PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE GIPPS, Knight, Captain General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

HEREAS, by an Act of the Governor with the advice of the Legislative Council, passed in the third year of the Reign of His late Majesty, King William the Fourth, entituled "An Act for the better regulating Courts of Requests, in the Colony of New South Wales;" it is enacted that Courts of Civil Jurisdiction to be called Courts of Requests, shall be holden at and in the following Towns or Places respectively; that is to say, in the County of Cumberland, at the several Towns of Sydney, Parramasta, Liverpool, Penrith, Windsor, and Campbelltown, and in the County of Camden, at the Town of Wollongong and the said Courts respectively shall be holden at such times, at the said several Towns or Places, as the Governor for the time being shall, by Proclamation to be issued for that purpose from time to time, direct and appoint.

Now I, the said GOVERNOR, in pursuance of the power and authority so vested in me by the said recited Act, do hereby direct and appoint that the said Courts of Civil Jurisdiction, to be called Courts of Requests, shall be holden in each and every year at the several and respective places aforesaid, on the days and times hereinafter respectively mentioned; that is to say,—

At SYDNEY, on the first Thursday and following days, in the respective mouths of March, April, June, July, August, September, October, and December.

At PARRAMATTA, on Monday, the 10th of May; Monday, the 13th of September; and Monday, the 13th of December.

At LIVERPOOL, on Wednesday, the 14th of April; Wednesday, the 14th July; and Wednesday, the 18th of October.

At CAMPBELL Town, on Thursday, the 15th of April; Thursday, the 15th of July; and Thursday, the 14th of October.

At Wollongong, on Saturday, the 24 h of April; and Saturday, the 23rd of October.

At Windson, on Friday, the 14th of May; Tuesday, the 14th of September; and Tuesday, the 14th of December.

At PENRITH, on Saturday, the 19th of June; Saturday, the 18th of September; and Saturday, the 18th of December.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir George Gipes, Knight, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales, and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c. &c. &c.

HEREAS, by an Act passed in the present year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to provide for the more effectual Administration of Justice in New South Wales and its Dependencies," it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor to appoint from time to time, one of the Judges of the Supreme Court to reside in the District of Port Phillip, and by Proclamation for that purpose, issued with the advice of the Executive Council, to dec'are and define the limits of the said District within which such resident Judge shall exercise jurisdiction; and that within the limits so declared and defined, the said Judge whilst so resident thereio, shall have, exerc'se, and er joy all such and the lke powers, jurisdiction, and authority, as now is, or are, or can be legally exercised by the said Supreme Court, or by all, or any of the Judges thereof collectively or individually: And whereas, I; the Govern r aforesaid, have by a Commission bearing even date herewith, under my Hand and the Seal of the Co ony, appointed John Walpole Willis, E.q.,

the said District of Port Phillip;-

Now I, the GOVERNOR aforesaid, with the advice of the said Executive Council, do hereby declare, in pursuance of the powers so in me vested, that the said District of Port Phillip shall comprise all that part of the Territory of New South Wales which is bounded on the north by the thirty-sixth degree of south

latitude; on the east by the one hundred and forty-sixth degree of east longitude, measuring from the meridian of Greenwich; on the south by the waters of Bass's Straits and the Pacific Ocean, and on the west by the one hundred and forty-first degree of east longitude, from the said meridian of Greenwich, being the limits of the said district set forth in the Government Notice bearing date at Sydney the Tenth Day of September, One thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, within which His Honor the Superintendent exercises the powers of a Lieutenant Governor, and that within the said limits the said John Walpole Willis as such resident Judge, or such other Judge of the said Supreme Court as may hereafter be duly appointed to reside therein, shall have exercise, and enjoy the powers, jurisdiction, and authority, which are conferred by the provisions of the said recited Act.

One acre and thirty-seven perches, County of Cumberland, parish of St. Luke, Town of Liverpool; bounded on the north by Redfern's allotment, being a line bearing west 15 minutes, south 2 chains 44½ links; on the west by Josephson's allotment being a line bearing south 500 links; on the south by Elizabeth-street, being a line bearing east 15 minutes north 249½ links; and on the east by Goulburn-street, being a line bearing north 15 minutes west 500 links.

According to the original map of Liverpool signed by Governor Macquarie, this allotment was located to Stephen Hunter. On Mr. Moor's, and the present maps it is charted to Stephen Burcher, now deceased. Mrs. Burcher alleges that it was given to her late husband by Mr. Moore and suggests, that Hunter is a clerical error.

Case No. 906 .- Walter Shutt, of Liverpool.

One rood six perches, County of Cumberland, parish of St. Luke, Town of Liverpool; bounded on the north by Graham's allotment being a line 198 links; on the west by Nothumberland-street, being a line bearing south 45 minutes, east 147 links; on the south by Moore's-street, being a line bearing east 15 minutes, north 230 links; and on the east by Graham's allotment being a line bearing north 1 degree west 147 links.

According to the original map of Liverpool signed by Governor Macquarie, this is part of an allotment located to Isaac Nelson, and which is also shewn as his on Mr. Moore's map; claimant however alleges, that it never was Nelson's, but that it originally belonged to one, Gillespie, from whom it passed respectively to Matthew Pear, James Grady, and to claimant, who gave a part to his daughter, retaining for himself the present allotment, which is charted to him on the present maps.

Case No. 907.—William Tristram, of Liverpool.

Two roods two perches, County of Cumberland, parish of St. Luke, Town of Liverpool; bounded on the north by Blioman's allotment, being a line bearing west 214 links; on the west by Wood's allotment being a line 220 links; on the south by Bolton's and Blainman's allo ments being 283 links; and on the east by George-street, being a line bearing north 45 minutes, west 207 links.

According to the original map of Liverpool signed by Governor Macquarie, this allotment was located to James Price, deceased. It is also shewn as his on Mr. Moore's map. Claimant alleges, that he purchased of Price.

Case No. 908.—Daniel M'Lean, Representatives

Six hundred and forty acres, County of Camden, parish unnamed, near Jellore; commencing at a point two miles north and one mile east of a measured portion of 640 acres at Mandemar, forming the corner of three several measured portion of 640 acres each, and bounded on the south by the south easterly portions of the said three portions being a line bearing east 80 chains; on the east by a line bearing morth 80 chains; and on the west by a line bearing south 80 chains to the north west corner of the said south easterly portion of 640 acres aforesaid.

Also,

Six hundred and forty acres, County of Camden, parish unnamed, near Jellore; commencing on a line North 80 chains from the north east corner of a measued portion of 640 acres at Mandemar; and bounded on the west by a line bearing north 80 chains; on the north by a line bearing east 80 chains; on the east by a measured portion of 640 acres, being a line south 80 chains; and on the south by a line bearing west 80 chains to a line 80 chains north of the north east corner of a measured portion of 640 acres, at Mandemar, as aforesaid.

These lands were obtained partly on remission and partly by purchase, as intimated in the Colonial Treusurer's letter to the Colonial Secretary of 3rd May, 1839. Dr. M'Lean is now deceased and his Representatives are to show to whom a Deed or Deeds of Grant should now issue.
