MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF BELFAST.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Major-General MACARTHUR, the Senior Military Officer in Command of Her Majesty's Land Forces in the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the Colony of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, "*An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*," it is amongst other things enacted, that any district of the Colony of Victoria, the area whereof shall not exceed nine square miles, and which shall contain a population of householders not less than three hundred, may, subject to the provisions of the said Act, be constituted a Municipal District as thereinafter mentioned, provided that no one point in any such area shall be distant more than six miles from any other point; and it is further enacted that it shall be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, on the receipt of a petition signed by not less than one hundred and fifty householders resident within any such district, praying that such district may be declared a Municipal District under the said Act, to cause the substance and prayer of such petition to be published in the *Government Gazette*, and (if no counter petition, signed by an equal or greater number of householders resident within such locality, shall have been delivered at the Office of the Colonial Secretary within one month from the date of such publication) the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice aforesaid, may, if he think fit, declare by Proclamation such locality a Municipal District by a name to be mentioned in such Proclamation, and also by the same or any other Proclamation may define the limits and boundaries of such Municipal District, and such limits and boundaries at any time thereafter in the same manner on receipt of a similar petition may vary and alter, but so as in no case, save as thereinafter mentioned, to include within the limits or boundaries of such municipal district an area of more than nine square miles, and upon the publication of any such Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, such locality so defined shall be deemed and taken to be a Municipal District within the meaning of the said Act; And whereas a petition has been presented to the Senior Military Officer and Officer administering the Government by the householders resident within the town of Belfast, in the county of Villiers, the substance and prayer of which petition have been published as directed by the said Act, but no counter petition has been delivered in opposition thereto within the time allowed by law: Now therefore I, the Senior Military Officer and Officer administering the Government of the said Colony, do by this my proclamation, in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act, with the advice of the Executive Council, declare that the district hereinafter described and named shall be a Municipal District within the meaning of the said Act, that is to say:—Commencing at a point on the sea coast, being the south-eastern angle of section VII., parish of Belfast, thence by a line bearing north seven degrees fifty-two minutes west, being the eastern boundary of sections VII., VIII., IX and X., to the southern boundary of section XXIV. in the parish aforesaid; thence by a line easterly, being the southern boundary of sections XXIV., XXV., XXVI. and XXVII., to the River Moyne; thence by the western side of the River Moyne to the Belfast Lough; thence by a line south-easterly, crossing the said Lough to the northern angle of suburban portion 38 A, in the said parish of Belfast; thence by the north-eastern boundary of the said portion to the sea coast; and thence by the sea coast to the commencing point aforesaid, including the islands at the mouth of the River Moyne.

And I do hereby, with the advice aforesaid, direct that the Council of the said Municipal District shall be called by the name and style of "The Municipal Council of Belfast."

PUBLIC HEALTH ACT EXTENDED TO SANDHURST.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Major-General MACARTHUR, the Senior Military Officer in Command of Her Majesty's Land Forces in the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed by the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the Colony of Victoria, in the eighteenth year of Her present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "*An Act for promoting the Public Health in populous places in the Colony of Victoria*," it was amongst other things enacted that the said Act, or any clause or section thereof, should apply to such city, town, district, or place in Victoria as the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, might by Proclamation see fit to direct: Now therefore I, the Senior Military Officer and Officer administering the Government of the said Colony, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation, in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act, declare and appoint that the said Act shall apply to, and be in force in, the Municipal District of Sandhurst, the boundaries whereof are set forth and defined in a Proclamation bearing date the twenty-third day of April, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this seventh day of July, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, and in the twentieth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

MUNICIPALITY OF SANDHURST

BYE-LAW, No. 7.—A BYE-LAW FOR THE APPROPRIATION OF THE SUM OF £7500 GRANTED OUT OF THE PUBLIC REVENUE FOR THE YEAR 1856 TO THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF SANDHURST.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council, 18th Victoria, No. 15, intituled, "*An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*," it is amongst other things enacted, "That every work proposed to be executed by any Municipal Council by funds raised by aid from the Government, whether by endowment or otherwise, shall be the subject of a distinct and separate Bye-Law:" And whereas by the Act of Council, 19th Victoria, No. 17, being the Act for the appropriation of the Revenue for 1856, the sum of £7500 is granted to the Municipal Council of Sandhurst, subject to the conditions of the first recited Act: Be it therefore enacted by the Council of the Municipal

District of Sandhurst, that the said sum of £7500 shall be expended in the forming, improving, and repairing the streets in Sandhurst.

