PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GIPPS, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of New South Wales, and Vice Admiral of the same, &c.

WHEREAS, by an Act of Parliament, passed in the Sixth year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "*An Act for punishing offences committed by Transports kept to labour in the Colonies, and better regulating the Powers of Justices of the Peace in New South Wales*," it is amongst other things enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty, by any order or orders to be by Him for that purpose issued, with the advice of His Privy Council, to authorize the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or other persons for the time being administering the Government of any of His Majesty's Foreign Possessions, Colonies, or Plantations, to appoint the place or places within His Majesty's Dominions to which any offender convicted in any such Foreign Possessions, Colonies, or Plantations, and being under Sentence or order for Transportation, shall be sent or Transported: And Whereas, by an order of the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council, bearing date the Twenty-second day of May, 1840, and issued in pursuance of the said recited Act of Parliament, it is ordered, That from and after the First day of August, 1840, the respective Governors, Lieutenant-Governors, and other persons for the time being, administering the Government of any of Her Majesty's Colonies, shall, in pursuance of the provisions of the said recited Act of the Sixth year of the Reign of His late Majesty George the Fourth, by Proclamation to be by Him for that purpose issued, appoint the place or places, within Her Majesty's Dominions, to which any offender convicted in any such Colonies, and being under sentence or order of Transportation, shall be sent or Transported, provided that neither the Colony of Bermuda, nor any of Her Majesty's Possessions in New Holland, or in the Southern Ocean, be so appointed for that purpose, by any such Proclamation as aforesaid, other than the Island of Van Diemen's Land and Norfolk Island, and the islands adjacent to and

comprised within the Government of Van Diemen's Land.

Now, therefore, I, the GOVERNOR aforesaid, in pursuance of the said order of the Queen's most Excellent Majesty in Council, and in exercise of the power and authority in me vested, do, by this my Proclamation, appoint the Island of Van Diemen's Land, and the islands adjacent to and comprised within the Government of Van Diemen's Land, to be the places to which all offenders convicted within the Colony of New South Wales or its Dependencies, and being under any sentence or order of Transportation, shall be sent or Transported.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty in Council.
WHEREAS by certain Acts, passed in the Third and Fourth years of the Reign of Her present Majesty, powers are reserved to Her Majesty to reduce the rates and tolls on foreign ships of Countries with which Great Britain has treaties of reciprocity, and on goods imported or exported therein, in manner in the said Acts mentioned;—
Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the

advice of Her Privy Council, doth, in pursuance and in exercise of the powers and authority in Her vested by the above-mentioned Acts, declare, That the ships of all such foreign powers as have treaties of reciprocity with this country, and the cargoes imported or exported therein, shall be admitted, under the said Acts of Parliament, on paying the like rates of duties and tolls as those charged on British vessels and their cargoes.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WEDNESDAY, the Seventh day of July, in the Year of Our Lord, One thousand eight hundred and forty-one.—It is Ordered:—That the Schedule of Fees, to be taken by the Sheriff, be amended in the following particulars.—

I. For and upon every Writ requiring to be sent by the Post, to any place within the County of Cumberland, (to cover Postage and Stationery) the additional sum of six pence, and beyond the County of Cumberland, one shilling.

II. That Mileage shall be chargeable upon the execution of all process, at a greater distance than one mile from the Sheriff's Office, or Residence of the Bailiff, at the rate of nine pence per mile out, and the same sum for conveying to Gaol a Party arrested.

III. For every Caption of a Defendant, ten shillings and six pence.

POLICE.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR directs it to be notified, that on the unanimous recommendation of the Magistrates of the present Districts of Campbelltown and Stonequarry, especially assembled to consider the subject, the following arrangements are to be adopted in respect to the Police of those Districts, viz:—

1st.—The Court of Petty Sessions hitherto held at Cawdor, is to be transferred to the Village of Camden, and a Bench of Magistrates will sit regularly at Camden and Picton.

2nd.—The ordinary and more immediate functions of the Bench of Magistrates established at Camden, will be exercised on the west bank of the Nepean, over that portion of the present

Police District at Picton, which is comprised within the following limits, viz:—a line commencing on the Nepean River at the mouth of the gully which separates D'Arietta's grant, called Morton Park, from Douglass' grant, and running along that gully upwards to the south-west corner of Morton Park, thence along the north boundary of Douglass' grant, westerly, to the summit or ridge of the Boolbinmatta range, and continuing along that ridge and the ridge of Mount Prudhoe and Razorback, to the south-east corner of Wild's grant of 600 acres, the eastern and northern boundaries of Wild's property to Werriberri Creek, the Werriberri to the Warragamba, that river to its junction with the Nepean, and the Nepean upwards to the mouth of the before-mentioned gully on the east bank of the Nepean, within that part of the Campbelltown Police District, lying westerly and northerly of the summit of the range of hills which abuts upon the Nepean River on Howe's Eskdale Estate, and running thence northerly forms the dividing ridge between the Cowpasture and Campbelltown roads.

