by that road southerly to Spring Creek at Pearce's Inn; by Spring Creek to its junction with the Merri River; by the Merri River to the Reedy Swamp immediately below the Merri Point; thence by a line south to the sea; and on the south by the sea to the commencing point; and I do hereby further proclaim and declare that such Road District shall be called and known as the "Belfast Road District."

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the Colony of Victoria, made and passed in the sixteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, "*An Act to make provision for the better controul and disposal of Offenders*," it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor of the said Colony to proclaim any Hulk or Floating Prison to be used as a Public Prison for the reception of all Prisoners convicted and sentenced for any Offence by any Court of the said Colony, and to define the limits and boundaries in and around such Hulk, within which no person shall come, and the place of embarking and landing Prisoners to and from such Hulk; And whereas it is expedient that the Hulk now called or known as the *Success*, should be and be declared to be a Public Prison, and that the boundaries around the same, and the place of embarking and landing Prisoners to and from such Hulk, should be defined; Now therefore I, the Lieutenant Governor aforesaid, by virtue of the said in part recited Act, and in furtherance of the power and authority thereby in me vested, and of all other powers enabling me in this behalf, do hereby proclaim that the Hulk *Success*, now moored to the northward of the Light-house, Gellibrand's Point, in the said Colony of Victoria, shall be used as a Public Prison for the reception and safe custody of Prisoners; and that the limits and boundaries in and around such Hulk within which no person shall come, are defined by four Buoys moored within one hundred yards of the said ship, the outer two Buoys being painted black, and the inner two Buoys being painted yellow; and that the place of landing and embarking Prisoners to and from such Hulk, shall be Gellibrand's Point aforesaid.

" confined or who shall come within the limit or boundary marked by any buoys surrounding any such Hulk or vessel in any ship boat or other craft except driven within the same by stress of weather or who shall land or attempt to land upon or embark or attempt to embark from any point of land bay inlet cove or other place which may have been proclaimed as the place of embarking or landing prisoners to or from any such Hulk or vessel or which shall or may be enclosed or marked off in any other manner for any or either of such purposes or for the confinement or employment of any such prisoner shall be liable to be apprehended by any Constable or by any other person or persons whose- ever without warrant and be by him or them detained and kept in safe custody until he can be brought before two or more of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace and any ship boat or other craft which any such persons may be or may have landed from or embarked in or attempted to land from or embark in shall be liable to be seized and detained by any such Constable or person and every such offender shall upon conviction before any two or more of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace forfeit a penalty of not less than five pounds nor more than thirty pounds and in default of payment or in the discretion of such Justices be imprisoned and kept to hard labour for any period not exceeding six calendar months and upon any such conviction any ship boat or other craft which may have been so seized as aforesaid shall be forfeited to Her Majesty."

REGISTRATION OF BIRTHS AND DEATHS
IN VICTORIA.

(UNDER THE ACT OF LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, 16TH
VICTORIA, No. 26.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that for the purpose of receiving Notices and other particulars, required by the Act of Legislative Council, 16th Victoria, No. 26, respecting Births and Deaths occurring in the City of Melbourne and its suburbs, a Deputy Registrar will be in attendance every day, except Sundays and Holidays, from the 1st July next, at the Office, 28, William-street, opposite St. James's Church, Melbourne, between the hours of Eleven and Two o'clock.

The Registrations are made, and original Certificates granted by the Deputy Registrars, *free of charge*, and the public is invited to give immediate notice of all births and deaths which have occurred since the 31st March, 1853.

All Children born on and after the 1st July, 1853, should be registered within *sixty days* from the date of birth.

Every person dying should be registered *before the funeral takes place*, so that the Deputy Registrar may give a Certificate of Registration to the undertaker, who, after the body is buried, is required to attest *place and date of interment*. The importance of this proceeding may be estimated by section 25 of the Act, where it is enacted that certified copies of Registers, or entries of Registers, shall be received as *prima facie* evidence in any Court of Justice, "*provided that no entry of the register of any death shall be received as evidence of the fact of such death, unless there shall also be an entry of the register of the burial.*"

As every inhabitant of the Colony may, at some time or other, be interested in knowing the precise time of some Birth or Death; and, as a complete system of registration will prevent much litigation in future years, and otherwise protect individual rights of property; besides throwing light on many social questions, as to duration of life among children and the upgrown population, to the increase of statistical science, and the general advantage of the inhabitants of Victoria: it is of the utmost importance that they should be well acquainted with the nature and provisions of the Act of Legislative Council, 16th Victoria, No. 26, under which the New Registration System has been formed.

