ACTS OF COUNCIL.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR directs it to be notified that the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies has intimated, in two several Despatches, under dates the 15th and 19th August, 1843, that HER MAJESTY has been graciously pleased to approve and confirm the undermentioned Acts, passed by the Governor and Legislative Council, in the 4th, 5th, and 6th years of Her Majesty's Reign, viz:—

4TH VICTORIA.

No. 22.—An Act to provide for the more effectual Administration of Justice in New South Wales and its Dependencies. [16th October, 1840.]

5TH VICTORIA.

No. 22.—An Act to further continue, for a limited time, an Act, intituled "*An Act for preventing the extension of the Disease commonly called the Influenza or Catarrh, in Sheep and Lambs, in the Colony of New South Wales.*" [26th May, 1842.]

No. 23.—An Act to further continue, for a limited time, an Act, intituled "*An Act to facilitate the apprehension of Transported Felons and Offenders illegally at large, and of persons found with Arms and suspected to be Robbers.*" [26th May, 1842.]

No. 24.—An Act to amend an Act, intituled "*An Act to provide for the periodical publication of Liabilities and Assets of Banks in New South Wales and its Dependencies, and the Registration of the names of the proprietors thereof.*" [26th May, 1842.]

No. 25.—An Act to further continue, for a limited time, an Act, intituled "*An Act for regulating the constitution of Juries, and for the Trial of Issues, in certain cases, in the Supreme Court of New South Wales.*" [15th June, 1842.]

6TH VICTORIA.

No. 2.—An Act for further facilitating proceedings by and against all Banking and other Companies in the Colony, entitled to sue and be sued in the name of their Chairman, Secretary, or other Officer. [7th July, 1842.]

No. 4.—An Act to amend an Act, intituled "*An Act to provide for the more effectual Administration of Justice in New South Wales and its Dependencies.*" [26th July, 1842.]

No. 6.—An Act to facilitate proceedings by and against the Proprietors of a certain Joint Stock Company, lately carrying on business in Maitland, in the Colony of New South Wales, under the name, style, or firm of the "*Hunter's River Auction Company,*" and for other purposes therein mentioned. [3rd August, 1842.]

No. 10.—An Act to amend an Act, intituled "*An Act for the better preservation of the Ports, Harbours, Havens, Roadsteads, Channels, Navigable Creeks, and Rivers, in New South Wales, and the better regulation of Shipping in the same.*" [16th August, 1842.]

No. 11.—An Act to amend Schedule C of an Act, intituled "*An Act for appointing and empowering Commissioners to examine and report upon Claims to Grants of Land under the Great Seal of the Colony of New South Wales.*" [16th August, 1842.]

No. 13.—An Act for directing the application of all Fines imposed for Drunkenness. [30th August, 1842.]

No. 14.—An Act to continue, for a limited time, an Act passed in the fifth year of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled "*An Act to authorise the Governor of New South Wales to detain, at hard labour, any male offender under a second sentence or order of Transportation.*" [7th September, 1842.]

No. 15.—An Act to consolidate and amend the Law relating to Courts of Requests, and to extend the

jurisdiction of such Courts in the County of Cumberland. [7th September, 1842.]

TWENTY POUNDS REWARD, OR A

CHURCH GRANTS.

THE following descriptions of TOWN ALLOTMENTS, which have, at various periods, been appropriated to the purposes of the UNITED CHURCH

of ENGLAND AND IRELAND, as hereunder more particularly mentioned, are published for general information, in order that all parties concerned may have an opportunity of correcting any errors or omissions that may have been made inadvertently, being in addition to those advertised on 8th February, 28th June, 14th July, 1st October, and 12th December, 1842, and 1st March, 4th May, and 1st August, 1843.

At the expiration of *one month* from this date, if no caveat be lodged or other cause of uncertainty appear, Deeds of Grant for the respective allotments will be executed in favor of the approved Trustees in each case, under the provisions of the Acts of the Colonial Legislature, 7th William IV., No. 3, and 8th William IV, No. 5, viz:—

74. BRAIDWOOD, 1, One acre, County of St. Vincent, Parish of Braidwood, Village of Braidwood, commencing at the fence forming the boundary of John Coghill's 5600 acres at the south-west corner of the Presbyterian Burial Ground, and bounded on the east by that allotment, being a line bearing north 3 chains and 43 links to Cowper-street; on the north by that street, being a line bearing west 3 chains; on the west by a line bearing south 3 chains 43 links to John Coghill's 5600 acres; and on the south by that land, being a line bearing east 3 chains to the south-west corner of the Presbyterian Burial Ground aforesaid.

