BEECHWORTH CEMETERY.

REGULATIONS made by the Trustees of the Public Cemetery established at Beechworth:—

1. All charges must be paid when orders are given, or before the grave or vault is opened.
2. Orders for interment must be given at the office of the Trustees in Beechworth, between the hours of Ten a.m. and Five p.m. the previous day.
3. The name, age, late place of residence, and probable cause of death of the deceased, must be stated at the time of giving the order.
4. The procession to arrive at the Cemetery punctually at the hour appointed for the funeral.
5. The usual hours of interment will be from Ten a.m. to Six p.m. from the 1st September to 30th April, and from Ten a.m. to Four p.m. in the other four months of the year.
6. The charges will be remitted for the burial of any person on evidence being produced to the Trustees that the relations or friends of such persons are unable to pay the costs and charges.
7. Application for permission to make a vault or erect a monument in the Cemetery to be made at the office of the Trustees. A certificate of permission will be granted to the person applying on payment of the charges set forth in the schedule A.
8. The Trustees will cause all common graves to be dug; but when a brick grave or vault is required, it must be constructed under the direction of the Trustees or some person duly appointed by them. And in case interment is to be made in any private grave or vault belonging to another person, the consent in writing of such person must be left with the order.
9. All monuments, vaults, graves, gravestones and fences, to be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owners.

10. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave to be bricked in, cemented and covered by a slab of freestone, granite, slate or iron.

11. A drawing of every stone, tomb, pedestal, and a plan of every monument, must be submitted to the Trustees for their approval. In the erection of tablets copper cramps must be used.

12. Wooden fences allowed, but if not kept in proper repair must be removed by order of the Trustees without notice to the owner.

13. A plan of the Cemetery and a registry will be kept, and may be inspected at the charges set forth in schedule A.

14. No servant or other person employed by or engaged in any duty on behalf of the Trustees will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.

15. Any person wantonly or wilfully destroying or doing or causing to be done any damage to any monument, vault, tombstone, building, erection, railing, fence, shrubbery, tree or plant in the Cemetery is guilty of a misdemeanor, and being convicted thereof, is liable to be punished as prescribed by the 14th section of the Act 17 Victoria No. 12.

16. No dogs will be allowed to enter the Cemetery.

17. The Trustees reserve the right to make any alterations from time to time in these charges and regulations.

MUNICIPALITY OF EAST COLLINGWOOD.

ADDITIONAL BYE-LAW, No. 6.—TO ENFORCE OBSERVANCE OF STANDING ORDERS, 18 VICTORIA, No. 15.

FOR the observance of the decorum becoming a deliberative body, the maintenance of the order essential to the proper discharge of their duties, and for economising time and despatching business, disrespectful remarks towards, or interruptions of, the Chairman whilst speaking, or towards, or of, any member whilst addressing him, by other member or members of Council, the Chairman shall promptly suppress.

If any member persist in such irregularity after having been twice called to order by the Chairman, the latter shall, before any other business be proceeded with, put the following question to the Council, upon which every member will be required to vote, namely: Is the member complained of disorderly? and if the Council decide in the affirmative, the offending member shall be fined 20s., and for every succeeding offence, at the same meeting, so adjudged disorderly, he shall be fined double the amount of the preceding fine, and a record of the same shall be entered in the Minutes of the Meeting.

For the preservation of order and decorum, at the meeting of the Council, strangers interrupting their proceedings, by addressing (without leave) the members, by conversation, or in any other disorderly manner, shall be excluded from the Council Chamber.

BYE-LAW No. 7.—TO AUTHORISE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF EAST COLLINGWOOD TO CHANGE ONE OR MORE OF TWO OR MORE NAMES OF STREETS BEARING THE SAME NAME, AND TO NAME STREETS NOT NOW NAMED, AND STREETS WHICH MAY HEREAFTER BE FORMED WITHIN THE MUNICIPALITY OF EAST COLLINGWOOD, UNDER 18 VICTORIA No. 15.

1. For the protection of *bona fide* ratepayers, their more easy recognition at elections, the identification of property, the perfecting the ratepayers' roll, and for other public conveniences, one or more of two or more streets within the Municipality bearing the same name shall be changed by the Municipal Council when they think fit, to some other name, due public notice of the same to be given.

2. Every street within the Municipality not now named, or which may be hereafter formed shall be named by the Municipal Council, public notice of the same to be given.

3. The streets now named in the Municipality not bearing duplicate or triplicate names shall not be changed, except by the Municipal Council, public notice of which change of name to be given.

BYE-LAW No. 8.—FOR THE PRESERVATION OF THE FOOTWAYS, WATER COURSES, &c., OF THE PUBLIC STREETS AND THOROUGHFARES, &c., OF THE EAST COLLINGWOOD MUNICIPALITY, UNDER 18 VICTORIA, No. 14 AND 15.

EVERY person requiring to take horses, bullocks, drays, carts, &c., across the footways of the public streets of the Municipality to his or her premises abutting thereon, shall make approaches thereto, in conformity with the instructions of the Municipal Council through their surveyor, or other authorised officer.

2. No person shall be permitted to make such approaches or form drains or other communication with the water courses of the public streets or thoroughfares, without first obtaining the approval of the Municipal Council through their surveyor or other authorised officer.

3. No person shall throw earth, sand, gravel, or rubbish into, or in any other manner obstruct the water courses or drains of the streets or other places in the Municipality.

The quantity stated in the schedule must be considered as approximative only, and it must be understood that the Government will draw either more or less than is there given. The excess over the estimate will however in no case exceed 50 per cent.

3. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by any contracts made by the Military Commissariat.

8. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage as to the quality of the same, it is to be decided by a Board of Survey, composed of persons named by the Head of a Department, and the decision of the Board is to be considered final.

9. If the Board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which, it will be procured elsewhere, and the expense, if any, will be charged as in clause 7.

10. When a Board of Survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when from some other cause injury would accrue either to the public service or to the contractor by waiting for a Board of Survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and the contractor must take back the rejected forage and supply good in its stead, failing which, it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 7.

11.
