CONDITIONS.

All the articles required by this notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds.

The flour and bread must be the produce of clean sound colonial wheat, from which on the clean soand colonial wheat, from which on the ration of emigrants, surreying parties, border police, mounted police, 20 per cent, and on the ration to prisoners of the crown 10 per cent, has been extracted in bran and waste.

Beef and mutton to be issued in such proportions as may be required for the ration to emigrants, and, when the quantity admits of it, this as well as the convict ration of beef, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters a tenately.

The tenders for forage are not required to state the price of the ration for oxen, as when the latter is required one half of the allowance fixed for herses will be drawn, and one half the price allowed to the contractor, whose engagement is to provide for both horses and oxen.

In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor, and the party receiving the sup-

In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the party receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey, according to the practice of the service. But in country districts, where a Basic of Survey according to the practice of the service. But in country districts, where a Board of Survey cannot be conveniently assembled, the party objecting will name one person as arbitrator, the contractor or his agent another, and these two will (previously to any other proceeding on their part) concur in naming a third, as umpire, who, in the event of the arbitrators not agreeing in opinion, will be called upon for his decision, which shall be final.

It the board, arbitrators, or umpire, shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it

It the board, arbitrators, or umpire, shall de-cide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing of which it will be procured by the depart-ment requiring it, and the expense charged to the contractor.

In the event of any unnecessary delay or failure of the contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise procured and charged in like manner.

In cases where the article is of a perishable unture, or from some other cause, injury would be sustained either by the parties to whom the rations are due, or to the contractor, by waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the department or officer in charge of the party or parties for whom the rations are to be received, shall have the power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality; it being distinctly understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and that the contractor will have a right to appeal to the Governor, although in the meantime, he must take back the rejected article and supply good in its atead, failing of which it will be obtained by the officer or party requiring it, and the expense charged to the contractor.

A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of any delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon the report of the officer in charge of the parties or establishment, to such mulet, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of his monthly account, as the Governor may direct. It will also be in the power of the Governor, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract.

It will be in the power of either party to limit the daration of the contract. by giving in writing a notice of three fu'l calendar months to the opposite party, and to end the contract at the expiration of that period, it being understood that such netice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the contract is made or agreed to be made.

(TRANSFER OF TICKETS.)

TT appearing to the Governor, that some misapprehension exists with respect to the meaning of the 10th clause of the Ticket of Leave Regulations of the 25th May, 1835, which directs "That all applications for the transfer of a Ticket of Leave from one District to applies or for permission to ratio trainer or a lieute of Leave from one District to another, or for permission to reside without the bounds of the District for which the Ticket is granted, must be made to the Principal Superintendent of Convicts through the Petry Sessions of the District for which the Ticket already hold is grantly as the standard and the Principal Conductor of the Principal Conductor o the Ticket already held is granthd, or through the nearest Justice as the case may be;" His Excellency desires it to be explained, that the Excellency desires it to be explained, that the object of requiring such applications to be transmitted through the Bench of the District was not (as has apparently in some cases been assumed) to enable the Magistrates to regulate the supply of labour in their Districts, but to establish a proper discipline and control over the Convicts, and to prevent such of them as may have laid themselves open to suspicion from changing their Districts, in order to evade from changing their Districts, in order to evade from changing their Districts, in order to evade a surveillance, which a knowledge of their character may have rendered necessary; whilst it was always intended that well conducted men should select for themselves any of the rural Districts where they thought they were most likely to obtain profitable employment.

When therefore applications for the transfer

most likely to obtain promiable employment. When, therefore, applications for the transfer of Tickels of Leave are received, they should be invariably forwarded to the Principal Superintendent of Convicts, for His Excelbeing a blowance or disallowance; and should the Bench see reason to object to the transfer, the grounds of their objection should be spe-

cially stated in their report.
