LIGHT HOUSE ON CAPE OTWAY.

IS Excellency the GOVERNOR directs the publication, for general information, of the subjoined memorandum respecting the Light House which has recently been erected on Cape Otway, in Bass's Straits.

His Excellency further directs it to be notified, that at the expiration of one calendar month from the 20th day of October, 1848, the Dues towards the maintenance of the said Light House will become payable at the several Ports in New South Wales, as provided for by the Act of the Governor and Legislative Council, passed in the eleventh year

of Her Majesty's reign, intituled, "An Act to provide for the payment of Dues towards the maintenance of Light Houses at Gabo Island and Cape Otway, respectively."

THE Light House on Cape Otway, Bass's Straits, latitude 38 degrees 51 minutes south, longitude 143 degrees 29 minutes east, having been completed and lighted on the 29th August, 1848, a light is burning, and will continue from sunset until sunrise.

The reef off Cape Otway is one-half to three-quarters of a mile distant, bearing south-east to south south-west, and extends  $1\frac{1}{4}$  miles westward.

The Light House is erected on a cliff 251 feet 6 inches above highwater mark; the supporting column is 45 feet high, and the lantern 7 feet high.

From highwater mark to the centre of the light is 300 feet.

The light is a revolving catoptric of three groups of lamps, each group containing 7 lamps; the entire revolves round once in 2 minutes 39 seconds, shewing a flash of light of 3 seconds duration, and 50 seconds of darkness.

It is estimated that the light will be seen 8 leagues.

FERRY AT GEORGE'S RIVER.

THE Dues arising for the year commencing 1st November, 1848, from the Ferry at George's River, will be put up to Auction, by the Colonial

The Lessee will be required to provide a sufficient ferry boat or punt to convey at all times, passengers, horses, carriages, &c., across the River, and to keep the same in suitable repair at his own expense.

A bond (in double the amount of the rent,) with two responsible sureties, will be required for the due observance of the conditions of the lease, and the regular payment of the rent by equal monthly instalments, before the expiration of seven days after the termination of each month;—together with a Warrant of Attorney.

### FORFEITED AND VACATED RUNS.

IS Excellency the GOWERNOR directs it to be notified, that application having been made for the purchase of the Leases of the Runs of Crown Land hereunder described, which after having been occupied, have become vacant (by forfeiture or otherwise) Tenders, in the prescribed printed form, will be received at this Office, until noon of Monday, the 6th day of November next, from the previous applicants, and from any other persons desirous to enter into competition with them, for the purchase of the Lease of any one of the said Runs.

2. Every such Tender must state the term of years, (not exceeding fourteen.) for which it is proposed to take the Run; and whether in addition to the minimum rent required by Her Majesty's Order in Council, it is intended to offer any, and if any, what amount of yearly premium for the lease.

3. As the grazing capabilities of these Runs have not yet been determined, it will be necessary that each Tender contain an estimate of the number of sheep or cattle that the Run will carry.

4. Until the Runs have been regularly surveyed, and their grazing capabilities determined, the future lessees will be required to pay rent according to their own estimates, as given in the Tenders; and in the event of the rent so paid proving to have been less than that determined by valuation, they will be required to make up the difference previously to the execution of the leases.

5. It is also to be distinctly understood, that the Government reserves to itself the right of excluding from the lease of any of these Runs, any land which it may be deemed proper to reserve for any of the purposes referred to in the 9th section of chapter II of Her Majesty's Order in Council, dated 9th March, 1847.

6. A separate Tender must be made for each separate Run.

#### DISTRICT OF MANEROO.

The Run known as Cubmurra, formerly occupied by James Hughes, estimated to contain about 16,000 acres.

Situated on the west side of the north branch of the Snowy River, bounded on the south by James Creek for about 3 miles bearing generally southwest by south; on the west by a line bearing northerly to and including a plain on the bank of the said branch, about three miles from its source; and on the north and east by the aforesaid branch of the Snowy River to the junction of James' Creek.

DISTRICT OF LIVERPOOL PLAINS.

The Run known as Piul/away, formerly occupied

by Messrs. McDougall, estimated to contain about 16,000 acres.

On the south-east divided from Mr. George Curtis' Station, by a line 5 miles in extent, running north-east from a gap in the Backbay Ranges, following the course of a small creek or gully to Piallaway Creek, which it cuts, and thence extending towards a hill in the Diver Range now called the Round Hill; thence on the north-east by a line 5 miles in extent running along certain Ranges in a north-west direction parallel with and three miles distant from Piallaway Creek; thence on the north-west by a line 5 miles in extent cutting Piallaway Creek and running south-west to the Bald Ridges; thence on the south-west by a line 5 miles in extent running south-east parallel with and 2 miles distant from Piallaway Creek, to the gap in the Backbay Ranges first mentioned.

