SECTIONS V. TO X. OF TOWN AND COUNTRY POLICE ACT EXTENDED TO MADDINGLEY.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Major-General MACARTHUR, the Senior Military Officer in Command of Her Majesty's Land Forces in the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant-Governor and Legislative Council of the Colony of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, "An Act to provide for the Management of Towns and other places in Victoria," it was amongst other things enacted that so many of the provisions of the said Act as relate to the good order of towns and other populous places, being sections numbered V., VI., VII., VIII., IX. and X. in the said Act, should extend to and be in force in such cities, towns, districts, and places as the Lieutenant-Governor might by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* declare to come under the operation of the same respectively, or any of them, and that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant-Governor to define the limits of such places: Now I, Major-General Macarthur, the Senior Military Officer and Officer administering the Government of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation, in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act, declare and appoint that the sections of the said Act, being numbered V., VI., VII., VIII., IX. and X., shall extend to and be in force within the township of Maddingley (Bacchus Marsh), in the said Colony; and I do define the limits of the said township to be the same as are hereinafter set forth, that is to say: Commencing at a point on the south bank of the River Werribee, being the north-western angle of allotment 1, section 29; thence by a line bearing south one hundred and twelve chains and sixty links; thence by a line bearing west eighty chains; thence by a line bearing north one hundred and fourteen chains, to the south bank of the River Werribee aforesaid; and thence by that river to the commencing point.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twenty-ninth day of October, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, and in the twentieth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

BENDIGO GOLD DISTRICT GENERAL HOSPITAL.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Major-General MACARTHUR, the Senior Military Officer in Command of Her Majesty's Land Forces in the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Governor-General and Legislative Council of the Colony of New South Wales, passed in the eleventh year of Her present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to enable certain public Hospitals to sue and be sued in the name of their Treasurer, and to provide for the taking and holding of real property belonging to such Hospitals respectively," it was amongst other things enacted that whenever the Governor should deem it expedient to extend the provisions of the said Act to any hospital thereafter to be No. 140.—OCTOBER 31ST, 1856.—1.

established in any town in the said Colony not mentioned in the said Act, it should and might be lawful for the said Governor to declare the same by Proclamation, to be published in the *Government Gazette*; and from and after the publication thereof the said Act should be deemed and taken to apply to the hospital or hospitals to be specified in such Proclamation to all intents and purposes as fully and effectually as if the said hospital or hospitals were specially named therein: Now therefore I, Major-General Macarthur, the Senior Military Officer and Officer administering the Government of Victoria, do by this my Proclamation declare, that in pursuance of the authority vested in me by the said Act, I have extended the provisions of the said Act to the hospital called and known as "The Bendigo Gold District General Hospital," situated at Sandhurst, in Victoria aforesaid.

MUNICIPALITY OF BALLAARAT.

BYE-LAW No. 10.—To provide for the more certain PROTECTION OF THE ROADS AND FOOTPATHS WITHIN THE BOUNDARIES OF THE MUNICIPALITY.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant-Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, No. 15, intituled, "An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," it is amongst other things enacted "that every Municipal Council shall have the care and management of the roads, public streets, paths and public thoroughfares;" And whereas by a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, dated the seventeenth day of December in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, the township of Ballaarat was duly established a municipal district, under the provisions and within the meaning of the said Act: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the Municipal Council for the district of Ballaarat, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Officer administering the Government of Victoria, as required by the provisions of the said Act, it shall not be lawful for any person or persons to remove the surface soil, or dig any hole, or sink a shaft for any purpose whatsoever upon any of the roads or footpaths within the boundaries of the municipality, whether the same be formed or not; and any person or persons committing either of these offences shall upon conviction before two or more justices of the peace forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding twenty pounds.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 10, made by the Municipal Council of Ballaarat, has been assented to by His Excellency the Officer administering the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF BALLAARAT.

BYE-LAW No. 9.—A BYE-LAW FOR REGULATING AND LICENSING PERSONS TO SLAUGHTER CERTAIN ANIMALS WITHIN THE MUNICIPALITY OF BALLAARAT UNDER CERTAIN RESTRICTIONS.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant-Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18th Victoria No. 15, intituled, "An Act for the Establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be competent for the Council of any Municipal District established under the provisions of the said Act to make bye-laws for the regulating, the killing and sale of butchers' meat, the establishment of slaughter-houses, the restraining noisome and offensive trades, and the general good rule and government of such municipal district; And whereas by a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, dated the seventeenth day of December, 1855, the district of Ballaarat was duly established a municipal district under the provisions and within the meaning of the said Act: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the Municipal Council of the District of Ballaarat, from and after this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Officer administering the Government of Victoria, as required by the provisions of the said Act, that all persons whose premises shall have been paved and suitably prepared so that in the opinion of the Council such premises can be kept inoffensive, and whose premises shall have been reported by the Council's Inspector to be in a fit and proper state, shall upon payment of an annual license fee of Twenty shillings to the Town Clerk in aid of the municipal fund (payable on the first day of October, or upon such adjourned day as the Council shall appoint) be permitted to kill sheep and lambs; providing all such persons shall receive the blood into tubs and cause its removal, together with all offal or other offensive matter, from such premises at least once in every twenty-four hours, and for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this bye-law such premises shall be registered at the municipal offices, and shall at all times be open to the inspection of the Council or their duly appointed Inspector; and every person who shall kill any sheep or lamb without being duly licensed, except the bona fide servants of a duly licensed butcher on registered premises as aforesaid, or whose premises shall not be kept or maintained inoffensive as above required, or who shall neglect or refuse to comply with any other regulations herein made, shall upon conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

Be it further ordered that it shall not be lawful for any licensed butcher to kill or cause to be killed sheep and lambs on premises which are situate distinct and apart, except such premises are severally registered and a license taken out to slaughter on such several premises as though they belonged to different owners.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 9, made by the Municipal Council of Ballaarat, has been assented to by His Excellency the Officer administering the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council.
