## SPIRIT MERCHANTS.

THE attention of wine and spirit merchants is called to the fifth clause of the Act 20 Victoria No. 4, by which the meaning of "spirit merchant" is defined as being "any vendor of duty-paid spirituous liquors, or of duty-paid wine, or of fermented malt liquors, in quantities respectively not less than two gallons."

All persons to whom the notice applies are hereby cautioned that unless they forthwith register themselves as spirit merchants, and pay the fee as required by the above recited Act, they will be proceeded against as the law directs.

## BREWERS' LICENSES.

ALL persons, vendors of duty-paid wine or of fermented malt liquors in quantities respectively not less than two gallons, who have taken out "Brewers'" licenses under the impression that the "Spirit Merchant's" license was not requisite for their carrying on the trade in question, are hereby cautioned against their error, and are informed that they are liable to the penalties of the Act for selling such wine, &c., without taking out a license as a spirit merchant.

## MUNICIPALITY OF BEECHWORTH.

BYE-LAW No. 15.—FOR REGULATING BUILDING OPERATIONS AND LICENSING BUILDERS WITHIN THIS MUNICIPALITY.

WHEREAS the safety and convenience of the inhabitants of this municipality are greatly interfered with by the manner in which building operations are at present conducted: Be it and it is hereby enacted by the municipal council of Beechworth, That from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor of this colony, all builders and others erecting buildings of any kind soever within this municipality shall conform to and be bound by the following conditions, namely:—

1. No builder or other person shall commence either erecting or pulling down any building whatever, nor placing materials intended for or coming from any building, in or abutting on any roadway or pathway in any street, road, lane, right-of-way or other public thoroughfare within the Beechworth municipality, without having previously obtained from the town clerk a license so to do, in the form appended to this bye-law, authorising the grantee to deposit such building materials.

2. The license shall be charged five shillings, which sum shall be paid to the town clerk towards the council's general fund before the license is issued.

3. The license may be renewed on application to the town clerk, each renewal to be considered and paid for as a new license.

4. Any person altering his license, or refusing to shew it when required so to do by any of the council's officers, shall be considered and be liable to the same penalty as an unlicensed person.

5. Any person depositing building materials without holding a license for the purpose, or any holder of a license exceeding the powers granted thereby, or not conforming to the conditions and regulations of this bye-law, shall, upon conviction thereof before any two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding twenty pounds: and any person whatever failing to remove any building materials, scaffolding, &c., on being requested so to do by any officer of the said municipal council, shall forfeit and pay a sum of twenty shillings daily for each and every day such materials or scaffolding, &c., shall be allowed to remain unremoved.

4. That at the end of the time for which this license is granted, the scaffolding or other materials to be removed, and the thoroughfare, of whatever description, be left in good order.

5. That the provisions, &c., of Bye-law No. 15 (under which this license is issued) be strictly attended to.

## MUNICIPALITY OF BEECHWORTH.

BYE-LAW No. 16.—FOR REGULATING AND LICENSING NIGHTMEN.

WHEREAS the preservation of the public health demands that nightmen be restricted in the carrying out of their business in this municipality: Be it and it is hereby enacted by the municipal council of Beechworth:—

1. That no person shall carry on the business of nightman without having first obtained a license from the town clerk so to do.

2. That every applicant for such a license shall send in to the town clerk the names and residences of two householders in the municipality who are willing to become his sureties; and if they shall be considered sufficient by the chairman, and the applicant himself be approved of by him, and a bond in the

sum of twenty-five pounds shall be jointly and severally entered into by them and the said applicant (to be prepared at such applicant's expense), he shall receive a license from the town clerk, on behalf of the council, in the form hereunto appended.

3. That the fee for such license shall be four pounds per annum, and shall be paid to the town clerk (towards the council's general fund) before the license is issued.

4. That the name and address of the nightman, and the number of his license, together with the words "licensed nightman" shall be legibly painted, in letters not less than one inch in height, in black on a white ground, or in white upon a black ground, in a conspicuous position on the off-side of the cart with which he shall carry on his occupation.

5. That whilst actually employed in removing nightsoil, each cart shall have affixed a light on each side, to be visible both in front and from behind.

6. That no nightman shall ply with his cart before Ten o'clock p.m., nor later than Five a.m., nor have his cart with soil therein within the boundaries of the municipality after the latter hour.

7. That no nightman shall remove nightsoil to any other place than the enclosed municipal manure depot (where a slight hole must be made to receive it), unless to some garden or farm for immediate use as manure.

