CLAIMS TO LEASES OF CROWN LAND

BEYOND THE SETTLED DISTRICTS.
WIMMERA DISTRICT.

HIS Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified for the information of all persons interested, that in pursuance of Her Majesty's Order in Council, of 9th March, 1847, the under-mentioned persons have demanded Leases of the several Runs of Crown Land, particularised in connexion with their respective names.

Persons who object to any of these claims, either wholly or in part, should lodge Caveats at this Office within two months from the present date, specifying the Lands to which their objections extend, and the grounds on which their objections are based.

It is to be distinctly understood, that the government does not pledge itself to the issue of a Lease in any case until due enquiry has been made into the validity of the claim, and whether or not it may be necessary to reserve any portion of the Land claimed, for any of the public purposes contemplated in the Order in Council.

John Affleck
Name of Run—Rosebank
Estimated Area—15,000 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—500
head of cattle, or 4,000 sheep

Northern boundary line running E and W 7 miles, dividing from Mr William Affleck; southern boundary line

running E and W 4 miles, dividing from Mr Urquhart's, and 5 miles dividing from Mr Gibson; eastern boundary line running N and S 3 miles dividing from Mr William Affleck; western boundary line running N and S 5 miles, dividing from Mr W Moffat.

William Affleck, (per James Affleck)
Name of Run—Pleasant Banks
Estimated Area—42,000 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—1,200
head of cattle, or 9,000 sheep

Northern boundary line E and W 7 miles dividing from Mallee Scrub, line N N E, S S W 5 miles, dividing from Mallee Scrub, and Mr Urquhart; southern boundary line E and W 5 miles, dividing from Mr Urquhart, line E and W 7 miles, dividing from Affleck and Younger; eastern boundary line, N by E and S by W 4 miles, dividing from Mr Urquhart; western boundary line N and S 3 miles dividing from Affleck and Younger; line N and S 4 miles dividing from W Moffatt.

No. 3.

Armstrong and Thomson
Name of Run—Avon and Molly Plains
Estimated Area—150,000 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—20,000
sheep

This run is on the Avon or Molly plains, known by the native names of Minyass and Dunmungle plains, with a frontage of about 9 miles on the Richardson and Avon, commencing at Mr Shanahan's boundary.

No. 4.

Name of Run—Murrandarra
Estimated Area—80,000 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—150
head of cattle, 12,000 sheep

Boundaries to commence at a point about 2½ miles N E side of Adelaide road, and extending about 8 miles S W thence a little S of W about 13 miles to Portland road, then about 11½ miles N N E to Burnt Hut, thence N E by E about 9½ miles, thence south about 6 miles to the Adelaide road, then along road about 7 miles, thence leaving road N E about 2½ miles, thence S E about 2½ miles to point of commencement.

No. 5.

Richard Hanmer Bunbury
Name of Run—Barton
Estimated Area—38,000 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—2,000 head of cattle

The run is bounded on the west by the foot of Mount William; on the N and N E by a line marked with plough lines and marked trees, from a high rocky peak of the next mountain N of Mount William, to the nearest point of a range of low green hills; thence by similar marked lines along a well defined dividing range with a general south easterly bearing, to a lofty hill known as Wills, Bald Hill; thence in a direct line about S E to a marked gap in a range of hills known as M'Gill's dividing range. These lines are all settled, and marked lines divide the run from that in the occupation of H J Wills, Esq. The marked boundary line continues along the summit of M'Gill's dividing range to the summit of a hill known as Good Morning Bills Hill. This line separates the run from that in the occupation of Messrs M'Gill and Co. The marked boundary line then continues from the summit of Good Morning Bills Hill, to the summit of the next hill in the range to the southward, and thence across the plain by a ploughed track, separating the run from those in the occupation of Mr J. Ross and Mr Thomas Churnside, passing along the south side of a large morass to a remarkable Sugar Loaf Hill south of Mount William, and thence along the foot of that mountain to the first named peak.

Estimated grazing capabilities—30,000 sheep

Bounded on the west by the Grampians, from a marked tree in the Grampians a line bearing about N N E 8 miles or thereabouts to the Wimmera, bounded by M'Lachlan and M'Kenzie, from a marked tree north side of Wimmera, a line 2 miles N bounded by same, from thence a line about 6 miles N E bounded by Taylor and M'Pherson, from thence a line S E by E about 5 miles bounded by

Darnell, Airey, and Nichol, from thence a line about 4 miles S E bounded on the E by Mr Robinson, from thence a line 2½ miles south to Wimmera, bounded by Mrs Green, from thence a line about 7 miles south bounded on the east by Mrs Green, from thence a line about 4 miles S W by S bounded on S E by Dr Blunden, from thence a line W about 4 miles, in the south by Mr Wills, from a marked tree on a branch of Wimmera to the S E point of Mount Dryden, from thence to Grampians.

