PORT PHILLIP.

From and to Yass, Gundagai, Albury, Ovens, Seymour, Kilmore, and Melbourne, once or twice a week, for the whole distance, or separately for portions of the Road.

It is to be understood that the Mails are to be dispatched on the days and hours to be fixed by the Postmaster-General, either according to the present arrangement, or as he may afterwards determine for the public convenience.

It will be optional with parties to offer for one or more of the above lines of stages, and to propose the mode of conveyance; but on all roads where wheel vehicles can travel, a preference will be given to carriage conveyance, and the Contractors will be held strictly bound to use the conveyance they propose, and to travel at the rate agreed upon. The rate of travelling is not to be less than six miles per hour, including all stoppages. The Contractors are to carry all bags and letters which may be delivered to them under authority of the Postmaster-General, or any of the Postmasters, and to provide secure lockers for the Mails in carriages, and dry coverings for the bags on horseback.

Contractors will be bound to prevent the conveyance of any letter or packet, by any of their servants or passengers, or otherwise, to the prejudice of the Post Office Revenue, under penalty of £5 for each and every offence.

Contractors will be liable to a fine of five shillings for every five minutes delay after the specified time of starting; and to a like penalty for every ten minutes delay after the specified time of arrival, except for the first five or ten minutes respectively.

Contractors will be strictly bound not to assign any portion of their Contract without consent of the Postmaster-General.

A Mail Cart or Carriage, drawn only by one horse, must not carry more than one passenger; by two horses, not more than three passengers and by three or more horses, not more than six passengers, exclusive of the driver, under a penalty of £3 for each offence, on all roads except between Melbourne and Yass, and on that road the penalty will be £10.

All vehicles and horses employed in the conveyance of Mails are to be at all times subject to the inspection and approval, or rejection of the Postmaster-General, or person appointed by him for that purpose.

The drivers and postmen are to be free men, and of certified good character.

All fines and penalties incurred under the agreement are to be deducted by the Postmaster-General, from the next quarterly instalment falling due to the Contractor, and to be considered as over and above any penalties provided by any Act of Council.

Each party tendering or an agent for him, must attend at this Office on the day appointed for opening the Tenders; and each Tender must bear the signature of two respectable and solvent persons, engaging to enter into a bond with the Contractor for the safety of the Mails and the due performance of the Contract, and every stipulation therein.

The hours of starting from each Post Office or stage and other particulars, may be ascertained at the General Post Office, where parties proposing to Tender are invited to seek information.

Printed forms of Tender may be had on application at the General and all other Post Offices throughout the Colony.

CONTRACTS FOR THE COLONIAL SERVICE, FOR 1847.

NOTICE is hereby given, that Tenders will be received at this Office, until 12 o'clock, of Monday, the 16th November next, for furnishing, for the Colonial Service, in the several Districts, the supplies undermentioned, in such quantities as may be required, during Twelve Calendar Months, commencing 1st January, 1847, upon the conditions hereafter specified.

PROVISIONS.

1. The Ration for Emigrants:—*For Men*, 24oz. wheaten bread, 16oz. fresh meat, 8oz. vegetables, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. of salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap—*For Women*, 16oz. wheat bread, 12oz. fresh meat, 6oz. vegetables, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap—Children under ten years, to be allowed two-thirds of the Ration of Female Adults; above that age, and under fifteen, the same as Adults.

2. The Ration for Prisoners of the Crown, and others in the employment of Colonial Departments when authorised to receive it, with the exceptions specified in Nos. 3, 6, and 7—20oz. wheat bread, 8oz. maize meal, 16oz. fresh beef, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. salt, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap.

3. The Rations to Officers in charge of Surveying parties, when in the field, and men composing such parties; and for Soldiers of the Mounted Police, and other Mounted parties, when required:—24oz. flour, 16oz. fresh beef, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, $2\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tobacco, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap.

4. The Ration for wives of Soldiers of the Mounted Police:—8oz. bread, 8oz. meat.

5. The Ration for children of Soldiers of Mounted Police above 7 years:— $5\frac{1}{2}$ oz. of bread, $5\frac{1}{2}$ oz. meat—under 7 years, 4oz. of bread and 4oz. of meat.

