ORDER IN COUNCIL.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR is pleased to direct that the following Order in Council, appointing HAMILTON, in BERMUDA, a Free Warehousing Port, be re-published from the *London Gazette*, of the 22nd December, 1840, for general information.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the third and fourth years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "*An Act to regulate the trade of the British possessions abroad,*" it is amongst other things enacted, that the several Ports therein in that behalf mentioned shall be free warehousing Ports for all the purposes of the said Act; and it is thereby further enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by Order in Council, from time to time, to appoint any Port in His Majesty's possessions in America, to be a free warehousing Port for all or any of the purposes of the said Act, and that every Port so appointed shall be,

for all the purposes expressed in such Order, a free warehousing Port, under the said Act, as if appointed by the same:

And whereas Her Majesty doth deem it expedient to appoint the Port of Hamilton, in Bermuda, a free warehousing Port under the said Act, subject to the provisions hereinafter contained:

Now, therefore, in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities in Her Majesty by the said Act in that behalf vested, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Port of Hamilton, in Bermuda, shall be a free warehousing Port for all the purposes of the said Act:

Provided always, and it is hereby ordered, that nothing herein contained shall exempt any goods, wares, or merchandise imported from the said Port of Hamilton, into any of the British possessions in the West Indies, or on the Continent of South America, or into the Bahama Islands, from the payment of the duties now chargeable thereon in such places under the said Act.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

COUNCIL.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR is pleased to direct that the general objects of the following Bill, about to be brought under consideration of the Legislative Council, be published for general information.

No. 1.—*A Bill to continue, for five years, an Act passed in the second year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, "An Act further to restrain the unauthorised occupation of*

Crown Lands, and to provide the means of defraying the expense of a Border Police."

As the above recited Act, 2 VICTORIA, No. 27, will expire on the 1st day of July, 1841, it is proposed:—

That the said Act be continued for five years from that date.

That the 14th section, which enacts, that the brands of different proprietors shall be distinct, and be registered with the Commissioner; and the 15th section, which enacts, that all unbranded beasts above one year old shall be impounded, branded, and sold, unless the owner prove his right of property within twenty-one days from and after the impounding of the same; shall be made to extend to all parts of the Colony.

That the Commissioners, and persons acting under them, shall be empowered to impound Cattle found straying on Crown Lands *within the boundaries.*

FEMALE FACTORY.

WITH reference to the notice published in the *Government Gazette* of the 22nd January last, respecting Washing at the Factory, His Excellency the GOVERNOR directs it to be notified, that when articles are delivered at the Factory, and taken away again, by the owners, at their expense, the charge for Washing will be reduced from 2s. per dozen to 1s. 6d.

These prices, however, will only apply to cases in which the entire washing of families is sent, or when the articles sent are such as to give only fair average trouble in washing or ironing; when articles only are sent which require more than ordinary care or trouble, the charge will be increased accordingly.

THIRTY POUNDS REWARD, OR A CONDITIONAL PARDON.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the Government, that a prisoner of the Crown commonly known by the name of Jacky Jacky, who was convicted at the late Circuit Court at Berrima, and sentenced to transportation for life, has effected his escape from the Gaol at Picton, and is now at large;—His Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified, that a reward of Twenty Pounds will be paid to any free person or persons who shall apprehend the said Jacky Jacky, and lodge him in any of Her Majesty's

Gaols; and that if the said Jacky Jacky be apprehended and secured by a prisoner of the Crown, application will be made to Her Majesty for the allowance of a Conditional Pardon to such prisoner of the Crown; and with a view to the more speedy capture of the said offender, His Excellency is further pleased to direct that an additional reward of Ten pounds shall be paid to any person who shall apprehend and lodge him in security within fifteen days from this date.

SIR,—We have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 6th instant, conveying the request of His Excellency the Governor, "that he might be furnished with any information which the Medical Board might possess, as to the prevalence of sickness at the present time in the town of Sydney, and also as to whether the Board considered anything could be done by the Government for its alleviation."

In directing our consideration to the important subject of His Excellency's communication, we beg most respectfully to state, that as the duties of the Medical Board are confined solely to the examination and registration of the testimonials of qualification of parties desirous of being enrolled as legally qualified Medical Practitioners, the matter referred to by His Excellency has never come before us as a Medical Board; but, as some of the Members, in their individual capacity, have had an opportunity of becoming conversant with the general state of health of the Inhabitants of the town of Sydney, we do ourselves the honour of submitting, for the information of his Excellency, the following brief and necessarily hurried observations in regard to it.

