MEETING OF THE PARLIAMENT OF VICTORIA.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Major-General MACARTHUR, the Senior Military Officer in Command of Her Majesty's Land Forces in the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Imperial Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, passed in the Session held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "*An Act to enable Her Majesty to assent to a Bill as amended of the Legislature of Victoria, to establish a Constitution in and for the Colony of Victoria,*" it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Governor to fix such places within Victoria, and (subject to the limitation in the said Act contained) such times for holding the first and every other Session of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of Victoria, and to vary and alter the same respectively as he might think fit:

Now therefore I, Major-General Macarthur, the Senior Military Officer and Officer administering the Government of Victoria, do hereby in pursuance of the power and authority in me vested as such Governor as aforesaid, announce and proclaim that the First Session of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of Victoria shall commence and be holden on Friday, the Twenty-first day of the current month of November, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, at Twelve of the clock at noon, in the building known as the Parliament Houses situate on the Eastern Hill, in Spring-street, in the city of Melbourne: And the Members of the said Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly respectively are hereby required to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this first day of November, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, and in the twentieth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

HIS Excellency Major-General MACARTHUR, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the promulgation of the following Amended Regulations for the Selection of Lands of the Third Class, viz., Country Lots, including, such as are designated Special Country, which have been exposed to sale by public competition and not sold, or on which the deposit has been forfeited and the purchase consequently invalid:—

1. On the receipt at the Surveyor General's Office, Melbourne, of the preliminary and final reports of sales of lands specified as above, a schedule of the allotments offered for sale for which there has been no bid, or of which the successful competitor has failed to complete his purchase, will be prepared and proclaimed as open for selection at the sum annexed in the schedule to each lot.

CIRCUIT COURTS.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Major-General MACARTHUR, the Senior Military Officer in Command of Her Majesty's Land Forces in the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, passed in the fifteenth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intitled, "An Act to make provision for the better administration of Justice in the Colony of Victoria," it was amongst other things enacted that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor of the Colony of Victoria, by any orders to be by him, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, from time to time made and proclaimed, to define the limits of districts within and the times and places at which Circuit Courts should be holden in the said Colony: And whereas it is advisable to alter and vary the boundaries and limits of the existing Circuit Court Districts, and to appoint that Circuit Courts should also be holden in and for the Districts hereinafter described, and to define the boundaries and limits within and for which such Circuit Courts shall be holden, and to fix the places for the holding of such Courts: Now therefore I, Major-General MacArthur, the Senior Military Officer and Officer administering the Government of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby order and direct that Circuit Courts for the trial of civil as well as criminal issues, and for the purpose of enquiring into and assessing damages in actions, shall be holden within the undermentioned districts in Victoria, to be called respectively:—The Ballarat Circuit District; The Beechworth Circuit District; The Castlemaine Circuit District; The Geelong Circuit District; The Portland Circuit District; and The Sandhurst Circuit District: And I do, with the advice aforesaid, order and direct that the aforesaid Circuit Districts shall consist of the parts of Victoria respectively comprehended within the following limits, that is to say:

CIRCUIT COURT DISTRICT OF BALLARAT.—Commencing at a point on the southern shores of Lake Hindmarsh, where the River Wimmera disembogues; thence southward by the River Wimmera to Norton Creek; thence by Norton Creek and a line south to the River Glenelg; thence by the River Glenelg to the county of Ripon; thence by the western and southern boundaries of that county to the township of Carngham; thence by a line south-easterly to the junction of Williamson's Creek with the River Yarrowee; thence by a line easterly to the junction of the Lal Lal Rivulet with the River Moorabool; thence by the River Moorabool to its source; thence by the main dividing range to the range between the Bullarook Creek and Joyce's Creek; thence by that range and a line westerly to the junction of the Dry Creek with the Mount Greenock Creek; thence by the Mount Greenock Creek to its source; thence by the main dividing range to the source of the River Avoca; thence by the River Avoca to a point five miles more or less north of Corom; and thence by a line westerly to the southern shores of Lake Hindmarsh, the commencing point aforesaid.

CIRCUIT COURT DISTRICT OF BEECHWORTH.—Commencing at the source of the River Murray; thence by that river to the River Goulburn; thence by the River Goulburn to Creighton's Creek; thence by Creighton's Creek to its source; thence by the Dividing Range to the western arm of the Devil's River; thence by the western arm of the Devil's River, the River Goulburn, and the Jerusalem River to the Great Dividing Range; and thence by the Great Dividing Range to the source of the Murray, the commencing point aforesaid.

LOCAL COURT REGULATIONS.

MOUNT BLACKWOOD.

