IS Excellency the GOVERNOR is pleased to direct that the general objects of the following Bill, now under consideration of the Legislative Council, be published for general information.

By His Excellency's Command, E. DEAS THOMSON.

No. 1.—"A Bill to increase the Duty on Spirits distilled in New South Wales and its Dependencies."

The duties on spirits, wine, and other goods and merchandise, imported into New South Wales and its Dependencies, having been increased by the Act 4 Victoria, No. 11, and it being expedient to preserve the relative proportion in the duties to be levied upon spirits imported into the said Colony, and spirits distilled therein, it is proposed;

That immediately from and after the passing of the proposed Act, there shall belevied and collected upon all spirits made or distilled within the said Colony and its Dependencies, from grain, whether imported into or grown within the said Colony or its Dependencies, or from any article, the produce of the said Colony or its Dependencies, a rate or duty of six shillings and sixpence for every gallon imperial measure of such spirits, not exceeding the strength of hydrometer proof, and in the same proportion for spirits of greater strength.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR is pleased to direct that the general objects of the following Bill, now under consideration of the Legislative Council, be published for general information.

No. 1.—A Bill to regulate the payment of the Duties of Customs in Her Majesty's Dominions in the Islands of New Zealand.

It being expedient to suspend, for a limited time, the payment of all rates, dues, fees, and duties of Customs, within the Islands of New Zealand, it is proposed—

That no rates, dues, fees, or duties of Customs shall be charged, or payable, or paid, on any spirits, wine, or other goods, or merchandise within, or imported into the Islands of New Zealand, until the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and forty one.

That from and after the said first day of July one thousand eight hundred and forty one, all and the like rates, dues, fees, and duties of Customs, which may then be chargeable and paid on spirits, wine, and other goods and merchandise imported into New South Wales, shall also be chargeable and paid on those imported into New Zealand, provided that no duty of Custom shall be chargeable or paid, on unmanufactured tobacco imported into the said Islands, until the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and forty three.

That all goods imported into New Zealand without payment of duties and exported thence to New South Wales, shall be charged with the like duties, as if they had been imported directly into New South Wales, without having been previously imported into New Zealand.

That no duties already paid on goods imported into New Zealand, shall be refunded.

That no person shall be allowed to import into, or by wholesale to sell, within the said Islands of New Zealand, any spirituous liquors, except on being licensed thereto.

That all the stock of spirituous liquors which may be found by the Officers of Customs within any store, or upon any publican's premises within the said Islands, on the first day of July one thousand eight hundred and forty one, shall be charged with the duties then customary to be paid on spirituous liquors imported into New South Wales.

As to powers of Officers of Customs to enter into or open any store or publican's premises, for the purposes of the proposed Act, and penalty on parties obstructing them.

As expedition is of so much importance, offers for any quicker conveyance of the Mails than is now effected will be favourably entertained; but it is to be understood that they are to be dispatched on the days and hours to be fixed by the Postmaster-General, either according to the present arrangement, or as he may afterwards determine for the public convenience.

It will be optional with parties to offer for one or more of the above lines of stages, and to propose the mode of conveyance; but on all roads where wheel vehicles can travel, a preference will be given to carriage conveyance; and the contractors will be held strictly bound to use the conveyance they propose, and to travel at the rate agreed upon. The rate of travelling is not to be less than six miles per hour, including all stoppages. The Contractors are to carry all bags and letters which may be delivered to them under authority of the Postmaster-General, or any of the Postmasters, and to provide secure lockers for the Mails in carriages, and dry coverings for the bags on horseback.

Contractors will be bound to prevent the conveyance of any letter or packet, by any of their servants, or passengers, or otherwise to the prejudice of the Post Office Revenue, under a pen-

alty of £5 for each and every offence.

Contractors will be liable to a fine of five shillings for every five minutes delay after the specified time of starting; and to a like penalty for every ten minutes delay after the specified time of arrival, except for the first five and ten

minutes respectively.

A Mail Cart or Carriage, drawn only by one horse, must not carry more than one passenger; by two horses, not more that three passengers; and by three or more horses, not more than six passengers, exclusive of the driver, under a penalty of £3 for each offence, on all roads except between Melbourne and Yass, and on that road the penalty will be £10.

All vehicles and horses employed in the conveyance of Mails, are to be at all times subject to the inspection and approval, or rejection of the Postmaster-General, or person appointed by him for that purpose. The drivers and postmen are to be free men, and of certified good character.

All fines and penalties incurred under the agreement, are to be deducted by the Postmaster-General from the next quarterly instalment falling due to the Contractor, and to be considered as over and above any penalties provided by any Act of Council.

Each party Tendering, or an agent for him, must attend at this Office on the day appointed for opening the Tenders; and each Tender must bear the signatures of two respectable and solvent persons, willing to enter into a Bond with the Contractor for the safety of the Mails, and the due performance of the Contract.

THE Postmaster-General having brought under notice the practice which is understood to prevail of bags or mails of letters being made up by merchants and others for despatch, by

vessels sailing for Great Britain or elsewhere, HIS EXCRLLENCY the GOVERNOR directs it to be notified, that under the provisions of the Act of the Governor and Council, 5th William IV., No. 24, section 22, any person sending letters or packets chargeable with postage, otherwise than by post, is liable to a penalty of not less than £2, nor more than £20, for every such letter or packet so sent, and that orders have been given for strictly enforcing the penalty in future. His Excellency at the same time directs it to be notified, that masters of vessels render themselves liable to the same penalty, by receiving any letter or packet, on board, except through the Post Office; but that they will be entitled to receive one penny for each letter, or packet sent to them by the Postmaster-General, or Postmaster of the place from which they may be about to depart.

