HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR is pleased to direct, that the general objects of the following Bills, now under consideration of the Legislative Council, be published for general information.

By His Excellency's Command,

E. DEAS THOMSON.

No. 1.—“A Bill for facilitating proceedings by and against a certain Joint Stock Company, called the ‘AUSTRALASIAN SUGAR COMPANY,’ and for other purposes therein mentioned.”

It is proposed by this Bill, to enable the Company to sue and be sued in the name of the Manager, or of one of the Directors, in the event of the death or absence of the Manager, subject to the usual conditions on which private Bills are granted.

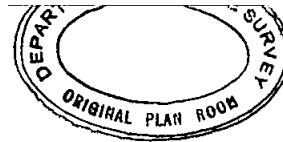
No. 2.—“A Bill to provide for the institution of Courts of Requests, and to extend the Jurisdiction of such Courts.”

It is proposed by this Bill, to repeal the existing Courts of Requests Acts, 3 William IV., No. 2; 4 Victoria, No. 25; and 3 Victoria, No. 16; and that from and after the first day of January, 1843, Courts of Requests shall be holden in and for such Counties or Districts, or other portions of the Colony, as the Governor shall by Proclamation appoint.

That such Courts shall be holden respectively by a Commissioner, to be appointed by the Governor; and shall have a Registrar, and such other Ministerial Officers as the Governor may deem necessary to appoint.

That the Jurisdiction of such Courts shall extend to all actions for the recovery of any sum not exceeding pounds; but they shall not have the power to determine any action involving the title to real property, nor where rights in future may be bound, nor where the sum claimed is a disputed balance of an account, originally exceeding pounds, nor any action for money won by way of wager, nor any action for any debt where there hath not been a contract or engagement to pay within the three years before the taking out of the summons; provided that no period which any defendant shall have been absent from the Colony shall be considered as any portion of such three years.

That where the sum sought to be recovered shall exceed pounds, the Commissioner shall be assisted by two Assessors, to be summoned by the Registrar in regular rotation from the persons on the list of Special Jurors resident in the District; provided that three only shall be summoned for each day of the sitting of the



Court; and such Assessors shall be entitled to a fee of one pound each for their attendance.

That no cause of action shall be split for the purpose of bringing it within the Jurisdiction of the Court; and if at any stage of the proceedings it shall appear to the Commissioner that any cause of action hath been so split, he shall dismiss the action, unless the plaintiff bind himself by memorandum to the Registrar to accept such sum as the Court is empowered to adjudge, in full of the whole of his demand so split; but where Bills of Exchange, or Promissory Notes have been given in payment of any debt, originally above the said sum of pounds, and it shall appear that such Bills or Notes are, separately, security for any amount not exceeding the said sum of pounds, then each Bill or Note shall be considered as forming a distinct and separate contract, and may be sued upon and recovered in the said Courts.

That the said Courts shall be Courts of Record, and judgments obtained therein may be pleaded in defence of actions brought in the Supreme Court.

That where any action shall be brought in the Supreme Court, for any sum recoverable in the Courts of Requests, and the plaintiff shall recover no more than the said sum of pounds, he shall not be entitled to costs, unless the Judge shall certify that the cause was not within the jurisdiction of the Courts of Requests.

That wages, or other sums of money not exceeding the said sum of pounds, due to clerks, servants, &c., may be recovered in such Courts.

That no Attorney, Solicitor, or other Officer of the Supreme Court, shall be exempt from the jurisdiction of the Courts of Requests.

That all actions in such Courts shall be commenced by a demand, or plaint, in writing, wherein the plaintiff shall set forth shortly, and in substance, the cause of action, the name of his Attorney, and the places of abode of himself and the defendant; and file a copy thereof with the Registrar of the Court, who shall place the same in a copy of the summons to be served on the defendant, either by delivering it to himself or to his wife or servant at his usual place of abode, or to any inmate thereof, or by putting it into the house, or fixing it upon the door of the house of such defendant, if the officer shall have been refused admittance.