Authorised by Sir George Gipps as an Episcopalian Burial Ground.

75. JERRY'S PLAINS, 1, One acre, County of Hunter, Parish of Hunter, Town of Jerry's Plains, allotments Nos. 6 and 7 of section No. 4, commencing 5 chains west 38 degrees north from the eastern corner of section 4; bounded on the north-east by Pagan-street, being a line 2 chains east 38 degrees north; on the north-west by a line 5 chains south 38 degrees west; on the south-west by a line 2 chains east 38 degrees south; and on the south-east by a line 5 chains north 38 degrees east to the point of commencement.

Authorised by Sir George Gipps as the site for an Episcopalian Church.

76. JERRY'S PLAINS, 2, Two roods, County of Hunter, Parish of Hunter, Town of Jerry's Plains, allotment No. 5 of section 4, commencing 4 chains west 38 degrees north from the eastern corner of section 4; bounded on the north-east by Pagan-street, being a line 1 chain west 38 degrees north; on the north-west by a line 5 chains south 38 degrees west; on the south-west by a line 1 chain east 38 degrees south; and on the south-east by a line 5 chains north 38 degrees east to the point of commencement. Authorised by Sir George Gipps as the site for an Episcopalian School House.

77. JERRY'S PLAINS, 2, Two roods, County of Hunter, Parish of Hunter, Town of Jerry's Plains, allotment No. 4 of section 4, commencing 3 chains west 38 degrees north from the eastern corner of section No. 4; bounded on the north-east by Pagan-street, being a line 1 chain west 38 degrees north; on the north-west by a line 5 chains south 38 degrees west; on the south-west by a line 1 chain east 38 degrees south; and on the south-east by a line 5 chains north 38 degrees east to the point of commencement.

Authorised by Sir George Gipps as the site for an Episcopalian Minister's Dwelling.

78. KIAMA, 1, One acre, County of Camden, Parish of Kiama, Town of Kiama, allotments Nos. 3 and 4 of section No. 3, commencing at the northernmost corner of allotment No. 5, on Manning-street, and bounded on the west by Manning-street, being a line bearing north 27 degrees east 2 chains; on the north by Bong Bong-street, being a line bearing south 63 degrees east 5 chains; on the east by allotment No. 2, being a line bearing south 27 degrees west 2 chains; and on the south by allotment No. 5, being a line bearing north 63 degrees west 5 chains to the northernmost corner of allotment No. 5, on Manning-street as aforesaid.

79. SCONE, 1a. 2r., One acre two roods, County of Durham, Parish of Scone, Village of Scone, allotments Nos. 11, 12, and 13, in section No. 3, commencing at the corner of Liverpool and Hill-streets; bounded on the north by Liverpool-street, being a line 3 chains west; on the west by a line 5 chains south; on the south by a line 3 chains east; and on the east by a line 5 chains north to the corner of Liverpool and Hill Streets aforesaid.

Authorised by Sir Richard Bourke as sites for an Episcopal Church and Parsonage.

THE following descriptions of grants of Land and Town Allotments, which have, from time to time, been appropriated to the purposes of the PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, as hereunder more particularly mentioned, are published for general information, in order that all parties concerned may have an opportunity of correcting any errors or omissions that may have been made inadvertently; being in addition to the allotments advertised on 1st October, 1842, and on 1st March, 6th June, and 12th September, 1843.

