CLAIMS TO LEASES OF CROWN LAND

BEYOND THE SETTLED DISTRICTS.

GIPPS LAND DISTRICT.

HIS Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified for the information of all persons interested, that in pursuance of Her Majesty's Order in Council, of 9th March, 1847, the under-mentioned persons have demanded Leases of the several Runs of Crown Land, particularised in connexion with their respective names.

Persons who object to any of these claims, either wholly or in part, should lodge Caveats at this Office within two months from the present date, specifying the Lands to which their objections extend, and the grounds on which their objections are based.

It is to be distinctly understood, that the government does not pledge itself to the issue of a Lease in any case until due enquiry has been made into the validity of the claim, and whether or not it may be necessary to reserve any portion of the Land claimed, for any of the public purposes contemplated in the Order in Council.

In the case of the Gipps Land District, it is possible that certain of these applications for Lease, may be found to have reference to Lands really situated within the Settled District, and these only subject to occupation under the regulations of March 29th, 1848.

No. 1.

William Bennett, now Broadribb and Bennett

Name of Run—Hasellwood
Estimated Area—16,000 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—1,000 head of cattle

Five miles frontage on the river Morewelle, bounded on the W by the river Morewelle, S by a nameless creek, on the E by ranges and the run of E. W. Hobson, and on the N by the run of T. Gorringe this run extends from its front (the river Morewelle) 5 miles back in an easterly direction.

No. 2.

Godfrey Vaughan Bentley
Name of Run—Sandy Creek
Estimated Area—20,000 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—6,000 sheep

Bounded N and E by the providence ponds ranges, and M'Lean and Gills' NW and W boundary, on the S by Mr Raymond's N boundary being a line E $\frac{1}{2}$ S by compass from M'Millan's NE corner, to below the junction of providence ponds and sandy creek; and on the W by stringy bark creek about one mile to the east of Sawpit creek. From the rugged nature of the country the lines cannot be estimated.

No. 3.

J Buchanan and Co.
Name of Run—Glencoe
Estimated Area—16,000 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—4,000 sheep

Bounded on the N by the river La Trobe, on the W by a creek known as the Tea Tree Creek, being the boundary line with Mr Bloomfield; on the S by heathy ridges, being unoccupied crown

lands; on the E by a belt of scrub dividing from Mr M'Donald's and thence by a N line to the river La Trobe.

No. 4.

Thomas Blomfield, (now G P Desailly)
Name of Run—Tangel
Estimated Area—16,000 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—300 head of cattle

Bounded on the N by the river La Trobe, on the E by a creek known as the Tea Tree Creek until it reaches a marked tree, and thence by a N and S line for 4 miles, on the S by unoccupied crown lands, and on the W by a creek known as the boggy creek.

N.B.—This run has been transferred with the sanction of the government to Mr G P Desailly, in whose name the lease will accordingly be prepared.

No. 5.

Hugh Buntine
Name of Run—Bruthen Creek
Estimated Area—8,000 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—1600 head of cattle

Bounded on the N by Bruthen creek, or a branch of the same 4 miles, on the W by a dry creek and the stations of E Buckley and H Bodman 3 miles, on the S for $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles by scrubby ranges, and on the E for 3 miles by heathy or scrubby ranges.

No. 6.

Henry Bodman
Name of Run—Tronton Valley
Estimated Area—2,000 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—500 head of cattle, or 2,000 sheep

The run consists of narrow flats running alongside of the Tarra creek, and bounded on one side by the creek running in a south westerly direction, then starting from a point on the creek and running one mile in a straight line ENE, and from that point 3 miles in a northerly direction along stringy bark ridges, and from the point to the creek in a westerly direction.

No. 7.

Edward William Bayliss
Name of Run—Merton
Estimated Area—15,360 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—640 head of cattle

The land consists of open forest and morass, bounded on the W by mountains, on the S by heath and scrub, on the N by Merriman creek, and on the E by an undulating fall adjoining the station of James Carr.