That all suits shall be brought in the Court holden for the District nearest to the defendant's residence, unless he shall have given an undertaking, in writing, to pay at a particular place, or unless he shall leave the District in which he had contracted the debt, in which case the action shall be brought in the Court which shall be holden for the District so particularly specified, or, in that holden for the District where the debt was contracted; provided that where a defendant shall have to be sued out of the District in which the plaintiff resides and such defendant shall have contracted the debt, the Court may award to the plaintiff double the amount of the costs incurred.

That in the case of joint defendants, living in different Districts, the plaintiff may bring his action before any Commissioner within whose jurisdiction any of the parties so jointly liable

shall reside; and in case judgment shall be given against such defendant, such judgment shall be admissible in evidence in any action for contribution, which he may afterwards bring against the other person or persons so jointly liable with him, provided he shall have caused a copy of the plaintiff's summons to be personally served on such person or persons three days before the day appointed for the hearing of the case in which such judgment was awarded against him; but if he shall have neglected so to do, then the liability of such other person or persons to contribution shall be proved in the ordinary manner.

That plaintiffs and defendants may be examined on oath or affirmation; and the Commissioners may commit persons swearing or affirming falsely, and direct prosecution for perjury to be forthwith instituted.

That all persons disobeying the summons of the Court, shall be subject to the like actions and attachments as for disobedience to a subpoena issuing out of the Supreme Court; and all persons refusing to be sworn, or to give testimony, or guilty of contempt before the Court, may be punished by the Commissioner, as for contempt, in a summary way, either by fine not exceeding forty shillings, or by imprisonment not exceeding fourteen days.

That on the application of the party in whose favor any order or decision shall be made for payment of any money, the Registrar may issue a decree or precept in the nature of a *feri facias* or a *capias ad satisfaciendum*, directed to any Bailiff of any of the said Courts, who may execute the same in any part of the Colony, in the same manner as process of a similar nature issuing out of the Supreme Court; provided that no real property shall be liable to be levied under such writs.

That if the person summoned in any case shall appear, and the party complaining make default, the Court shall adjudge the plaint to be disproved; or if both parties appear, and judgment be for defendant, then or in either case the Court may adjudge to the defendant his reasonable costs, to be levied in manner aforesaid.

That in any suit wherein a special writ of execution may be issued, the Registrar of any of such Courts may grant the same, at the peril of the plaintiff, and appoint one or more special bailiffs, to be named by the plaintiff, to execute the same, on receiving from such plaintiff a bond of indemnity, to secure the defendant against any improper use of such writ; and the defendant may maintain an action against the party only giving such bond for any wrong done in the execution of such writ.

That if any defendant, against whom a decree or judgment shall have been obtained in any of such Courts, shall have removed out of the jurisdiction of such Court, the bailiff thereof may apply to any Justice of the Peace, and on proof on oath of such removal, such Justice shall endorse his name on such execution, whereupon such bailiff may seize the person or effects of such defendant, wheresoever the same may be found within the County or District for which such Justice shall act, and deal therewith as if the same had been seized within the jurisdiction of the said Court.

That where any disputed claim shall be made to

any property to be sold under process of any of such Courts, such property shall be released from execution, on proof before a Commissioner or Magistrate that the defendant is not the true owner thereof, and the costs of levy shall be added to the amount of costs charged in the execution; but no bill of sale, or mortgage of chattel property, shall protect such property, unless the same be produced to the bailiff, and shall have been executed at least ten days before the summons shall have been served on the defendant, and there be inserted therein a certain time for payment of the principal sum for which the same was given, not exceeding one year from the date thereof; and that at the expiration of such time the holder of such bill of sale, or mortgagee of chattel property, shall not renew the same, but either assume possession or proceed to the sale of the property secured thereby, or relinquish all claim to the protection of it from the debts of other creditors; and no protection from sale as aforesaid shall extend to any articles of chattel property not enumerated in a schedule to such bill of sale or deed of mortgage to be attached.

That all Executors and Administrators shall be liable to be sued in such Courts; and all judgments obtained by plaintiffs, and not satisfied previous to their decease, as well as all causes of action, shall survive to their proper representatives.