The foregoing Bye-Law, No. 7, made by the Municipal Council of Sandhurst, has been assented to by His Excellency the Officer administering the Government.

ORDER IN COUNCIL UNDER THE IMPERIAL PASSENGERS ACT OF 1855.*

THE Order in Council appended hereto, prescribing certain regulations for preserving order, for promoting health, and for securing cleanliness and ventilation on board of Passenger Ships proceeding from the United Kingdom to any place in Her Majesty's possessions abroad, is published for general information.

PRESENT:

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the "*Passengers Act, 1855*," it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by any Order in Council, to prescribe such rules and regulations as to Her Majesty may seem fit for preserving order, promoting health, and securing cleanliness and ventilation on board of passenger ships proceeding from the United Kingdom to any port or place in Her Majesty's possessions abroad, and the said rules and regulations from time to time in like manner to alter, amend, and revoke, as occasion may require:

And whereas it is expedient to revoke an Order in Council made at a Court held at Windsor, on the sixteenth day of October, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, in virtue of the provisions of the "*Passengers Act, 1852*" (now repealed), and to make a new Order in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty doth, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and in pursuance and exercise of the authority vested in her by the said "*Passengers Act, 1855*," order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Order in Council of the sixteenth day of October, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, be, and the same is hereby revoked; and that the following shall henceforth be the rules for preserving order, for promoting health, and for securing cleanliness and ventilation, to be observed on board of every passenger ship proceeding from the United Kingdom to any port or place in Her Majesty's possessions abroad out of Europe, and not being within the Mediterranean Sea.

1. All passengers who shall not be prevented by sickness or other sufficient cause, to be determined by the surgeon, or in ships carrying no surgeon, by the master, shall rise not later than seven o'clock a.m., at which hour the fires shall be lighted.
2. It shall be the duty of the cook or cooks, appointed under the thirty-ninth section of the said "*Passengers Act, 1855*," to light the fires, and to take care that they be kept alight during the day; and also to take care that each passenger or family of passengers shall have the use of the fireplace at proper hours, in an order to be fixed by the master.
3. When the passengers are dressed, their beds shall be rolled up.
4. The decks, including the space under the bottom of the berths, shall be swept before breakfast, and all dirt thrown overboard.
5. The breakfast hour shall be from eight to nine o'clock a.m. Before the commencement of breakfast, all the emigrants, except as hereinbefore excepted, are to be out of bed and dressed, and the beds rolled up, and the deck on which the emigrants live properly swept.
6. The deck shall further be swept after every meal, and after breakfast is concluded shall be also dry holystoned or scraped. This duty, as well as that of cleaning the ladders, hospitals, and round houses, shall be performed by a party who shall be taken in rotation from the adult males above fourteen, in the proportion of five to every one hundred emigrants, and shall be considered as sweepers for the day. But the single women shall perform this duty in their own compartment, where a separate compartment is allotted to them, and the occupant of each berth shall see that his own berth is well brushed out.
7. Dinner shall commence at one o'clock p.m. and supper at six p.m.