8. That any person carrying on the business or occupation of a nightman within this municipality without a license, or using another person's license, shall, upon conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

9. That any person altering his license, or refusing to shew it when required so to do, or any person exceeding the power granted by his license, or not conforming to the regulations and conditions of this bye-law, under which the license is framed, shall be deemed an unlicensed person, and be liable to the same penalty.

10. That no nightman shall ply his avocation with any cart that has not first been surveyed and approved of in writing by some officer of the council.

**BYE-LAW No. 10.—FOR THE PREVENTION OF FIRES.**  
**WHEREAS** by the Act of Council 18th Victoria No. 15, intitled, "An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," the council of any municipal district is empowered to make bye-laws for the prevention of fires: And whereas property is greatly endangered by the ignition of soot and other accumulations in chimneys and flues, owing to such chimneys and flues not being kept properly swept and cleansed: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Sandhurst, that the occupier of any premises in the said municipal district, in the chimney or flue of which premises a fire shall occur in consequence of such chimney or flue having been suffered to become foul, shall for every such offence forfeit and pay on conviction before two or more justices of the peace, a penalty not to exceed Ten pounds; and all fires occurring in chimneys and flues shall be taken to have arisen from such chimneys being foul, unless satisfactory proof shall be given of their having been properly swept and cleansed within one calendar month previous to such fire taking place.

## MUNICIPALITY OF WILLIAMSTOWN.

**BYE-LAW No. 23.—FOR AUTHORIZING AND REGULATING THE AFFIXING OF BOARDS OR METAL PLATES IN FRONT OF HOUSES TO DENOTE THE NAMES OF STREETS.**

**WHEREAS** it is expedient and necessary that boards or metal plates, having the names of the respective streets, ways, squares, or lanes, within the municipality of Williamstown, painted or engraved thereon, should be affixed on the corner houses or buildings of the respective streets, ways, squares or lanes, or at the junctions of the same, or on the houses or buildings nearest to the corners or junctions of the said streets, ways, squares, or lanes, for public guidance: Be it therefore ordered and enacted, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, pursuant to 18 Victoria No. 15, sec. 33, &c.:—  
 1st. That it shall be lawful for the council of said municipal district to erect or cause to be erected, if they shall think proper, in front of every house or other building at the corner or junction of every street, way, square, or lane within the said district, or on the nearest house or other building thereunto, boards or metal plates, having the name of the street, way, square, or lane in which such front is situated, or towards which the same faces, painted or engraved thereon in black letters on a white ground, or *vice versa*, such boards or metal plates not to be more than five feet long or seven inches wide.

2nd. That if any person or persons shall interrupt or cause to be interrupted any workman or other person engaged in the erection of any such board or metal plate while so engaged, or shall remove or cause to be removed, after it shall have been erected, any such board or metal plate (except as hereafter excepted), he, she or they shall, on conviction of every such offence before any two or more of the justices for the said district, forfeit and pay a sum or penalty of not exceeding Five pounds.

3rd. Provided nevertheless than in case of any such house or other building being about to be taken down or to undergo such alterations or repairs as to require the removal of any such board or metal plate, the same may be removed by the owner or occupier, or owners or occupiers, of the said house or other building, provided three days' notice of such removal has first been given in writing to the town clerk; and provided, nevertheless, that as soon as the necessity for such removal shall have ceased, the owner or occupier, or owners or occupiers, of such house or buildings, shall cause the said board or plate to be restored or re-erected, otherwise he, she, or they shall, on conviction of any such neglect or refusal as aforesaid, forfeit and pay a sum or penalty of not exceeding Five pounds.

## LOCAL COURT REGULATIONS.

## HEATHCOTE.

**REGULATIONS** made by the Local Court of the district of Heathcote:—

**xxxi. Regulations applicable to wet workings.**—The following regulations, Nos. xxxii., xxxiii. and xxxiv., shall apply only to the wet workings on the McIvor Creek, and other creeks within the McIvor district.

**xxxii. Definition of wet workings.**—Those shall be deemed wet workings that require the co-operation and appliances of a

number or party of miners to overcome water and other natural difficulties consequent upon mining in wet or flooded grounds.

**xxxiii. Names of shareholders to be posted.**—It shall be compulsory upon all companies, on taking possession of their respective claims, to cause a notice or card to be kept constantly posted at one end of the claim, having each shareholder's name in full inscribed thereon, with the number and date of issue of his miner's right, and that otherwise no party or company shall be deemed in the lawful occupancy or possession of such claim.