Baird and Hodgkinson
Name of Run—Lockhart
Estimated Area—56,080 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—9,000 sheep

Bounded on the north by a low wet unoccupied country, being a line bearing east 9 miles, on the east by the stations of Mr M'Kinley and Mr Jones, being a line bearing south 8 miles, on the south by a flat wet unoccupied country, being a line bearing west 9 miles, and on the west by the South Australia boundary line, being also a line bearing north 8 miles to commencing point.

No. 8.

Robert Ballantyne
Name of Run—Newlands
Estimated Area—70,400 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—200 head of cattle, 10,000 sheep

Low flat country with numerous large swamps very wet, bounded on the north by a line running east 13 miles adjacent to Mr M'Leod's run, on the east by a line running north 8 miles adjoining Mr Hope's run, on the south by a line running west one point south 13 miles adjoining Armytage and Wallace, on the west by the Adelaide boundary line running north 9 miles to the commencement of the north boundary.

Andrew Beveridge
Name of Run—Swan Hill
Estimated Area—30,720 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—1,000 head of cattle, 6,000 sheep

Bounded on the east by Curlewis and Campbell, commencing at a point about 1 mile above the junction of a branch of the Murray River and taking a belt of timber on Swan Hill, southerly about 3 miles, on the south by Mallee Scrub, on the west by G Coghill, from the Mallee Scrub to the river, about 3 miles and on the N E by the Murray River, and its branch about 17 miles upwards to the commencing point, including the island 5 miles below Swan Hill.

Estimated Area—39,568 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities — 400
head of cattle; 10,000 sheep.

From junction of the sheep wash and Salt Creek, a line S W 80o 430 chains; bounded by Thomas Hamilton, thence a line W 186 chains, bounded by A. Donaldson; thence a line N W, 40½o 556 chains, bounded by Stringy Bark; thence a line E 996 chains, bounded by C. P. Cooke, thence a line N W 16o 160 chains, bounded by C. P. Cooke; thence a line S E 36½o 360 chains, bounded by Messrs Baird & Hodgkinson; thence by a line S E 8o 102 chains, bounded by Messrs. Baird and Hodgkinson; thence by a line on Salt Creek, S W 42o 160 chains, bounded by Thomas Hamilton; thence by a line on Salt Creek, N W 86½o 131 chains, bounded by Thomas Hamilton to starting point.

Lady Baillie and Robert Hamilton (per Thomas Baillie, and R. Hamilton)
Name of Run—Polkemmet
Estimated Area—96,000 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—12,000
sheep.

Commencing on the Wimmera River, at a gum tree marked B, and bounded by a line of marked trees, bearing E N E 4½ miles; thence by a line (unmarked) bearing N to the western termination of a line passing midway between the Plain Station of Baillie and Hamilton, and Coming Station of Wilson Brothers, and at right angles to the direction they bear from each other; by this line easterly to a road from Coming Station to Naratuwah; by that road to the S easterly termination of a line passing 2½ miles from Naratuwah; and by that line to a point bearing E from a marked tree XX on the Wimmera River, and continued to a point 2½ miles W of it; thence a line S W to meet a line bearing N, commencing from a point 4 miles W of Mount Arapiles, and by that line to said point; thence a line E to Mount Arapiles, skirting the N W base of it to the Mitre Rock; from the Mitre Rock by a line bearing N E 6½ miles; thence a line E N E to the tree marked B, the point of commencement on the Wimmera River.

Estimated Area—18,000 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities — 1000
head of cattle

Bounded on the N by W Anderson, and the River Avon on the East; on the S by J. Thears and Shanahan; on the W by Taylor and M'Pherson.

Cecil Pybus Cooke

Name of Run—Pine Hill

Estimated Area—50,560 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities — 10,000
sheep.