No. 8.

Patrick Coady Buckley
Name of Run—Coady Vale
Estimated Area—53,760 acres

No. 13.

John Collins
Name of Run—Saugborough
Estimated Area—13,440 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—537 head of cattle

Bounded on the E by the station of and joining Mr. James Davies station; bounded on the N by and joining the station occupied by Mr Hodinott; bounded on the W by Bruthen Creek and joining the station of Mr H Bunting; bounded on the S of Bruthen Creek, the station occupied by Mr. Charles Lucas. The run is composed of heathy plains, open forest, and patches of Tea Tree scrub.

No. 14.

James Carr
Name of Run—Donibrook
Estimated Area—3,840 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—153 head of cattle

Bounded on the N by Merriman's Creek, on the W by a Morass, about 4 miles E of Mr Bayliss' hut; on the E by the Boggy Creek, and on the S by a belt of scrub and heath. This run is covered with willow scrub, with the exception of one square mile of good open forest.

No. 15.

Edward Crooke
Name of Run—Hole-by-Plain
Estimated Area—13,440 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—640 head of cattle, or 4000 sheep

Bounded on the N by La Trobe River, and extending along it for about 7 miles, supposed direction E and W; on the S by sandy heathy ranges, and extending for about 7 miles supposed direction E and W; on the E by Mr. Bloomfield's run, and separated from this by a creek known as the third from this or Logged Boggy Creek, and by a line running thence to a marked tree on the margin of the river, extending about 3 miles supposed direction SW; on the W by Mr. Reeves run, and separated from it by a line running from the centre of a water-hole on the river bank (known as the second water-hole from this, and common to both runs) through a marked tree on the opposite side of the plain to the Heathy Ranges, supposed extent 3 miles, supposed direction SW.

No. 16.

James Dobson and Robert Morgan
Name of Run—Cherry Tree Flat
Estimated Area—6,400 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—500 head of cattle

Bounded on the E by Shallow Inlet, on the N by Bruthen Creek, and joining the station occupied by Mr James Davis; on the W by a bend of said Bruthen

Creek, and joining the boundary of the said Mr. James Davis; on the S by a junction of the said Bruthen Creek, adjoining the station of Mr. Charles Lucas. The run is composed of open forest land and patches of Tea Tree scrub.

No. 17.

John Foster (per William Montgomery)
Name of Run—The Heart
Estimated Area—29,440 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—1,500 head of cattle, or 12,000 sheep

Bounded on the N by Mr Macalister's run, from the junction of the Barney or Macalister, and Maconochie or Thomson's Rivers, bearing E 14° 30' N, 5 miles, 46 chains; thence by Cunninghame and Thomson's runs, bearing E 43° 24' S, about 9½ miles, and terminating in the River La Trobe; thence by the River La Trobe until its junction with the Barney or Macalister; thence by the Barney or Macalister to the commencing point. A large portion of this run is unavailable morass.

No. 18.

Thomas Gorringe (per Watson & Wight)
Name of Run—Mary Ville
Estimated Area—22,900 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—1,500 head of cattle

Bounded on the N by La Trobe River, S by a marked tree line; Broadribb and Bennett's northern boundary, being 4 measured miles from a creek, and given by a Commissioner E by Hobson's run, W by Morewalle River.

No. 19.

Edmund Charles Hobson
Name of Run—Traralgon
Estimated Area—28,000 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—1,600 head of cattle, or 12,000 sheep

On the N by a frontage to the River La Trobe of 7½ miles, on the West by Messrs Broadribb, Bennett and Gorringe; on the E by a line running through a water-hole at the head of the Half Moon Flat N and S to the La Trobe River and Barren Ranges; this line is the boundary betwixt this run and Mr. John Turnbull's, the side lines measure about six miles.

No. 20.