IMMIGRATION.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR is pleased to direct, with reference to the Regulations, dated 3rd March, 1840, and 30th March, 1841, the republication, in this Colony, of the following notices, issued by Her Majesty's Colonial Land and Immigration Commissioners, relating to certain Certificates with which parties proposing to claim Bounties for the introduction of Labourers into New South Wales, are required to furnish themselves, and the conditions on which such Certificates are granted by the Commissioners or their Agents.

WHEREAS it has been made to appear to the Commissioners of Colonial Lands and Emigration, and by them reported to Her Majesty's Government, that abuses have arisen in certain cases of vessels fitted out, or advertised for the conveyance of Emigrants to New South Wales, on bounties to be received of the local Government; now, in pursuance and by authority of instructions from Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, the Commissioners do hereby give notice to all whom it may concern, that if Emigrants shall hereafter be removed from this Kingdom to New South Wales, by persons who hold orders for bounties on the introduction of labourers or others into that Colony, it will be necessary, in order to entitle the claimants to receive such bounties, that they should obtain from the officers acting under the orders of Her Majesty's Commissioners for Land and Emigration, at the ports from which the Emigrant vessels may respectively sail, certificates addressed to the Governor of New South Wales, to the effect, that the Emigrants are fit and proper persons to be removed at the public expence, and that they are about to proceed on the voyage freely, and without any undue influence or misrepresentation having been employed on the part of the claimants of the bounties, or their agents, to induce them so to Emigrate, and that all contracts made with the Emigrants have been duly carried out; and further, that the vessels in which the Emigrants are about to sail are in every respect sound and sea-worthy, and properly manned, and provided with all things requisite for the sustenance, health, and necessary comfort of the Emigrants during the voyage; which certificates, on due proof being made of these facts, the various Emigration Agents before mentioned will be prepared to issue, on application at their respective offices.

NOTICE

For the information of Persons sending out Emigrants on BOUNTY to NEW SOUTH WALES.

In reference to the Notice in the "*Royal Gazette*" of the 29th day of January last, announcing by direction of Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, that parties proposing to claim Bounty on the introduction of Labourers into New South Wales, must previously furnish themselves with certain Certificates, issued under the authority of Her Majesty's Colonial Land and Emigration Commissioners; the object of the present Paper is to explain the conditions which the Commissioners deem it necessary to attach to the issuing of such Certificates.

SELECTION.

1. The parties holding Orders for Bounty will be required to employ, in the selection of their Emigrants, the form of Certificates annexed to this Notice.

2. Such certificates, when duly filled up, must be transmitted to this Office. They will then be examined, and if approved, will be returned to the parties managing the emigration, with the approval of the Commissioners marked upon the face of the documents. They must afterwards be produced at the port of embarkation to the Commissioners' Agent there, whose duty it will be, as stated in Paragraph 8, to see whether the persons presenting

themselves correspond with the description given in their certificates.

3. The kind of persons to be selected must be entirely regulated by the terms of the notice in the Colony under which the order for bounty has been granted.

4. If the applicants consist of married parties, the certificate of marriage is to be produced for the inspection of the Government Agent at the port of embarkation.

5. It is required by the Rules laid down in the Colony, "that the ages of the parties must be established, where possible, by the production of "Copies or Extracts of the Registry of their

"Baptism, duly certified by the Parish Minister, or other proper Officer."

6. In order not to deprive parties of a reasonable opportunity to supply the place of defaulters when the vessel is about immediately to sail from some other port than London, the Commissioners will not, under such circumstances, enforce the reference to their own office of the certificates of passengers added, in order to fill up the ship. The Commissioners' Agent at the port of embarkation, will possess authority to examine and decide on the fresh certificates used on such occasions; and will note his approval in a special form printed at the foot of the certificate. It must rest with the same officer to determine the case in which the principle of the present exception will fairly apply.

7. All publications whatever, by which poor persons are invited by Bounty Agents to emigrate, must be submitted to the Commissioners previously to circulation, as they will not otherwise be able to authorize their officers to certify that improper influence is not used.

8. It will be the duty of the Commissioners' Agents at the port of embarkation to inspect the emigrants, and if the parties presenting themselves correspond with the description contained in the certificates, to state the fact upon the face of those documents, which will then be forwarded with the emigrants to the Colony.

9. It will further be the duty of the Agents to receive, and inquire into any complaints which the intending emigrants may have to make, concerning the means used in prevailing upon them to emigrate, or the non-fulfilment of any engagements made with them by the selecting Agents, or their employers; and if such complaints are of an important character, and appear well founded, the Agents of the Commissioners must either qualify, or altogether withhold the final certificates, according to the nature of the case.

SHIP.

10. The Commissioners will require that all ships in which it is intended to convey emigrants to the Colony, should be of the first class in Lloyd's Register, not lower than the red diphthong with a star; and if there should ever be reason to doubt the sea-worthiness of any vessel, it will be competent to the Commissioners, or their officers, to order a survey.