6. The Ration to the Superintendent and Crew of the Floating-light Vessel, Sydney Harbour:—16oz. biscuit, 8oz. flour, 16oz. fresh beef, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 3oz. sugar, $2\frac{1}{2}$ oz. raisins, 1-14 pint oatmeal, 1-14 pint vinegar.

7. The Ration to Men attending the Light-house, South Head, Telegraphs, and Boatmen in the Departments of Customs, Harbour Master, and Police:—24oz. wheat bread, 16oz. fresh beef, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. salt, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap.

8. The Ration to Apprentices to the Colonial Architect:—20oz. bread, 16oz. fresh beef or mutton, 8oz. vegetables, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 2oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

9. To prisoners confined in Gaol:—12oz. wheat bread, 12oz. maize meal, 4oz. fresh beef, 8oz. vegetables, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap—(Ration No. 2 is issued to Gaol attendants, and to Witnesses and others awaiting bail; and if confined in solitary cells, Ration No. 11.)

10. To children of Female Prisoners confined in Gaol.—8oz. wheat bread, 4oz. fresh beef, 1 pint milk, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. yellow soap.

11. Prisoners confined in Lock-up or Watch-houses:—24oz. wheat bread or 20oz. flour—(Ration No. 2 is occasionally issued at Watch-houses to Prisoners of the Crown, when travelling from one station to another, and in other cases when sanctioned by a Magistrate.)

12. The Ration to Men, to the Matron, and to the Apprentices in the Government Printing Establishment, 24oz. bread 16oz. fresh beef or mutton, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 2oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap.

13. Forage for Horses and oxen—8lbs. maize or barley, or 10lbs. of oats, 4lbs. bran, 12lbs. eaten or cultivated grass hay, and 4lbs. wheat straw, for each horse daily, and half that quantity for each bullock.

14. For the Light House, South Head, and Floating Light, Sydney Harbour—Best clarified sperm oil, per imperial gallon; patent wicks each.

15. Flour, tea, sugar, and tobacco, bread or meat, in such quantities as may be required, for deserving Mechanics and others in Colonial Establishments when authorised.

16. Fuel and light—Firewood per 100lbs.; sperm oil, common oil, per imperial gallon; mould candles, dipt candles, cotton wick per lb.

17. To be delivered in Sydney, as required for the Public Service, when ordered:—Fresh beef, salt beef, salt pork, fresh mutton, maize meal, bread 1st, 2nd, and 3rd quality, ship biscuit, flour 1st, 2nd, and 3rd quality, arrowroot, sago, rice, tea, sugar, oatmeal, salt, yellow soap, pearl barley, tobacco, lard, candles mould and dipt, salt butter, gelatine, vegetables per lb.; milk, yeast, lime-juice, per quart; port wine; per dozen; rum, vinegar, per imperial gallon; roach lime, per bushel; straw for bedding, per 100lbs.

18. For the Lunatic Asylum, at Tarban Creek:—Fresh beef, fresh mutton, suet, wheaten bread, bread of the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd quality, flour 1st, 2nd, and 3rd quality, rice, tea, sugar, salt, pepper, per lb.; milk per quart; tobacco, soap, vegetables, per lb.; port wine per dozen; vinegar per gallon; sago, oatmeal, arrowroot, dipt candles, per lb.; common oil, per gallon; cotton wick, per lb.; forage, per ration, roach lime, per bushel; straw, per 100lbs.

MALE ORPHAN SCHOOL, LIVERPOOL.—Daily Ration.

1. To the Master, Schoolmaster, and Men employed as servants or labourers, and to every two of the Master's children:—22oz. flour, 16oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. tea, 2oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

2. To the Wife of the Master and Female servants entitled to Rations:—16oz. flour, 12oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 2oz. sugar, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. soap.

3. Children above 6 years of age:—On Holidays, 20oz. flour, 12oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap. On Thursdays, 16oz. flour, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap. On other days, 16oz. flour, 12oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap.

4. Nursery Children under 6 years of age:—On Holidays, 16oz. flour, 4oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap. On Thursday, 12oz. flour, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap. On other days, 12oz. flour, 4oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap.

