## PASSAGE OF BAGGAGE AND GOLD ACROSS THE ISTHMUS OF SUEZ.

THE accompanying despatch, addressed by Her Majesty's Agent and Consul-General in Egypt to the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, notifying the additional facilities granted by the Transit Administration to the passage of Baggage and Gold across the Isthmus of Suez, is published for general information.

MY LORD,—As a proof of the Viceroy's wish to consult the convenience of passengers proceeding to and from India through Egypt, I may mention two alterations to which he has readily consented on my proposing them.

Hitherto the amount of baggage conveyed gratis by the Transit Administration across the Isthmus was smaller than that allowed to passengers by the Peninsular and Oriental Company.

On representing to His Highness the inconvenience to which this arrangement subjected the passengers, he at once ordered the rates to be equalized, though this measure is attended with a diminution of the transit revenue.

I also stated to him that Her Majesty's Government was about to establish a monthly line of steamers from Australia to Suez, and that a considerable portion of the Australian gold might be expected to pass through Egypt if the charge for specie were reduced from 7s. 6d. per £100 to 5s. The Viceroy has adopted this proposal, thereby affording a considerable advantage to whatever company obtain the contract for the above service.

I may also state to your Lordship, that His Highness has promoted Mr. Luquin, Director of the Transit and Railway Administration, to the rank of Bey, thus placing a Christian and an Englishman to the head of the Turkish Administration.

#### LOCAL COURT REGULATIONS.

##### CASTLEMAINE.

REGULATIONS made by the Local Court of the District of Castlemaine:—  
xxxii. *Shape of alluvial claims.*—That all claims in alluvial workings, under whatever document held, and irrespective of extent of claim, must be (as per Gold Fields Act) taken in square or rectangular blocks not exceeding in length twice their breadth, and if otherwise marked cannot be lawfully held.

xxxiii. *Construction and management of races and water channels.*—In all cases where races and water channels are required for draining the ground, and carrying off surplus water and sludge, such races and channels may be constructed through any unoccupied ground, and shall be reserved and protected for their proper uses: all such races and channels shall become common or main races and channels, provided that all parties wishing to run a head or side race into, or otherwise use such main races, shall contribute a fair proportion in labor or cash towards constructing and repairing the same, and shall, when required, clean out and otherwise keep in order or repair such main races in proportion to the number of men, the use made of, and benefits derived from, such races.

## MUNICIPALITY OF BALLAARAT.

BYE-LAW No. 11.—FOR THE REGULATION AND GOVERNMENT OF BUILDERS AND NIGHTMEN.

(Under the Act 18 Victoria No. 15.)

BUILDER'S LICENSE, NO. —.

**M**R. for a Builder's License to erect on allotment section street, within the Municipality of Ballaarat, permission is hereby granted to him to erect scaffolding, fence, site, and deposit building materials therein for the space of days from the date hereof.

## CONDITIONS.

No builder shall commence erecting or pulling down any building or placing materials for or from the same in or abutting on any public thoroughfare or street, lane, court, alley, &c., to which the public may have access within the Municipality of Ballaarat, without first obtaining a license from the Municipal Council to authorise him to deposit such building materials.

Before any such deposit shall be made, a good and sufficient boarding shall be placed round such materials, to the satisfaction of the Council or their officer; and a light in a conspicuous position shall be kept burning from sunset to sunrise. No such materials shall encroach more than one-third of the width of any roadway, or so as to render any road impassable to vehicles. The footways and gutters must in all cases be kept free.

1. The license shall be charged five shillings, and it shall remain in force twenty-one days from the date thereof, and no longer.

2. Any person producing such license, which has been in any manner altered, shall be deemed an unlicensed person.

3. Any builder refusing to show his license when required so to do, by any authorised officer of the Council, shall be deemed and dealt with as an unlicensed person.

4. Any person depositing building materials without being licensed so to do, or exceeding the powers granted by such license, shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding twenty pounds.

5. Any person failing to remove scaffolding, &c., on being requested so to do by the local authority, shall forfeit and pay twenty shillings daily for every day it shall so continue.

## NIGHTMEN.

1. Every applicant for a license to ply for hire as a nightman shall, at the same time, submit the names and residences of his proposed sureties, and on his being approved by the Council, he shall receive a license therefrom.

2. The object of the sureties and bond shall be for the protection of the health of the Municipality from the consequences of the negligent performance of the nightman's avocations.

