POLLING PLACES FOR THE ELECTORAL PROVINCES.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Major-General MACARTHUR, the Senior Military Officer in Command of Her Majesty's Land Forces in the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

IN pursuance of an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of the Colony of Victoria, passed in the nineteenth year of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled, "*An Act to provide for the Election of Members to serve in the Legislative Council and the Legislative Assembly of Victoria respectively*:" I, Major-General MACARTHUR, the Senior Military Officer and Officer administering the Government of the said Colony, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation appoint that St. Paul's shall be the place for nomination of candidates for the Central Province, and that Brighton shall be the place for nomination of candidates for the South Province, and that North Geelong shall be the place for nomination of candidates for the South-western Province, and that Portland shall be the place for nomination of candidates for the Western Province, and that Kyneton shall be the place for nomination of candidates for the North-western Province, and that Seymour shall be the place for nomination of candidates for the Eastern Province; And with the advice aforesaid I do hereby appoint that the several places mentioned in the last column of the Schedule hereunto annexed shall be respectively polling places for the purpose of taking the poll at any contested election for the province within the limits whereof such places are respectively situate, and that all votes in respect of qualifications within the boundaries and limits mentioned in the second column of the same Schedule shall be taken at any election for such provinces respectively at the polling place, or polling places, set opposite thereto, in the said last column, that is to say:—

The Municipal District of Sandhurst having been created, and its boundaries fixed by a proclamation of His Excellency Sir Charles Hotham, K.C.B., Governor of the Colony of Victoria, bearing date the 23rd day of April, 1855, and made in pursuance of the provisions of the 18th Victoria, No. 15, on the 10th day of January, 1856, James Forrester Sullivan, Edward Nucella Emmett, John Harney, Shadrach Jones, Robert Bell, William Vazie Simons and George Washington Haycock, were duly elected as members of the first Municipal Council, and on the 14th day of the same month Councillor E. N. Emmett was chosen Chairman of the Council.

1. The attention of the Council was first directed to a proper organization of their own proceedings, the appointment of officers, the preparing a careful and legal assessment of all rateable property, forming a rate-payer's roll or list of municipal voters, and obtaining suitable premises for their meetings and offices; the last was effected by purchasing the buildings now occupied by them, with the weighbridge, the income from which it was thought would produce a good interest for the money invested in the whole.

2. The assessment numbers 1532 properties, and shows a total rateable value of £99,021, exclusive of the numerous tenements on Crown Lands occupied as dwellings under a Miner's Right, and which the Council were under the impression they should not include, though it would appear from an opinion recently given by the Crown lawyers elsewhere, that where these dwellings possess a degree of permanency they are rateable.

Its correctness and fairness may be judged by the fact that only two notices of appeal have been sent in.

On the 4th of April a rate of 6d. in the pound was struck, and is now in course of collection.

3. A grant in aid amounting to £7,500 (seven thousand five hundred pounds) was voted from the general revenue.

After some delay and correspondence a moiety of the amount was paid to the Council about the 3rd of June, but from the restrictions placed by the Act, against which strong remonstrances have been sent, the Council has scarcely yet the power to expend the money.

4. The uncertainty as to the amount of funds that would be at their disposal, pending the question of the Government grant-in-aid, prevented the Council from undertaking works during the first three months of their existence, and since the grant was made the weather has been such as to preclude outdoor works being so generally undertaken as they otherwise would have been.

5. In giving priority to the improvements completed and in progress the Council have been governed by a wish to afford facilities and improve, in the first instance, where the traffic and population are the greatest.

6. The holes were filled up in Market-square, as one of the first works, because as many months must elapse after filling before an unyielding surface could be obtained, doing the work there would make the square so much sooner available for use, and presentable in appearance.

The works completed, and in progress, are the following:—

7. The removal of the stumps, and filling holes in Pall Mall, Market Square, Mundy-street, Bull-street, Williamson-street, and Mitchell-street.

8. The removal of the stumps from View Place, Forest-street, Short-street, Wattle-street, and parts of Mackenzie-street, Rowan-street and Barnard-street, and the formation of a roadway over honeycombed ground in Forest-street. It must here be remarked that the much-used thoroughfare to Eaglehawk, &c., and the vicinity of the hospital, church, and Wesleyan chapel are comprised in this improvement.

9. The cutting a water-channel across three detrimental bends of the creek below Harney's Bridge, and removal of a heavy dam, and other obstructions.

The Council are of opinion that, by the action of the water, with a little extraneous aid, the cutting will soon become a new creek for that distance, deeper, with better fall, and far less liability to fill up than the old circuitous channel which it has relieved.

10. The removal of the stumps, filling holes, and making crossings over water-courses in the main street at the White Hills Hamlet.

11. The forming a drain the whole length of Hargraves-street, to intercept the storm-water from the whole of that hill-side, and carry it towards the creek below Harney's Bridge, so as, in time of flood, to form one item of relief to the creek at that point so overcharged. The drain also prevents the water spreading over the surface of Hargraves-street, the cross streets, and back of Pall Mall allotments, and can afterwards be made available in the proper formation of the street.

12. The forming crossings for foot passengers in High-street, Bridge-street, McCrae-street, Mundy-street, to the Post Office and to Harney's Bridge.

13. The repairing and making good the fence of the old Cemetery behind Bridge-street, the repairing Pike's Bridge and its approaches, filling in dangerous holes and watercourses in various places requiring immediate remedy, and the removal of the mud, as it will be created, from the three bridges in the heart of the town.

Steps have been taken to provide a first class fire engine and apparatus.

