PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES AUGUSTUS FITZ ROY, Knight Companion of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of New South Wales, passed in the sixth year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, "*An Act to consolidate and amend the laws relating to Courts of Requests, and to extend the Jurisdiction of such Courts in the County of Cumberland,*" it was amongst other things enacted, That from and after the first day of January, 1843, Courts of Requests should be holden in and for such Counties and Districts, or other portions of this Colony and its Dependencies, and at such places respectively, as the Governor should by Proclamation for that purpose from time to time appoint: And whereas by another Act passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her said Majesty, intituled, "*An Act to amend the laws relating to Courts of Requests in the City of Sydney and County of Cumberland, and in the Town of Melbourne and County of Bourke*" respectively, it was enacted, that all Courts of Requests, established or to be established, within the City of Sydney and County of Cumberland, and in the Town of Melbourne and County of Bourke, should respectively have power and authority to hear and determine, in a summary way, all actions whatsoever for the recovery of any debt, demand, or damage, whether liquidated or unliquidated, to an amount not exceeding thirty pounds: Now I, the said Governor, in pursuance of the power and authority so vested in me by the

said first recited Act, do hereby direct and appoint that Courts of Requests in and for the City of Sydney and County of Cumberland, shall be holden during the year 1851, at the times and places, and for the Districts hereafter respectively mentioned, that is to say:—The "Ordinary Sittings" of the Court of Requests, for the trial of all cases not exceeding ~~ten~~ pounds, for the City of Sydney and for the Police District thereof, as described in a certain notice from the Colonial Secretary's Office, bearing date 17th January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and published in the *New South Wales Government Gazette*, shall commence and be holden on the following days, and shall respectively be continued by adjournment from day to day, as may be found necessary, viz.:—Monday, 6th January; Monday, 3rd February; Monday, 3rd March; Monday, 7th April; Monday, 5th May; Monday, 2nd June; Monday, 7th July; Monday, 4th August; Monday, 1st September; Monday, 6th October; Monday, 3rd November; and Monday, 1st December respectively.

The New Sittings of the said Court for the trial of all cases from ten to thirty pounds for the said City and Police District thereof as aforesaid, shall commence and be holden on the following days, and shall respectively be continued by adjournment from day to day as may be found necessary, viz.:—Monday, 13th January; Monday, 10th February; Monday, 10th March; Monday, 14th April; Monday, 12th May; Monday, 9th June; Monday, 14th July; Monday, 11th August; Monday, 8th September; Monday, 13th October; Monday, 10th November; and Monday, 8th December respectively.

The Ordinary Sittings of the said Courts for the other districts in the County of Cumberland, will commence on the undermentioned dates; and the

New Sittings of the Courts for these Districts respectively, shall commence after the termination of the "Ordinary Sittings," and shall respectively be continued by adjournment from day to day as may be found necessary, that is to say:—

At the Town of Campbelltown and for such portions of the Police District thereof as are situated in the County of Cumberland, and for such portions of the Police Districts of Camden and Narellan as are situated in the County of Cumberland, as described in the aforesaid Notice; on Monday, 20th January; Monday, 21st April; Monday, 21st July; and Monday, 20th October respectively.

At the Town of Liverpool for such portion of the Police District of Parramatta, as was formerly included and known as the Police District of Liverpool, and more particularly described in a certain Notice from the Colonial Secretary's Office, bearing date the 15th day of September, one thousand eight hundred and forty-one; on Wednesday, 22nd January; Wednesday, 23rd April; Wednesday, 23rd July; and Wednesday, 22nd October respectively.

At the Town of Parramatta, and for the Police District thereof, as described in the aforesaid Notice, dated 17th January, 1850, with the exception of that portion of the District by this Proclamation allotted to Liverpool; Thursday, 23rd January; Thursday, 24th April; Thursday, 24th July; and Thursday, 23rd October respectively.

At the Town of Windsor, and for such portions of the Police District thereof, as are situated in the County of Cumberland as described in the aforesaid Notice; Monday, 27th January; Monday, 28th April; Monday, 28th July; and Monday, 27th October respectively.

At the Town of Penrith, and for such portions of the Police District thereof, as are situated in the County of Cumberland, as described in the aforesaid Notice; on Thursday, 30th January; Thursday, 1st May; Thursday, 31st July; and Thursday, 30th October respectively.

PUBLIC ACCOUNTS.

ALL persons having claims on the Colonial Treasury are requested to furnish their accounts through the proper channel, before the end of the year, or as soon thereafter as practicable.

2. The several Collectors and Officers in the receipt of Public Monies will pay over to the Colonial Treasurer, on or before the 31st of December, the amount of all collections remaining in their hands respectively up to that date, so that the entire Revenue collected by each may be credited in the accounts of the year within which it was received.

3. The Heads of Departments and other Officers who have received advances to enable them to defray expenses incurred under their superintendence, are requested to furnish to the Audit Office, as far as practicable and with all convenient despatch, the accounts of the expenditure thereof, and on or before the last day of December to pay into the Colonial Treasury the unexpended balance of such advances, that the adjustment of the same may appear in the accounts to the 31st proximo.

4. They will also, as soon as practicable after the close of the year, bring forward all accounts of expenses incurred within the same which do not admit of being previously settled, so that if possible, all the expenses incurred in the present year may be finally adjusted and liquidated within one month after its termination.

5. The Colonial Treasurer is requested to use his endeavours to give effect to these directions, and to report through the proper channel, for the information of His Excellency the Governor, any instance of neglect in complying therewith on the part of the Government Officers concerned.

NOTICE is hereby given, that Tenders will be received at this Office, until 12 o'clock, of *Monday, the 18th November next*, for furnishing, for the Colonial Service, in the several Districts, the supplies undermentioned, in such quantities as may be required, during Twelve Calendar Months, commencing 1st January, 1851, upon the conditions hereafter specified.

PROVISIONS, AND OTHER ARTICLES.

When required, 8oz. wheat bread may be substituted in lieu of vegetables, and 8oz. of oatmeal in lieu of meat.

One half of the above quantities to Children of Immigrants, under 14 years of age.

2. The Ration to Prisoners on Cockatoo Island, to Wardsmen in Gaol, to Prisoners detained as Witnesses or for want of bail, and to Others in the employment of Colonial Departments, when authorised to receive it:—

20 oz. wheat bread
8 oz. maize meal
16 oz. fresh meat
 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt
1 oz. sugar
 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap

this Ration is occasionally issued at Watchhouses to Prisoners of the Crown, when travelling from one station to another, and in other cases when sanctioned by a Magistrate.