8. The fires shall be extinguished at seven p.m., unless otherwise directed by the master or required for the use of the sick; and the emigrants shall be in their berths at ten o'clock p.m., except under the permission or authority of the surgeon, or, if there be no surgeon, of the master.
9. On each passenger deck there shall be lit at dusk and kept burning till daylight three safety lamps, and such further number as shall allow one to be placed at each of the hatchways used by passengers.
10. No naked light shall be allowed between decks or in the hold, at any time or on any account.
11. The scuttles and stern ports, if any, shall, weather permitting, be opened at seven o'clock a.m. and kept open till ten o'clock p.m.; and the hatches shall be kept open whenever the weather permits.
12. The coppers and cooking utensils shall be cleaned every day, and the cisterns kept filled with water.
13. The beds shall be well shaken and aired on deck, weather permitting, at least twice a week.
14. The bottom boards of the berths, if not fixtures, shall be removed and dry-scrubbed, and, weather permitting, taken on deck, at least twice a week.
15. Two days in the week shall be appointed by the master as washing days; but no washing or drying of clothes shall on any account be permitted between decks.
16. On Sunday mornings the passengers shall be mustered at ten o'clock a.m., and will be expected to appear in clean and decent apparel. The Lord's Day shall be observed as religiously as circumstances will admit.
17. No spirits or gunpowder shall be taken on board by any passenger, and if either of those articles be discovered in the possession of a passenger, it shall be taken into the custody of the master during the voyage, and not returned to the passenger until he has landed or is on the point of landing.
18. No loose hay or straw shall be allowed below for any purpose.
19. No smoking shall be allowed between decks.
20. All gambling, fighting, riotous, disorderly or quarrelsome conduct, swearing, and violent or indecent language, are strictly prohibited.
21. Fire-arms, swords, and other offensive weapons shall, as soon as the passengers embark, be placed in the custody of the master.
22. No sailors shall be allowed to remain on the passenger deck among the passengers, except on duty.
23. No passenger shall go to the ship's cookhouse without special permission from the master, nor remain in the fore-castle among the sailors on any account.
24. In vessels not expressly required by the said "*Passengers Act, 1855*," to have on board such ventilating apparatus as therein mentioned, such other provision shall be made for ventilation as shall be required by the Emigration Officer at the port of embarkation, or, in his absence, by the officers of Customs.
25. And to prevent all doubts in the construction of this Order in Council, it is hereby further ordered, that the terms "United Kingdom," "Passenger," "Passenger Ship," "Passenger Deck," and "Master," shall herein have the same significations as are assigned to them respectively in the said "*Passengers Act, 1855*."

And the Right Honorable Henry Labouchere, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

THE following report on Pollock Reef is published for general information.

POLLOCK REEF.

THE above dangerous Reef was seen by me whilst on a voyage from Adelaide to Swan River, in the brigantine *Robert Clive*, on 21st April, 1856; and by favourable observations was found to lie 14 miles in direction south half east (magnetic) from the nearest part of the South-east Isles of the Recherche Archipelago.

This position on Flinder's Chart will be in lat. 34° 35' south, longitude 123° 28½' east.

Passing 3½ miles southward of the Reef at 10½ hours a.m., the weather being fine, and a long swell rolling in from the S.W., the shoal water was observed from aloft to extend about one mile in an east and west direction, and to be 200 yards in width, but breakers extended over only one-third of that space, in probably 2 or 3 fathoms water; the shoalest part was near the centre, where the sea broke abruptly against a small rock, which had apparently not more than 6 or 8 feet water on it.

As this Reef lies in the direct track of vessels rounding the South-east Isles, and is entirely under water, it is dangerous to approach in the night or in thick weather, for the soundings are deep close up to it, and give no warning of its vicinity.

The third South-east Isle mentioned in the note upon Flinder's Chart does not exist.

EAST COLLINGWOOD MUNICIPALITY.

THE first Half-yearly Report of the Municipal Council of East Collingwood, made pursuant to the provisions of the Municipal Institutions Act, 18 Victoria, No. 15, section 43.—Adopted by Council, 6th May, 1856.

FORMATION OF MUNICIPALITY.

The District of East Collingwood was duly constituted a municipality by Proclamation to that effect, by His late Excellency Sir Charles Hotham, and a public meeting of the resident householders and of the landowners within the said district was convened on the 9th of October, 1855, for the purposes prescribed in the Municipal Institutions Act. His late Excellency appointed John Pascoe Fawkner, Esq., M.L.C., to preside at such meeting.

