PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE GIPPS, Knight, Captain General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

WHEREAS, by an Act of the Imperial Parliament of Great Britain and Ireland, passed in the fifth and sixth years of the Reign of Her Majesty, Queen Victoria, intituled "*An Act for the Government of New South Wales and Van Diemen's Land*," it was amongst other things enacted, that for the purpose of electing their several Representatives to the Legislative Council of New South Wales, to be constituted under the provisions of the said recited Act, the Towns of *Sydney* and *Melbourne*, and such other towns as should be declared to be Electoral Districts, should be deemed to be bounded and limited in such manner as the Governor of the Colony of New South Wales, by Proclamation, to be published in the *New South Wales Government Gazette*, or by Letters Patent, under the Great Seal of the Colony, should set forth and describe; and whereas by an Act of the said Governor and Legislative Council of New South Wales, as now by law established, passed in the present year of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled "*An Act to provide for the Division of the Colony of New South Wales into Electoral Districts, and for the Election of Members to serve in the Legislative Council*," it was amongst other things enacted, that the Town of Parramatta, in the County of Cumberland—the united Towns of Windsor, Richmond, Campbelltown, and Liverpool, in the said County of Cumberland, under the denomination of the Cumberland Boroughs—and the united Towns of East Maitland, West Maitland, and Newcastle, in the County of Northumberland, under the denomination of the Northumberland Boroughs, should respectively form Electoral Districts: And whereas, by another Act of the said Governor and Council, passed in the Sixth year of Her said present Majesty's reign, intituled "*An Act for declaring the Town of Syd-*

ney to be a City, and to incorporate the Inhabitants thereof," the said Town of Sydney was thereby constituted a City:—Now, therefore, I, Sir George Gipps, the Governor aforesaid, do hereby, in pursuance of the authority so in me vested by the said Act of Parliament, notify and proclaim that, for the purposes of the said Act, the Boundaries of the said City of Sydney, and of the said several Towns, shall be such as are hereinafter set forth and described, that is to say—

CITY OF SYDNEY.—Bounded on the north by the waters of Port Jackson, from a landmark at the head of Blackwattle Bay to Rushcutter's Bay; on the east by the stream entering Rushcutter's Bay to a bridge on the South Head Road, at the north-west corner of Sydney Common, and by the western boundary of that Common to a road extending westward to the back of Cleveland House; on the south by that road and its western fence prolonged to a landmark on the Road to Cook's River; on the west by the western side of the Road to Cook's River, and that line prolonged to the landmark at the Head of Blackwattle Bay.

TOWN OF MELBOURNE.—Comprehending the two following portions of Land, viz.:—1st., parish of North Melbourne, bounded on the north by a line bearing east 240 chains, being distant 1 mile north from the centre of Batman's Hill, extending 2 miles east to its north-east corner; on the east by a line bearing south 110 chains; on the south by the Yarra Yarra River; and on the west by a line bearing north 94 chains to its north-west corner.

2nd.—The suburb of Newtown, otherwise called "Collingwood", consisting of 320 acres, county of Bourke, bounded on the south by the parish boundary line of Melbourne, being a line bearing east 40 chains; on the east by a road of 1 chain wide which separates it from suburban allotments Nos. 52, 68, 73, 81, and 86, being a line bearing north 80 chains on the north by a road of 1

chain wide which separates it from Crown Land, being a line bearing west 40 chains; and on the west by a road of 1 chain wide being a line bearing south 80 chains.

TOWN OF PARRAMATTA.—Commencing at a stake on the northern side of Parramatta River, nearly opposite the mouth of Clay Cliffe Creek, from this point a straight line up the Orphan School Road to a marked grey gum tree, on the northern side of the Kissing Point Road being a line bearing north 1 degree west 55 chains 30 links; from this tree a line to a stake on the western side of the Windsor Road, near to the Darling Mills Bridge being a line bearing west $18\frac{1}{4}$ degrees north 124 chains 40 links; from the aforesaid stake a line to a large dead stump on a hill to the west of the Old Mill being a line bearing south 34 degrees west 24 chains 50 links; from this stump a line through the Domain to a post of a small bridge situated to the west of the Governor's Stables being a line bearing south $2\frac{1}{4}$ degrees 75 chains 70 links; from this post a line to a dead stump on the south side of the Bathurst Road and west of the Toll House being a line bearing south 20 degrees east 46 chains 90 links; from the aforesaid dead stump a line to a stake on the top of the ridge at the western fence of the Race Course being a line south $21\frac{1}{2}$ degrees west 40 chains 50 links; from this stake a line across the Sydney Road to a stake near the Constable's hut formerly the Toll House being a line bearing east $19\frac{1}{4}$ degrees north 40 chains; from the latter stake a line running along the ridge across Dr. Harris's ground to a stake on the outside of a fence that crosses a small dry Watercourse, situated to the west of Mr. McArthur's residence being a line bearing east $28\frac{1}{2}$ degrees north 56 chains; from this stake by the water course to Clay Cliffe Creek, and by Clay Cliffe Creek to Parramatta River nearly opposite to the commencing point.