For Children under 7 years of age, best wheaten bread is to be substituted, if required, in the proportion of 8oz. of bread for 12oz. flour.

5. For the use of the Establishment:—3 pints of oil.

6. For Artificers and Labourers— $\frac{3}{8}$ oz. of tobacco, when authorised.

7. Forage for a Horse—10lbs. of maize.

8. Best wheat bread, flour, tea, sugar, salt, pearl barley, rice, oatmeal, arrowroot, sago, yeast, lard, candles, soap, vinegar, and straw, as required.

FEMALE ORPHAN SCHOOL, PARRAMATTA.—

Daily Rations.

1. To the Superintendent and men employed as labourers or servants, the same as No. 1 of the Male Orphan School.

2. To the Matron and female servants, entitled to Rations, the same as No. 2 of the Male Orphan School.

3. To each of the Female Orphans and Children:—On holidays, 16oz. flour, 8oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. soap. On Sundays and other days, 12oz. flour, 8oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. soap.

For children under 7 years of age, best wheaten bread is to be substituted, if required, in the proportion of 8oz. of bread for 12oz. of flour.

4.—For the use of the Establishment:—1oz. pints of oil, 1oz. pints vinegar.

5. For Artificers and Labourers:—The same as No. 6 of the Male Orphan School.

6. Forage:—The same as No. 13 of the General Supplies.

7. Best wheat bread, flour, tea, sugar, salt, pearl barley, sago, rice, oatmeal, arrowroot, yeast, lard, candles, soap, vinegar, straw, and firewood, as required.

The holidays at these Schools are, New Year's Day, Easter Day, Christmas Day, and the Queen's Birth Day.

When the full ration of flour, specified in No. 3, is not required, the Contractor is to deduct from his account the value of such quantity as may be undrawn or returned to him, at the price per lb. fixed for that article, when supplied by him under No. 7.

INSTITUTION FOR DESTITUTE ROMAN CATHOLIC CHILDREN, PARRAMATTA.

Daily Rations.

1. To the Master, Schoolmaster, Storekeeper, and men employed as servants:—22oz. flour, 16oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. tea, 2oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

2. To the Matron and female servants:—16oz. flour, 12oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 2oz. sugar, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. soap.

3. To the Male Children above six years of age:—On holidays—20oz. flour, 12oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap. On Thursdays—16oz. flour, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap. On other days—16oz. flour, 12oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap.

4. To the Male Children under six years of age:—On holidays—16oz. flour, 4oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap. On Thursdays—12oz. flour, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants,

1oz. suet, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap. On other days—12oz. flour, 4oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

5. To the Female Children—On holidays—16oz. flour, 8oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. raisins or currants, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. suet, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap. On Sundays and other days—12oz. flour, 8oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

6. For the use of the Establishment—1 $\frac{3}{4}$ pint oil, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ pint vinegar.

7. Milk and vegetables for the Children, best wheat bread, flour, tea, sugar, salt, pearl barley, rice, oatmeal, arrowroot, sago, yeast, lard, common dipped candles, soap, vinegar, straw, and firewood, as required.

For Children under seven years of age, best wheaten bread is to be substituted, if required, in the proportion of 8oz. of bread for 12oz. of flour.

DISTRICTS.

The Districts for which Contracts will be required, are as follows, viz:—

1. Sydney; 2. Parramatta; 3. Liverpool; 4. Campbelltown; 5. Picton; 6. Camden and Narrellan; 7. Illawarra; 8. Berrima; 9. Goulburn; 10. Braidwood; 11. Broulee; 12. Queanbeyan; 13. Yass, including Gunning and Narrawa, at the Fish River; 14. Windsor; 15. Penrith; 16. Hartley, including Blackheath; 17. Bathurst; 18. Carcoar; 19. Wellington; 20. Mudgee; 21. Brisbane Water; 22. Newcastle and Raymond Terrace; 23. Dungog; 24. Maitland; 25. Wollombi and M'Donald River; 26. Paterson; 27. Patrick's Plains; 28. Merton and Muswellbrook; 29. Scone and Murrurundi; 30. Cassilis; 31. Macquarie; 32. Moreton Bay.