The meeting elected Messrs. Thomas Hood and Richard Samuel Norton to act as Assessors, decided that the Council should consist of seven members who should not receive pecuniary remuneration, and elected by voting cards the following resident ratepayers members of the said Council, namely:—Messrs. Samuel Turner, Francis Murphy, M.L.C., William Coleman, John Owen, John Myers, Alexander Carnie, and Charles Curtis.

At the first meeting of the Council, held on the 12th October, 1855, councillor John Owen, Chairman for the time being, Francis Murphy, Esq., M.L.C., was elected Chairman, and on motion to that effect councillor Curtis, who complied therewith, was requested to act as Honorary Secretary.

The Council occupied for a short time a room in Smith-street, but afterwards accepted the liberal offer of Major Hodgson to have the gratuitous use, for one year, from 24th November, 1855, of the commodious rooms now in their possession, as a Council Chamber and Police Court.

BOUNDARIES OF MUNICIPALITY.

The boundaries of the municipality, when first proclaimed on the 23rd April, 1855, were comprised within the limits of Victoria-parade, the Yarra River, Smith-street and Reilly-street; but the inhabitants declining the responsibility and expense of municipal government with so small an area, the boundaries were enlarged by His late Excellency Sir Charles Hotham, so as to include therein the additional area extending to the south side of Heidelberg Road.

The enlarged boundaries, as proclaimed 14th September, 1855, are the north-east corner of Smith-street, along the northern side of Victoria-parade and Victoria-street to the west bank of the Yarra Yarra River; thence on the western bank thereof to its junction with the Merri Creek, and along the north-western bank thereof to the southern side of the Heidelberg-road; thence on the western side of Smith-street to north-western corner of the intersection of Reilly-street by Smith-street, thence on the eastern side of Smith-street to its junction at Victoria-parade.

A subsequent application has been addressed to his Excellency for a further extension, so as to include the Studley Park Reserve. To this application no definite reply has as yet been received, but the Council have every hope that their application will be favourably entertained by Her Majesty's Government.

The provisions of the following Acts of the Legislative Council, excepting No. 8, not so required, were extended by proclamation to the municipality at the dates specified:—

The Dog Act, 6 William IV., No. 4, 17th September, 1855.*

The Common Lodging Houses Act, 18 Victoria, No. 8, 1855.

The Management of Towns Act, 18 Victoria, No. 14. Sections 5 to 9, 28th December, 1854; and section 10, 3rd November, 1853.*

The Health of Towns Act, 18 Victoria, No. 13, 27th December, 1855.

ORGANISATION.

The Council accepted the tender of Mr. George Avery Fletcher, for the valuation of all the property in the municipality for assessment, which valuation was completed within two months. The result was 3500 assessments, of the aggregate annual value of £61,695 8s. Mr. Fletcher also completed, by order of Council, an enlarged plan of the municipality, with every property numbered thereon, to correspond with the number and description thereof in the valuator's book he prepared.

The following officers were appointed at the dates affixed to their respective names:—

Town Clerk, Mr. J. J. Moody, 9th November, 1855.

Honorary Solicitor (on his offer to perform the legal business of the Council gratuitously for one year), H. G. Freame, Esq., 9th November, 1855.

Rate Collector, Inspector, and Health Inspector, Mr. John Petherick, 17th January, 1856.

Surveyor (conditionally), Mr. Lloyd Tayler, 22nd April, 1856.

A Court of Petty Sessions was established on the 2nd November, 1855, and Mr. John Barlow was appointed Clerk of the Bench, November, 1855.

The Council passed a bye-law for regulating their proceedings by standing orders, which was sanctioned by the Acting Governor, on 11th January, 1856.

Also bye-laws now under consideration of His Excellency, for the licensing of porters, carters, water drawers, builders, butchers, and nightmen, and the registration of common lodging houses, bowling alleys, skittle ground keepers, and public ball rooms; and also for the preventing and extinguishing of fires, &c.