REGULATIONS made by the Local Court of the District of Mount Blackwood:-

xix. *Area for the deposit of rubbish on quartz claims.*—The holders of any quartz claim shall be entitled to occupy for the deposit of quartz or rubbish fifteen yards on each side of the claim from the centre of the shaft, or in cases where the ground will not admit of taking the fifteen yards on each side it shall be lawful for such holder or holders to take or occupy thirty yards on one side, and should more space be necessary, it shall be lawful for the Warden to grant it on the recommendation of the Local Court:

Provided that if such reef or vein shall run through or under any alluvial or surface soil supposed to contain gold, it shall be lawful for any person desiring to take away or work any such earth or soil to do so, and such person shall remove the same from within the boundaries of the abovementioned surface area attached to each quartz claim within a reasonable time:

Estimated further that no person or persons shall sink or drive within fifteen (15) yards of the centre of any shaft; and in loose or porous soil he or they shall leave such a thickness of wall around the shaft as will prevent the ingress of water.

xx. *Persons to stack quartz.*—Any person who wishes to retain possession of any quartz stone or other substance containing gold, the product of a quartz claim, may do so for any period not exceeding three (3) months, although the claim from which it came has been relinquished; Provided that he stack such quartz stone or other substance in a proper manner upon ground not supposed to be workable, and erects close to such

stack a post with his name, address, and date of stacking legibly printed thereon. And no person or persons shall remove, deface, or damage any such post so erected, quartz-stone or other substance stacked in accordance with this regulation; and it shall be competent for the Warden of the district to declare relinquished any quartz stone or other substance not so stacked and taken from a claim then abandoned.

STATEMENT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF WILLIAMSTOWN FOR THE SIX MONTHS ENDING ON THE 11TH OCTOBER, 1856.

His Excellency the Officer administering the Government, by a Proclamation dated the 12th day of March, 1856, duly declared Williamstown a municipal district within the meaning of the Act 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, "An Act for the Establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria."

The following gentlemen were elected as members of the Council, viz. — Messrs. Stewart, Mason, Armstrong, Verdon, Maclean, Moxham and Langford. The Council elected Councillor Thomas Mason as Chairman, and during the last six months thirty-seven general meetings have been held, of which

The Chairman has attended	37
Councillor Stewart	35
Councillor Armstrong	26
Councillor Verdon	34
Councillor Maclean	29
Councillor Moxham	35
Councillor Langford	37

The absence of Councillor Verdon from two meetings was due to his presiding at the time as Chairman of the Conference of Municipal Delegates. The weekly meetings are held on Thursdays, at half past three p.m.

The following officers have been appointed:—1. Town Clerk and Collector of Rates; 2. Surveyor; 3. Solicitor; 4. Assessor; 5. Inspector of Nuisances; 6. Town Herd; 7. Servant. The Council engaged suitable chambers for one year at a rental of £150.

Three permanent committees have been formed for Public Works, Finance and Markets.

PUBLIC WORKS.

The total length of footpaths formed and being formed is 64 miles, of which 4½ miles are metalled, in addition to which 600 yards in length of paved crossings of streets, and 404 yards of paved gutters are completed or well advanced. For effecting the above works the following materials have been purchased, viz. :—

3650 cubic yards of broken stone,
81,000 pitching stones for crossings, gutters, &c.

The formation of the principal carriage ways will be proceeded with immediately.

FINANCE.

The Council appointed his Worship the Chairman Treasurer, and opened an account with the English, Scottish and Australian Chartered Bank. Of the Legislative grant to this district of £4000, one moiety only has been received. The estimates of public works necessary to be undertaken during the current year amounted to £10,000. The assessment represented 1457 rateable properties, and amounted to £68,444. This was reduced by appeals to £62,910. A rate of one shilling in the pound was struck, of which, to the 11th October last, the sum of £809 had been collected. Negotiations are in progress for a loan of £5000, to be applied to the formation of portions of leading thoroughfares.

RATE-PAYERS' ROLL.

The Rate-payers' Roll has been carefully compiled, revised, and will shortly be printed.

BYE-LAWS.

The assent of His Excellency has been given to ten bye-laws; other bye-laws of an important character are under consideration.

ENDOWMENT, &c.

The question of municipal endowment having been introduced for the consideration of this Council, it was considered expedient to submit this, together with some other important questions, to the deliberations of a Conference of Municipal Delegates, which, at the suggestion of this Council, was held in August last. All the then existing municipal districts were represented at it, and the report of the proceedings of the Conference is now under the consideration of the various Councils, whose renewed deliberations upon it will, it is confidently hoped, tend to the immediate practical benefit and progressive development of municipal institutions in Victoria generally.