3. The amount of the bond shall be jointly and severally for the sum of £90.

4. The license fee shall be five pounds per annum, and the license for each cart shall be twenty shillings per annum.

5. The name and address of nightman, carter, together with the number of his license, and the words "Licensed cart or dray," as the case may be, shall be legibly painted in letters not less than one inch in height, in white on a black ground, or in black on a white ground, in a conspicuous position upon

the off side of the cart or dray with which he shall ply for hire.

6. Each cart shall have affixed thereto when employed in the removal of night-soil, two colored lights (bull's eyes), that on the off side to be green, and on the near side to be red.

7. Nightmen's carts shall not be employed earlier than ten (10) o'clock, p.m., and shall not with soil therein be in any part of the Municipality after five (5) o'clock, a.m.

8. The district manure depot shall be the ground appropriated for that purpose on the north-east angle of the Municipality, five chains square.

9. Any person or persons not complying with the provisions of this bye-law, shall, upon conviction before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding twenty pounds.

10. The following shall be the form of license:—

MUNICIPALITY OF CASTLEMAINE.

BYE-LAW No. 10.—FOR THE FORMATION AND MAINTENANCE OF CROSSING PLACES FOR WHEELED VEHICLES OVER FOOTPATHS AND DRAINS, AND THE PRESERVATION THEREOF.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council, 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, "An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," the Council of any municipal district have the care and management of the roads, public streets, paths, &c.; and whereas it is expedient and necessary to preserve the drains and footpaths that are or may be formed by order of the Council out of the public moneys: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the Municipal Council of Castlemaine, that all persons having or that may hereafter have roadways for carts or other wheeled vehicles across the footpaths or drains now formed or that may hereafter be formed by the Council within the said Municipality, shall, at their own cost, provide, construct, and maintain a crossing-place over the water channel and footpath, in manner following:—

In streets where a stone or wood kerb is now or may hereafter be laid, the crossing shall be paved with stone or broken metal the whole width of the footpath from the building line to the pavement of the water channel, and shall be enclosed on both sides with a stone or wood kerb of the same size and description as the street kerbing, which it must join with a curve closely. The water channel must not in any way be altered or obstructed, but must be maintained at all times in good repair by the persons having the crossing.

In streets where a footpath and channel are or may hereafter be formed, and where no kerbing is laid, suitable wooden bridges shall be provided, or wood plank or scantlings, and fixed over the water channel so as to have a free passage for the water underneath, to project into the public roadway not less than four feet nor more than five feet from the outer edge of the footpath, and the crossing place over the footpath shall be paved, metalled, or gravelled in such manner as to be always as clean and as dry as the adjoining footpath itself, or the water channel may be pitched with large metal to its proper level.

The materials used for such crossings and kerbing, and the manner of laying the same, shall be subject to the approval of the Municipal Council or of their surveyor; and in cases where such work, in any respect whatever, shall on the report of the said surveyor be deemed objectionable by the said Council, it shall be lawful for the said Council, on and after seven days from the day of giving notice of objection to the persons forming or causing to be formed any such crossing place, to proceed as hereinafter provided against any party or parties refusing or neglecting to comply with the provisions of this bye-law.

All persons about forming crossing places over footpaths or water channels shall give notice thereof in writing, and submit a specification of the work to the town surveyor, who shall give permission for the same to be proceeded with, provided the specified manner be not objectionable, and shall charge and receive a fee of five shillings for each examination and permission.

All persons crossing any formed water channel, drain or footpath, or causing such to be crossed by any cart or other

wheeled vehicle, excepting the channels in the carriage or roadways at the intersections of the public streets, unless over and by a crossing place formed in manner as herein stated; and any person refusing or neglecting to comply with any other provisions of this bye-law shall, on conviction before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

It shall be lawful for the said Municipal Council whenever it appears that carts or other wheeled vehicles habitually or frequently cross any formed channel or footpath to any right-of-way, yard, or other premises, without a crossing place having been made, as hereinbefore stated, to form such a crossing place, and to recover the cost and expense of its construction from the owner or occupier of the premises entered by the use thereof; and in cases of common rights-of-way from the several owners and occupiers of the premises forming the boundaries thereof, or to which it is appurtenant; and any person refusing or neglecting to pay the sum due and owing for such construction in manner aforesaid, shall be further liable to the penalty as before stated, for a breach of this bye-law.

MUNICIPALITY OF PRAHRAN.