Bye-laws for the conducting of municipal public meetings, elections, the determining the validity of disputed elections, &c., are prepared and now under consideration.

Bye-laws for the licensing abattoirs were not sanctioned by His Excellency. The Council also appointed the following permanent committees, with a prescribed summary of duties to each, namely:—

Finance and Rate.
Public Works.
Markets.
Health, public park, library, and museum.
Legislative.
Licensing and registration.

APPLICATIONS TO GOVERNMENT, AND THEIR RESULT.

The Council have memorialised His Excellency the Governor on important public questions affecting the interests of the municipality, and have maintained an active correspondence with, and sent several deputations to the various governmental departments, with the following results:—

Applications.

For engraved Plan of Melbourne and boundaries—granted.
Court of Petty Sessions—granted.
Additional police force—granted.
Extension of temporary water supply to municipality—stand in Smith-street.

Plans and estimates of cost of draining municipality—granted.
Temporary services of officers to prepare plans and estimates of the cost of draining municipality, and of forming, metalling, and maintaining streets—Mr. Inspector Harris, Mr. District Surveyor Hodgkinson.

Grant of £20,000 to municipality—£5000 granted.
Quarry Reserve—seven acres granted.
City Quarry Reserve in municipality, no objection, but the City Council declined—to be given thereto, and the city to have an equivalent grant elsewhere.

Additional magistrates—under consideration.
Studley Park Reserve—under consideration.
Resident Deputy Registrar of Births, Deaths and Marriages—offered attendance of present Deputy in municipality on stated days.

Branch Post Office—declined.
Police Court and Lock-up—granted, and half cost of site advanced.

County Court with £10 jurisdiction—declined.
To fix boundary posts—granted.
To exempt councillors from serving on juries—declined.
Copies of certain Acts of Council, *Government Gazette*, and printed scientific and other reports for nuclei of a municipal library—partially complied with.

To lay out line of road from Johnston-street to the Fleming-ton-road; to lay out line of road from Hoddle-street to the Merri Creek bridge, Plenty-road—under consideration, but a favorable response anticipated.

Use of unsold lands in municipality for depasturing purposes—promised in a prescribed mode on termination of present tenure.
To exempt from municipal taxation all the schools and places of worship in the municipality—granted.

A grant of £500 towards a Mechanics' Institute—declined by Government, but granted by Legislative Council.

For a bridge at the foot of Johnston-street over the Yarra—granted by the Legislative Council.

Application to the Gas Company for the introduction of gas into the municipality—not able to comply therewith.

PUBLIC WORKS COMPLETED, IN PROGRESS, AND PROJECTED.

Completed.

Portable engine house, repairs of Hodgsons-road bridge, metalling streets and labour.

In Progress.

Formation and metalling of Peel and Hoddle-streets, from Johnston-street to Reilly-street.

Formation and metalling of Derby, Stanley, Otter and Perry-streets. Ordered to be so done when Council are in receipt of sufficient funds.

Projected.

A drain of large capacity on the north side of Reilly-street to the Yarra Yarra River, from the plans of the Government District Surveyor, C. Hodgkinson, Esq., C.E., the City Surveyor, M. P. Smith, Esq., C.E., at the joint expense of the Council, the City Council, and, it is hoped, the Government.

The drain will carry off the greater portion of the storm water from the Government land on the north-east part of the municipality, &c., and that from nearly the whole of Fitz Roy Ward. An additional drain to carry off the storm water of the intersecting streets with Smith and Wellington-streets, is part of the systematic plan of drainage adopted by the Council.

The Council appointed Mr. C. Hodgkinson their consulting engineer, in reference to the drain. They deem it their duty gratefully to acknowledge the invaluable services rendered by that gentleman to the municipality. Upwards of forty plans of streets, &c., have been completed under his direction, and he is also engaged in the preparation of an elaborate map of the whole district, with drainage contour lines, every building shewn, and the material of which it consists distinguished, with a mass of other valuable information thereon.