Situation—south of the tree marked in the presence of the Commissioner of Crown Lands. Boundaries — starting point the above-mentioned tree; thence a line W to and through the first stringy bark forest, 293 chains, bounded by G. Urquhart; thence a line verging and through the stringy bark, S 408 chains, bounded by G. Urquhart; thence a line verging through stringy bark, S E 29o 540 chains, bounded by Hope Brothers; thence a line E 84 chains, bounded by Messrs. Birmingham and Reilly; thence a line N 160 chains, bounded by Messrs. Birmingham and Reilly; thence a line to old sod hut on Tea Tree Lake, N E 84o 365 chains, bounded by Messrs. Birmingham and Reilly; thence a line E to the S point of the stringy bark, 360 chains, bounded by Messrs. Birmingham and Reilly; thence a line verging the stringy bark N W 16o 600 chains, bounded by T. Hamilton; thence a line W midway between an out-station and one of Mr. G. Urquhart's, 288 chains, bounded by G. Urquhart; thence a line N W 41o 121 chains, bounded by G. Urquhart; thence a line W 192 chains, bounded by G. Urquhart to the starting point.

Curlewis and Campbell (per R Campbell and A M'Lachlan)

Name of Run—Swan Hill and Lake Boga

Estimated Area—60,000 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—1,500
head of cattle, and 10,000 sheep

Bounded on the north by the River Murray 15 miles, on the east by a line bearing south from the Murray to a point of Mallee Scrub about 10 miles, on the south by the Mallee Scrub about 20 miles, thence by a line bearing to the Murray separating it from Beveridge's, and including Swan Hill.

No. 15.

Curlewis and Campbell (per R. Campbell and A. M'Lachlan)

Name of Run—Reedy Lake, Baal Baal, Loddon and Marabout

Estimated Area—170,000 acres
Estimated Grazing Capabilities—22,000
sheep

One portion bounded on the N by the Murray; 12 miles on the E by a line bearing S from the Murray to the junction of the Loddon and Marabout rivers 2 miles and upwards; thence by the Loddon about 14 miles on the S bearing W from the Loddon (intersecting Reedy Lake) to Lake Baal Baal about 12 miles; on the W by a line bearing N from Baal

Baal to the Murray about 24 miles. The other portion bounded on the N by a line W from the Loddon to a point of Mallee Scrub about 8 miles; on the E by the Loddon about 14 miles; on the S by a line W from the Loddon to the Mallee Scrub (separating from M'Cullum's) 5 miles; on the W by the Mallee Scrub about 14 miles.

No. 16.

Curlewis and Campbell, (per R Campbell and A M'Lachlan)

Name of Run—Baal Baal and Combertook or Avoca

Estimated Area—140,000 acres

Estimated Grazing Capabilities—20,000 sheep

Bounded on the E by a line from a point of Mallee Scrub to Lake Baal Baal about 13 miles; thence by a line bearing E about $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles to the Mallee Scrub; from thence by Mallee Scrub 23 miles on the S by a line (separating it from Rutherford and Greeves) 13 miles; on the W by a line from the western extremity of the southern boundary to the Mallee Scrub 7 miles; from thence by the Mallee Scrub about 30 miles or more.

No. 17.

Cay and Kaye, (per William M. Bell)

Name of Run—Charlton (West)

Estimated Area—238,000 acres

Estimated Grazing Capabilities—18,000 sheep

Bounded on the S by a part of Cameron and Foley's run, being a ploughed line commencing at the Avoca Rivulet and running W $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles 4 chains; on the W by part of Donald and Hamilton's run and Mallee Scrub, being a line bearing NNW and running through the centre of a marsh called Charoop $17\frac{1}{4}$ miles; on the N by Wilson's run, being a line bearing E $13\frac{1}{4}$ miles 10 chains to the Avoca Rivulet; and on the E by the Avoca Rivulet and Cay and Kayes' "East Charlton Run" up the course of that rivulet to the commencing point.

No. 18.

William Coghill

Name of Run—Burra Burra

Estimated Area—16,000 acres

Estimated Grazing Capabilities—4,000 sheep

Situated on the S bank of the Murray and commencing at a marked tree opposite the lower junction of the Wakool River with the Murray; bounded thence on the N by M'Leod on a line bearing S $84^{\circ} 30'$ W 4 miles, thence on the W by a line bearing S $5^{\circ} 30'$ E $8\frac{1}{2}$ miles, thence on the S by Piangill on a line bearing N $84^{\circ} 30'$ E 2 miles 50 chains; thence by the Murray $8\frac{1}{2}$ miles to the point of commencement. Bearings by compass.

No. 19.

William Coghill

Name of Run—Piangill

Estimated Area—16,000 acres

Estimated Grazing Capabilities—4,000 sheep

Situated on the S bank of the Murray and bounded on the N by the Burra Burra run on a line bearing S $84^{\circ} 30'$ W from the Murray 2 miles 50 chains; thence on the W by a line bearing S $5^{\circ} 30'$ E $8\frac{1}{2}$ miles; thence on the S on a line bearing N $84^{\circ} 30'$ E 4 miles; thence on the E by the Murray 8 miles 47 chains to the point of commencement. Bearings by compass.