#### LACHLAN DISTRICT.

The Run known as Cocomingla, formerly occupied by William Bolter, and estimated to contain about 16,000 acres.

Bounded on the east by the Burrowa River; west by a gully running north and south about 3 miles back from the river which divides it from Evan Evans' Run; north by the Battery Range, which also divides it from Evans' Run; south by a gully running from the Burrowa River, and thence by a line west to Bolter's Gully, which divides it from Kinghorne's Station, "Cucungilliga."

#### TOLLS AND FERRIES.

A T 12 o'clock on Tuesday, the 5th day of December next, the Colonial Treasurer will put up to Auction, at the Colonial Treasury, Bentstreet, Sydney, the Leases for one year, commencing the 1st day of January, 1849, of the Tolls and Dues authorised and imposed by the Act of the Governor and Council, 2 William IV., No. 12. arising and to be collected at the undermentioned Toll Gates and Ferries, viz.:—

#### AT THE TOLL GATE.

1st.—Near Annandale Bridge, on the road from Sydney to Parramatta. Upset price £2,000.
2nd.—At Beckett's Bridge, on the road between Sydney and Parramatta, and also on the road between Parramatta and Liverpool. Upset price £400.

3rd.—At Lansdowne Bridge, on the road between Sydney and Liverpool. Upset price £535.

5th.—At Howe's Bridge, near Windsor. Upset price £220.

7th .- Over the Parramatta River, at Bedlam Point. Upset price £25.

8th.—Over the River Nepean, at Emu Plains. Upset price £400.

It being deemed expedient and necessary to raise a larger sum for the repair of the Parramatta Road than has been hitherto collected for this purpose, and the distance between the toll gates at Annandale Bridge, and Beckett's Bridge, respectively, being upwards of 12 miles, it has been determined that from and after the 1st of January, 1849, when these leases will come into effect, toll shall be demanded and payable at both of the abovementioned gates, and that payment at one of them will not, as at present, exempt from payment at the other.

#### TO BE PUT UP IN SEPARATE LOTS.

Each Lessee, with two responsible sureties, must enter into a Bond and Warrant of Attorney, securing regular payment of the Rent by equal monthly instalments, before the expiration of seven days after the termination of each month, and containing an engagement binding him to a due observance of the conditions.

The attention of intending bidders is particularly directed to the following articles of the conditions of sale, the requirements of which will be, in future, strictly enforced, viz .:-

" That the lessees shall be bound, within one " month from the commencement of their respec-"tive Leases, to put into good plight, state, and "condition, as to the repairs thereof, the Turn-"pike Gate or Ferry respectively leased to them, "and all Houses, Erections and Buildings, and as "respects the said Ferries, including also all "Punts, Boats, Chains, Ropes, and Appurte-"nances thereunto belonging, and to keep the " same in the like state of repair during the whole "term or period which the said Leases shall res-"pectively endure; and at the end or sooner de-" termination of the said term, shall surrender and " yield up the Gates, Ferries, Buildings, Vessels, "and Appurtenances, in a good plight, state, and " condition as to the repairs thereof; and if any " one or more of the said Lessees shall fail so to "do, the Lessee or Lessees so failing shall pay " along with his or their last month's Rents, such " a sum or sums as shall be requisite to effect the "repairs required, to be determined by the report " of the Colonial Architect, or any other qualified " person appointed to inspect the same under the "authority of the Governor, which sum shall be-"come and be a part of the rent agreed to be " paid for the said Toll or Ferry repectively; and

" under a warrant to be issued by the said Colo-" nial Treasurer, or the Colonial Treasurer of "the Colony for the time being."

IIIS Excellency the Governor has directed the re-publication of the notice of 11th January, 1847, with the view of again drawing the attention of parents and guardians to the importance of vaccinati

IS Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified, that a Vaccine Institution has been established in Sydney, and that Dr. Savage, the Health Officer, has been appointed to carry out the objects of the Institution.

His Excellency further directs it to be notified, that Dr. Savage will be in attendance at the Immigration Barracks, Bent-street, between the hours of 10 and 12 o'clock on every Tuesday and Saturday to Vaccinate, free of charge, such children as may be taken to him for the purpose. But as the operation itself, without any proof of its having taken effect, would be insufficient security to the public mind, His Excellency has been pleased to direct, that the sum of one shilling shall be deposited for every child vaccinated, which sum will be returned on the presentation of the child on the next vaccination day.

His Excellency very strongly recommends Parents and Guardians to avail themselves of the means thus afforded to them of taking this necessary and proper percaution with respect to all children not already vaccinated.

In order that a constant supply may be kept up throughout the Colony, the Health Officer will furnish lymph to any Medical Practitioners in the Country Districts who may apply for the same.

