WRECK OF THE MINERVA—Undoubted intelligence has at length reached Launceston that the schooner MINERVA, of this port, belonging to J.

H. Campbell, Esq., was lost at Open Bay, New Zealand, on the 18th of August last. She struck on a reef in three fathoms of water, about a mile from shore. A tremendous sea was running at the time, and the vessel was nearly holed on the beach. With the assistance of the natives the lives of the crew were with difficulty saved. The natives also assisted in landing the cargo, consisting of produce purchased from themselves, but they afterwards seriously plundered it, and carried off everything portable from the wreck, cutting the sails into mats, &c., for their own use. On the 20th of November, Mr Alexander Campbell was still on the coast with a large quantity of produce, anxiously waiting for a vessel from Port Nicholson, to which place he had written for assistance.—*Launceston Examiner.*

**TARIFF.**

**BY** the amended new Tariff, passed by the British Parliament, the duty on salt beef from the colonies has been reduced from twelve to two shillings, foreign to eight shillings per cwt.; cheese from 10s 6d., to 2s. 6d. per cwt.

From the duty levied on colonial beef, a considerable export trade will immediately be created from these colonies, whose herds are numerous, and can be reared and supported on the natural grasses at little expense.

Port Phillip from its rich pasture at all seasons, the numerous herds now grazing thereon, the trifling expense at which cattle on a station where they have been reared will amount to per annum; the proximity to a sea port at which large herds are now departing in the district, saving the reduction in weight and fever which a long journey will cause, often producing inflammation sufficient to prevent the thorough curing of the meat.

Several English capitalists are now preparing to avail themselves of these advantages, being aware that these colonies, and Port Phillip in particular, are the only countries from which an immediate supply of beef, equal to English, can be procured to meet the demand, which the nominal duty of 2s. per cwt. will create rivalry amongst the Australian Colonies—Port Phillip need not dread.

From the immediate demand which will arise for stock suitable for killing, independent of the regular supply to V. D. Land, the price of cattle is certain to advance in a few months to a capital paying price. Parties who intend to become settlers—or the capitalist who may speculate on a certain rise, will no doubt avail themselves of the present temporary depressed state, to become purchasers.