No. 20

James Allan Cameron, (per A. M'Kenzie.)

Name of Run—Decameron.

Estimated Area—102,400 acres;

Estimated Grazing Capabilities—250 head of cattle and 20,000 sheep.

Bounded on the N by a ploughed line 3 miles, on the NE by ranges which make the boundary with W J T Clarke, and on the E by the ranges which divide the waters of the Wimmera and the Avoca, on the S by a ploughed line which divides the boundary of W J T Clarke. The general features are ranges, the principal being Mount Cole: Commencing at the top of Mount Direction and bounded on the SE by a line bearing W $32^{\circ} S$ 90 chains to a creek, then by a road bearing W $5^{\circ} S$ 124 chains to a ploughed line, then by said ploughed line bearing W $30^{\circ} S$ 43 chains to the Wimmera, thence by the Wimmera SE 26 chains to Hickman's Creek, then up said creek SW 90 chains, then by line of plough furrow W $11^{\circ} S$ up the ranges following the same $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles or thereabout to the top of Bennevis.

No. 21.

James Campbell.

Name of Run—Strathfillan.

Estimated Area—106,880 acres.

Estimated Grazing Capabilities—12,000 sheep.

With M M'Grath from a marked tree on the Tarpaulin Creek about 3 miles from the Avoca, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles along the creek and a ploughed line bearing about SW, and about $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles along the top of a range bearing WSW; Foster and Stawel about $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile WSW 1 mile S and $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles SW. W Rutherford about $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile SW to a marked tree on the creek half way from where he first occupied the hut; then $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile S and by W, and 1 mile WSW. L Rostron, along a dividing range about $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles NW, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles NW and by N 1 mile, NE 6 miles, N and by W $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles N and 3 miles NE. James Orr along a dividing range about $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles ENE to a marked tree on Three Mile Creek; then 3 miles NNE and 3 miles ESE to a marked tree on the creek about $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles from the Avoca. Ellis and

Shore, about $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles S to a marked tree on the Creek; then a marked line of about 2 miles SE and by S $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles SSE; then along a range $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles SSW, 1 mile SW and 5 miles S, which terminates at the marked tree on the Tarpaulin Creek, about 3 miles from the Avoca, where Michael M'Grath's boundary commences. Watered by a creek and several tributaries, each of them being divided by thickly wooded ranges and scrub, and all the high ranges bounding with Messrs Rostron and Ellis and Shore, mostly unavailable.

W. J. T. Clarke

Name of run—Woodlands

Estimated area—184,000 acres

Estimated grazing capabilities—100 head of cattle, 29,000 sheep

Commencing at SW corner, bounded between W Magill by a line running along Mount Langerene Range to highest peak, thence by a line N 53° W $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles to a rocky spur of said range, thence N $27\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ W across a flat to Bald Hill, thence by the range for 6 miles, thence between John Sinclair by a line running N 25° E, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles across a flat, intersecting Range, again thence N $52\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ W 30 chains N 13° W 70° 50 chains, N $39\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ W 110 chains, to road, thence N $23\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ W 56 chains, to creek, thence between Michael Fallen by said creek for 19 chains, thence S $71\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ E 19 chains, N $35\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ E 52, N $1\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ E 54, N 2° W 100 chains, N 53° W 171 chains, S 70° W 137 chains, thence between Dr Blunden, N $32\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ W 168, N 69, W 84 chains, to Tucker and Boudry's road, by the road $\frac{1}{2}$ mile, thence S $67\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ W 96 chains, thence between Mrs Green N 17° E 298, to Wimmera, thence by Wimmera easterly 36 chains, thence N $12\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ E 84 chains, to creek, thence by creek, about $\frac{3}{4}$ mile thence by a line running N passing trees marked W J T C 6 miles, thence between Stewart and Rutherford by a line running in an easterly direction along top of leading range 5 miles, thence between Rostron by a line running N $58\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ E 42, S 72° E 63, 50 chains, S $48\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ E 283 chains, to ploughed furrows, thence between Cameron by a line bearing S $22\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ E running along ploughed furrow to top of leading range 293 chains, thence by leading range in south easterly direction about $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles, thence by a line S W 266 chains across flat to top of Bald Hill Range, then by said range in a south easterly direction about 5 miles, thence by same range in southerly direction 4 miles, thence across flat along ploughed furrow in the direction of S by E 5 miles, to spur of Mount Cole Range, thence along said range in south easterly direction about $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles, thence between C Campbell by a line across flat where water falls both ways,

bearing S $67\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ W about $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles to the point of starting.

