## PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE GIPPS, Knight, Captain-General, and Governor-in-Chief, of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice Admiral of the same. &c., &c., &c.,

W HEREAS, by an Act of the Imperial Parliament of Great Britain, passed in the Ninth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty KING GEORGE THE FOURTH, intituled " An Act to provide for the administration of Justice in New South Wales and Van Diemen's Land, and for the more effectual Government thereof, and for other purposes relating thereto," it was, amongst other things enacted, that every Law or Ordinance to be passed by the Governor of New South Wales with the advice of the Legislative Council thereof, should, within six months from the date of such Law or Ordinance, be transmitted by the Governor for the Time being of the said Colony, to one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State for the time being; and that it should, and might be lawful, for His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, from time to time, as He or They should think necessary, to signify through one of His or Their Principal Secretaries of State, His or Their Approbation or Disallowance of all such Laws and Ordinances: and that from, and immediately after the Time when such Disallowance should be published in the said Colony by Proclamation to be for that purpose issued by the said Governor, all such Laws and Ordinances should be null and void ;-And whereas certain Acts or Ordinances were passed during the Third Year of the Reign of Her present Majesty QUEEN VICTORIA, by the Governor of New South Wales, with the advice of the Legislative Council thereof, intituled respeciively, " An Act to amend an Act intituled, An Act for Registering Deeds and Conveyances in New South Wales, and for other purposes; and to prevent Convicts under Sentence from Acting as Conveyancers," and "An Act to allow the Aboriginal Natives of New South Wales to be received as competent witnesses in Criminal Cases;" and, " An Act to enable the Proprietors of a certain Banking Company, carried on in the Town of Bathurst, in the Colony of New South Wales,

under the name, Style, and Firm of "The Bathurst Bank" to sue and be sued in the name of the President of the said Company for the time being; and for other purposes therein mentioned,"—And Whereas the Right Honorable Lord John Russell, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State has signified in two several despatches bearing date respectively, the tenth day of June and the eleventh day of August, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty, and addressed to the said Governor, Her Majesty's Disallowance of the said Acts;—Now I, Sir George Gipps, Knight, the Governor aforesaid, do by this iny Proclamation declare, that the said Acts are null and void accordingly.

Given under my Hand and Seal, at Government House, Sydney, this Eighth day of January, in the Year of Our Lord, One Thousand eight hundred and forty-one, and in the fourth Year of Her Majesty's Reign.

HIS Excellency the Governor is pleased to direct, that the following Grder in Council, respecting the Duties payable at the Cape of Good Hope, be re-published from the London Gazette, for general information.

By His Excellency's Command, E. DEAS THOMSON.

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 10th day of August, 1840. PRESENT,

The QUEEN's most excellent Majesty in Council. WHEREAS by a certain Act of Parliament, made in the session of Parliament, holden in the third and fourth years of the reign of His late Majesty, King William the Fourth, intituled " An Act to regulate the trade of the British possessions abroad," it is, amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for iter Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, by any Order or Orders in Council, to be issued from time to time, to give such directions and make such regulations touching the trade and commerce of, to, and from any British possession on or near the Continent of Europe, or within the Mediterranean Sea, or in Africa, or within the limits of the East India Company's Charter, excepting the possessions of the said Company, as to Her Majesty in Council shall appear most expedient and salutary :-

And whereas by an order in Council of the twenty-second day of February, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-two, made in pursuance of an Act, passed in the sixth year of the reign of King George the Fourth, initialed "An Act to regulate the trade of the British possessions abroad," certain duties of Customs are imposed upon goods imported into the Colony of the Cape of Good Hope, and it is expedient to repeal the said duties, and to impose other duties of Customs

in lieu thereof, Her Majesty doth, therefore, with the advice of Her Privy Council, and in pursuance and exercise of the powers so vested in Her as aforesaid, by the said recited Act of Parliament, order, and it is hereby ordered, that, upon goods, wares, and merchandise imported into the Cape of Good Hope, the duties imposed by the said order in Council shall cease and be no longer payable; and that, in lieu of the same, there shall be levied the several duties set forth in the table hereinafter contained, that is to say:—
