## PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE GIPPS, Knight, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

I IN pursuance of the authority in me vested, by a certain Act of the Imperial Parliament of Great Britain and Ireland, passed in the 5th and 6th years of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled, "*An Act for regulating the sale of Waste Land belonging to the Crown in the Australian Colonies*;" I do hereby notify and proclaim that at 11 o'clock of Wednesday, the 8th day of February next, the following Portions of Crown Land will be offered for Sale by Public Auction, at the Colonial Treasury, in Sydney, at the upset price affixed to each lot respectively, on the terms and conditions and under the provisions of the above recited Act, viz. :—

**H**IS Excellency the GOVERNOR is pleased to direct that the general objects of the following Bill, now under consideration of the Legislative Council, be published for general information.

No. 1.—“*A Bill to declare all Inhabitants of Corporate Cities and Towns to be competent Witnesses, and to enable Judges, Justices, and other public Officers to act in matters relating to the Corporation, of which they are respectively Members, and to authorise Magistrates of the Territory to commit in certain cases.*”

It is proposed, by this Bill, to declare the Inhabitants of all Corporate Cities and Towns in New South Wales to be competent Witnesses in any proceedings, by or against the Corporation of which they are Members, and to enable Judges, Justices, and other Officers, to act in their official capacities, notwithstanding their being Members of any Corporation, and to empower Justices of the Peace for the Territory to commit offenders to the Sydney or Melbourne Gaol.

##### QUALITIES OF THE SUPPLIES.

1. All the articles shall be of the best quality of their several kinds.
  2. The Bread shall be the produce of clean, sound, Wheat, Barley, and Maize, from which, on the Military Ration 20 per cent., and on the Convict Ration 10 per cent., has been extracted in bran and waste. ##### GENERAL CONDITIONS.

9. Parties tendering may do so by either of the three following modes, at their option, viz. ---