No. 23.

Donald and Hamilton

Name of run—Banyinong

Estimated area—80,000 acres

Estimated grazing capabilities—9,000 sheep

Commencing at a marked tree on the river Avon, $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile from head station in a southerly direction, from thence 12 miles NE and by E till it meets Messrs Cay and Kaye's line, from thence $7\frac{1}{2}$ miles S and by E half E boundary with Messrs Cay and Kaye, from thence 2 miles due W boundary with Mr Cameron, from thence 7 miles due S boundary with Messrs Foley and Cameron, from thence 10 miles due W along a ploughed line till it reaches the river Avon boundary with Captain Harrison and Mr Sutherland, and from that $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles along the river Avon in a northerly direction till it meets the marked tree mentioned above.

No. 24.

Donalds and Hamilton

Name of run—Corack

Estimated area—100,000 acres

Estimated grazing capabilities—600 head of cattle, 7000 sheep

Commencing at a marked tree on the river Avon, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from the head station in a southerly direction, from thence 12 miles NE and by E till it meets Messrs Cay and Kaye's line, from thence $9\frac{1}{2}$ miles N by W half W along Messrs Cay and Kaye's boundary line with us, from thence $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles due west, and from thence $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles SW boundary with Mr Raleigh, from thence 6 miles S half E, and from thence $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles S and by W, from thence $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles SE to a marked tree on the river Avon, at the end of the long water hole called Banyinong, (the last mentioned lines divide Mr Macredie), and from that marked tree $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles along the river Avon in a southerly direction until it meets the marked tree mentioned at the commencement of this description.

No. 25.

Darlot and M'Lachlan

Name of run—Brighton

Estimated area—102,400 acres

Estimated grazing capabilities—800 head of cattle, 25,000 sheep

Bounded on the E by Taylor and M'Pherson's run, commencing at Mount Zero and bearing N 12 degrees W 22 miles (crossing the Wimmera at 12 miles) on the north by the run of Wilson Brothers, bearing S 71° W 7 miles, and S 73° W 1 mile 45 chains; on the west by the runs of Wilson Brothers and Splatt and Pysent bearing S 11° 30' E, to the Bungleally or Boundary Creek $14\frac{1}{2}$

miles (crossing the Wimmera River at 10 miles,) thence by the Bungleally or Boundary Creek, and on the south by the runs of Splatt & Pynsent and of P. D. Rose, being a line bearing from the said creek S 80° E 7½ miles to Mount Zero.

No. 26.

Ellis and Shore

Name of run—Avoca Forest

Estimated area—30,720 acres

Estimated grazing capabilities — 7000 sheep

Beginning at that point of Avoca River bounded with M Magrath, bearing west 3 miles, and bounded on the south by M Magrath, thence north 8 miles and bounded by M Magrath and James Campbell, thence NE 1 mile, thence NNE 1½ mile, thence NNW 1½ mile, thence NW by N 2 miles, thence north by Campbell's creek 1½ mile, and bounded on these lines by J Campbell, thence north 1 mile to junction of Campbell's creek with Avoca river, and bounded by James Orr, and on the E by the Avoca river 15 miles to the commencing point.

No. 27.

Foley and Cameron

Name of run—Coonover and Spring Bank

Estimated area—89,600 acres

Estimated grazing capabilities—14,000 sheep

Ten miles frontage to the Avoca river, N and S, running 7 miles back from the creek E and W, bounded on the North by Messrs Cay and Kaye, on the south by Mr Orr, on the east by Messrs Cooke & Orr, on the west by Messrs Donald, Horsfall, and Captain Harrison.

Bounded on the north by Messrs Cay and Kaye, running 7 miles east and west from the Avoca creek, bounded on the east by Messrs Cooke, on the west by Messrs Donald and Co, and on the south by Mr Foley

Name of run—Six Mile Creek

Estimated area—12,000 acres

Estimated grazing capabilities—50 head of cattle, 3000 sheep

(RENEWAL OF PASTURAGE LICENSES.)

HIS Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, directs it to be notified for general information, that the state of the Survey not yet admitting of the issue of Leases for Runs beyond the Settled Districts, all existing licenses for the occupation of Crown Lands so situated, will be renewed for the ensuing year, commencing on the 1st July next, on the same terms as Licenses have been granted for the now current year, subject of course, to the adjustment of the License Fee according to the quantity of Stock returned by the Commissioner as depastured on every such Run.