Thomas Holt, Jun. (now Loughnan Taylor and Loughnan)
Name of Run—Deighton
Estimated Area—32,000 acres
Estimated, grazing capabilities—9,500 sheep

Bounded on the N by the Commissioners' Road, separating it from Emu Vale, the station of Messrs Loughnan and Taylor; on the E by a marked tree line, running from the said road due S as far as Lake Victoria, being the W boundary of Mr A M'Leod's station; on the S by Lake Victoria, and on the W by Emu Vale Creek.

NB—This run has been transferred with the sanction of the Government to Messrs John Michael Loughnan, Frederick Taylor, and Henry Nicholas Loughnan in whose names the lease will accordingly be prepared.

No. 21.

David Jones (now Thomas Butler)
Name of Run—Deighton
Estimated Area—9,600 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—300 head of cattle

Bounded on the southward and eastward by Jones' Backwater and Lake Victoria; on the W by a NNE line from Jones' backwater to Jones' water-hole in the forest; on the N by an E line from Jones' water-hole in the forest, joining Mr M'Leods boundary at Lake Victoria; on the E by Lake Victoria.

NB—This run has been transferred with the sanction of the Government to Thomas Butler in whose name the lease will accordingly be prepared.

No. 22.

Frederick Jones
Name of Run—Lucknow
Estimated Area—48,640 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—300 head of cattle, and 10,000 sheep

On the E for 8 miles from the crossing place of the River Nicholson or Riley by that River and Jones Bay; on the S for 29 miles (including a point of land 10 miles long by 1-8th mile broad) by the River Mitchell or M'Arthur from its mouth, to where it is joined by a creek called Stoney Creek; on the W for 3 miles by the Stoney Creek from its mouth to a point 3 miles from the Mitchell, and on the N for 20 miles by a line drawn from this given point, on the Stoney Creek to the ford of the River Nicholson or Riley.

No. 23.

Charles Lucas
Name of Run—Casthead
Estimated Area—3,220 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—200 horses or 3000 sheep

Bounded on the N and W by Mr Buntin's run, Bruthen Creek on the east, and Mr Morgan S. The run is very nearly covered with native hop, stringy bark and honeysuckle, 6 miles from the 90 mile Beach, from Port Albert 16 miles.

No 24.

John Michael Loughnan, per Loughnan and Taylor
Name of Run—Emu Vale
Estimated Area—13,000 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—4000 sheep

Bounded on the N by the S boundary line of the Lindenow run, being a line running from E to W from the point of the eastern boundary of the Lindenow run 4 miles S from the Mitchell until it intersects the main road from Lindenow to the Avon; on the E by a line in continuation of the eastern boundary of Lindenow, being a line running S as far as the road from Eagle Point to Emu Creek known as the Commissioner's road;

thence along said road as far as Emu Creek; on the S by Emu Creek from the point of contact of the Commissioner's road with it as far as the big water hole at Mr John Scott's house; on the W by the E line of Mr John Scott's run, being a line bearing N by compass from the water hole aforesaid to the main road from Lindenow to the Avon; the W boundary line thence running along the last named road until it intersects the S boundary line of Lindenow.

No 25.

L. Macalister.
Name of Run—Boisdale
Estimated Area—57,600 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—3,400 head of cattle or 20,000 sheep

Bounded on the N by a river called the Avon and ranges; S by the Macalister river; E by a plough furrow across the 'big plain' from the Macalister river and a continuation of the same line nearly E and W to Lake Wellington; W by ranges.

No 26.

Angus M'Millan
Name of Run—Bushy Park
Estimated Area—16,000 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—800 head of cattle or 5000 sheep

Bounded on the N by Mount Angus range; on the W by the Avon or Dunlop river; on the E by the Stringy Bark creek (the western boundary of Sandy Creek run); on the S by a line NE by E (compass) 5 miles from the junction of the little or plain creek with the Avon or Dunlop river, being the NW boundary of Strathfieldsaye run.