11. It will be necessary that the proper officer of the Commissioners should be made acquainted with the mode in which it is intended to fit up the ship.

12. It will be required, in all cases, that married couples should not be separated, that their berths should be interposed between those of the single men and single women, and that there should be a separate hospital for males and females, of sufficient dimensions, and in convenient situations. The Victualling Scale must be submitted to the Commissioners, and approved by them.

13. The decks are not to be lumbered, but to be kept duly clear for the working of the ship, and the exercise of the people. All provisions to be stowed under hatches, and only sufficient water for immediate use to be allowed to remain on deck. A proper space is to be reserved in the hold for the emigrants' baggage.

SURGEON.

14. It will be necessary that the diplomas and testimonials of the Surgeon to whose care it is proposed to entrust the emigrants, should be submitted to the Commissioners.

ISSUING OF THE COMMISSIONERS' GENERAL CERTIFICATE.

15. When all the arrangements are complete, and the ship is sailing, the Commissioners' Agent will, if no objection have occurred, issue a general certificate in the form annexed.* It will be observed, that the correctness of the several emigrants' certificates will not be vouched for by this general document, but that the evidence of their having been duly passed by the Commissioners or their officers, must consist of what appears on the face of the papers themselves.

16. If the ship sails from one port, but calls in at another for part, or all of her passengers, the Commissioners' Agent at the first port will issue the general certificate alluded to in Paragraph No. 15, to be countersigned by the officer at the second port, who will also attend to the duty of passing the certificates of as many passengers as embark at the second place.

17. In order not to interfere with arrangements now in progress, the present regulations will not take effect sooner than the 30th of April next; and in all ships sailing previously, the absence of the Commissioners' certificate is not to constitute any objection to the claim to Bounty.

18. An explanation may be useful on one point. The signature of the Commissioners' Secretary will attest the fact that the emigrants' certificates appear proper as documents; and that there is no apparent reason to doubt the genuineness of the signatures, or the truth of the descriptions. Into these circumstances, therefore, inquiry will be made if necessary. The signature of the Commissioners' Agent will testify the apparent identity of the parties. But their personal fitness, or the question whether or not they come properly within the kind of emigrants for whom Bounty is promised, will be left, as at present, exclusively to the decision of the proper Board in the Colony.

19. The Governor has been instructed that Bounties will not be payable to any parties except on production of the required certificates from the Colonial Land and Emigration Commissioners.