2. Adverting to the 5th section of chapter II. of Her Majesty's Order in Council, dated 9th March, 1847, which declares that Leases of Runs issued thereunder will be absolutely and indefeasibly forfeited if the stipulated Rent be not paid within the time therein prescribed, his Excellency the Governor desires it to be distinctly understood, that claims to Leases will, in like manner, be held to have become forfeited and void, if the licenses for the continued occupation, for the ensuing year, of the Lands for which Leases are sought, shall not have been taken out within the time fixed by the present Notice, namely, between the 1st day of July, and the 30th day of September next.

3. If, within the year commencing the 1st July next, the Government shall be in a position to grant Leases of Runs under Her Majesty's Order in Council, any Licensee under this Notice who may obtain a Lease, will receive credit in the payment of his first year's rent, for so much of the amount paid for his License as may be proportionate to the unexpired part of the term for which the license was granted.

4. The present Regulation does not, however, extend to lands which have been brought by the Order in Council within the settled class, but which have hitherto been held under Squatting Licenses for pastoral purposes. The occupants of such lands will be enabled to obtain leases for the same, on the terms prescribed in sections 22, 23, and 24 of the Notice of 29th March last.

But whenever any holder of purchased land in the immediate neighbourhood shall either put forward his claim to the number of sections which he may be entitled to rent under the pre-emptive right conferred by clause 16 of these Regulations, or shall make application for a Lease of any additional sections to be offered for sale by auction, such sections will not be relet to the previous occupant, but will be withdrawn from his holding, in order that they may be demised to the person claiming the exercise of his pre-emptive right respecting them, or be let by auction, as the case may be. In respect, however, to any sections thus taken out of the previous occupant's holding, in order that the leases of them may be offered for sale, such previous occupant will be allowed to continue to use them for pastoral purposes until the day of sale, and in the event of their not being then purchased, to renew his lease for the current year at the rate above mentioned.

23. Any lot of land within the meaning of the preceding clause, which may not have been chartered in sections in the Surveyor General's Office, will be let, until so chartered, to the present licensed occupant thereof in one block, the amount of rent being determined by the computed number of sections therein contained, according to an estimate to be submitted by the occupant, and approved by the Surveyor General, or the Surveyor in charge at Melbourne, accordingly as the lands may be situated in the Sydney or the Port Phillip District.

24. Of the class of Lands referred to in clause 22, no sections containing valuable improvements, nor any of the sections contiguous thereto, will, for the present, be open to lease under these Regulations, to any other person than the present licensed occupants thereof.

An Act to regulate the Keeping and Carriage of Gunpowder imported into that part of the Colony of New South Wales called Port Phillip.

[Assented to 15th June, 1848.]

WHEREAS it is expedient that the keeping and carriage of gunpowder imported into that part of New South Wales known as the District of Port Phillip, should be regulated by law, in order to prevent the great mischiefs which may arise from explosions occasioned by the improper exposure or carriage thereof: Be it enacted by his Excellency the Governor

of New South Wales, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, That all and every person or persons importing gunpowder into the Port of Melbourne, or other place within the said District of Port Phillip, shall land, or cause the same to be landed, between the hours of seven in the morning and five in the afternoon, and at no other time or times whatever, upon pain of forfeiting the sum of five pounds for every barrel or package of gunpowder that shall be landed otherwise than as aforesaid.

II. And be it enacted, That all and every person or persons who shall import gunpowder into the port of Melbourne, shall immediately on its arrival in harbour, report the same to the Collector or other Chief Officer of Customs for the time being, and as soon as the same shall be reported to the Collector or other Chief Officer of Customs for the time being, he shall, and he is hereby authorised to grant a permit or permits to the importer of gunpowder as aforesaid, or to the proprietor thereof, in order that the same may be deposited in one of the magazines belonging to Government; and the storekeeper thereof shall receive the same into his custody and charge, and enter in a book, to be kept by him for that purpose, the name of such importer or proprietor, together with the particulars of the packages of the gunpowder so to be deposited.