No 27.

M'Lean Brothers and Gillies
Name of Run—Glenaladale
Estimated Area—20,480 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—20 head of cattle—6000 sheep

Situated on the river Macarthur or Mitchell and bounded on the E by that river and a line bearing S from the junction of a creek with that river (and marked by Commissioner Tyers about 1845, April,) as the boundary between this run and Messrs Loughnan and Taylor; on the S and W by Providence Ponds and barren heathy ranges; and on the N by a creek running E and W falling into the river, being the line with Mr Meyrick's run.

No 28.

Archibald Macleod
Name of Run—Buchan
Estimated Area—22,000 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—1500 head of cattle—2000 sheep

Bounded on the E by the Snowy river; on the W by the creek Wilkinson; on the S by the Boggy creek; and on the N by the Black Mountains. It is chiefly limestone country, bold and mountainous, with narrow valleys covered with ferns, the soil generally good although the mountains are very steep and but small portions fit for agriculture; good summer run—winter severe.

No. 29.

Archibald Macleod
Name of Run—Ensay, former name
Numla-mungie
Estimated Area—38,400 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—24 head
of cattle—14,000 sheep

Bounded on the S by a high mountain called the fainting range; on the E by the creek or river Wilkinson; on the N by a gap in the mountains leading to M'Farlane's run 'Tongeo' and Swift's creek; and on the W by barren, steep mountains. Soil chiefly decomposed granite, high and hilly and lightly timbered, with little or no ground clear, altogether plentifully watered by springs and small mountain streams, and so cold in winter that sheep do very badly, but very good during the warm months.

No. 30.

Archibald Macleod
Name of Run—Bairnsdale
Estimated Area—22,840 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—460 head
of cattle—1000 sheep

The land generally is light loam forest land, with sand belts and scrub running through and generally undulating, with a swamp of considerable extent in front near the river bank and which is occasionally flooded, a small part sufficiently dry for the purposes of agriculture.

Bounded on the W by a line running S from the river Macarthur to Lake Victoria, passing through the head of the large morass; on the E and S by Lake Victoria; on the N by the river Macarthur.

No. 31.

T and M Macalister
Name of Run—Kilmorie
Estimated area—9,600 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—500 head
of cattle, or 3,000 sheep

Bounded on the N by the Clifton ranges, on the S by a line passing through the Tanbo $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile above Mr Sparke's heifer station, and extending $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles WNW and ESE; on the E by barren stringy bark ranges, on the W by the dividing ranges between the Nicholson and Tanbo rivers.

No. 32.

Archibald M'Intosh
Name of run—Flooding Creek
Estimated area—1,280 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—150 head
of cattle

Bounded on the west by the Thomson river 2 miles, on the south by a line from the river bearing east $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile, on the north by a line from the river bearing east 1 mile, and on the east by a line meeting the points of north and south boundaries.

No. 33.

Norman R Macleod
Name of run—Numeralla or Lochend
Estimated area—16,000 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—500 head
of cattle, 2,000 sheep

Bounded on the east by the Snowy river, on the north by a black range known as the Haystack mountain, on

the west by a dense scrub running parallel to the Snowy river, on the south by the barren heathy ridges running parallel with the 90 mile beach.

No. 34.

John C Macleod
Name of run—Orbost
Estimated area—24,322 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—800 head
of cattle

Bounded on the west by the Snowy river, on the east and south by the river Broadribb, on the north by ranges about 15 miles below the Buchan river junction, large morasses and stringy bark forest.

No. 35.

James Macfarlane
Name of run—Tungeomungin
Estimated area—36,500 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—500 head
of cattle, 5,000 sheep

On the south by Nunlamungin (6 miles below the hut,) on the east by crown lands a line parallel to the Tanbo 4 miles back, on the west by crown lands being a line parallel to the Tanbo 4 miles back, on the north by an east line $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles above the hut.