The 31 Districts first mentioned are the Police Districts described in the Notices from this Office, dated 15th September, 1841, 9th August, 1842, and 25th March, 1845, and further particulars respecting them may be obtained from the Police Magistrates and Benches.

Separate Tenders will be required for the forage in the District of Sydney, but the other supplies for that District are to be tendered for together.

The supplies for each of the other Districts, with the exception of those for the Male and Female Orphan Schools, the Institution for Destitute Roman Catholic Children, and the Lunatic Asylum, are intended to be included in one Contract, and therefore no Tenders can be received, unless for supplying the whole that may be required in the entire of a District, and for each District there must be a separate Tender, excepting Hartley and Blackheath, and Yass, Gunning, and Narrawa, for each of which places Tenders may be sent in separately.

Separate Tenders must also be made for the Male Orphan School, the Female Orphan School, the Institution for Destitute Roman Catholic Children, and for the Lunatic Asylum.

The Tenders for the Moreton Bay District, to specify the sum required for the supply of the following articles, daily, for Boatmen, in addition to the price of their Ration No. 7, viz:— $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tobacco.

CONDITIONS.

1. All the articles required by this Notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds.

2. The Flour and Bread must be the produce of clean sound Colonial wheat, from which, on the

Ration of Emigrants, Surveying, and Mounted Police or other parties, Superintendent and Crew of the Floating Light, Men at the Light House, Telegraphs, Boatmen, Apprentices, the Orphan Schools, and the Institution for Destitute Roman Catholic Children, 20 per cent., and on the Ration to Prisoners of the Crown, 10 per cent., has been extracted in bran and waste.

3. Beef and Mutton to be issued in such proportions as may be required for the Ration of Emigrants, and when the quantity admits of it, this, as well as the Convict Ration of Beef, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately.

4. Beef to be issued to the Male Orphan Schools on five days, and Mutton on two days of the week; and to the Female Orphan School, Beef to be issued three days and Mutton four days of the week.

5. The Maize Meal to be similar in quality to the Wheat Meal, and to be twice ground.

6. The Tobacco to be Colonial.

7. When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz:—1 lb. wheat flour or 1 lb. biscuit equal to 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ lb. of bread; 1 lb. salt Beef or 1 lb. Mutton, or 10 oz. salt Pork, equal to 1 lb. of fresh Beef.

8. These substitutions are to be made whenever required by the Officers authorised to draw the several Rations.

9. Hospital Bread is to be supplied to the Children of the Orphan Schools, and to the Institution for Destitute Roman Catholic Children when required by the Surgeon, in lieu of the ordinary Ration.

10. Vegetables to be supplied in reasonable proportions of potatoes, greens, pumpkins, onions, &c., &c.

11. In case the whole Ration of Forage be not required or delivered, each of the species to be reckoned as the portion of the Ration undermentioned:—The Maize or Barley, 4-12; the Hay, 5-12; the Bran, 2-12; and the Straw, 1-12.

12. The Supplies are to be delivered at the nearest fixed station, on the requisition of the Officer in charge; being previously to removal from the Contractor's premises, approved by a person, if any authorised for the purpose.

13. The Tenders for provisions and Forage, when required by Rations, according to the scale under their respective heads, are to express the price per Ration only.

14. The Tenders for Forage are not required to state the price of the Ration for Oxen, as when the latter is required, one-half of the allowance fixed for Horses will be drawn, and one-half the price allowed to the Contractor, whose engagement will be to provide for both Horses and Oxen.

15. In the event of a difference of opinion between the Contractor and the party receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey, composed by persons named by the Government, according to the practice of the service. But in country districts, where such a Board of Survey cannot be conveniently assembled, the party objecting will name one person as arbitrator, the Contractor or his agent another, and these two will (previously to any other proceeding on their part,) concur in naming a third as umpire, who, in the event of the arbitrators not agreeing in opinion, will be called upon for his decision, which shall be final.



16. If the board, arbitrators, or umpire shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the Contractor, failing of which, it will be procured by the Department requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

17. In the event of any unnecessary delay, or failure of the Contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise procured, and charged in like manner.

18.