III. And be it enacted, That the master of any ship or vessel arriving in the port of Melbourne, in the District of Port Phillip, shall land at the Government magazine, in the manner required by the provisions of this Act, all gunpowder which may be on board such ship or vessel, whether as cargo or stores; and that no ship or vessel shall be allowed to enter Hobson's Bay, to the north of the black buoy off Gellibrand's Point, on the River Yarra Yarra, until all gunpowder which may be on board shall be first landed as aforesaid; and the master of every ship or vessel lying either in Hobson's Bay, to the north of the black buoy off Gellibrand's Point, or in the River Yarra Yarra, at any time after the passing of this Act, on board of which any gunpowder shall be found, shall be liable to a fine of not less than five nor more than fifty pounds for every barrel or package of such gunpowder so found; Provided that twenty-four hours from the time of anchorage shall be allowed to the master of every ship or vessel anchoring in Hobson's Bay or in the River Yarra Yarra, for the landing of such gunpowder, not exceeding twenty pounds in weight, as he may have brought as stores in such ship or vessel.

IV. And be it enacted, That all ships or vessels arriving in Hobson's Bay having gunpowder on board exceeding the quantity allowed as stores, are to hoist an Union Jack at the main mast head upon being required so to do by the Harbour Master or Pilot in charge of such ship or vessel, which Union Jack shall not be hauled down until the gunpowder on board be landed according to law, under a penalty, in each case, of ten pounds.

V. And be it enacted, That in case

any such importer or proprietor of gunpowder as aforesaid, shall at any time, whilst it shall be deposited in manner aforesaid, sell or transfer the whole or any part of the same to any other person or persons, such sale or transfer shall be immediately reported in writing to the storekeeper of the magazine, and a certificate of such sale or transfer from the original importer or proprietor shall also be produced to the said Storekeeper, in order that the same may be duly registered—and in case of failure thereof it shall be lawful for the said Storekeeper to refuse to deliver up the said gunpowder so in his charge.

VI. And be it enacted, That all boats or other conveyances used in the removal of gunpowder, shall be provided with tarpaulins, or be properly housed over, and any person who shall remove or cause to be removed any gunpowder in any boat or other conveyance not so provided with tarpaulins, or properly housed over as aforesaid, shall forfeit and pay the fine of ten pounds sterling for every such offence.

VII. And be it enacted, that no gunpowder which shall be imported into the Port of Melbourne, shall be landed from or placed in boats for shipment, on board any ship or vessel in any part of the Harbour other than at the magazine wharf; and any person who shall land or attempt to land, or who shall ship or attempt to ship any gunpowder, contrary to the provisions hereof, shall forfeit and pay the sum of five pounds for every barrel or package of gunpowder so landed or attempted to be landed, or so shipped or attempted to be shipped.

VIII. And be it enacted, That no gunpowder shall be delivered from the magazine at any time other than between the hours of seven and ten in the morning.

IX. And be it enacted; That any gunpowder which may be so permitted to be deposited in the Government Magazine as aforesaid, shall be removed between the hours aforesaid, from the ship or vessel in which the same may be imported; and when and so often as any quantity or quantities of gunpowder shall be so removed, the same shall be brought direct from such ship or vessel to the Government Magazine by and at the expense of the importer or proprietor thereof.

X. And be it enacted, That the magazine or magazines belonging to the government in the said District of Port Phillip, shall be subject to the superintendence and control of the Collector or other Chief Officer of Customs.

XI. And be it enacted, That all gunpowder so removed as aforesaid, shall be in packages or barrels closely joined or hooped, without any iron about them, and not contained in any one package or barrel more than one hundred pounds in weight; and the said packages or barrels shall be so secured that no part of the gunpowder can be scattered in the removal thereof; and in case of failure thereof, the storekeeper of the magazine for the time being; or other person who may receive the same on his behalf, shall be, and he is hereby authorised and em-

powered to remove the contents of the said packages or barrels into secure and proper packages, and to charge the expense attending the same to the importer or proprietor thereof; and the said storekeeper may refuse to deliver the gunpowder so removed into fresh packages, until the said expenses shall be first paid.

XII. And be it enacted; That all applications for the delivery of the whole or any part of the gunpowder so deposited in the government magazine as aforesaid, shall be made to the storekeeper of the magazine for the time being, who shall deliver the same accordingly to the person properly authorised to receive the same at the magazine: Provided always, that no such delivery shall be made until all storage rent and other expenses which may have been incurred of and concerning the depositing of such gunpowder as aforesaid, shall have been paid and discharged.

XIII. And be it enacted; That the storage rent for the depositing of gunpowder in the government magazine as aforesaid, and to be paid by the importer or proprietor of such gunpowder, shall be fixed at the rate contained in the Schedule marked A, and hereunto annexed.

