NEW POLLING PLACES FOR ELECTORAL DISTRICT OF SOUTH BOURKE.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Major-General MACARTHUR, the Senior Military Officer in Command of Her Majesty's Land Forces in the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

IN pursuance of an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of the Colony of Victoria, passed in the nineteenth year of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to provide for the Election of Members to serve in the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of Victoria respectively." I, Major-General MACARTHUR, the Senior Military Officer and Officer administering the Government of the said Colony, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation abolish the polling places already appointed for the electoral district mentioned in the Schedule hereunto annexed; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do hereby appoint that the several places mentioned in the last column of the same Schedule shall be respectively polling places for the purpose of taking the poll at any contested election for the said district, and that all votes in respect of qualifications within the boundaries and limits mentioned in the second column of the same Schedule shall be taken at any election for such district respectively at the polling places in the said last column set opposite to the names of the respective divisions of such district, that is to say:—

Divisions.	Boundaries and Limits.	Polling Places.
SOUTH BOURKE.		
Oakleigh	As described in the Proclamation of the sixth day of September last	Oakleigh, Gardiner, and Mulgrave.
Templestowe	As described in the said Proclamation	Hawthorn and Templestowe.