CUMBERLAND BOROUGHES.

TOWN OF WINDSOR.—Commencing at a marked oak tree on South Creek to the south-east of the Court-house; from this tree by South Creek to a stake situated on the bank of the creek on Fitzgerald's farm; from this stake by a line bearing west 91 chains to another stake; from this by a line passing the north fence of land belonging to the Benevolent Asylum, bearing west 34 degrees north 52 chains 80 links to a marked dead stump on Rickaby's Creek; from this stump by Rickaby's Creek to the Hawkesbury River; and by the Hawkesbury River to a stake nearly north of the Court-house; and from this stake by a line bearing south 28 degrees east 28 chains to the aforesaid marked tree on South Creek.

TOWN OF RICHMOND.—Commencing at a marked post at the south-west corner of William Townsend's land; from thence along Wilson's fence to the southern corner post being a line bearing south 27 minutes 12 chains 12 links; from thence a line to the south-east corner of the Catholic Burial Ground allotment, being south 35 degrees 3 minutes west 25 chains 10 links; from thence to the north-east corner post of the fence of Luttrell's 400 acres, being a line bearing south 62 degrees 9 minutes west 19 chains 66 links; from thence along the fence dividing it from the road to Pen-

rith, being a line bearing south 38 degrees 12 minutes west 55 chains 27 links; from thence along the fence dividing it from the Common to the corner post on the south side of the road to the Kurragong, being a line bearing west 40 degrees north 81 chains 75 links; from thence a line crossing the road and along a fence as far as it goes; and then a continuous line to a stake on the west side of the Pugh's Lagoon, bearing north 38 degrees 10 minutes east 76 chains 30 links; and from thence a line across the lagoon to the commencing corner post bearing east 16 degrees south 86 chains 70 links.

TOWN OF CAMPBELLTOWN.—Commencing at a marked post situated by a small bridge on the high road from Sydney, north-easterly of Graham's Inn, being a line bearing east 49 degrees 15 minutes south 59 chains 45 links to a marked post near the eastern corner of the Campbelltown Reserve; from thence by a line bearing south 44 degrees 35 minutes west 35 chains 45 links to a marked post near the southern corner of Campbelltown Reserve; from thence by a line bearing west 3 degrees north 47 chains 60 links to a marked post on the western side of the Appin Road; from thence by a line bearing west 42 degrees north 26 chains to a marked post near the junction of the roads leading to the Menangle and Cowpasture Fords; from thence by a line bearing north 38 degrees east 68 chains 35 links to a marked post on the northern side of the continuation of the street which extends along the north-eastern boundary of the Campbelltown Reserve; and from thence by a line bearing east 19 degrees 20 minutes, south 11 chains and 40 links to the aforesaid post on the high road from Sydney.

TOWN OF LIVERPOOL.—Commencing at a stake near a marked corner post of S. Lloyd's fence upon Brickmaker's Creek; from thence along the fence to the Sydney Road, and thence a continuous line to a stake, being east 13 degrees 30 minutes north 80 chains 30 links; from thence a line easterly to Chippendale's fence, and along that fence to the river, being south 1 degree 54 minutes east 48 chains 95 links; from thence along the river to a marked stump situated in Chipp's grant; from thence a line bearing west 70 chains 50 links to a stake on Brickmaker's Creek, in Maria Lock's grant; and from thence along Brickmaker's Creek to the stake at the point of commencement.

NORTHUMBERLAND BOROUGHES.

TOWN OF EAST MAITLAND.—Commencing at the north-west corner of Goldenham's 500 acres, and bounded on the south by his northern boundary line bearing east; then by its continuation as the northern boundary of a portion of 320 acres reserved for the extension of the Town; and further easterly at the northern boundary line of Davis' 200 acres to the north-east corner thereof; on part of the east by a line bearing north about 100 chains; on part of the north by a line bearing west to a southerly continuation of Eckford's eastern boundary line; on the remainder of the east by that continuation and by the said boundary line bearing north to his north-east corner; again on the north by Eckford's northern boundary line to the river; and on the residue of the north by Hunter's River to its confluence with Wallis' Creek; and on the west by Wallis' Creek south-

easterly to the north-west corner of Goldenham's 500 acres as aforesaid.