XIV. And be it enacted, That such storage rent shall be payable at least once in every twelve months, and if it be not paid it shall be lawful for the Superintendent or Chief executive officer of said district, to cause any gunpowder for which the same shall be due to be sold by public auction, in order to defray the storage rent of same, and also of the necessary expenses incurred in repairing the packages in which it is kept, thirty days notice being first given in the Port Phillip Government Gazette, prior to every such sale: Provided always, that no powder shall be delivered out of such magazine until all rent and other expenses shall be paid; and provided that any balance remaining after the payment of such storage rent and expense of repairs shall be paid to the importer or proprietor of such gunpowder.

XV. And be it enacted; That the importer or owner of such gunpowder shall be held liable for the payment of the storage rent and all other expenses, until the transfer in the property of such powder has been duly notified and registered.

XVI. And be it enacted; That if any person who shall import any gunpowder into the said Port of Melbourne, or who shall be the proprietor of any such gunpowder, or if any other person or persons shall land, or cause to be landed or removed, any gunpowder otherwise than is provided for by this Act, any person being convicted thereof, shall forfeit the sum of five pounds for each and every barrel or package that shall be landed or removed, other than as aforesaid.

XVII. And be it enacted, That all payments made for the storage of gunpowder, and all fines and penalties imposed under and by virtue of this Act, shall be paid to her Majesty, her heirs, and succes-

sors, to and for the public uses of the said Colony, and in support of the government thereof, in such manner as may from time to time be directed by any Act of the said Governor and Legislative Council.

XVIII. And be it enacted, That no steam vessel engaged in the coasting or colonial trade of the said District, shall carry gunpowder either as stores or cargo—and the master or owner of any steam vessel on board which any gunpowder may be found, contrary to the provisions of this Act, shall forfeit and pay for every such offence any sum not exceeding fifty pounds nor less than ten pounds: Provided that nothing herein contained shall prevent, or be construed to prevent, any steam vessel bound to any port or ports beyond seas to carry any such reasonable quantity of gunpowder as may be required for the purpose of making signals.

XIX. And be it enacted, That no person or persons being a dealer or dealers in gunpowder, shall have or keep within any Town in the said District, at any one time, more than two hundred weight of gunpowder, and not being such dealer or dealers, more than one hundred weight of gunpowder in any house, store house, ware house, shop, cellar, yard, wharf, or any other building or place occupied by the same person or persons, on pain of forfeiting all the gunpowder beyond the quantity hereby allowed to be kept, and the barrels in which such gunpowder shall be, and also the sum of two shillings for every pound of gunpowder beyond such allowed quantity.

XX. And for the more easy discovery of the keeping and carriage of gunpowder contrary to the provisions hereinbefore contained: Be it enacted, that it shall be lawful for any Justice of the Peace within the said District, on demand made, and a reasonable cause assigned upon oath, by any person or persons, to issue a warrant or warrants under his hand, for searching in the day time, any house, storehouse, warehouse, shop, cellar, yard, wharf, or other building or place in which gunpowder is suspected to be kept, contrary to this Act; and that all gunpowder found upon search, to be kept contrary to this Act, and also the gunpowder barrels, shall be immediately seized by the searcher or searchers, who shall with all convenient speed after the seizure, remove the same to such proper places as they, in conformity with the restrictions of this Act, shall think fit, and may detain such gunpowder and the barrels containing the same, until it shall be adjudged on a hearing before any two or more of such Justices, whether the same shall be forfeited; and such searcher or searchers, seizer or seizers, shall not be liable to any suit for such detainer, or for any loss or damage which may happen to the said gunpowder or barrels, other than by wilful acts or neglects of them, or the persons with whom they shall trust the keeping thereof.

XXI. And be it enacted, that all penalties enacted by this Act shall be recoverable in a summary way, before two or more Justices of the Peace, within the said District of Port Phillip, on proof of

the offence on the oath or oaths of one or more credible witness or witnesses, or on the confession of the offender; and where the penalty shall be pecuniary, in case of non-payment it shall be levied by distress and sale of the offender's goods and chattels, by warrant, under the hands and seals of such Justices; and the overplus of the money raised, after deducting the penalty and the expenses of the distress and sale, shall be rendered to the owner; and for want of sufficient distress, the offender shall be sent by such Justices to the house of correction, there to be kept to hard labour for any term not exceeding three months, nor less than one month, as such Justices shall think most proper.

XXII. Provided always and be it enacted, that this Act shall not extend to the keeping of gunpowder at any storehouse or magazine belonging to Her Majesty, Her Heirs, or Successors, or to the carriage of gunpowder to or from the Queen's magazines under a special and express order of His Excellency the Governor, or Acting Governor for the time being, or the Superintendent of said District.

XXIII. And be it enacted, that this Act shall commence and take effect on the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight.
