PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES AUGUSTUS FITZ ROY, Knight Companion of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the GOVERNOR and Council of New South Wales, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, "*An Act for the Regulation of Gaols, Prisons, and Houses of Correction, in the Colony of New South Wales, and its Dependencies, and for other purposes relating thereto*," it is enacted that all buildings, erections, houses, and premises, which should thereafter be erected, built, purchased, enlarged, or maintained at the public expense, as and for public Gaols, Prisons, and Houses of Correction, within the said Colony and its Dependencies, and which should by Proclamation to be from time to time published in the New South Wales *Government Gazette*, by order of the Governor, for the time being of the said Colony, be declared and notified, as such public Gaols, Prisons, or Houses of Correction, should from and after the publication of such notification be severally deemed and taken to be the public Gaol, Prison, or House of Correction of the place or district where the same was or should be situated within the said Colony or its Dependencies respectively, and should be subject to the several provisions there-

in after made, for the regulation, management, care, and discipline of the public gaols, prisons, and houses of correction belonging to the said Colony and its Dependencies, and of the prisoners confined within the same; and whereas there has been for some time in course of erection as and for a public gaol, the building called and known by the name of the New Gaol at Maitland, in the said Colony, and it is expedient that the said gaol should be and be declared to be a public gaol, prison, and house of correction for the Circuit District proclaimed and known as the "Northern Circuit District," in the said Colony: Now I, the Governor aforesaid, by virtue of the said recited Act, and of the authority and power thereby vested in me, do hereby proclaim, declare, and notify the said building at Maitland to be a public gaol, prison, and house of correction of and for the said "Northern Circuit District."

Given under my Hand and Seal, at Government House, Sydney, this twentieth day of December, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, and in the twelfth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

ADMISSION OF INSANE PERSONS INTO LUNATIC ASYLUM.

REFERRING to the notice from this Office, dated 1st January, 1844, respecting the course to be pursued by parties desirous of procuring the admission into the Lunatic Asylum of persons who are insane; His Excellency the GOVERNOR directs it to be notified, that, under the 11th section of the Act of Council, 7 Victoria, No. 14, all applications of the above description must be accompanied by the following documents, viz. :—

(1.—) A certificate in the form hereto annexed (A), signed by two legally qualified Medical Practitioners, stating that they have examined the person and found him or her to be of unsound mind, and that they consider that such person will be benefited by treatment in the Lunatic Asylum.

(2.—) An application from one or more of the relatives or guardians of the insane person, in the form annexed (B), which must be sanctioned by one of the Judges of the Supreme Court. For this purpose the application must be taken to the Prothonotary or Registrar of the Court or one of the Judges' Clerks.

2nd. In all applications of this nature the relationship in which the applicants stand to the insane persons must be distinctly stated; but in cases where the insane person has no relatives or guardians, the application may proceed from a Justice of the Peace, or from the Directors or Principal Officer of any public Charity.

3rd. The applications when sanctioned by one of the Judges, are to be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary.

4th. The charge for the maintenance in the Lunatic Asylum, of an insane person, male or female is one shilling and four-pence per diem; and, unless in the case of a pauper, the persons seeking the admission of the insane person will be required to furnish to the visiting Justice of the Lunatic Asylum, an engagement from two responsible persons for the regular payment of this sum.

5th. If the application be for the admission of the insane person as a pauper, a certificate will be required, from some respectable person, known to the Government, to the effect not only that such insane person is without funds for his or her maintenance, but that he or she is also without friends who can reasonably be expected to maintain him or her.

PUBLIC ACCOUNTS.

ALL persons having claims on the Colonial Treasury are requested to furnish their accounts through the proper channel, before the end of the year, or as soon thereafter as practicable.

The several Collectors and Officers in the receipt of public monies, will pay over to the Colonial Treasurer, on or before the 31st of December, the amount of all collections remaining in their hands respectively up to that date, so that the entire Revenue collected by each, may be credited in the Accounts of the year within which it was received.

The Heads of Departments and other Officers, who have received advances to enable them to defray expenses incurred under their superintendence, are requested to furnish to the Audit Office, as far as practicable, and with all convenient despatch, the accounts of the expenditure thereof, and on or before the last day of December, to pay into the Colonial Treasury, the unexpended balance of such advances that the adjustment of the same may appear in the accounts to 31st proximo.

They will also, as soon as practicable, after the close of the year, bring forward all accounts of expenses incurred within the same, which do not admit of being previously settled, so that if possible all the expenses incurred in the present year may be finally adjusted and liquidated within one month after its termination.

The Colonial Treasurer is requested to use his endeavours to give effect to these directions, and to report through the proper channel, for the information of His Excellency the Governor, any instance of neglect in complying therewith, on the part of the Government Officers concerned.