All communications with that Officer on the subject of Vaccination, sent through the Post Office, must be enclosed under cover to the Colonial Secretary, with the word " Vaccination " on the lower left hand corner of the envelope.

his home station, where the Aborigines domesticated under his protection, were attacked, and an Aboriginal lad was dangerously wounded by them; His Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified, hat a reward of twenty-five pounds will be paid to any free person or persons who may within six months from the present date, give such information as shall lead to the apprehension and conviction of any one of the individuals concerned in these outrages; and if such information be afforded by a Prisoner of the Crown, that application will be made to Her Majesty for the allowance to such convict, of a Conditional Pardon.

His Excellency further directs it to be notified, that a Pardon will be granted to any one of the persons concerned in these outrages, not being the actual perpetrators thereof, who will give such information as shall lead to the apprehension and conviction of any one or more of his accomplices.

FIFTY POUNDS REWARD, OR A CONDITIONAL PARDON.

THEREAS it has been represented to the Government, that on the morning of Sunday, the 11th June last, a party of Aboriginal Natives, encamped at "Umberiolli," on the Macintyre River, a station belonging to Mr. John Brown, of Singleton, was attacked by a party consisting of seven white men and an Aboriginal native, who murdered a gin named "Bootha," His Excellency the GOVERNOR directs it to be notified, that a reward of fifty pounds will be paid to any free person or persons not the actual perpetrators of this murder, who may, within six months from the present date, give such information as shall lead to the apprehension and conviction of the guilty parties; and if the person giving such information be a Prisoner of the Crown, application will be made to Her Majesty for the allowance to such Prisoner of the Crown of a Conditional Pardon.

# CONTRACTS FOR THE COLONIAL SERVICE, FOR 1849.

NOTICE is hereby given, that Tenders will be received at this Office, until 12 o'clock, Monday, the 30th October next, for furnishing for the Colonial Service, in the several Districts, the supplies undermentioned, in such quantities as may be required, during Twelve Calendar Months, commencing 1st January, 1849, upon the condtions hereafter specified.

#### PROVISIONS.

1. The Ration for Emigrants:—For Men, 24oz. wheaten bread, 16oz. fresh meat, 8oz. vegetables,  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. of salt,  $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea,  $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar,  $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap. For Women, 16oz. wheat bread, 12oz. fresh meat, 6oz. vegetables,  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt,  $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea,  $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar,  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap. Children under ten years to be allowed twothirds of the Ration of Female Adults; above that age, and under fifteen, the same as Adults.

2. The Ration for Prisoners of the Crown, and others in the employment of Colonial Departments, when authorised to receive it, with the exceptions specified in No. 3—20oz. wheat bread, 8oz. maize meal, 16oz. fresh beef, ½oz. salt, 1oz. sugar, ½oz.

3. The Ration to Officers in charge of Surveying parties, when in the field, and men composing such parties, and for Soldiers of the Mounted Police, and other Mounted parties, when required:—24oz. flour, 16oz. fresh beef, ½oz. salt, ½oz. tea, 2½oz. sugar, ½oz. tobacco, ¼oz. soap.

4. The Ration for wives of Soldiers of the

Mounted Police :- 8oz. bread, 8oz. meat.

5. The Ration for children of soldiers of Mounted Police above seven years:  $-5\frac{1}{3}$ oz. of bread,  $5\frac{1}{3}$ oz. meat—under 7 years, 4oz. of bread and 4oz. of meat.

6. To prisoners confined in Gaol:—12oz. wheat bread, 12oz. maize meal, 4oz. fresh beef, 8oz. vegetables, ½oz. salt, ½oz. soap—(Ration No. 2 is issued to Gaol attendants, and to Witnesses and others awaiting bail; and if confined in solitary cells, Ration No. 11.)

7. To children of Female Prisoners confined in Gaol:—80z. best wheat bread, 40z. fresh beef, 1 pint

milk,  $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. yellow soap.

8. Prisoners confined in Lock-up or Watchhouses:—24oz. wheat bread or 20oz. flour—(Ration No. 2 is occasionally issued at Watch-houses to Prisoners of the Crown, when travelling from one station to another, and in other cases when sanctioned by a Magistrate.)

9. Forage for Horses and Oxen.—8lbs. maize or oarley, or 10lbs. of oats, 4lbs bran, 12lbs. oat or cultivated grass hay, and 4lbs. wheat straw, for each horse daily, and half that quantity for each bullock.

- 10. For the Light-house, South Head, and Floating-light, Sydney Harbour:—Best clarified sperm oil per imperial gallon; patent wicks each.
- 11. Flour, bread, meat, tea, sugar, and tobacco, in such quantities as may be required, for deserving Mechanics and others in Colonial Establishments when authorised.
- 12. Fuel and Light:—Firewood per 100lbs.; sperm oil, common oil, per imperial gallon; mould candles, dipt candles, cotton wick per lb.

13.