TOWN OF WEST MAITLAND.—Commencing at the River Hunter at the confluence with the river of a creek dividing the allotments of Hall and Balcot, and bounded on part of the north by that creek so far as it bears westerly; thence by a continued west line to the south-west corner of Hall's allotment; on the west by Balcot's western boundary and its southerly continuation to P. F. Campbell's northern boundary line; again on the north by that boundary line bearing west to its north-west corner; again on the west by the western boundary line of Campbell and Luke Ralfe's lands to the north-west corner of J. T. Hughes' 4 acres; on part of the south by the northern boundary line of that land bearing east to Swamp Creek; on the remainder of the south and part of the east by that creek to its confluence with Wallis' Creek; and thence by Wallis' Creek to its own confluence with the River Hunter; and on the residue of the east and north by that river to its confluence with the creek, dividing the allotments of Hall and Balcot as aforesaid.

TOWN OF NEWCASTLE.—Commencing at the centre of the Swamp Creek Bridge, on the road from Newcastle to Maitland, and bounded on the west by a line bearing south 73 chains to the south boundary line of the Australian Agricultural Company's 2000 acres grant; on the south by 44 chains of that boundary line, bearing east to the sea coast; on the east by the waters of the Pacific Ocean, northerly; and on the north by the waters of Port Hunter, westerly to the mouth of the Swamp Creek; and by the Swamp Creek upwards to the centre of the bridge crossing it on the road from Newcastle to Maitland.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR has been pleased to direct the re-publication from the *London Gazette* of the 7th October, 1842, of the following Order in Council.

By His Excellency's Command,

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS, by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to regulate the trade of the British possessions abroad," it was, amongst other things, enacted, that no goods should be im-

ported into, nor should any goods, except the produce of the fisheries in British ships, be exported from any of the British possessions in America by sea, from or to any place other than the United Kingdom, or some other of such possessions, excepting to or from the several ports in such possessions, called free ports, enumerated or described in the table in the said Act contained; and it was thereby further enacted, that if any goods should be imported into any port or place in any of the said possessions, contrary to the said Act, such goods should be forfeited; and it was thereby provided that, if His Majesty should deem it expedient to extend the provisions of the said Act to any port or ports not enumerated in the said table, it should be lawful for His Majesty, by Order in Council, to extend the provisions of the said Act to such port or ports, and that, from and after the day mentioned in such Order in Council, all the privileges and advantages of the said Act, and all the provisions, penalties, and forfeitures therein contained, subject, nevertheless, to the limitations and restrictions thereafter provided, should extend, and be deemed and construed to extend, to any such port or ports, respectively, as fully as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the said table at the time of passing the said Act:

And whereas by the said last-before recited Act, it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of his Privy Council, by any Order or Orders in Council to be issued from time to time, to give such directions and make such regulations, touching the trade and commerce to and from any British possessions on or near the continent of Europe, or within the Mediterranean Sea, or in Africa, or within the limits of the East India Company's charter (excepting the possessions of the said Company,) as to His Majesty in Council shall appear most expedient and salutary, any thing in this Act to the contrary notwithstanding: and if any goods shall be imported or exported in any manner contrary to any such Order of His Majesty in Council, the same shall be forfeited, together with the ship importing or exporting the same:

And whereas Her Majesty doth deem it expedient to extend the before-mentioned provisions of the said Act, respecting such free ports, to the ports of Wellington, Auckland, and Russell, in the Colony of New Zealand:

Now, therefore, under and by virtue of the said Act of Parliament, and in exercise of the powers thereby in Her Majesty in Council in that behalf vested, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that, from and after the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and forty-three, the provisions of the said Act, as far as the same relate to the free ports respectively therein mentioned, shall be, and the same are hereby extended to ports Wellington, Auckland, and Russell, in the Colony of New Zealand; and that, from and after the said first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and forty-three, all the privileges and advantages of the said Act conferred upon the free ports therein mentioned, and all the provisions, penalties, and forfeitures in the said Act contained, subject to the limitations and restrictions therein provided, shall extend to the said ports of Wellington, Auckland, and Russell, as fully and effectually as if such ports had been situate in Her Majesty's American Colonies,

and inserted and enumerated in the said table at the time of passing the said Act:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

OCCUPATION LICENSES.

WITH reference to the 4th paragraph of the Regulations of 21st August, 1841, respecting the sale of Licenses for the occupation of Crown Lands, within the boundaries of location, which provides that if the yearly price of the License does not exceed £5, the same will be demanded at the fall of the hammer, but if above £5, a deposit of ten per cent. only will be required at the fall of the hammer, and the remainder within one month: His Excellency the GOVERNOR directs it to be notified, that, in future, before any bidding is accepted, the party will be required to pay £5 for each section of 640 acres, at the fall of the hammer, whether the yearly price of the License exceed that sum or not, and the balance, if any, within one month from the day of sale, as heretofore.
