## No. XIII.

An Act for applying certain sums arising from the Revenue receivable in New South Wales, to the service thereof, for the Year One thousand eight hundred and forty-five, and for further appropriating the said Revenue.

WHEREAS by a certain Act of Parliament, passed in the fifth and sixth Preamble. year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, "An Act for the Government of New South Wales, and Van Die- 5 & 6 Vic., c. 76.
