PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES AUGUSTUS FITZ ROT, Knight Companion of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

N pursuance of the authority in me vested by a certain Act of the Imperial Parliament of Great Britain and Ireland, passed in the fifth and sixth year of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for regulating the sale of Waste Land "belonging to the Crown in the Australian Colonies," I do hereby notify and proclaim, that at Eleven o'clock of Friday, the 23rd day of November next, the following portions of Land will be offered for Sale by Public Auction, at the old Military Barracks, George-street, Sydney, at the upset price affixed to each lot respectively, on the terms and conditions, and under the provisions of the above recited Act.
