EXPLORATORY EXPEDITION.

IS Excellency the GOVERNOR is pleased to direct the publication of the following Despatch, from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies, relative to the exploratory expedition undertaken by the late Mr. Assistant Surveyor Kennedy.

I have to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch No. 55, of the 25th of April last, with the papers which accompanied it, containing an account of the Exploratory Expedition undertaken by Mr. Assistant Surveyor Kennedy, and of the investigation which had taken place into the circumstances connected with the death of that gentleman and others of his party.

I have read the melancholy narrative contained in these documents with much regret, and it has given me deep concern to observe the loss of life which has resulted from the undertaking. I avail myself, however, of the earliest opportunity of expressing to you the sense which I entertain of the courage and enterprize shewn by every individual belonging to the party by whom, notwithstanding so calamitous an issue, much appears to have been achieved; and I especially appreciate the intrepid zeal and energy by which their leader would seem to have been distinguished.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

The Pilot Station for the River Hooghly, in the South-West Monsoon.

Directions for approaching the Pilot Station for the River Hooghly during the S.W. Monsoon. East India-House,

London, the 10th October, 1849.

Experience of the new pilot station off the South Channel having established that it can be made by vessels from False Point with the greatest facility, and that pilots can also be readily supplied, and the same causes existing which originally rendered necessary the removal of the pilot station from off Point Palmyras to a position about fifteen miles S.W. by W. of the Outer Floating Light in lat. 20° 56' N. long. 88° 93' E., and in from 17 to 22 fathoms water, notice is hereby given, that this latter station will in future be continued during the S.W. monsoon, viz. from the False Point to the present station, if common attention be paid to the lead and to the following directions, prepared by Captain Lloyd, late Officiating Marine Surveyor General, after a careful survey of the ground between the two points :-

"False Point Light-house is in lat. 20° 1913 N. and long. 86° 47' E., and the South Channel Buoy in lat. 20° 59' N. and long. 88° 4' E., and bears from the Light-house N. 61° E., true, or N.E. by E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. by compass, distant 83 miles, and is laid

in 12 fathoms.

" A bank of soundings extends from off Point Palmyras, in a direction towards the tail of the Western Sea Reef, and the nature of the bottom (as distinguished from that of the Hooghly deposit, which is sand and mud, with shining specks,) is a gravelly substance composed of sand, shells, and small pebbles, discharged from the Kunka and other rivers near Point Palmyras, the lighter material of which, being carried farther out, is deposited, and forms what is called the Pilot's Ridge, which, in crossing to the N. W., shows a little less water than on either side. In coming from seaward, you shoal rather suddenly from 28 to 23 fathoms upon its eastern edge. It is composed of a shelly sand, or minute gravel, of a reddish or rusty brown color.

"The best guide, therefore, to enable a vessel to direct her course from False Point to the pilot vessels at the present station, will be to run down the edge of the Pilot's Ridge, which can readily be done by making the Light-house, and bringing it to bear about W.S.W. or S.W. by W., distant, by computation, from 10 to 15 miles, then steering to the E.N.E., and having gradually increased the depth of water to 23 fathoms upon the eastern edge of the ridge, regulate the course to keep between it and 27 fathoms, when, by attention to the lead and nature of the soundings, course, and distance run from the Light-house, it is almost impossible to miss the pilot vessels (if the above limits are kept within,) either by getting too far to windward or falling to leeward, for the soundings increase so rapidly to seaward from the present station, that 28 fathoms will not be more than three or four miles to the southward of it, and 23 fathoms the same distance to the westward of it.

"The soundings to seaward of the ridge are in general a greenish or olive-colored mud, with occasionally a few bits of broken shells mixed with

Vessels approaching the station during the day are required to show the usual signal for a pilot, and by night to give as early and as much warning as possible by firing guns, burning blue lights, and by exhibiting two lights in a vertical position, where best seen; but commanders are strictly enjoined to avoid as much as possible making the station during

Ships have been lost from running for the station in dark, or threatening, or actually bad weather. In such weather, the pilot vessels cannot be made out, and, if fallen in with, cannot board the inward bound vessel, nor could the pilot take her in, if he

No difficulty can possibly be felt in passing from | was on board. No advantage, then, is gained by attempting to get a pilot in such weather, while the danger is imminent. It is strongly recommended, therefore, to commanders, under such circumstances, to put their ships under snug canvas, while well out in deep water, and keep to sea.

> To mark the station, one of the pilot vessels will show, during the day, a large St. George's Jack (white with red cross) at the main top gallant mast head, and a good mast head light during the night, and will burn a blue light and a maroon alternately every half hour, and fire a gun at eight P.M., at midnight, and at four A.M. Vessels approaching the station, and while there, as well as when approaching the * light and buoy station vessels, are warned to be careful in avoiding collision by night or by day; and in communicating with either of the above vessels, either at anchor or hove to, when it is necessary to cross her, to pass under the stern; several instances of serious damage having occurred during the S.W. monsoon, whereby the outer floating light was more than once compelled to leave her station for repairs, to the great inconvenience and risk of vessels entering and quitting the river.

RULES FOR THE ADMISSION OF BARRISTERS.

New South Wales,) To wit.

Tuesday, the 29th day of January, 1850.

