Post Office Contracts for 1847.

THE undermentioned tenders having been accepted for *Conveyance of Mails*, in the Port Phillip District, in the ensuing year, the same are published for general information, viz:—

From and to Melbourne, Fiery Creek, the Grange, and Portland, twice a week, by two horse mail-cart, and from and to the Grange and Mount Gambier twice a week, on horseback; the mail to run once a week by way of Ballan and Bunnenyong, to Fiery Creek, and once a week by way of Geelong to Fiery Creek. Edward B. Green, for £1,500.

From and to Fiery Creek and Port Fairy once a week, on horseback. William Rutledge, for £120.

From and to Melbourne and Mount Macedon, once a week, by two horse mail-cart. William Bayes, for £90.

The contract between Yass and Melbourne has been taken by Edward B. Green, to run twice a week, as at present: but the mails from Sydney to be delivered at the Post Office, at Melbourne, on the evenings of Monday, and Thursday. The Port Phillip share of this contract will be £1,325.

By his Excellency Sir Charles Augustus Fitz Roy, Knight Companion of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

WHEREAS the Legislative Council of New South Wales now stands prorogued to Tuesday the fifteenth day of December next ensuing, and it is expedient further to prorogue the same: Now, therefore, I, Sir Charles Augustus Fitz Roy, Knight Companion of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, in pursuance of the power and authority in me vested as Governor of the said Colony, do hereby further prorogue the said Legislative Council to Tuesday the twenty-sixth day of January next.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Wellington, this thirtieth day of November, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, and in the tenth year of Her Majesty's reign.

Conditional Pardons.

HIS Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified, that it has been decided by Her Majesty's Government to qualify, in the Pardons granted to Convicts in Australia, that condition which confined the effect of the pardon to the Australian Colonies, and to give to the convict, either Colonial or British, the power of removing to any place which he may desire, provided he should not return to the Country or Colony from which he had been transported. Conditional Pardons granted hereafter, will, therefore, be available every where save in the Country or Colony from which the parties to whom they may be issued may have been transported.

It is further notified, that this arrangement is to have a retrospective effect, and that all persons who now hold Exemptive Absolute Pardons, available every where except in Europe, or Conditional Pardons; available either in the Australian Colonies, or in New South Wales only, will have extended to them the benefit of this Regulation, provided they have not dis-

qualified themselves for receiving this indulgence by any colonial offence subsequent to the issue of their former pardons.

Those persons who are desirous of obtaining new pardons will apply, in writing, to the Principal Superintendent of Convicts, enclosing, at the same time, the pardons they now hold.

Wharfage and Tonnage Rates at the Queen's Wharf.

At twelve o'clock on Tuesday the 29th instant, the Sub-Treasurer will put up to Auction, at the sub-Treasury, Melbourne, the Lease for one year, commencing the 1st January, 1847, of the Wharfage and Tonnage Rates payable at the Queen's Wharf, Melbourne, under the provisions of the Act of the Governor and Council 10 Victoria, No. 11.

The Lessee will be entitled to the free use of the Wharf, to collect dues, for depositing goods thereon, either for shipment or discharge, as well as for all other purposes appertaining to a Wharf.

The use of the Customs' shed near the Wharf will be allowed to the lessee of the Rates when not fully occupied by the Customs Department.

The use of the Wharf will be reserved as a public thoroughfare, or of the landing or embarking passengers and other persons at the same, free of any charge whatsoever; and the steps will have to be kept free from all goods or other obstructions.

The person or persons who shall be declared to be the highest bidder, if the bidding be accepted, must immediately enter into a Bond with two sufficient Sureties, each of whom is to be present at the knocking down of the rates, and Warrant of Attorney, securing regular payment of the rent by equal monthly instalments, before the expiration of seven days after the termination of each month, containing an engagement binding him or them to a due observance of the conditions.