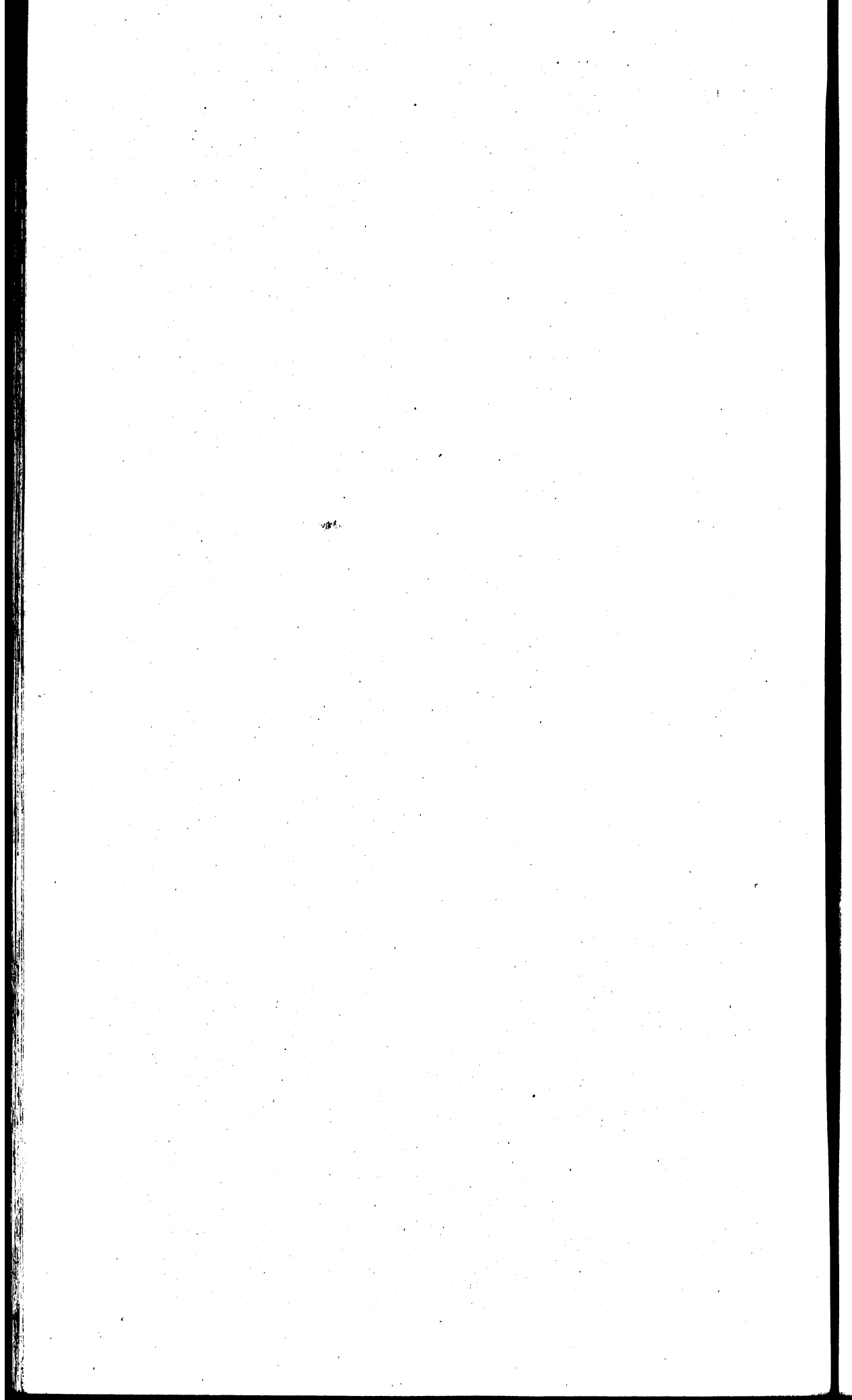

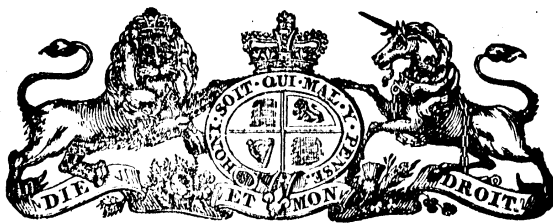

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GIPPS, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of New South Wales, and Vice Admiral of the same, &c.

WHEREAS, by an Act of Parliament, passed in the Sixth year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intitled "*An Act for punishing offences committed by Transports kept to labour in the Colonies, and better regulating the Powers of Justices of the Peace in New South Wales*," it is amongst other things enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty, by any order or orders to be by Him for that purpose issued, with the advice of His Privy Council, to authorize the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or other persons for the time being administering the Government of any of His Majesty's Foreign Possessions, Colonies, or Plantations, to appoint the place or places within His Majesty's Dominions to which any offender convicted in any such Foreign Possessions, Colonies, or Plantations, and being under Sentence or order for Transportation, shall be sent or Transported: And Whereas, by an order of the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council, bearing date the Twenty-second day of May, 1840, and issued in pursuance of the said recited Act of Parliament, it is ordered, That from and after the First day of August, 1840, the respective Governors, Lieutenant-Governors, and other persons for the time being, administering the Government of any of Her Majesty's Colonies, shall, in pursuance of the provisions of the said recited Act of the Sixth year of the Reign of His late Majesty George the Fourth, by Proclamation to be by Him for that purpose issued, appoint the place or places, within Her Majesty's Dominions, to which any offender convicted in any such Colonies, and being under sentence or order of Transportation, shall be sent or Transported, provided that neither the Colony of Bermuda, nor any of Her Majesty's Possessions in New Holland, or in the Southern Ocean, be so appointed for that purpose, by any such Proclamation as aforesaid, other than the Island of Van Diemen's Land and Norfolk Island, and the islands adjacent to and

comprised within the Government of Van Diemen's Land.

Now, therefore, I, the GOVERNOR aforesaid, in pursuance of the said order of the Queen's most Excellent Majesty in Council, and in exercise of the power and authority in me vested, do, by this my Proclamation, appoint the Island of Van Diemen's Land, and the islands adjacent to and comprised within the Government of Van Diemen's Land, to be the places to which all offenders convicted within the Colony of New South Wales or its Dependencies, and being under any sentence or order of Transportation, shall be sent or Transported.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the

advice of Her Privy Council, doth, in pursuance and in exercise of the powers and authority in Her vested by the above-mentioned Acts, declare, That the ships of all such foreign powers as have treaties of reciprocity with this country, and the cargoes imported or exported therein, shall be admitted, under the said Acts of Parliament, on paying the like rates of duties and tolls as those charged on British vessels and their cargoes.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

No. 1.—*"A Bill to amend, and to extend to Port Phillip, an Act intituled, 'An Act to consolidate and amend the laws relating to the Savings' Bank of New South Wales.'"*

It being expedient to amend the Act 3 VICTORIA, No. 12, and to extend the provisions thereof, as so amended, to a Savings' Bank to be established at Port Phillip, it is proposed:—

That a Savings' Bank shall be established at Port Phillip, to be called "THE SAVINGS' BANK OF PORT PHILLIP," the management whereof shall be distinct from, and independent of, the Savings' Bank of New South Wales.

That His Honor the Superintendent of Port Phillip shall be the President of the said Institution, and that the management of the affairs thereof shall be vested in Twelve Trustees, to be appointed by the said Superintendent, of whom one shall be styled Vice-President.