BYE-LAW No. 39.—A BYE-LAW TO PREVENT NUISANCES ARISING FROM BADLY CONSTRUCTED CESSPOOLS; FOR THE PROPER ERECTION OF PRIVIES, AND OTHER REGULATIONS CONNECTED THEREWITH, WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF PRAHRAN.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, "An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in the Colony of Victoria," whereby amongst other things it is enacted that it shall be competent for the Council of any Municipal District to make bye-laws for the suppression of nuisances, the preservation of the public health, and the general good rule and government of such Municipal District, and that no such bye-law shall have any force or effect until His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor should under his hand have signified his assent thereto; and whereas it is expedient to make a bye-law for the prevention of nuisances arising from badly constructed cesspools, for the proper erection of privies, and other regulations connected therewith: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the authority aforesaid, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Officer administering the Government, as required by the provisions of this Act, that all dwelling houses now or hereafter to be erected within this Municipal District shall be provided with a properly constructed privy and cesspool, the cesspool to be placed at a distance of not less than three feet from any fence or boundary, and not less than fifteen feet from any dwelling house, except by special permission from the said Council or their duly authorised officer; and when such cesspool is sunk below the surface, it shall be built with brick, stone, or other approved material, closely set, so as to prevent the contents from percolating through the walls and saturating the adjoining ground; that previous to such privies and cesspools being erected, permission shall be obtained from the said Council or their duly authorised officer, and any owner, occupier or other person erecting any privy or cesspool without obtaining such permission, or refusing or neglecting to erect a properly constructed privy and cesspool for the use of any dwelling house now or hereafter to be erected, shall on conviction before two or more justices of the peace forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding ten pounds.

MUNICIPALITY OF PRAHRAN.

BYE-LAW No. 40.—A BYE-LAW PROHIBITING THE DISCHARGE OF WATER FROM THE ROOFS OF HOUSES OR OTHER BUILDINGS ON TO OR OVER THE PUBLIC FOOTPATHS AND HIGHWAYS OF THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF PRAHRAN, AND FOR PREVENTING THE ACCUMULATION OF WATER ON ANY PRIVATE PREMISES SO AS TO OVERFLOW OR OTHERWISE DAMAGE THE SAID PUBLIC FOOTPATHS AND HIGHWAYS.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, "An Act for the Establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," it is amongst other things enacted that the Council of any municipal district established under the provisions of the said Act shall have the care and management of the roads, public streets, paths, &c., lying within such municipal district, and that it shall be competent for the Council of any municipal district to make such bye-laws for

carrying out these objects as shall to such Council seem fit; And whereas it is expedient to make a bye-law for the better preservation of the public footpaths and highways of the said municipal district of Prahran, and to prohibit damage arising to the same by reason of any water discharged from the roofs of houses or other buildings on to or over any of the footpaths and highways of the district, or by reason of any water being allowed to accumulate on any private premises so as to overflow, undermine or otherwise damage any of the said footpaths and highways, or any of the roads, public streets, thoroughfares, &c., of the said district: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the authority aforesaid, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Officer administering the Government, as required by the provisions of the said Act, that the owner or occupier of any house, building or premises who shall wilfully or negligently cause or suffer any water discharged from the roof or roofs of any such house, building or premises, to pass on to or over any public footpath or highway within the said district, or who shall suffer any water to accumulate upon the premises of such owner or occupier, so as the same shall overflow, undermine or otherwise damage any of the said public footpaths, highways, roads, streets, thoroughfares, &c., of the said district, shall upon conviction thereof before any two or more justices of the peace forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum or penalty not exceeding twenty pounds: And be it further ordered and directed that the owner or occupier of any house, building or other premises within the said district shall, where no other suitable, proper and convenient means exist for carrying off and discharging the water from such house, building or other premises, be at liberty, and such owner or occupier is hereby authorised, required and directed by the said Council to make and maintain such drains or trunks leading through and under the adjoining paths as shall be necessary to discharge the water from such house, building, or premises into the public water tables, channels or gutters, at the expense of such owner or occupier, and under the superintendence of such officer or officers as the said Council may appoint for that purpose, and that all such drains or trunks shall be made and maintained in the form and manner, and of one or other of the materials hereafter described; the drains or trunks shall be of such dimensions as the municipal surveyor shall deem necessary, not being less than four inches nor more than twelve inches diameter in the clear, and may be of cast iron, soundly burnt earthenware, or red or blue gum plank of not less than one inch thick, firmly nailed together, and laid and bedded in clay puddle, the bottom on a level with the bottom of the water table or channel in the street, and rising towards the house or premises equally with the inclination of the path, the length to be from the outside of the kerk of the path to the house or premises, and so far within the latter as to prevent any damage to the path.

