## PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES AUGUSTUS FITZ ROY, Knight Companion of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

**W**HEREAS by a certain Proclamation bearing date the thirteenth day of September, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-three, the Crown Lands adjacent to, and beyond the limits of Location, in the District of Port Phillip, were divided into four Districts, and it is deemed expedient further to subdivide the same: Now, therefore, I, the Governor aforesaid, in virtue of the authority in me vested, do hereby proclaim, that the Crown Lands adjacent to, and beyond the limits of location, in the said District of Port Phillip, have been divided into five Districts, and that the following are the boundaries of the same respectively, viz. :—

1. GIPPS LAND DISTRICT—Bounded on the south and east by the sea; on the north by a line running in a westerly direction from Cape Howe to the source of the nearest tributary of the Murray, and the Australian Alps; again on the west by the Alps and a line south to Anderson's Inlet.

2. MURRAY DISTRICT—Bounded on the south and west by the River Goulburn to its junction with the Murray; on the north and north-east by the River Murray and its tributaries; and on the south-east by the dividing Range, (Alps.)

3. WESTERN PORT DISTRICT—Bounded on the south by the Coast from Anderson's Inlet to the South Eastern limit of the County of Bourke, further by the eastern and northern boundaries of the said County to the River Werribee; on the west by the River Werribee and a north-westerly line to

Mount Cole, thence by a line to the source of the Avoca River, by the Avoca River to Lake Bael Bael, and thence by a line due north to the River Murray; on the north and north-east by the River Murray to the Goulburn River, following the course of the latter River to its source; and on the east by a line running due south to Anderson's Inlet.

4. PORTLAND BAY DISTRICT—Bounded on the west by part of the South Australian frontier; on the north by the range dividing the waters falling into the Murray from the waters falling into the Glenelg and other Rivers to the eastward of Portland Bay, extending from the head of the Glenelg to Mount Cole; on the east by part of the Western Port District and the County of Grant; and on the south by the sea coast, exclusive of the County of Normanby.

5. WIMMERA DISTRICT—Bounded on the east by a line from Mount Cole to the source of the Avoca River, thence by the Avoca River to Lake Bael Bael, thence by a line due north to the River Murray; on the north by the River Murray to the South Australian frontier; on the west by the south Australian frontier to the range dividing the waters falling into the Murray from those falling into the Glenelg and other Rivers to the eastward of Portland Bay; and on the south by that range to Mount Cole.

—On holidays—16oz. flour, 4oz. meat,  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt,  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea,  $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet,  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap. On Thursdays—12oz. flour,  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt,  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet,  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap. 5. To the Female Children—On holidays—16oz. flour, 8oz. meat,  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt,  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea,  $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar,  $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. raisins or currants,  $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. suet,  $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. soap, On Sundays and other days—12oz. flour, 8oz. meat,  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt,  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar,  $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. soap.

6. For the use of the Establishment— $1\frac{3}{4}$  pint oil,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  pint vinegar.

7. Milk and vegetables for the Children, best wheat bread, flour, tea, sugar, salt, pearl barley, rice, oatmeal, arrowroot, sago, yeast, lard, common dipped candles, soap, vinegar, straw, and firewood, as required.

For Children under seven years of age, best wheaten bread is to be substituted, if required, in the proportion of 8oz. of bread for 12oz. of flour.

The Flour and Bread must be the produce of clean sound Colonial wheat, from which, on the Ration of Emigrants, Surveying, and Mounted Police or other parties, Superintendent and Crew of the Floating Light, Men at the Light House, Telegraphs, Boatmen, Apprentices, the Orphan Schools, and the Institution for Destitute Roman Catholic Children, 20 per cent., and on the Ration to Prisoners of the Crown, 10 per cent. has been extracted in bran and waste.

3. Beef and Mutton to be issued in such proportions as may be required for the Ration to Emigrants, and when the quantity admits of it, this, as well as the Convict Ration of Beef, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately.

4. Beef to be issued to the Male Orphan School on five days, and Mutton on two days of the week; and to the Female Orphan School, Beef to be issued three days and Mutton four days of the week.

5. The Maize Meal to be similar in quality to the Wheat Meal, and to be twice ground.

6. The Tobacco to be Colonial.

WEDNESDAY, the fourth day of November, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-six.

(Dispatch of Business.)

1. THE several Rules and Orders following, are established for the Dispatch of Business in this Court, in its several Jurisdictions, during the now ensuing year:—

(Civil Terms.)

2. There shall be four Terms in the said year:— which shall commence on the first day of April, the fifth day of July, the fourth day of October, and the second day of December, respectively; and shall end respectively on the following days, that is to say; the thirtieth day of April, the thirty-first day of July, the thirtieth day of October, and the twenty-third day of December, respectively.

(Sittings for Causes.)

3. There shall be four Sittings in each year for Causes; to commence on the tenth day of March, the third day of May, the second day of August, and the tenth day of November, respectively:—at which Sittings the twenty-fifth days of March and May respectively, the nineteenth day of August, and the twenty-fifth day of November shall be the days for Special Jury Causes of twelve persons.

And the twenty-ninth day of March, the twenty-eighth day of May, the twenty-first day of August, and the twenty-ninth day of November, shall be the days for Common Juries of twelve persons.