That the Act 3 VICTORIA, No. 12, shall extend and apply to the said Institution to be established at Port Phillip.

That the said Act shall be amended by providing for the establishment of a Rest or Security Fund in each Bank.

That the said Act shall be further amended by providing, in the event of the Insolvency, or death of any Officer of the said Banks respectively, for the recovery of such Money, Deeds, or Securities, belonging to such Banks respectively, as may have been in the possession of such Officer at the time of his Bankruptcy or death.

No. 2.—*"A Bill to amend the law for the Transportation of Offenders to Penal Settlements, and to provide for and regulate the Transportation of Offenders to Van Diemen's Land, and the Islands adjacent thereto, and comprised within the Government thereof."*

The places heretofore used as Penal Settlements for the Colony of New South Wales, being no longer used as such, and His Excellency the Governor having, by virtue of the authority vested in the several Governors of Her Majesty's Colonial Possessions,

under an Act of Parliament, passed in the Sixth year of the Reign of King George the Fourth, and an order in Council, bearing date 22nd May, 1840, issued a Proclamation, declaring that the Colony of Van Diemen's Land, and the Islands adjacent thereto, and under the Government thereof, shall be used as places of Transportation for Transported offenders under Colonial sentence of Transportation; it is proposed to repeal so much of 3 William IV., No. 3, as enacts that Transported offenders, under Colonial sentence or order of Transportation, shall be Transported to such Penal Settlements within the Colony of New South Wales and its Dependencies, as the Governor for the time being of the said Colony should direct.

That after sentence passed on any such offender, the Governor may order him to be kept to hard labour at such place as he shall think fit, until his removal to the place of Transportation.

That in all cases where any such offender, already under sentence or order of Transportation passed in any of Her Majesty's Dominions, shall be convicted of an offence for which a sentence of Transportation may be passed, it shall be lawful to pass on such offender a sentence of Transportation for life, or for any term not less than seven years, provided that the term of such sentence shall in no case exceed, in the whole, the duration of sentence to which a free and untransported person would for such offence be liable, in addition to the duration or residue of the term of the original sentence of such Transported offender.

Nothing in the proposed Act to repeal or alter the Act 3 Victoria, No. 22, abolishing the Transportation of Female Convicts.

OCCUPATION OF CROWN LANDS WITHIN THE BOUNDARIES.

WITH reference to the Regulations of 1st August, 1831, 25th September, 1839, and 13th February, 1840, relative to the Leasing of Crown Lands within the Boundaries of Location, and to the 6th clause in the Act of Council, 5 VICTORIA, No. 1, His Excellency the GOVERNOR directs it to be notified, that it having been found inconvenient to issue Annual Leases in the manner pointed out in the said Regulations, it is proposed, in future, instead of Annual Leases, to grant Licenses to Depasture Cattle and other Stock in lieu thereof.

The said Regulations have accordingly been cancelled so far as they apply to the Leases in question, and the following are to be substituted for them :—

1st. The Land for the occupation of which Licenses may be obtained, will be advertised from time to time in the *Government Gazette*.

2nd. Persons wishing to have particular Lands advertised, may apply, as heretofore, to the Surveyor General, for that purpose.

3rd. No Lot, consisting of less than one square mile, or 640 acres, will be put up, except in special cases, which may render expedient a departure from this rule : And in any case where there is a broken section with water frontage, the section behind it will be added to the Lot.

4th. The upset price of each Lot will be specified in the advertisement ; the bidding will be upon this upset price, and the Lot will be knocked down to the highest bidder. The Government, however, reserves to itself the right of refusing the bidding of any one ; and before any bidding is accepted, if the yearly price of the License does not exceed £5, the same will be demanded at the fall of the hammer, but if above £5, a deposit of ten per cent. will be required at the fall of the hammer, and the balance to be paid within one month from the day of sale.

5th. Parties failing to pay the balance within

that period, will forfeit the deposit of ten per cent., and will of course acquire no right to the occupancy of the Land intended to have been included in the License.

6th. Immediately upon payment of the full amount for the License, the same will be issued by the Colonial Treasurer, in the form annexed.

7th. It is to be distinctly understood, that the Lands included in any such License, will be open to purchase under the ordinary Regulations ; and in the event of their being sold, must be surrendered by the party upon his receiving one month's notice ; but in such case, the balance of the price of the License for the time it has to run, will be refunded to him.

8th. Parties holding Lands under License, in conformity with these Regulations, will be entitled to the exclusive right of occupancy of the same, during the period the License shall remain in force, for the purpose of Depasturing Cattle and other Stock ; but a clause will be inserted in it, restraining the holder from cutting Cedar or other Timber, except such of the latter as may be required for domestic uses, for firebote, fencing stock-yards, or other conveniences, for the enjoyment of the Land, provided that no part thereof be sold.

9th. In the District of Port Phillip, Licenses will be issued by the Sub-Treasurer of the District, in the same form and manner, and subject to the same formalities, in all respects, as Licenses in the Sydney District ; and persons desiring to have any particular portions of Land advertised, may make application for them to the Senior Surveyor of the District.