8. To Prisoners confined in Gaol: 12oz. wheat bread, 12oz. maize meal, 4oz. fresh beef, 8oz. vegetables, ½oz. sal', ½oz. soap. (Ration No. 3 is issued to Gaol Attendants, and to Witnesses and others awaiting bail; and if confined in solitary cells, Ration No. 10.)

9. To Children of Female Prisoners confined in Gaol-80z. wheat bread, 40z. fresh beef, I pint

10. Prisoners confined in Lock-up or Watch-houses—24oz. wheat bread—(Ration No. 3 is occasionally issued at Watch-houses, to Prisoners of the Crown, when travelling from one station to another, and in other cases when sauctioned by a Magistrate.)

11. Forage for Horses and Oxen—8lbs. maize, or barley, or 10lbs. of oats, 4lbs. bran, 12lbs. oaten or cultivated grass hay, and 4 bs. wheat straw, for each horse daily, and haf that quantity for each

All the articles required by this Notice are to be of the best quality of their sever# kinds.

The Flour and Bread must be the produce of clean sound Colonial wheat, from which, on the Ration of Emigrants, Surveying and Mounted Police Parties, Superintendent and Crew of the Floating Light, Men at the Light-house, Boatmen, and the Orphan Schools, 20 per cent., and on the Ration to Prisoners of the Crown 10 per cent. has been extracted in Bran and Waste.

Beef and Mutton to be issued in such proportions as may be required for the Ration to Emigrants, and, when the quantity admits of it, this, as well as the Convict Ration of Beef, to be deliverable in fore and hind quarters alternately.

Beef to be issued to the Orphan Schools on fivedays, and Mutton on two days of the week.

The Maize Meal to be similar in quality to the Wheat Meal, and to be twice ground,

When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz.—1 lb. wheat flour or 1 lb. biscuit, equal 1 of bread; 1 lb. salt beef or 1 lb. mutton, or 10oz. salt pork, equal to 1 lb. of freshmet

These substitutions are not to be made except on the requisition of the officer authorised to draw the several Rations.

Hospital Bread is to be supplied to the Children of the Female Orphan School, when required by the Surgeon, in lieu of the ordinary Ration.

Vegetables to be supplied in reasonable proportions of potatoes, greens, pumpkins, onions, &c. &c.

The supplies for Road and other Parties are to be delivered at the nearest fixed Stations to the places where the party may be employed, on the requisition of the Officer in charge; and in case the whole Ration of Forage be not required or delivered, each of the species to be reckoned as the portion of the Ration undermentioned:—The maize or barley 4-12, the hay 5-12, the bran 2-12, the straw 1-12.

The Supplies (not specified in the preceding paragraph) are to be delivered direct to the Parties or Establishments entitled thereto, on the written order of the person duly authorised for the purpose.

Separate Tenders will be required for the Forage in the District of Sydney; but the other supplies for that district are to be tendered for together.

The supplies for each of the other Districts, with the exception of those for the Orphan Schools and the Lunatic Asylum, are intended to be included in one Contract; and therefore no Tenders can be received unless for supplying the whole that may be required in the entire of a District, and to each District there must be a separate Tender.

Separate Tenders to be made for each of the Orphan Schools, and for the Lunatic Asylum.

Provisions and Forage being required by Rations, according to the scales under their respective heads, the Tenders are required to express the price per ration only.

The Tenders for Forage are not required to state the price of the Ration for Oxen, as when the latter is required, one half of the allowance fixed for Horses will be drawn, and one half the price allowed to the Contractor, whose engagement is to provide for both Horses and Oxen.

In the event of a difference of opinion between the Contractor and the party receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey, according to the practice of the service. But in country districts where a Board of Survey cannot be conveniently assembled, the party objecting will name one person as arbitrator, the Contractor or his agent another, and these two will (previously to any other proceeding on their part) concur in naming a third as umpire, who in the event of the arbitrators not agreeing in opinion will be called upon for his decision, which shall be final.

If the board, arbitrators, or umpire, shall decide

that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the Contractor, failing of which it will be procured by the Department requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

In the event of any unnecessary delay or failure of the Contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise procured in like

manner.

In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or from some other cause injury would be sustained either by the parties to whom the Rations are due, or to the Contractor, by waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of the party or parties for whom the Rations are to be received, shall have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality; it being distinctly understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and that the Contractor will have a right to appeal to the Governor, although, in the mean time, he must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead.

A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of any delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the Contractor, upon the report of the officer in charge of the parties or establishment, to such mulc', not exceeding one-fourth the amount of his monthly account, as the Governor may direct. It will also be in the power of the Governor, upon

such repetition, to terminate the contract. It will be in the power of either party to limit the duration of the contract, by giving in writing

a notice of three full calendar months to the opposite party, and to end the contract at the expiration

of that period.

The Contractor will be required to prepare his own account, month y or quarterly, in the prescribed form; and on the production thereof, with the requisite voucners, in a complete state, to the officer receiving the supplies, the same will be forwarded by the latter to the Auditor-General, in order that a warrant may be prepared, and payment made from the Colonial Treasury.
