6. The charges will be remitted for the burial of any person on evidence being produced to the Trustees that the relations or friends of such persons are unable to pay the costs and charges.

7. Application for permission to make a vault or creet a monument in the Cemetery to be made at the office of the Trustees. A certificate of permission will be granted to the person applying on payment of the charges set forth in the

and if the Council decide in the affirmative, the oftending member shall be fined 20s., and for every succeeding offence, at the same meeting, so adjudged disorderly, he shall be fined double the amount of the preceding fine, and a record of the same shall be entered in the Minutes of the Meeting.

For the preservation of order and decorum, at the meeting of the Council, strangers interrupting their proceedings, by addressing (without leave) the members, by conversation, or in any other disorderly manner, shall be excluded from the Council Chamber Council Chamber.