That no debtor, confined under the provisions of the proposed Bill, shall be kept in custody longer than one month from the day of his commitment, except when any such debtor shall fraudulently conceal property, in which case the Commissioner may extend the term of imprisonment to any period not exceeding six months; but persons taken into custody for more than one execution, may be imprisoned the said limited time on the first, and thereafter the said limited time on each successive execution; and in every case where a defendant shall be discharged out of custody without satisfying the judgment of the Court, the plaintiff may take out execution against any estates or effects acquired by such defendant, at any period within the three years following.

That it shall be lawful for the Commissioner to order judgment to be paid by instalments, in certain cases, provided that the judgment shall be fully satisfied within six months.

That no execution awarded as aforesaid shall prejudice the right of landlords to recover one year's rent.

That no plaint shall be removed from such Courts, but the orders made by the Commissioners shall be final and conclusive on all the parties.

That the Commissioner, or any Police or Visiting Magistrate, may order the detaining creditor to support the defendant in custody under the proposed Bill.

That all persons acting in obedience to any order of any such Court shall be indemnified for any thing done by them in the execution of their duty; and no process shall be sued out against any Officer of the Court, until one calendar month after notice given; and for preparing or serving such notice, a fee of twenty shillings shall be taken.

That the fees to be taken shall be such only as shall be limited and expressed in the rules of practice

and proceeding framed for the dispatch of business in such Courts; and such rules may be made, from time to time, by the Governor, with the advice of the Judges of the Supreme Court, at Sydney.

That if any Officer of any of such Courts neglect the duty required of him, so that execution shall not have had effect on the goods or person of any defendant, the Commissioner may order such Officer to pay the amount for which such execution was awarded, to be recovered as hereinbefore specified in other cases.

That no process of the Court shall be set aside on account of verbal or technical errors only.

That wherever judgment given in the Court of one District is required to be executed in another, the amount thereof shall be paid to the Registrar of the Court in which the judgment is carried into effect, there to remain until applied for by the proper party.

That in Cases not exceeding ten pounds, the parties thereto must themselves prosecute or defend the action, but in all cases above ten pounds, the action may be prosecuted or defended by agent or attorney.

That Attorneys intending to practise in such Courts shall formally apply to the Commissioner of the Court, and be enrolled as practitioners before being admitted; and the Commissioners may suspend such Attorneys from practising, either wholly or for a time, for improper conduct, subject however, to appeal to the Judges of the Supreme Court.

That if by reason of illness or other sufficient cause of absence, a Commissioner shall be unable to attend the Court, the Governor may appoint a substitute.

No. 1.—“*A Bill for directing the application of all fines imposed for Drunkenness.*”

It is proposed to repeal so much of the Act 2 Victoria, No. 18, as relates to the application of of Fines imposed for Drunkenness; and that in future all such fines, not exceeding five shillings, shall go to the benefit of the Benevolent Society in the District where they may be exacted; but in cases where the fines exceed five shillings, such portion thereof as the Justices may think proper shall be awarded to the informer, and the remainder applied as aforesaid; but when any such fines shall be exacted in a District where there is no Benevolent Society, the same or portions thereof, as aforesaid, shall be paid towards the support of the Benevolent Society in Sydney.

FORTY POUNDS REWARD.

OR A

CONDITIONAL PARDON.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the Government, that George Wilson, a prisoner of the Crown, by the ship *Moffatt*, who effected his escape from off the chain while awaiting his trial on the 9th February, 1841, at the Maitland Quarter Sessions, for being illegally at large with fire arms in his possession, and horse stealing, is still at large, and committing depredations in the district of Scone, accompanied by Thomas Forrester, a free man, who some time since shot at a Constable who attempted to apprehend him; His Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified, that a reward of Twenty Pounds will be paid to any free person or persons who shall apprehend and lodge either the said George Wilson or Thomas Forrester, in any of Her Majesty's Gaols, and that if either of the said persons be apprehended and secured by a prisoner of the Crown, application will be made to Her Majesty for the allowance of a Conditional Pardon to such prisoner of the Crown.