All Letters or Packets, addressed on Registration business only, to the REGISTRAR GENERAL, or any of the DEPUTY REGISTRARS, provided the sides are open, pass through the Post Office *free of charge*.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING THE
LIGHTS TO BE EXHIBITED BY
STEAM VESSELS, AND SIGNALS
TO BE MADE DURING THICK AND
FOGGY WEATHER.

THE Victoria Steam Navigation Board, in compliance with section 29 of the "*Victoria Steam Navigation Act*," and with the approval of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, have determined that from and after the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, the following Regulations be observed on board all Steam Vessels coming within the provisions of the Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council, 16th Victoria No. 25.

Sea-going Steam Vessels are to be provided with three lanterns, one of which shall exhibit a plain light, and shall be carried at the vessel's foremast head on the collar of the fore stay, to hang clear of any canvas she may have set, and shall be kept burning between the hours of sunset and sunrise, whether such vessel shall be at anchor or under weigh.

One to be fixed on the starboard paddle-box, on the fore part, which shall exhibit a green light; one to be fixed on the port side, which shall exhibit a red light, and shall be a lantern of a similar description to the starboard one. The last mentioned paddle-box lights shall only be exhibited when the steam vessel is under weigh, the plain light only at the foremast head being required when the vessel is at anchor; the mast-head light to be visible at a distance of at least five miles in a clear dark night, and the lantern to be constructed so as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of twenty points of the compass, viz. :— From right a-head to two points abaft the beam on each side of the ship.

The colored side lights to be visible at a distance of at least two miles in a clear dark night, and the lanterns to be so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of ten points of the compass, viz. :— From right a-head to two points abaft the beam on their respective sides.

The side lights to be moreover fitted with in-board screens of at least three feet long to prevent them being seen across the bow, the screens to be placed in a fore and aft line with the inner edge of the side lights.

The lantern used by steam vessels when at anchor elsewhere than at their respective wharves either at Melbourne, Hobson's Bay, or the outports, to be constructed so as to show a good

light all round the horizon. Steam vessels, while lying at their respective wharves, will not be required to hoist any lights.

River steam vessels, while steaming under weigh between sunset and sunrise, shall exhibit two lights, viz.:—One bright plain light at the foremast head, to be visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least two miles in a clear dark night, and one deep red light hung outside the stem, under the bowsprit.

River steam vessels plying without masts shall exhibit the upper light from a pole, to be placed amidships before the paddle boxes, the light not to be less than twelve feet from the deck.

The master of any steam vessel while steaming under weigh during thick or foggy weather shall, in addition to the lights already provided to be carried, cause a bell to be rung or a steam whistle to be sounded every minute, and whenever a steam vessel while under weigh shall be within any harbor or river within the Colony of Victoria between the hours of sunset and sunrise, he shall cause the above signals to be made by ringing the bell or sounding the whistle, and shall continue the same until the vessel shall have arrived at her wharf or anchorage.

The Board also direct that the 30th section of the Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council, 16th Victoria No. 25, having reference to vessels passing each other, be published for general information.

"Whenever any vessel proceeding in one direction meets a vessel proceeding in another direction, and the master or other person having charge of either such vessel perceives that if both vessels continue their respective courses they will pass so near as to involve any risk of a collision, he shall put the helm of his vessel to port so as to pass on the port side of the other vessel, due regard being had to the tide and to the position of each vessel with respect to the dangers of the channel, and as regards sailing vessels to the keeping of each vessel under command; and the master of any steam vessel navigating any river or narrow channel shall keep as far as practicable to that side of the fairway or mid-channel thereof which lies on the starboard side of such vessel; and if the master or other person having charge of any steam vessel neglect to observe these regulations or either of them, he shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds."