NOTICE

For the information of Persons sending out Emigrants on BOUNTY to NEW SOUTH WALES.

In reference to the Notice in the "*Royal Gazette*" of the 29th day of January last, announcing by direction of Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, that parties proposing to claim Bounty on the introduction of Labourers into New South Wales, must previously furnish themselves with certain Certificates, issued under the authority of Her Majesty's Colonial Land and Emigration Commissioners ; the object of the present Paper is to explain the conditions which the Commissioners deem it necessary to attach to the issuing of such Certificates.

SELECTION.

1. The parties holding Orders for Bounty will be required to employ, in the selection of their Emigrants, the form of Certificates annexed to this Notice.

2. Such certificates, when duly filled up, must be transmitted to this Office. They will then be examined, and if approved, will be returned to the parties managing the emigration, with the approval of the Commissioners marked upon the face of the documents. They must afterwards be produced at the port of embarkation to the Commissioners' Agent there, whose duty it will be, as stated in Paragraph 8, to see whether the persons presenting

themselves correspond with the description given in their certificates.

3. The kind of persons to be selected must be entirely regulated by the terms of the notice in the Colony under which the order for bounty has been granted.

4. If the applicants consist of married parties, the certificate of marriage is to be produced for the inspection of the Government Agent at the port of embarkation.

5. It is required by the Rules laid down in the Colony, "that the ages of the parties must be established, where possible, by the production of "Copies or Extracts of the Registry of their

"Baptism, duly certified by the Parish Minister, or other proper Officer."

6. In order not to deprive parties of a reasonable opportunity to supply the place of defaulters when the vessel is about immediately to sail from some other port than London, the Commissioners will not, under such circumstances, enforce the reference to their own office of the certificates of passengers added, in order to fill up the ship. The Commissioners' Agent at the port of embarkation, will possess authority to examine and decide on the fresh certificates used on such occasions; and will note his approval in a special form printed at the foot of the certificate. It must rest with the same officer to determine the case in which the principle of the present exception will fairly apply.

7. All publications whatever, by which poor persons are invited by Bounty Agents to emigrate, must be submitted to the Commissioners previously to circulation, as they will not otherwise be able to authorize their officers to certify that improper influence is not used.

8. It will be the duty of the Commissioners' Agents at the port of embarkation to inspect the emigrants, and if the parties presenting themselves correspond with the description contained in the certificates, to state the fact upon the face of those documents, which will then be forwarded with the emigrants to the Colony.

9. It will further be the duty of the Agents to receive, and inquire into any complaints which the intending emigrants may have to make, concerning the means used in prevailing upon them to emigrate, or the non-fulfilment of any engagements made with them by the selecting Agents, or their employers; and if such complaints are of an important character, and appear well founded, the Agents of the Commissioners must either qualify, or altogether withhold the final certificates, according to the nature of the case.

SHIP.

10. The Commissioners will require that all ships in which it is intended to convey emigrants to the Colony, should be of the first class in Lloyd's Register, not lower than the red dipthong with a star; and if there should ever be reason to doubt the sea-worthiness of any vessel, it will be competent to the Commissioners, or their officers, to order a survey.

11. It will be necessary that the proper officer of the Commissioners should be made acquainted with the mode in which it is intended to fit up the ship.

12. It will be required, in all cases, that married couples should not be separated, that their berths should be interposed between those of the single men and single women, and that there should be a separate hospital for males and females, of sufficient dimensions, and in convenient situations. The Victualling Scale must be submitted to the Commissioners, and approved by them.

13. The decks are not to be lumbered, but to be kept duly clear for the working of the ship, and the exercise of the people. All provisions to be stowed under hatches, and only sufficient water for immediate use to be allowed to remain on deck. A proper space is to be reserved in the hold for the emigrants' baggage.

SURGEON.

14. It will be necessary that the diplomas and testimonials of the Surgeon to whose care it is proposed to entrust the emigrants, should be submitted to the Commissioners.

ISSUING OF THE COMMISSIONERS' GENERAL CERTIFICATE.

15. When all the arrangements are complete, and the ship is sailing, the Commissioners' Agent will, if no objection have occurred, issue a general certificate in the form annexed.* It will be observed, that the correctness of the several emigrants' certificates will not be vouched for by this general document, but that the evidence of their having been duly passed by the Commissioners or their officers, must consist of what appears on the face of the papers themselves.

16. If the ship sails from one port, but calls in at another for part, or all of her passengers, the Commissioners' Agent at the first port will issue the general certificate alluded to in Paragraph No. 15, to be countersigned by the officer at the second port, who will also attend to the duty of passing the certificates of as many passengers as embark at the second place.

17. In order not to interfere with arrangements now in progress, the present regulations will not take effect sooner than the 30th of April next; and in all ships sailing previously, the absence of the Commissioners' certificate is not to constitute any objection to the claim to Bounty.