A site in Johnston-street, near Smith-street, for the erection thereon of a Court House, Lock-up and Town Hall.

* Those to the district or country within five miles of the city boundaries.

The site comprises a frontage to Johnston-street and Perry-streets respectively of 100 feet, and a uniform depth of 270 feet, with ten cottages thereupon. One-half of the cost, £750, to be paid by the Government, who will, at their expense also erect court house and lock-up. The other half of the cost to be paid by the Council, out of the grant of £5000 to the municipality.

A site for a market at the corner of Wellington and Vere-streets has been conditionally selected by the Council, further proceedings thereon pending, until the return of the owner to town.

SANATORY CONDITION OF THE MUNICIPALITY.

The deep interest manifested by the Council from their election to the present time, in the sanitary importance of draining the whole of the municipality (which necessity is illustrated by the recent floods), will be apparent on a reference to their minutes, and to their correspondence with the Government, of which the following are indications:—

The Government drainage plans, with contour lines; the elaborate map of the municipality, by Mr. Hodgkinson (previously alluded to); the able report on the drainage and on the cost of forming and maintaining the streets of the municipality, by Mr. Inspector Harris, of the Central Road Board, &c.

The Health Inspector has been enjoined to cause the removal of every nuisance tending to impair the health of the rate-payers.

An important document from the Central Board of Health, on sanitary requirements and duties, is referred to the Health Committee; and the propriety of appointing one of the medical applicants as health officer (one offering his professional services gratuitously) is under consideration of Council.

PROPERTY OF THE MUNICIPALITY.

The Council have acquired, or been instrumental in obtaining for the municipality, the undermentioned property, with a conditional exception, the increase of which may be anticipated:—

Portable engine house.

Furniture of Council Chamber, including Government Map of Melbourne and suburbs.

Enlarged plan of municipality.

Blue Stone Quarry Reserve, comprising seven acres.

Site of, and Court House and Lock-up, to be erected at the expense of Government, with ample space for Town Hall.

Anticipated extension of municipal boundaries so as to include Studley Park.

Grant of £5000 to municipality.

Grant of £500 for a Mechanics' Institute, contingent upon a similar sum being raised by private subscription.

Granted for the erection of a Bridge at the foot of Johnston-street over the Yarra Yarra River.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The Council procured a Corporate Seal, which was approved by the Governor.

Francis Murphy, Esq., resigned his offices as Chairman and Member of Council on the 11th March, and Alexander Carnie, Esq., was elected Chairman of Council on the 18th, and sworn in as a Magistrate of the District, at the Supreme Court, before His Honor the Chief Justice, on the 29th March, 1856.

A unanimous vote of thanks of Council to F. Murphy, Esq., for his services as Chairman, was passed on the 18th March, and an engrossed copy of the same presented to him at a Council meeting on the 22nd April, 1856.

Mr. William Finlay was, after the holding a poll, elected, on the 14th instant, a municipal councillor, in the place of Francis Murphy, Esq.

The List of Ratepayers, which had been settled and revised after several adjournments (terminating on the 9th instant) of the Municipal Court of Revision, was used as the electoral roll in the scrutiny of votes objected to at the said election.

The Council have ordered the printing of the Ratepayers' Roll, and by public notice have invited qualified persons, whose names are not thereon, to present their claims to be inserted.

FINANCE.

A rate of one shilling in the pound, moieties thereof due in advance the 1st of January last and the 1st of July ensuing, was struck by Council, and on the 22nd January, 1856, sanctioned by His Excellency the Governor.

Two Courts of Appeal against the valuation assessments were held by the magistrates at the Petty Sessions, respectively on the 19th of February and 7th of March last, but the appeals were few in number, and the amount of the reduction of the assessments was very small.

The Council were indebted to the late Chairman for the advance of moneys to pay their current liabilities, and it was not until the 27th February last that they received the first proceeds from the rate levied. The total amount of rates paid into the Collingwood branch of the English, Scottish, and Australian Chartered Bank, by the rate collector, from that date to the 12th April instant, inclusive, is £482 4s.