HEREAS by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of New South Wales, passed in the eleventh year of the reign of our Lady the Queen, intituled, "An Act to regulate " the admission, in certain cases, of Barristers of " the Supreme Court of New South Wales," after reciting that it was expedient to make provisiou in certain cases for the admission of properly qualified persons to practise as Barristers of the Supreme Court of New South Wales, it is enacted, That the Judges of the Supreme Court at Sydney, the Attorney General for the time being, and two Barristers of the Supreme Court, to be annually elected in the month of December for the year then onsuing, by the practising Barristers of the said Court, should form a Board for the approval of properly qualified persons to be Barristers of the Supreme Court of New South Wales; and that the said Board should from time to time, as might appear to them to be expedient, make and promulgate rules for the examination of candidates in the Ancient Classics, both Greek and Latin, in Mathematics, in Law, and in such other branches of knowledge as they should deem meet; and that the said Board might from time to time depute the examination of such candidates to such persons as they should consider competent to examine such candidates, subject to the payment of such reasonable fees to the Examiners respectively as the said Board should order to be paid by such candidates: Provided, that no candidate, however qualified in other respects, should be admitted to be a Barrister of the said Supreme Court unless the said Board shall be satisfied that he is a person of good fame and character. We, the Judges and Attorney General aforesaid, with William Montagu Manning, Esquire, and John Bayley Darvall, Esquire, being the Barristers elected according to the said Act in the month of December last, do, in pursuance of the said Act, make and promulgate the following Rules for the examination of candidates applying to be admitted as Barristors of the said Supreme Court from and after this date, but without prejudice to the right of the Board to make and promulgate any other Rule or Rules at any time or times either during the present or any future year.

1. Every candidate shall give written notice to the Board (through the Attorney General), ten clear days at the least before the first day of some Term, of his intention to apply to be admitted a Barrister; and shall at the same time transmit to the Board written testimonials, from two or more persons resident in Sydney, to the effect that they have been well acquainted with the candidate for twelve months and upwards, and that he is a

Chambers, at four o'clock in the Afternoon of the first Wednesday in the Term, to consider the application of any such candidate: Provided that such meeting may be adjourned from time to time as may be found necessary.

3. Where the Board shall be satisfied as to the character of the applicant, he shall be admitted to examination in the classics and in mathematics and history; which examination shall be conducted by two Examiners, to be appointed by the Board

for that purpose.

4. The Examiners so appointed shall meet in Sydney, for the examination of the candidate, on the second Wednesday in the Term, (or on the Wednesday next after signification to them that the candidate is to be admitted to such examination,) at such place and hour as they shall appoint; of which appointment they shall give two clear days notice to the Prothonotary; and they shall have power to adjourn from time to time as may be necessary.

5. Unless the said Examiners shall report specially to the Board that the candidate's examination before them was unsatisfactory, he shall, on the third Wednesday in the Term, (or on the Wednesday next after signification to the Master, that the candidate is to be admitted to examination in law,) be admitted to examination in law; which shall be conducted by the Master and one practising Barrister, to be appointed by the Board for that purpose, at such place and hour as they shall appoint: Provided that the said Master and Barrister shall have power to adjourn from time to time as may be necessary.

6. The examinations shall severally be by questions in writing to be given to the candidate, and answered by him in writing, in the presence of the examiners so appointed, or of one of them; or (in law) in the presence of the said Master and Barrister, or of one of them; and not more than two hours shall be allowed to the candidate for answering one examination paper.

7. The answers to each paper shall be signed by the candidate; and be forwarded by the Examiners respectively, as soon as conveniently may be, under seal, together with the examination questions, and their Reports, respectively, as to the sufficiency of such answers, under each head of examination, to the Chief Justice, for consideration by the Board :-- And the Examiners shall distinctly and in terms report to the Board, as to each head of examination, whether the candidate's examination therein has or has not been satisfactory.

8. The Board shall meet on such day next after the Term, as the Judges shall on the last day of Term have appointed for that purpose, to determine as to the admission of the candidate; and it shall then, or on some day of adjournment, consider the Reports of the Examiners, and the candidate's Examination papers (or such of them as the Board may think it proper to examine) and decido on his admission or rejection; or direct that a new and additional examination shall be the Poundkeepers must apply for the same. had at some future day.

9. So soon as the admission of any canditate shall be approved of, it shall be notified to him through Sydney, 28th February, 1850.

There shall also be five examination papers in Law, comprising not less than 12 nor more than 18 questions each, on the several subjects and matters specified in the said General Rule of the 4th April, 1849:—except that, in Archbold's Practice the following shall be substituted: i.e. Part 1 of Vol. I (by Chitty last edition,) excepting chapters 1, 2, 3, 10, 11, 12, 13, 16, 24, 25, and 26 .- Parts 1 and 3 of Vol. II; and part 4 of that volume, excepting chapters 1 to 7 inclusive :-Also part 5, chapters 8, 16, 22, 23, 26, 28, and

12. Each of the Examiners in Classics and Mathematics shall be paid by each candidate a fee of Ten Guineas for his examination and the Report thereon—such fees to be paid into the hands of the Prothonotary for the Examiners on or before the first day of the term in which such

examination is to take place.