At the expiration of *one month* from this date, if no Caveat be lodged, or other cause of uncertainty appear, Deeds of Grant for the respective allotments will be executed in favor of the approved Trustees in each case, under the provisions of the Acts of the Colonial Legislature, 7th William IV, No. 3, and 8th William IV, No. 7, viz:—

24. KIAMA, 1, One acre, County of Camden, Parish of Kiama, near the Town of Kiama, commencing 16 chains north, and 4 chains 20 links east, from the south-east corner of J. Collis' 1280 acres primary grant, and bounded on the south by a line bearing south 65 degrees east 4 chains; on the east by a line bearing north 25 degrees east 2 chains and 50 links; on the north by a line bearing north 65 degrees west 4 chains; and on the west by a line bearing south 25 degrees west 2 chains 50 links to the point of commencement.

PATERSON, $\frac{1}{2}$ a., Half an acre, County of Durham, Parish of Houghton, Town of Paterson, commencing at the north extreme of the west boundary line of the Presbyterian Parsonage allotment, and bounded on the east by that boundary line, bearing south 4 chains and 80 links; on the south by 1 chain of the north side of the high road bearing west 30 degrees north; on the west by a north line of 6 chains and 5 links to the River Paterson; and on the north by the River Paterson downwards to the north extreme of the west boundary line of the Presbyterian Parsonage allotment as aforesaid.

Authorised by Sir George Gipps as a site for a Presbyterian School House.

27. PATERSON, $\frac{1}{2}$ a., Half an acre, County of Durham, Parish of Houghton, Town of Paterson, commencing at the north extreme of the west boundary line of the Presbyterian Church allotment, and bounded on the east by that boundary line bearing south 4 chains and 50 links; on the south by 1 chain of the north side of the high road bearing west 30 degrees north; on the west by a line bearing north 4 chains and 80 links to the River Paterson; and on the north by the River Paterson downwards to the north extreme of the west boundary line of the Presbyterian Church allotment as aforesaid.

Authorised by Sir George Gipps as the site for the Presbyterian Clergyman's Residence.

28. WEST MAITLAND, $\frac{1}{2}$ a., Half an acre, County of Northumberland, Parish of Maitland, at West Maitland, commencing at the east extreme of the north boundary line of the Presbyterian School allotment, and bounded on the south by that boundary line bearing west 1 chain and 75 links; on the west by a north line of 2 chains 90 links; on the north by an east line of 1 chain and 75 links; and on the east by 2 chains 90 links of the east boundary line of the 5 acres of land originally appropriated to Presbyterian Church purposes, and of which this forms a part, bearing south, to the eastern extreme of the north boundary line of the School allotment as aforesaid.

Authorised by Sir Richard Bourke as a site for a Presbyterian Church.

29. WEST MAITLAND, $\frac{1}{2}$ a., Half an acre, County of Northumberland, Parish of Maitland, at West Maitland, commencing at the south extreme of the east boundary line of the 5 acres of land originally appropriated to Presbyterian Church purposes, and of which this forms a part, and bounded on the east by 2 chains 90 links of that line bearing north; on the north by a west line of 1 chain 75 links; on the west by a south line of 2 chains 90 links; and on the south by 1 chain 75 links of the south boundary line of the aforesaid 5 acres of land, bearing east, to the south extreme of the east boundary line thereof as aforesaid.

30. WEST MAITLAND, $\frac{1}{2}$ a., Half an acre, County

of Northumberland, Parish of Maitland, at West Maitland, commencing at the southern extreme of the west boundary line of the 5 acres of land originally appropriated for Presbyterian Church purposes, and of which this forms a part, and bounded on the west by 1 chain 50 links of that boundary line bearing north; on the north by an east line of 3 chains 50 links; on the east by a line dividing it from the Presbyterian School allotment bearing south 1 chain 50 links; and on the south by 3 chains 50 links of the south boundary line of the aforesaid 5 acres of land, bearing west, to the south extreme of the west boundary line thereof as aforesaid.

CONDITIONS.

QUALITIES OF THE SUPPLIES.

1. All the articles shall be of the best quality of their several kinds,

2. The Bread shall be the produce of clean sound Wheat, Barley, and Maize, from which, on the Military Ration 20 per cent., and on the Convict Ration 10 per cent., has been extracted in bran and waste. The Wheaten Bread shall be made in loaves of 3lbs., and the Mixed Bread in loaves of 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ lbs. each, and baked 24 hours before being issued; and parties Tendering are requested to observe, that the most rigid adherence to the conditions as to the quality of the Bread, shall be invariably enforced.
