ROADS AND PUBLIC WORKS BEYOND THE SETTLED DISTRICTS.

THE sum of one thousand five hundred pounds having been provided by the Legislative Council "for Roads and Public Works beyond the Settled Districts," of the Sydney or Middle District of the Colony, during the year 1849, His Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified, that applications for the repair, &c, of such Roads and Works, so far as provided for by the above amount, should on or before the 1st of February next, be submitted for the consideration of the Government, through the Magistrates of the District, willing to superintend the execution of the work, with the assistance of other gentlemen in the neighbourhood.

NOTICE.

The system of recording all Transfers of Goods in Bond, as introduced in the year 1846, having been found to work extremely ill, the Honorable the Board of Customs have authorized its being altered, with the sanction of His Excellency the Governor; and notice is therefore hereby given, that in future no transfer of such goods will be recorded in the Transfer Book, except in cases where the goods sold are the property of the occupier of a Bonding Warehouse, as provided for in the 9th section of the Imperial Act of Parliament, 8 and 9 Victoria, chap. 91; and that no goods will in future be delivered from the warehouse, except upon the order of the person whose name is endorsed on the back of the bonding certificate, which will render it necessary that every time a sale of goods in bond takes place, the seller shall endorse on the back of the bonding certificate that the goods are sold to the person to whom the certificate is transferred.

In all cases the purchaser of goods under bond is authorised, by the 6th section of the 9th Victoria, No. 15, to give security by bond, that no part of such goods shall be taken out of the warehouse until duty entered for home consumption or exportation, thereby shewing that he is the owner of those goods, a course however, which has never been adopted in this colony, even when the transfer system was not in force.

WHEREAS by an Act intituled "An Act to alter and amend the Laws relating to the Savings' Banks of New South Wales and Port Phillip, respect-

ively" it is enacted, that after the passing of the said Act, no deposit shall be received in the Savings' Banks under any order of the Supreme Court of the said Colony, or of the District of Port Phillip; or of any Judge thereof.

It is therefore ordered, that the Deputy Registrar, shall in future do all such things and make all such payments, as are required of him by the present Rules of Court, with regard to the effects of deceased persons, but that all matters, and payments, are directed to be made to, and transacted with the Savings' Bank of Port Phillip, be paid into, and transacted with, either the Union Bank of Australia or the Bank of Australasia Melbourne, and all matters, motions, petitions, and applications which are now by any Rule, or Rules of Court, ordered to be done, made, or presented, in respect of any payments to or transactions with the said Savings' Bank, shall be made, done, and presented, in like manner in reference to the said Bank of Australia, or Union Bank of Australasia, or one of them, as if the said last mentioned Banks, or one of them had been respectively named in the said Rule or Rules.

OCCUPATION OF CROWN LANDS
WITHIN THE SETTLED DISTRICTS.

WITH reference to the regulations published on the 29th March last, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed it to be notified, that any person now in actual licensed occupation of Crown Lands within the Settled Districts, who before the 31st December next, may make application to purchase any portion not less than 30 acres thereof, will be permitted to occupy on the same terms and on the same rent as at present, the section of which the land applied for, forms part, until such portion of land shall have been measured and offered for sale, and an opportunity shall have thus been afforded to him of acquiring the fee simple.

Sections of land of which any portion may be required for sale under the terms of this notice, will not be let under the pre-emptive right conferred by clause 16 of the Regulations of the 29th March last; nor will they be again obtainable on lease, even though no part of them be actually sold. In all such cases those portions of sections which may have been put up for sale and not bid for, or on which the deposit shall have been forfeited, will be kept open to selection for purchase without competition, under the provisions of the Land Sales Act, 5 and 6 Vic., cap. 36, and the regulations, thereon founded, of the 1st March 1843. The remaining portions of the sections will be reserved, until required for sale, for the use of the adjoining holders of Land in fee simple, as a Common.

NAVIGATION OF PORT ALBERT.

WITH special reference to Captain Stoke's directions, given in a note page 427, vol. 2, of his "Discoveries in Australia," it is considered expedient that the following observations, made by C. J. Tyers, Esq., Commissioner of Crown Lands at Gipps Land, should be published for the information of Mariners.

The channel into Port Albert is available only for boats of about (15) fifteen tons and under.

In March 1846, while passing through it in the "Lucy" of about (17) seventeen tons, I grounded several times; and about half-way between Corner Inlet and Port Albert, found that a shoal had been formed across the channel, apparently by the meeting of the flood tide from Corner Inlet with that from Port Albert.

The only approach to the shipping place at Port Albert for vessels of any burthen (not above 200 tons) is by the Clonmel Channel or Shallow Inlet, of Stokes—and although there is not more than between two or three fathoms on the bar at low water, it is, I believe considered safe by Captain Bentley and many others, who have traded hither from Van Diemen's Land for several years past.

Proper precautions being taken, or the services of one of the Port Pilots being put into requisition, and would be rendered much more so by the aid of a few beacons and buoys.