BYE-LAW 41.—TO REGULATE THE ERECTION OF SHADES OR AWNINGS OVER OR ACROSS THE PUBLIC FOOTPATHS.

WHEREAS it is expedient to regulate and control the erection of shades or awnings over or across the public footpaths in the fronts of shops, dwelling houses, or other premises within the Municipality of Prahran, so as to prevent such erections becoming public nuisances: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the Council of the Municipal District of Prahran that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Officer administering the Government, pursuant to 18 Victoria No. 15, section 33, that any person or persons who shall erect or cause to be erected any shade or awning over or across any public footpath within the Municipality without having first obtained in writing the consent of the said Municipal Council to such erection, shall, on conviction thereof before two or more of the justices of peace for the said district, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum or penalty not exceeding ten pounds; And be it further ordered and directed by the authority aforesaid, that every such shade or awning, when such consent to the erection of the same shall have been obtained, shall be erected with the upright post or pillars thereof immediately at the outside of the kerb stone or other boundary of the footpath in front of any shop, dwelling house, or other premises to which such shade or awning shall be attached, and that no plate, rafter, or tie of any such shade or awning shall be of a less height above the surface of such path than seven feet in the clear to the under side of such plate, rafter, or tie: And be it further ordered and directed that it shall be lawful for the said Council to direct and require the removal of any shade or awning erected across or over any public footpath of the said Municipality, except the same be in strict accordance with the foregoing directions, whether such shade or awning shall have been erected prior to the date of this bye-law receiving the

assent of His Excellency the Officer administering the Government, or subsequently thereto; and it shall be further lawful for the said Council to give notice to remove any such shade or awning by means of the Surveyor or other officer of such Council to any owner or occupier by whom or for whom such shade or awning shall have been erected, and any such owner or occupier who shall refuse or neglect to remove any such shade or awning within forty-eight hours from the time of such notice of removal being given, shall, on conviction thereof before any two or more of the justices of the peace for the said district, forfeit and pay for every such offence, refusal, or neglect, a sum or penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

#### MUNICIPALITY OF RICHMOND.

BYE-LAW No. 2.—TO PREVENT ACCIDENTS FROM FIRES IN CHIMNEY FLUES, AND TO CAUSE WATER DRAWERS TO GIVE PROMPT AID AT FIRES.

THE occupier of any premises within the Municipality of Richmond, whose chimney flue shall take fire from having become foul, shall forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding forty shillings.

If any such occupier shall plead that his chimney did not take fire from being foul, the proof thereof shall lie with him.

Every water drawer for hire shall keep his cart or dray loaded with water from sunset to sunrise, and on neglect thereof he shall forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding forty shillings.

Every water drawer for hire, when called upon to attend a fire by a policeman or fireman, shall, on neglect or refusal of the same, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding forty shillings.

Every regular or occasional water drawer for hire shall have his designation as such painted in white on black ground or in black on white ground, over his door or other conspicuous part of his dwelling, and on neglect thereof he shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding twenty shillings.

BYE-LAW No. 3.—PROHIBITING DAMAGE TO THE PUBLIC FOOTPATHS AND WATERCOURSES, AND REGULATING THE FORMATION OF PRIVATE DRAINS AND CROSSINGS.

Any person who shall ride or drive any horse or beast, or who shall drive or wheel any carriage, cart, barrow, or other vehicle upon or across any of the public footpaths or watercourses of the Municipal District of Richmond, or who shall in any way cause damage to the said public footpaths or watercourses, or any of them, shall, upon conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding twenty pounds.

Provided that every owner or occupier of any gateway, yard or lane, to which access by horses, beasts, carriages or other vehicles can be obtained only by riding, driving or wheeling upon or across any of the said public footpaths or watercourses, who shall make and maintain such crossing or crossings over the said public footpaths or watercourses or any of them as may be necessary for approach and access to any such private gateway, yard, or lane at the expense of such owner or occupier, and under the superintendence of such officer or such officers as the said Municipal Council may appoint for that purpose, shall be allowed to use such crossing without being liable to the penalty hereinbefore imposed.

The owner or occupier of any building or premises who shall cause or suffer any water to be discharged or to overflow from any such building or premises into or over any public footpath or highway within the said district shall, upon conviction thereof before any two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum or penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

Provided that if such owner or occupier shall make and maintain such drains leading through and under the adjoining path as shall be necessary to discharge the water from such building or premises into the public water tables, channels, or gutters, at the expense of such owner or occupier, and under the superintendence of such officer or officers as the said Council may appoint for that purpose, he shall not be liable to the penalty hereinbefore imposed.