**xxxiv. Extent of claim in wet workings.**—The extent of claim to which each miner's right shall entitle the holders shall be—

For 4 miners, 50 yards in length by 100 yards in width.

For 6 miners, 75 yards in length by 100 yards in width.

For 8 miners, 100 yards in length by 100 yards in width.

Than which no greater area shall be given.

The regulations Nos. xiv. and xx., of Heathcote Local Court, gazetted on the 16th May, 1856, and 20th January, 1857, are hereby annulled.

**xxi. Lady Amos Lead.**—The size of claims allowed to be taken up, under the frontage system, on the Lady Amos Lead, shall be one hundred and fifty (150) feet in length by one hundred (100) feet in width for ten (10) men.

## LOCAL COURT REGULATIONS.

## HEPBURN.

**REGULATIONS** made by the Local Court of the district of Hephurn:—

**xxvi. Production of miners' rights.**—All parties applying to the local court for grants shall produce the minor's right of each partner, and the names of the whole of the persons to whom the grant is allowed shall be inserted in the same.

**xxvii. Registration of claims.**—Parties unable to work for want of water shall be allowed to register their claims until three days after there is sufficient water to work the same; after that time, the parties not returning to the same, it shall be considered abandoned. The registration to be posted on the claim.

**xxviii. Tunnelling.**—Every hill that exceeds forty-feet in depth, or in which there is rock or cement that requires blasting to contend with in sinking it, shall be considered tunnelling ground, and twelve feet in breadth shall be allowed to each party as a protection for their tunnel.

**xxix. Extent of tunnelling claims.**—In tunnelling, each party shall be allowed a frontage of twenty feet per man, irrespective of depth, until such time as gold in paying quantities shall have been discovered in the tunnel. The side boundary line of each tunnelling claim shall be marked off distinctly by means of two parallel lines or rows of pegs to be fixed in the ground at intervals of twenty yards, or thereabouts. The said side boundaries or parallel lines, and also the tunnel, shall be carried as straight and squarely as possible into the main body of the hill. No party shall sink or drive ahead of any tunnel and between the said parallel lines without the consent of the tunnelling party, until gold shall have been found as herein abovementioned.

The size and extent of claims for tunnelling shall be—

For one miner, 20 feet by 150 feet,

For two miners, 40 feet by 150 feet,

For three miners, 60 feet by 150 feet,

For four miners, 80 feet by 150 feet,

to be marked off after gold in paying quantities shall have been discovered.

**xxx. Priority of claim, &c., in tunnelling ground.**—In tunnelling under hills on the frontage of which angles may occur or which may be of an oblong or elliptical form, no party shall be allowed to tunnel from any of the said angles nor from either end of such hills, so as to interfere with parties tunnelling from the main frontage of such hills. In cases of two or more parties tunnelling from opposite sides of the same hill and their side boundary lines meet or intersect, or their claims meet, the party that first marked off their claim according to rule No. xxix. shall be entitled to a priority of claim

thereon. In cases of tunnelling under hills or fronts of hills, such as occur at the junction of creeks, in which there may be two leads or gutters, all parties shall, if required to do so, take their claim on the lead or gutter nearest the side of the hill at which their tunnel commences.

xxx. *Prospecting*.—As it is expedient the resources of this gold field should be more fully developed, the local court will grant to parties engaged or about to engage in prospecting in cement or rock sinking or alluvial sinking more than forty feet in depth an extended prospecting claim, in no case to exceed one hundred yards by one hundred yards, which shall be held by the prospecting party until such time as they may discover gold in paying quantities therein, unless sooner abandoned. Upon the discovery of gold, and giving immediate information thereof to the warden, such prospecting party may have a double or treble claim allotted them to be marked in presence of the warden or other person authorised by him for the purpose.

xxxi. *Registration of prospectors, &c.*—Any party who may hereafter spend three months of continued and diligent labor in prospecting in cement or rock sinking, or in alluvial sinking not less than forty feet in depth, and shall tender sufficient proof thereof to the warden, may be allowed to register their names in a book to be kept for that purpose, and to receive from the warden a registration ticket, which will not be transferable, which will entitle the holder to a claim of the authorised extent on the first lead or gutter, or the first spot or patch of payable ground that may hereafter be discovered in the district of the class or kind of ground herein above specified. Such claim or claims to be marked on the extended prospecting claim, authorised by rule No. xxxi., after the prospectors shall have marked off the claim allotted them, to be allotted them or distributed to such ticket-holders, as provided in the rule next following.