14. The state of the main road, and other roads in the district, under the control of the Central Road Board, have, from the first, had the best attention of the Council. The first application was made to the Board early in February, and up to the present time there has been a continuance of letters, remonstrances, and interviews with its officers. The Board is now making passable the Murray Road, and has offered, on condition that the Council afterwards preserve it from damage from the puddlers, permanently to raise and make good the low portions, and is also about to lay out a sum in improving parts of View Place, Rowan, and Forest-streets, which form a portion of the Mount Korong Road.

15. The danger of flood and other inconveniences arising from the filled up state of the creek, and the prevention of its being still further filled up, have never been lost sight of. The Council had a careful report made of all the obstructions in the creek, of the state of its banks and other details, and remedial suggestions offered, and has had much correspondence with the Road Board and Government authorities, with a view of making a permanent and effectual improvement. It is evident that it would be too costly a work for the Council to undertake, with the funds at their command without other assistance. The Road Board have now undertaken to take a series of levels

throughout the valley, with a view of finding the places most advantageous for cutting new channels, and when this is done the Council is of opinion that they shall be able to accomplish the desired result. The great difficulty to be overcome is preventing future obstructions from the puddling mills without damaging a portion of one staple industry of the district, and the two things appear all but incompatible; yet it is evident that the main drain of the town when once made effective, must not again be suffered to lapse to its present condition; it must be preserved uninjured, though the Council will endeavor to interfere with the puddling interest as little as possible.

16. The Council has made many applications to Government in furtherance of the interests of the Municipality, with various results.

The following applications have been acceded to:—

Appointing a police force for the Municipality, and stationing the men on beats.

The grant in aid.

To exempt from assessment places of public worship and public schools.

To supply the *Government Gazette*.

The extension of the Dog Act.

For manure depôts

Laying out the footpaths and defining by posts.

To refuse an application for grant of a portion of the reserve to private individuals for a Dispensary.

The Bald Hill as a source of supply for gravel and earth.

The extension of all clauses of Management of Towns Act to the whole Municipality.

The grant of Back Creek Cemetery.

The following are under consideration or the answers delayed:—

The formation of a Municipal Court of Petty Sessions.

Improvement of Creek.

For a share of Court House money.

A set of standard weights and measures.

The formation of the district into a county, and making Sandhurst a county town.

Plans and sections for the intended line of railway to the Murray, especially particularizing its connection with Sandhurst.

To erect a powder magazine.

To limit the threatened removal of Crown tenants to only half-a-mile from boundary.

To remove Junction Camp into White Hills Hamlet.

Branch post-offices at White Hills Hamlet and Golden square.

For payment to Council of deposits made and forfeited by diggers before sinking holes in streets.

A portion of the labor of prisoners in Sandhurst Goal.

The control of the White Hills Cemetery.

The establishment of a pound.

The following are refused, or Government unable to grant:—

Application for unsold lands, made 15th February, 1856.

17. The following by-laws have been passed, only two have yet received the assent of the Governor. It has been withheld in all cases either on insufficient or technical grounds. The Council has strongly remonstrated against such withholding, believing they have only enacted what was required, and what their Act empowered them to do. As the Government have waived the principal objections, and the Council will of course remedy the technical defects, it is expected that the whole will soon be assented to.

February 22. No. 1. By-law to regulate by means of standing orders the proceedings of the Municipal Corporation of Sandhurst.

May 13. No. 2. By-law for regulating and licensing public vehicles, public carriages, and water-drawers, and nightmen.

May 27. No. 3. By-law for regulating and licensing persons to slaughter certain animals within the Municipality of Sandhurst under certain restrictions.

May 21. No. 4. By-law for regulating the driving of unbroken horses and cattle through the Municipal district of Sandhurst.

June 3. No. 5. By-law to provide for compelling residents to keep their premises free from offensive and unwholesome matters, the restraining noisome and offensive trades, and the preservation of the public health.

June 24. No. 6. A by-law for regulating the formation of crossings for wheel vehicles over footpath and water-channels.

June 24. No. 7. By-law for the appropriation of the sum of £7500 (seven thousand five hundred pounds) granted out of the public revenue for the year 1856 to the Municipal District of Sandhurst.

July 8. No. 8. By-law for the prevention of fires.

18. The boundary of the Municipality was perambulated on the 14th of April, by the Council, the Resident Warden, District Surveyor, Superintendent of Police, &c., and has since been marked by boundary posts at all the angles.

19. Amongst other things that have had much consideration from the Council may be named the plan of street formation, the taking detailed levels of all the Municipality, with the view of fixing and having marked the permanent levels, and the endowment of the Municipality with all or a portion of the unsold Crown Lands. The latter demand the Council early initiated, and has since proposed a general united demand from all the municipalities. With a view of agreeing on the best course to be pursued in this matter, a act of amending the No. 96.—August 8th, 1856.—8.

Municipal Act, and promoting the advantages of municipalities generally, representatives of the several Councils will shortly meet in Melbourne to confer and agree on a plan of action.

20. During the six months of course many minor subjects have been discussed, and working details carried out, to enumerate which would unnecessarily prolong this report.

Two incidents deserve special mention. In March an attempt was made to force the maintenance of destitute individuals on the Municipality; a patient, discharged from the hospital, being brought personally to the Council room. This was strongly and successfully opposed by the Council, in justice to the rate-payers, who had not consented to tax themselves for that purpose. The Act empowers the Council to take such measures as they think fit for the maintenance of the sick and destitute, but does not compel them.

In April £300, as a grant in aid, was voted to the Sandhurst Fire Brigade, but the amount was not paid in consequence of the Council's solicitor stating that it was illegal.

21. One change has occurred in the Council during the period. On the 21st May, Councillor Jones resigned, and on the 17th June, William T. B. J. Harris was elected by polled votes to the vacant seat.