18. An explanation may be useful on one point. The signature of the Commissioners' Secretary will attest the fact that the emigrants' certificates appear proper as documents; and that there is no apparent reason to doubt the genuineness of the signatures, or the truth of the descriptions. Into these circumstances, therefore, inquiry will be made if necessary. The signature of the Commissioners' Agent will testify the apparent identity of the parties. But their personal fitness, or the question whether or not they come properly within the kind of emigrants for whom Bounty is promised, will be left, as at present, exclusively to the decision of the proper Board in the Colony.

19. The Governor has been instructed that Bounties will not be payable to any parties except on production of the required certificates from the Colonial Land and Emigration Commissioners.

By His Excellency Sir George Gipps, Knight, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales, and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, with the advice of the Legislative Council.

An Act to make further provision for the Trial of Cases in the Circuit Courts of New South Wales, and to amend, in certain respects, the Act providing for trial by Jury in such Courts.

WHEREAS, by an Act of the Governor and Council of New South Wales, passed in the Fourth Year of the Reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, "*An Act to provide for the more effectual Administration of Justice in New South Wales, and its Dependencies,*" provision was made for the establishment of Circuit Courts in the Colony of New South Wales; and whereas by another Act of the said Governor and Council, passed in the same year, intituled, "*An Act to provide for the Trial by Jury in Civil and Criminal Cases in the Circuit and other Courts, to be holden within the Colony of New South Wales, and its Dependencies,*" it was enacted, that all Issues both Civil and Criminal, should be tried in such Courts by a Jury; and whereas, the Act hereinbefore last recited has been found in some respects to require amendment, and it is necessary to make further provision for the trial of cases in Circuit Courts, in manner hereinafter mentioned: Be it therefore enacted, by His

Powers of Circuit Courts, as Courts of Gaol delivery.
Wales, with the advice of the Legislative Council thereof, That from and after the passing of this Act, it shall be lawful for the Governor for the time being of

the said Colony, by any Proclamation or Proclamations, by him from time to time for that purpose issued, to apportion and divide the said Colony into three or more "Circuit Districts," and to ascertain and fix the boundaries and limits of every such district, and such limits and boundaries from time to time to alter as occasion may require; and from and after any such apportionment and division as aforesaid, every Circuit Court now or hereafter established, or appointed to be holden, under or by virtue of the said first recited Act, shall be a Court of "Gaol Delivery" in and for the particular District only, within which it shall have been or shall be so appointed to be holden: Provided always, that every such Circuit Court shall be a Court of Oyer and Terminer, and of Assize and Nisi Prius, for the said Colony of New South Wales.

(Powers of Circuit Courts as to the assessing of damages and as to punishments.)

II. And be it declared and enacted, That every such Circuit Court shall have power and jurisdiction not only to try Issues in all Actions, but also to inquire into and assess Damages therein; and that all persons convicted in any such Court, of any crime or offence cognizable therein, shall be subject and liable to the same penalties and punishments, as by law could be inflicted on them, if convicted of any such crime or offence in the Supreme Court of the said Colony.

(Certain provisions of the Jury Act.)

III. And be it enacted, That from and after the passing of this Act, so much of the said recited Act, passed to provide for the Trial by Jury of cases in the said Circuit Courts, as enacts that all Issues of Fact in Civil Actions tried therein shall be tried by a Jury, and also so much of the same as enacts that all such Issues, and all Crimes and Misdemeanors therein prosecuted, shall be tried by a

repealed.

Jury of Inhabitants of the towns or places where such Courts shall respectively be holden, shall be, and the same is hereby repealed.

(Jury in future to be residents within the town or place where Circuit Courts are holden, or thirty miles therefrom.)

IV. And be it enacted, That from and after the passing of this Act, all Crimes and Misdemeanors prosecuted in any such Circuit Court as aforesaid, and all Issues of Fact in Civil Actions therein coming on to be tried, (and which Issues shall by the Supreme Court have been directed to be tried by a Jury,) shall be respectively tried by a Jury of Twelve Inhabitants of the Colony, resident in the town or place where such Circuit Court shall be appointed to be holden, or within a distance of thirty miles therefrom; and all Damages in any such Action which may have been directed to be assessed by a Jury, shall be inquired into and assessed in like manner; and it shall be lawful for the Judges of the said Supreme Court, to frame and issue Writs of Venire Facias accordingly.

(In ordinary cases the trial in Actions to be by Assessors.)

V. Provided always, and be it enacted, That, except in cases where the said Supreme Court, in pursuance of the power vested therein in that behalf, shall direct any such Trial or Assessment to be by a Jury, the trial of all Issues, and assessment of all Damages in Actions in every such Circuit Court, shall be by the Judge before whom such Court shall be holden, and by two Assessors, being Magistrates of the Colony, and resident in or within thirty miles of the place where such Court shall be holden, in the same manner, and subject to the same rules in all respects, as if such Trial, or Assessment, were had in the said Supreme Court before and by one of the Judges thereof, and two Assessors, in Sydney.