1st. It is undeniable that an unusual amount both of sickness and mortality, has, for some time past, prevailed, and still exists, in the town of Sydney.

2dly. That the condition above referred to as affecting the state of health of the Inhabitants of Sydney, in a great measure depends upon the existence of "Scarlatina" or "Scarlet Fever," a disease of a specific and contagious character, usually manifesting itself only once during the life time of an individual, and which, from its never having

previously appeared in the Colony, must, we apprehend, owe its origin to some exterior source.

3dly. That the existence of this disease was first brought under our notice (and we believe made its first appearance in the Colony) about the commencement of the present year—that at the period abovementioned it was almost exclusively confined to the north-western parts of the town of Sydney, but that it has since extended itself in every direction, and is now, we believe, prevailing in many parts of the country.

4thly. That the extreme prevalence of the disease in the Colony, may, in a great measure, be accounted for, by the circumstance, that a large proportion of its Inhabitants has for the first time been exposed to its influence; and the probable increase on the average mortality arising from the same disease, as observed in Europe, may be explained by reference to the generally acknowledged law, governing the diffusion of contagious disorders, viz.—that they are always more fatal on their first introduction to Countries, where their influence had never previously been experienced.

5thly. In allusion to that part of His Excellency's communication, which refers to the steps which the Government might possibly take for the removal, or alleviation of the prevailing sickness, we regret to say, that we consider no measures which the Government could adopt, would have any decided influence upon the progress of the disease. As it is generally believed, however, that most diseases of a contagious character are apt to assume a more or less malignant aspect, according to circumstances, which have a general influence on the health of the community, such as the due supply of water, an effectual drainage, the removing of all decaying or refuse animal and vegetable matter, and the avoidance of too great a concentration of the population in crowded and close lanes and alleys; we would most respectfully suggest, that it can only be by the establishment of some municipal or legislative enactments, whereby the Police of the town might, in such particulars, be regulated, that the health of the inhabitants can hereafter be influenced, and the progress of any future epidemic, or contagious disorder, either mitigated or arrested.

Other causes, frequently assigned as tending to produce or aggravate epidemic, or contagious diseases in Europe, and as creating a more than usual susceptibility to their influence, viz.—those arising from poverty, insufficient or unwholesome food, insufficient clothing, or unhealthy occupation, we believe can have had no influence whatever on the disease now prevalent. The lower ranks of the inhabitants of Sydney seem by no means to have been affected in a greater degree, or in undue proportion, by the prevailing disorder, over the other classes of the community; a circumstance arising, in all probability, from the high rate of remuneration for labor, the sufficiency and reasonable price of food, and their ability to command a large share of the comforts and necessaries of life.

In concluding these necessarily brief and imperfect remarks upon the subject of His Excellency's communication, we would take the liberty of adding our conviction of the paramount importance

of a strict enforcement of all Quarantine regulations.

We are led to offer this observation, more particularly from the circumstance of our having recently learned that "Small Pox" is prevailing to a great extent at the Mauritius, with which Island this Colony is in frequent communication, coupled with the fact, that at the present time there are no means of affording the inhabitants of the Colony the protecting advantages of vaccination, and we need not add, that the introduction of the Small Pox, under the circumstances here pointed out, would be much more serious in its consequences, and in all probability attended by a much larger amount of mortality, than that which has accompanied the existing, or any previous disease.

THE Corporation for preserving and improving the port of Dublin hereby give notice, that a Light-house has been built on the north-east point of Valentia Island, from which a fixed white light will be exhibited on the evening of the 1st of February, 1841, and thenceforth will be lighted from sun-set to sun-rise.

Specification given of the Position of the Tower, &c., by Mr. Halpin, the Inspector of Light-houses.

The Light-house is erected within the old building of Cromwell's Fort, on the western side of the principal entrance to Valentia Harbour;

and bears from Reenadrolaan Point, S. E. by E., distant $1\frac{1}{2}$ nautic miles;

and bears from Doulus Head, S. S. W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W., $1\frac{1}{4}$ nautic miles;

and bears from Clacka-Vallig (sunken rock), W. by S., $1\frac{1}{4}$ cables length.

The light will be a fixed white light, open to seaward, from N.W. to S.S.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., and elevated 54 feet above the level of high-water springs, 60 feet above the mean level of the sea.

The light, kept open, will lead clear of Reenadrolaan Point, and also of the Harbour Rock within the entrance.

Shelving rocks, partly covered at high water, extend three quarters of a cable's length from Cromwell's Fort.

The bearings given are magnetic.—Var. $28\frac{1}{4}$ W.
