CASES of Small-pox having occurred on board the steamship Great Britain, during her passage from England to this port, His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under the authority of the Acts of the Governor and Council of New South Wales, 3 William IV., No. 1, and 5 Victoria, Nov 12, has deemed it necessary to place the vessel, crow and passengers under quarantine, in conformity with the provisions of those Acts, for a period of fourteen days from the convalescence of the last case of infectious disease, of which all persons are hereby to take notice accordingly.

We, the Mayor, Aldermen, Councillors, and Burgesses of the Town of Geelong, desire to approach your Excellency on this auspicious occasion with our sincere and earnest congratulations, and Lady Hotham, on this your first visit to the Town of Geelong, and again reiterate our sentiments of loyalty and affection to our beloved Sovereign the Queen, and our unfeigned respect to your Excellency as Her Majesty's Representative.

1. The providing Sewerage and Supply of Water for the Town.—Plans, surveys, and estimates for which were made by the Government some time since, with a view to. the carrying out these most necessary works. The peculiar, indeed almost unequalled, advantages which the town of Geelong possesses, in its adaptability for sewerage and supply of water, would render the performance of these most important works a matter of but little difficulty, and at a comparatively trifling expense, whilst the blessings and happiness conferred upon the people in a sanitary point of view would be incalculably great.

2. Wharf Accommodation.—It will easily be seen how greatly accommodation of this kind is required for the shipping of the port, the present wharves, undeserving of the name, being totally inadequate for the purpose, it frequently occurs that vessels are detained for several weeks, waiting for a berth to discharge cargoes, the want of accommodation in this respect will be still more severely felt when the bar is removed, which it is

hoped will be in a short time, so that large ships may come up to the town, instead of, as at present, anchoring at Point Henry.

3. The Removal of the Bar.—We respectfully trust that this great work will be energetically carried on; the advantages which the mercantile, trading, and indeed all classes of the community, would derive from this obstacle to the free navigation of the port being removed, are obvious.

4. The erection of a Bridge across the Barwon.

 The erection of a new Court House and Public Offices, for which £20,000 were voted by the Legislative Council last Session.
- 7. The extension of the Gaol, for which £20,000 were voted by the Legislative Council last Session.
- 8. The erection of a Post Office, for which £3000 were voted by the Legislative Council last Session.

9. The appointment of a Resident Judge in the town of Geelong.

- 10. The establishment of an Office for the Registration of Deeds, &c.

 11. The laying out the Reserve, already made as a Botanical Garden, for the recreation of the inhabitants.
- 12. The erection of a Flag Staff, for which £3000 were voted by the Legislative Council last Session.

We will not trespass upon your Excellency on this occasion, by dilating upon the necessity of these works being carried out at an early period, or of the vast benefits that would be conferred upon the inhabitants of this rapidly progressing town and district, and, indeed, in a great degree to the

the innabitants of this rapidly progressing town and district, and, indeed, in a great degree to the Colony in general, as these matters will, we are convinced, be readily perceived by your Excellency.

In conclusion, we again respectfully give your Excellency and your Honorable Lady a sincere and hearty welcome to our fair and highly favored town, earnestly trusting that, under the blessing of Divine Providence, all your Excellency's endeavours to carry on the Government of this magnificent country may be crowned with the most complete success, so that the social, moral, and religious condition of the people, the advancement of their material prosperity, and the boundless resources of Victoria be fully dividence. 1. To any person or persons who may satisfactorily establish his or their claim as the discoverer or discoverers of an available Gold Field or gold working, an extent of vacant ground in the locality of the discovery, of double or treble the area allowed by the Regulations of 31st December, 1853, will be licensed to him or them.

2. The precise extent of land to be allowed to the discoverer or discoverers, upon proof of the discovery, will be determined by the officer to whom the proof

has been tendered.

3. Proof of the discovery must be made at the earliest possible date to the Commissioner of Gold Fields in charge of the district in which the discovery may be situated; or in the event of no such officer being within a reasonable distance, such proof may be tendered to the nearest Bench of Magistrates or Resident Magistrate.

4. The neglect of or non-compliance with clause No. 2, will involve the forfeiture of all advantages hereby allowed.

Special Instructions for the guidance of Intending Exhibitors.

PUBLIC notice has been given that an Exhibition will be held in Melbourne, in October next, of articles, the natural and artificial produc-tions of this Colony, intended for transmission to the Paris Exhibition, to be held in May, 1855; and also of other articles, the produce of any country, not for transmission to Paris, but to exhibit at Melbourne, and to be subsequently delivered to their respective owners.

The Commissioners have deemed it important that information should be imparted to persons desirous of exhibiting articles on either or both occasions, and it is with this object that the following regulations are published.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

1. Applications for reserves of space must state the amount in square feet of wall or ground superfices required, and should be sent in before the 5th of September; but, in order that adequate provision may be made to meet the wants of intending exhibitors, it is desirable that such applications

be made to the Commissioners as early as possible.

2. The name and address, in full, of the exhibitor, must be ticketed on the specimens in legible characters, and it must be stated whether or not the exhibitor wishes the specimen to be forwarded to Paris, and what is to be done with

it ultimately.

3. The zoological and local name of animals, birds, fishes, reptiles, and insects, their habits and the place where found, must, if known, be ticketed on the specimens or the cases or bottles containing them. Similar instructions will apply to specimens from the vegetable kingdom. Minerals should have the scientific and popular name upon each specimen, the labels being rendered adhesive by a solution of gum arabic and sugar.

4. To descriptive particulars accompanying specimens having either commercial value or probable economic application, should be added the mode of saving, curing, preserving, or preparation, together with the quantity capable of being procured or produced, and any other infor-

mation worthy of being known.

5. Specimens should be neatly and securely packed (particularly those for transmission to Paris) in boxes or packages, and forwarded before the 20th September next, to

- 6. The form of stands and show-cases for the display of the various specimens will be left to the individual taste of the exhibitors, subject, however, to the approval of the Commissioners, and must be provided at the cost of the exhibitors.
- 7. Those who desire to exhibit commercial articles in the Exhibition Building, in Melbourne, will be allowed to have attendants in waiting to answer enquiries respecting the same, but cannot be permitted to remove them until the close of the exhibition.
- S. A receipt will be given for specimens as received, and they will be arranged, exhibited, and forwarded to Parisfree of expense to the owners.
- 9. Care will be taken of the articles in the exhibition, but the Commissioners will not be responsible for loss or injury on transit to or from Melbourne, or while in the exhibition.
- 10. The Commissioners will give a testimonial to exhibitors, and award prize medals to those worthy of the distinction.
- 11. The Commissioners will afford every facility to exhibitors of valuable specimens, to insure the same, on their being transmitted to Paris; and if exhibitors be desirous of disposing of specimens in Paris, will effect their sale, and pay the proceeds to the exhibitors or their agents, after deducting all expenses attendant on such sale. Exhibitors wishing to have their specimens sent to England, may have them forwarded to any part of the United Kingdom on pre-payment of the expense of their transit from Paris to London.
- 12. Those articles exhibited in Melbourne only will be delivered to the owners, or persons authorised by them, on production of the Commissioners' receipts.