(Sydney Gaol Delivery.)

4. There shall be five Sessions of Gaol Delivery holden at Sydney in the said year:—to commence on the third day of March, the thirty-first day of May, the twenty-third day of August, the first day of November, and the twenty-seventh day of December respectively; at any of which Sessions there shall be two distinct and separate Sittings, simultaneously, if the Judges shall think fit.

(Causes on Circuit.)

5. The days for trying Causes in the Circuit Courts, in February and September respectively,

shall be the following, that is to say:—At Berrima and Maitland the fifth day, and at Bathurst the fourth day of the Sittings, or so soon after as the presiding Judge shall direct.

(Setting down Causes.)

6. All Causes, to the extent of the number limited for each day as next mentioned, shall be set down consecutively only, as at present; unless (in any particular case) by leave of a Judge. No more than six Causes shall be set down for any day, for trial by a Jury of four persons, nor more than four Causes for trial by a Jury of twelve persons.

(Additional Causes.)

7. Provided that ten Causes, for trial by a Jury of four persons, may be set down for each of the first three days, and eight Causes for each of the three following days of the Sittings; and that four additional Causes, being Short or Undefended, (and specially entered in the list as such,) may be set down for each of those days, and for any other day, at the discretion of the Prothonotary.

(Juries of four.)

8. No cause for trial by a Jury of four persons shall be set down for trial, on or after any of the days appointed as aforesaid, for the trial of Special Jury Causes. If, on the last day of the Sittings for Causes, triable by a Jury of four, any of such Causes remain undisposed of, the same shall be proceeded with, on such day or days, after the disposal of the Special Jury Causes, as the Judge presiding on the said last day shall direct.

(Causes in Term; and Assessment Causes.)

9. No Cause shall be entered for trial or assessment, on any day in Term, other than the first Wednesday only; nor shall any Cause be so entered, of any other nature than such as may be entered for trial in Term now: and no day shall be named in any Writ of Summons, or in any notice indorsed thereon, for the assessment of Damages, other than such first Wednesday in Term, or some Wednesday or Friday of the Sittings for Causes, for trial by a Jury of four persons, before or after Term. On every such Wednesday and Friday, Causes entered for Assessment only, or as Short and Undefended Causes, may be taken (notwithstanding the trial simultaneously of other Causes) before a second Judge.

(Business in Term.)

10. On every Wednesday in Term, the Primary Judge in Equity will sit at Ten o'Clock, for common motions and matters only:—and, at Eleven o'Clock, the full Court will sit; first, in its Insolvency Jurisdiction, and then for the disposal of such business as the Judges shall have appointed, or shall then appoint, for that day. On Mondays and Thursdays, motions will have precedence over all other business. On Fridays, Demurrers, Special Cases, and Appeals (at Law) from Port Phillip, will have precedence. On Saturdays (except where Saturday shall fall on the last day of Term) there will be no Sitting. Chamber Business will be taken throughout the Term, on every Wednesday and Saturday, as at present, at Nine o'Clock. Provided that, where any of the said days shall be the first or last day of Term, the same business shall be taken thereon, only, as is now taken on the first or last day of Term; as the case may be.

*(Appeals in Equity.)*

11. Provided also, that on the third Monday in April, July, and October, and the second Monday in December, and on every following day throughout that week, (except Wednesday, but including Saturday,) if any Appeal shall so long remain for hearing, the Court will sit exclusively for the hearing of Appeals in Equity; including equally Appeals from the Primary Equity Judge, and from the Resident Judge at Port Phillip.

*(Equity Causes.)*

12. The Primary Equity Judge will sit in Equity on every Tuesday, and Thursday, during the Criminal Sittings, and also during the Civil Sittings for Causes; and at such other times, as he shall from time to time appoint for that purpose.

*(January and June Vacation.)*

13. From the first to the last day of January, both days inclusive, and from the seventh to the last day of June, both days inclusive, there will be no sitting of the Court, in any branch of its jurisdiction; and (except in cases of emergency, for the disposal of which a Judge will sit on every Wednesday,) no Summons returnable in Chambers shall be issued or made returnable;—nor shall any Pleading be filed, amended, or delivered, at Law or in Equity, or any other proceeding be taken, (unless specially directed,) in the Equitable Jurisdiction of the Court;—nor shall any time run for the return of any Writ, or for Pleading, or the filing of any Answer, or the doing of any other thing at Law or in Equity, during that period.

*(Proviso.)*

14. Provided always, that all necessary proceedings may be taken for the purposes of any Appeal; and for obtaining or dissolving any special Injunction; and the issuing of any Writ at Law or in Equity; including the execution thereof; and that nothing in the preceding Rule shall extend to prevent the issue and return of any Writ of Ne exeat Colonia, or Capias ad Respondendum.

*(Holidays.)*

15. Provided also, that the several Offices of the Court shall be open, on every day throughout the Vacation, not being a Sunday, or Holiday:—and the only Holidays, during the ensuing year, shall be the following, that is to say:—January the 1st, 2nd, 26th, and 27th; April the 2nd and 3rd; May the 24th; June the 21st and 22nd; and December the 24th and 25th.