(Summoning of Assessors.)

VI. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Judges of the said Supreme Court, fourteen days at the least before the intended day of Trial, or Assessment, as the case may be, to issue a precept or precepts to the Sheriff for the summoning of Assessors for all such cases; and the Sheriff shall accordingly, by himself, or his lawful Deputy or Officer, six days at the least before such day of Trial, or Assessment, summon such and so many Magistrates, being not less than three nor more than six, resident as aforesaid, as the said Judges shall direct, or in the absence of any such direction, as the said Sheriff shall think fit; and every such Magistrate shall be summoned in the same manner, and by writing in the same form, (as nearly as may be,) as respectively now are, or hereafter may be, prescribed by law for the summoning of Jurors.

(Compensation to Assessors, and fine for non-attendance.)

VII. And be it enacted, That upon every such Trial or Assessment, as last aforesaid, the Assessors shall be selected from the list of Magistrates so summoned, in like manner as is directed in the case of Assessors summoned to the said Supreme Court; and every Assessor shall, for every case on which he shall serve whether of Trial or Assessment, be allowed the sum of Ten Shillings, which shall immediately be paid by the successful party, and be eventually taxed and allowed as Costs in the cause; and every Magistrate summoned as an

Assessor, who shall neglect to attend in obedience to the summons served upon him, shall, on proof of such service, be liable to the same fine, at the discretion of the presiding Judge, as may be by law imposed by the said Supreme Court for non-attendance in the case of any Special Juror; and every such fine shall, on a return thereof to the said Supreme Court, be levied and appropriated as Fines on Jurors in the said Court now are, or hereafter may be, by law levied and appropriated.

(Provision in cases of deficiency in the list of Special Jurors.)

VIII. And be it enacted, That whenever a Special Jury shall have been awarded for the trial of any such Issue or Issues as aforesaid, and there shall not be a sufficient number of persons qualified as Special Jurors, and resident as aforesaid, for the striking of a "Reduced List" as by law directed in such cases, it shall be lawful for the Sheriff, or his Deputy, to make up the number required for that purpose, from the List of Common Jurors; and no exception shall afterwards be allowed in respect thereof, or for that any number of such Jurors (if on such Reduced List) were or are included in the Jury Panel.

(Provision for cases where the Sheriff is interested.)

IX. And be it declared and enacted, That in every case wherein it shall be made to appear to the said Supreme Court, or to one of the Judges thereof, that the Sheriff is a party or in any manner interested, the Venire or Precept to be issued therein, shall be directed and delivered to the Coroner, or such other person as the said Court or Judge shall in that behalf appoint; and such Coroner or person shall thenceforward have and exercise, for the purposes of such Writ or Precept, all the powers and duties of the Sheriff of the said Colony.

(Declaratory clause as to prosecutor in Circuit Courts.)

X. And be it declared and enacted, That all crimes and offences which have been and are respectively cognizable in the said several Circuit Courts, shall, until the constitution of Grand Juries within the said Colony, continue to be so cognizable, and may be tried in the said Courts respectively, upon Information or Informations exhibited therein by and in the name of Her Majesty's Attorney or Solicitor General for the time being of the said Colony, or either of them; or, in case of their absence from any such Court, by and in the name of such other person as the Governor for the time being of the said Colony shall have appointed, or shall hereafter appoint, in that behalf.

(Governor may appoint District Sheriffs.)

XI. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Governor, at any time or times hereafter, as he shall see fit, by Warrant under His Hand and Seal, to nominate and appoint some fit and proper person to act as and be the Sheriff in and for every or any such Circuit District; and the Sheriff first so appointed shall continue in office until he shall be re-appointed, or another person shall be appointed in his stead, in manner next hereinafter mentioned; and it shall be lawful for the Governor, on the first Monday in the next and every succeeding year, to nominate and appoint in manner aforesaid, the same or some other fit and proper person, to act as and be the Sheriff for every or any such District, for the year next following; and every such Sheriff so appointed

shall, as soon as conveniently may be, take before one of the Judges of the Supreme Court the oath of Allegiance, and an oath faithfully to execute his office; and every Sheriff appointed as last aforesaid, shall continue in office during the space of one whole year then next following, and until he be re-appointed, or another person be appointed, and sworn into office in his stead, in manner aforesaid; and if the Sheriff for any such Circuit District shall die or depart from the said Colony, or become otherwise incapable of executing the duties of his office, then and in such case, another person shall be appointed and sworn in like manner, and such person shall continue in office for the remainder of the year, and until he be re-appointed, or another person be appointed and sworn into office in his stead, as aforesaid; and every such Sheriff, during the time of his continuance in office, shall, in and for the District for which he shall have been so appointed, have

and execute the same powers and duties, and enjoy the same privileges, and be subject to the same liabilities, in all respects, as by law belong to the office of a Sheriff; and the powers, duties, privileges, and liabilities, of the Sheriff of New South Wales, shall, within such District, cease and determine.