No. 36.

Helen Pearson, (now Wm Pearson)
Name of run—Kilmory Park
Estimated Area—12,800 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—1,200
head of cattle

On the south by the La Trobe river, on the west by a line from the old crossing place on the La Trobe river to that part of the road from the 'old crossing' place which is two miles distant in a straight line, on the north by a line from that point on the said road to a marked tree on a morass a few hundred yards below Mr Desailey's hut, and from thence to the nearest point of the Thomson or Maconochie river, on the east by the Thomson and La Trobe rivers to their junction.

N.B.—This run has been transferred with the sanction of the government to Mr William Pearson, in whose name the lease will accordingly be prepared.

No. 37.

William Odell Raymond
Name of Run—Stratford
Estimated area—16,000 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—6,000
sheep

Bounded by a line from the water hole at the point where the road from Stratford to Bushy park crosses a creek known as little plain creek, bearing about NE for $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles thence by a line bearing about E by S to the public road leading to the Macarthur or Mitchell river; thence by a line to the bisection of a creek known as Davis' creek, by the road from Stratford to lake Wellington, and following down the said Davis' creek to its junction with the river Avon; thence following up the river Avon to its junction with the little plain creek, thence up the little plain creek to the water hole mentioned as starting point.

No. 38.

William Odell Raymond
Name of run—Strathfieldsaye
Estimated area—64,000 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—1,000
head of cattle, 18,000 sheep

Bounded on the west by the Stratford run, thence by a line running east by south to Tom's creek, thence by a marked tree line to lake Wellington, dividing it from Mr Cunningham's run, thence S and SW by lake Wellington and river Avon.

No. 39.

John Reeve, (per John King)
Name of run—Snakes' Ridge
Estimated area—60,160 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—1,200
head of cattle, 25,000 sheep

Comprises a block of land situated on the north and south side of the river La Trobe, the eastern boundary line on the north side of the river La Trobe starts from the upper crossing place of the river and runs across Barney plains course nearly north to a marked tree on the Barney river, thus dividing the Snakes ridge run from Messrs Desailly and Pearson's run; the north boundary line is the Barney river, the western boundary line starts from a marked tree on the Barney river and runs south $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles and then west till it meets a line running north from a water hole in the west corner of Snakes ridge shearing plain, thus dividing the run from Messrs M'Farlane and Oakden; on the south side of the river La Trobe, the eastern boundary line on the north side of the river La Trobe starts from the upper crossing place of that river and runs out in a direction to strike the road running across Barney plains course about north by west, then from that point to a marked tree $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile west of Captain Orr's old station on the Barney river, thus dividing the Snakes ridge run from Messrs Pearson's and Desailly's run.

John Scott
Name of run—Delvin
Estimated area—8,640 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—600 head
of cattle

Bounded on the east and north by Messrs Loughnan and Taylor, west and south by Mr Raymond, boundary line east 5 miles, west 4 miles, north 3 miles, south 3 miles, consisting of gum and stringy bark forest land, west side of run scrubby.

No 41.

James Taylor
Name of Run—Warrigal Creek
Estimated Area—15,360 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—900 head
of cattle

Bounded on the E by the "Ninety Mile Beach"; on the W by the main road; on the N by Josh. Varney's run "Warrigal Creek"; on the S by Edmond Buckley's run "Gammon Creek,"

No 42.

Robert Thomson (per R. Cunningshame.)
Name of Run—Clydebank

Estimated Area—13,440 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—1000 head
of cattle or 4000 sheep

One half of the run called "Clyde bank" bounded as follows: on the NW by a line bearing $255^{\circ} 30'$ commencing at the SE bend of the river Dunlop at a small creek and terminating at the northern angle of Mr. Foster's run $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles; on the N by the river Dunlop or Avon; on the SW by a line bearing $133^{\circ} 24'$ commencing at the N angle of Mr. Foster's run and terminating in the river La Trobe; on the SE by the river La Trobe; and on the E by Lake Wellington.

