BUOYS IN GAGE'S ROADS, WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

THE following description of Buoys laid down in Gage's Roads, Western Australia, has been published, and is now given for the information of the public.

Description of Buoys placed to mark the position of Eleanor Rocks, Beagle Rock, Minden Reef, and Scott's Ledge, for the convenience of Shipping frequenting Gage's Roads, Western Australia.

1. **ELEANOR ROCKS.** A chequered buoy is placed in 5 fathoms about 120 feet W.S.W. from the shoalest rock, which has 15 feet on it at low water, and lies $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile N.W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. from the nearest part of Rous Head, and 1 mile N.W. from the Lighthouse on Arthur's Head. This danger is not more than 100 yards in diameter, and has a clear channel of 4 to 5 fathoms in shore of it, and 8 fathoms $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile outside.

2. **BEAGLE ROCK.** A small narrow ridge, with 16 feet least water, has a black buoy on its western side, in 3 fathoms, $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile west 15 degrees south from Arthur's Head Lighthouse, and nearly one mile south from Eleanor Buoy. It lies $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile outside the edge of a 3-fathom bank which fronts Arthur's Head; but although $4\frac{1}{2}$ to 4 fathoms are found in the intermediate space, a similar rocky patch of 3 fathoms, one-sixth of a mile E.S.E. from Beagle Buoy, renders the passage unsafe for strangers.

3. **MINDEN REEF** is marked by a black buoy with a white vane, placed on the northern edge of the rock, which is small, and has 15 feet water on it. The buoy is nearly one mile S.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. from Arthur's Head Lighthouse, and a short half mile south from Beagle Buoy; the three buoys here described being in a line with each other. Minden Reef lies about a cable's length N.N.W. from a projecting part of the 3-fathom bank which ex-

tends from Arthur's Head, and there is a clear but narrow passage of $4\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms between, with 5 and 6 fathoms close on the reef's western side.

4. SCOTT'S LEDGE, situate near the northern edge of Success Bank, which forms the south side of Gage's Road, is more extensive than either of the foregoing, being $\frac{1}{3}$ of a mile in diameter, with least water 9 feet on a rocky bottom near its centre. A black buoy is placed in 3 fathoms water $\frac{1}{4}$ of a mile N.N.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. from this shoal part, and is distant $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles E.N.E. from the large rock called the Mewstone, in a direct line from that rock towards the mouth of Swan River. The deepest channel over the Success Bank is formed by keeping the N.W. extremity of Garden Island just touching the S.E. extremity of the small island close to Carnac. These marks will lead a vessel in 4 to 3 fathoms water, $\frac{1}{3}$ of a mile westward of Scott's Buoy, but a ship drawing 18 feet water should not attempt the passage.

5. HALL'S BANK, a rocky patch of $3\frac{1}{4}$ fathoms about 100 yards in diameter, lies nearly 2 miles from the nearest sandy shore to the eastward, and $1\frac{1}{4}$ miles from Eleanor Buoy, in the line of direction to it from the outer extremity of Arthur's Head. There are 8 and 9 fathoms water close around this danger, and a red and white buoy will shortly be placed to mark its position.

In all the foregoing descriptions, the depths of water are at low tide and the bearings by compass.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

Whalsey Skerries, Shetland.—Temporary Lighthouse.

The Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses hereby give notice that they are at present engaged in erecting a Lighthouse on the Out-Skerries of Whalsey, on the eastern coast of the Shetland Isles, and that until the completion of the permanent Lighthouse, a Light will be shewn from a temporary tower, and will be exhibited for the first time on the night of Friday, the 15th September, and every night thereafter, from the going away of day-light in the evening till the return of day-light in the morning.

The following is a specification of the Lighthouse, and the appearance of the Light, by MR. DAVID STEVENSON, Engineer to the Commissioners:—

The Lighthouse is situated on the eastern part of the Island of Gruna, in N. lat. $60^{\circ} 25' 24''$, and W. long. $0^{\circ} 44' 20''$, the Bound Skerry of Whalsey bearing from the Lighthouse about E. by compass. The outer or seaward extremity of the Bound Skerry is about half a mile or thereby from the site of the Lighthouse, so that vessels in rounding the Light must give it a wide berth.

The Whalsey Light will be known to mariners as a Revolving Light, which shews a bright white Light once in every minute.

The temporary Light will be exhibited from a tower of timber frame work, and is elevated about 108 feet above the level of high water of ordinary spring tides, and may be seen at the distance of about 16 nautic miles, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere. To a near observer, in favorable circumstances, the Light will not wholly disappear between the intervals of greatest brightness.

The Commissioners further give notice that by an Order in Council, dated the 3rd day of July last, the following tolls are authorised to be levied in respect of the said Lighthouse, viz:—

For every vessel belonging to the United Kingdom (the same not belonging to Her Majesty, her heirs or successors, or being navigated wholly in ballast), and for every foreign vessel privileged to enter the ports of the United Kingdom upon paying the same duties of tonnage as are payable by British vessels which may pass or derive benefit from the Light, the toll of two-sixteenths of a penny per ton of the burthen of every such vessel for every time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if on a coasting voyage.

For every time of passing or deriving benefit on an oversea voyage, one penny per ton for every such vessel.

For every vessel not navigated wholly in ballast, and not privileged in manner before specified, double the respective tolls above set forth.

Which tolls are liable to the following abatements on payment:—For a coasting voyage, ten per cent.; for an oversea voyage, twenty-five per cent.

6. If the Board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which, it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense, if any, deducted from the amount then due to the contractor by the party requiring it.
7. In the event of unnecessary delay, or failure of the contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise procured and charged in like manner.
8. A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of supplies, or of any delay in delivering or replacing them, when required, will subject the contractor to the forfeiture of his contract.

9.
