PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Lieutenant General Sir Maurice Charles O'Connell, Knight, Commander of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, Senior Military Officer in Command of Her Majesty's Forces within the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, Captain-General and Governor-in-chief of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS Her Majesty Queen Victoria was graciously pleased, by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, dated the fifth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-seven, to appoint His Excellency Sir George Gipps, Knight, to be Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief in and over the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies; And whereas Her said Majesty was further pleased, by the said Letters Patent, to signify Her Royal Will and Pleasure, that if, upon the Death or Absence from the said Territory and its Dependencies of the said Sir George Gipps, there should be no Person upon the place, commissioned or appointed to be Lieutenant-Governor of the same, or specially appointed to administer the Government, the Senior Military Officer in Command of Her said Majesty's Forces within the said Territory and its Dependencies, should take upon him the Administration of the Government, and should execute the said Letters Patent and the Instructions under the Royal Sign Manual therewith given, and the several Powers and Authorities therein contained, in the same manner and to all intents and purposes as either the Governor or Commander-in Chief should or might do in case of the absence of the said Sir George Gipps, or until his return, or in all cases until Her said Majesty's pleasure should be known therein;

And whereas His Excellency the said Sir George Gipps departed from the said Territory and its Dependencies on the eleventh day of July instant, and is now absent therefrom;

And whereas at a Meeting of the Executive Council held at the Government House in Sydney, this day, His Excellency Lieutenant General Sir Maurice Charles O'Connell, Knight, Commander of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, being the Senior Military Officer in Command of Her Majesty's Forces within the said Territory and its Dependencies, took the several Oaths mentioned in Her Majesty's said Letters Patent, before His Honor the Chief Justice of the said Colony, and the said Executive Council: Now, therefore, it is hereby Proclaimed, that, immediately upon the said departure of His Excellency the said Sir George Gipps, all and singular the Powers and Authorities given and granted to the said Sir George Gipps, and exercised by him as such Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief in and over the said Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, became and now are vested in His Excellency the said Lieutenant-General Sir Maurice Charles O'Connell, Senior Military Officer in Command of Her Majesty's Forces within the said Territory and its Dependencies, to be by him executed and enjoyed, during Her Majesty's Royal Pleasure: And all Officers and Ministers, Civil and Military, and all other inhabitants of the said Territory and its Dependencies, are hereby required and commanded to be obedient, aiding, and assisting to his Excellency the said Lieutenant-General Sir Maurice Charles O'Connell, accordingly.

Gaol Regulations.

HIS Excellency the Governor, directs the publication, for general information, of the following alterations in the General Rules for Gaols, dated 27th September, 1841, which have been prepared under the advice of the Executive Council, in pursuance of the provisions of the Act of the Colonial Legislature, 4 Victoria, No. 29.

AMENDMENTS of clauses I., IV., and VIII., of the Gaol Regulations, of 27th September, 1841, advised by the Executive Council, on the 6th July, 1846.

I. In all cases where the Building will allow of separate classification, the Prisoners are to be divided into four classes.

(1.) Debtors and others confined for contempt on civil process.

(2.) Prisoners committed on charges of felony or misdemeanour, or for want of sureties, and Prisoners convicted of misdemeanour including cases of contempt, other than on civil process.

(3.) Prisoners convicted of felony.

(4.) Lunatics and persons of unsound mind. IV. A convenient and suitable apartment shall be set apart and appropriated as an Infirmary for the reception of sick and diseased Prisoners, including persons of unsound mind, who are not dangerously insane; and a separate one for Females.

VIII. Prisoners confined for debt or for contempt on civil process, Prisoners committed for trial, and persons sentenced to imprisonment without being sentenced to hard labour, shall be allowed to procure for themselves, and to receive at proper hours, any food, bedding, clothing, or other necessaries, subject to a strict examination by the Keeper of the Prison, in order to prevent extravagance and improper indulgence within the said prison, or the admission of Fermented or Spirituous Liquors, or other prohibited articles, and all articles of clothing and bedding shall be examined in order that it may be ascertained that such articles are not likely to communicate infection or facilitate escape. Such of the last mentioned persons as do actually maintain themselves, at their own expense, are exempt from the labor authorized by the 9th clause of the Act 4 Vic., No. 29.