No 43.

John F. Turnbull.
Name of Run—River Tyers
Estimated Area—16,000 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—640 head
of cattle

On the S by the river La Trobe; on the E by a deep creek, being the boundary between Mr. Reeve's station Scame and this; on the N by heathy ranges; on the W by scrubby ranges 4 miles from river Tyers.

No 44.

John F. Turnbull
Name of Run—Loy Yang
Estimated Area—16,000 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—6000
sheep

On the N by the river La Trobe; on the E by Mr. Reeve's station, by a line bearing S from the river La Trobe to a marked tree at mouth of 'dry creek,' from thence continued S to Flin's creek, and thence by creek to heathy ranges; on the S by heathy ranges; on the W by Hobson's station, by a line bearing S from the river La Trobe to marked tree at W end of Half Moon Flat, and from thence by a line continued round W end of Half Moon Flat to first junction from mouth of chain of ponds running into Half Moon Flat, and from thence by a line bearing S to heathy ranges.

No 45.

Joseph Varney
Name of Run—Warrigal Creek
Estimated Area—20 square miles
Estimated grazing capabilities—500 head
of cattle

Bounded by James Taylor's run, by Mr. P. Buckley, Mr. Hodinott, and the main road.

No 46.

William Walker (now James M'Farlane)
Name of Run—Hayfield
Estimated Area—60,800 acres
Estimated grazing capabilities—500 head
of cattle and 10,000 sheep

FIRST PART.

On the S by a line 6 miles distant from the Thomson river running parallel with it; on the E by Mr. Reeve's boundary, a southerly line from a marked tree cutting the forest at the E point; on the W by the foot of the Mount Baba range and Mr Okeden's run.

SECOND PART.

On the N by the Bald Hills; on the E by the Macalister river as far as Mr.

M'Alister's boundary, being a rocky point on the river, and a line from thence to a morass on the Thomson river; on the W by a parallel line to the M'Alister river, one mile distant from it; on the S by the first point.

Estimated grazing capabilities—700 head of cattle

On the north by the dividing Range; on the east by the dividing Range; on the south and west by Tongiomungee.

CROWN LANDS BEYOND THE SETTLED DISTRICTS.

(LIMITING THE TIME OF APPLYING FOR LEASES.)

HIS Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to direct the publication of the following Regulation limiting the time with which certain claims to leases of runs beyond the Settled Districts, will be entertained by His Excellency.

BY the 11th section of chapter II, of Her Majesty's Order in Council, of the 9th March, 1847, it is provided, "That all occupants of Crown Lands, who shall have been in licensed occupation of the same for at least one year, at the time when this Order shall come into effect, are to be entitled to demand leases of their respective runs under the present Regulations, within six months from the date of the publication of this Order in Council by the Governor but not afterwards."

The said Order in Council having been published and brought into effect in the Colony on the 7th October, 1847, the period allowed for preferring claims to leases expired on the 6th April last, as respects those persons, who on the 7th October last, had been in licensed occupation of their runs for one year or more. All such persons, therefore, who failed to demand leases on or before the 6th April last, have lost the right of so doing conferred by the Order in Council. As a matter of grace, however, the Governor has not up to the present time, refused to entertain applications for leases on the ground of their having been sent in subsequently to the expiration of the time prescribed by the Order in Council, nor will His Excellency do so as respects any further applications which may be received before the 30th September next, when the time allowed for taking out Licenses for the current year will expire. But after that date the Governor will not under any circumstances whatever, entertain a demand for a lease of a run from any person whose licensed occupancy of the run had, on the 7th October, 1847, been of not less than one year's duration;

It will of course be understood that this notice does not apply to parties, who having failed to take out their Licenses for the past year, are not entitled to

demand Leases under the provisions of Her Majesty's Order in Council above referred to.
