjects from any of the Native Chiefs or Tribes of these Islands, after the date hereof, will be considered as absolutely null and void, and neither confirmed nor in any way recognised by Her Majesty.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR has been pleased to direct that the following order of the QUEEN IN COUNCIL, dated the 11th day of July, 1839, appointing the Ports of DIGBY and ARICHAT, in the Province of NOVA SCOTIA, free Warehousing Ports for the Importation and Exportation of Goods into and from Her Majesty's Possessions, be republished from the *London Gazette*, for general information.

At the Court of Buckingham Palace, the eleventh day of July, 1839.
PRESENT,

The QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty, in Council.
WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament, holden in the third and fourth years of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "*An Act to regulate the Trade of the British Possessions abroad.*" It was, amongst other things, enacted that no goods should be imported into, nor should

any goods, except the produce of the Fisheries, in British ships be exported from any of the British Possessions in America, by sea from or to any place other than the United Kingdom, or some other of such Possessions, excepting to or from the several Ports in such Possessions, called Free Ports, enumerated or described in the Table in the said Act contained; and it was, thereby, further enacted that if any goods should be imported into any Port or Place, in any of the said Possessions, contrary to the said Act, such goods should be forfeited; and it was, thereby, provided that if His Majesty should deem it expedient to extend the provisions of the said Act to any Port or Ports not enumerated in the said Table, it should be lawful for His Majesty, by order of Council, to extend the provisions of the said Act to such Port or Ports: and, that from and after the day mentioned in such order in Council, all the privileges and advantages of the said Act, and all the provisions, penalties, and forfeitures therein contained, subject, nevertheless, to the limitations and restrictions, thereafter provided, should extend, and be deemed, and construed to extend to any such Port or Ports, respectively, as fully as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the said Table, at the time of passing the said Act.

And it was thereby also enacted, that the several ports therein in that behalf mentioned, should be free warehousing ports for all the purposes of the said Act: and that it should be lawful for His Majesty by order in Council from time to time to appoint any port in His Majesty's Possessions in America, to be a free warehousing port for all or any of the purposes of the said Act, and that every port so appointed should be for all the purposes expressed in such an order, a free warehousing port, under the said Act, as if appointed by the same.

And whereas, Her Majesty doth deem it expedient to extend the before mentioned provisions of the said Act respecting such free ports; to the ports of Digby and Arichat, in the province of Nova Scotia.

Now therefore, under and by virtue of the said Act of Parliament, and in exercise of the powers in Her Majesty in Council in that behalf vested, Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her Privy Council doth order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that, from and after the eleventh day of September, One thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, the provisions of the said Act as far as the same relate to the free ports respectively therein mentioned, shall be, and the same are hereby extended to the ports of Digby and Arichat, in the Province of Nova Scotia, and that, from and after the said eleventh day of September, One thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, all the privileges and advantages of the said Act, conferred upon the free ports therein mentioned, and all the provisions, penalties, and forfeitures in the said Act contained, subject to the limitations and restrictions therein provided, shall extend to the said ports of Digby and Arichat, as fully and effectually as if such ports had been inserted and enumerated in the said table at the time of passing the said Act.

And in further pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities in Her said Majesty by the said Act in that behalf vested, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth

order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Ports of Digby and Arichat, in the Province of Nova Scotia, hereinbefore appointed Free Ports as aforesaid, shall also, from and after the eleventh day of September, One thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, be Free Warehousing Ports for all the purposes of the said Act.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

PRESENT

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed at the Session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth Years of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled, "*An Act to regulate the Trade of the British Possessions abroad*," it was among other things enacted that no Goods should be Imported into, nor should any Goods except the Produce of the Fisheries in British ships be Exported, from any of the British Possessions in America by sea, from or to any place other than the United Kingdom, or some other of such Possessions, excepting to and from the several Ports in such Possessions called Free Ports, enumerated or described in the Table in the said Act contained; and it was thereby further enacted that if any Goods should be imported into any Port or Place in any of the said Possessions, contrary to the said Act, such Goods should be forfeited; and it was thereby provided that if His Majesty should deem it expedient to extend the provisions of the said Act to any Port or Ports not enumerated in the said Table, it should be lawful for His Majesty, by Order in Council, to extend the provisions of the said Act to such Port or Ports, and that from and after the day mentioned in such Order in Council, all the privileges and advantages of the said Act, and all the provisions, penalties, and forfeitures therein contained, subject nevertheless to the limitations and restrictions thereafter provided, should extend, and be deemed and construed to extend, to any such Port or Ports respectively, as fully as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the said Table at the time of passing the said Act.

And it was thereby also enacted, that the several Ports therein in that behalf mentioned should be Free Warehousing Ports for all the purposes of the said Act; and that it should be lawful for His Majesty, by Order in Council from time to time, to appoint any Port in His Majesty's Possessions in America to be a free Warehousing Port for all

or any of the purposes of the said Act; and that every Port so appointed should be for all the purposes expressed in such Order a Free Warehousing Port under the said Act, as if appointed by the same.

And whereas Her Majesty doth deem it expedient to extend the before mentioned provisions of the said Act respecting such Free Ports to the Port of George Town, Demerara, in the Colony of British Guiana.

Now, therefore, under and by virtue of the said Act of Parliament, and in exercise of the powers in Her Majesty in Council in that behalf vested, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council doth order and it is hereby ordered accordingly, That from and after the twenty-sixth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, the Provisions of the said Act as far as the same relate to the Free Ports respectively therein mentioned shall be, and the same are hereby extended to the Port of George Town, Demerara, in the Colony of British Guiana; and that from and after the said twenty-sixth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, all the privileges and advantages of the said Act conferred upon the Free Ports therein mentioned, and all the Provisions, Penalties, and Forfeitures in the said Act contained, subject to the limitations and restrictions therein provided, shall extend to the said Port of George Town, as fully and effectually as if such Port had been inserted and enumerated in the said Table, at the time of passing the said Act.

And in further pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities in Her Majesty by the said Act in that behalf vested; Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth order and it is hereby ordered, that the Port of George Town, Demerara, in the Colony of British Guiana, herein appointed a Free Port as aforesaid, shall also from and after the twenty-sixth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, be a Free Warehousing Port for all the purposes of the said Act.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

PUBLIC ACCOUNTS.

9.