xxxii. *Notice of discovery to be given by successful prospectors*. It shall be incumbent upon all prospecting parties that discover gold in paying quantities in cement or rock sinking or alluvial sinking or quartz reefs more than forty feet in depth, to give information thereof to the warden prior to making it otherwise public. And no party or person shall be allowed to mark off or take possession of any ground within one hundred yards of any prospecting claim in ground of the abovementioned class or kind, until such time as the warden or other person authorised by him may have visited the ground and marked off the claims of all parties holding a prior right thereto of and by reason of holding such prospecting tickets; and six days notice shall be given upon the ground to all holders of such prospecting or registration tickets to come forward and take possession of their claims.

At the expiration of that time, if such ticket holders do not come forward, the ground thus marked off shall become public property.

xxxiv. *Combined or amalgamated parties*.—No party, single or combined or amalgamated, shall be compelled to keep more than one-half of their number at their claim until such time as gold, in paying quantities, shall have been found therein, when, after a lapse of seven days, the full number of men shall be required to work in or upon the claim. This rule to apply to quartz workings, prospecting, and all other branches of mining on this gold field.

xxxv. *Abandonment of claims*.—No claim shall be deemed to be abandoned until the parties claiming to or owning the same shall have neglected to work the same for three consecutive working days.

xxxvi. *Felling trees across public roads, &c.*—Any person who may fell, or cause to be felled, any tree across any road, footpath, crossing-place, claim or water-race in common use, shall remove, or cause to be removed, such tree from such road, footpath, crossing-place, claim or water-race within twelve hours from the time of said tree being felled.

xxxvii. *Persons to stack quartz properly*.—Any person who wishes to retain possession of any quartz, stone, casing, or other substance containing gold, the product of a quartz claim, may do so for any period of time not exceeding one year, although the claim from which it came has been relinquished, provided that he stack such stone, casing, or other substance in a proper manner upon ground not supposed to be workable, and erect close to such stack a post, with his name, address and date of stacking legibly painted thereon; and no person or persons shall remove, deface or damage any such post so erected, quartz, stone, casing, or other substance stacked in accordance with this regulation. And it shall be competent for the warden of the district to declare relinquished any stone, casing, or other substance not so stacked and taken from a claim then abandoned.

xxxviii. *Encouraging search for quartz, and prospecting hard hills, &c.*—To encourage and facilitate the discovery of auriferous quartz veins, and prospecting hard hills, the warden of the district may, on application, grant permission to any number of miners not exceeding twenty-four, to combine for the purpose of sinking a prospecting shaft, or putting in a tunnel, in common; they shall take up claims in the usual manner, and number them north or south from the said prospecting shaft or tunnel along the supposed course of the reef or gutter, and give a list of the same, together with the names of all the parties, to the warden at the time of application; the said claims to be registered by the warden, after which they will be allowed to keep their claims in reserve until the said reef or hill is proved.

No. 112.—OCTOBER 2ND, 1857.—6.

Any parties so combining shall in no case have an extended prospecting claim.

xxxix. *Protection of races*.—Any party who may be in actual and undisputed possession of any race, or any party engaged or about to engage in cutting any race for mining purposes, may apply to and obtain from the local court a written protection for said race, and no race thus protected shall become forfeited in consequence of the owner thereof working elsewhere on other claims when there is not sufficient water for its purpose.

xl. *Priority of right to water*.—Races cut for mining purposes shall be entitled to water according to priority of date, the first race cut from any stream having the first right to water, and so on, but no race shall be entitled to more than one sluice head of water until all others on the same parallel shall have been supplied with water for one sluice or tom. The proposed course of each race to be indicated by pegs at intervals of twenty (20) yards or thereabouts.

NOTE.—Rule xxiii. of this series is hereby annulled.

"The Right Honorable the Governor General of India will be much obliged to His Excellency the Captain General and Governor-in-Chief of Victoria, if he will cause enquiries to be made with respect to powerful horses about five years of age, suited to carry men of the Dragoon Guards, two of which corps it is understood have been ordered to India.

THIRD HALF-YEARLY REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF PRAHRAN, PURSUANT TO THE PROVISIONS OF THE MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS ACT 18 VICTORIA No. 15.

## ELECTIONS.

Councillors Izett, Snodgrass and Oliver, retired by rotation. The nomination of candidates took place on the 20th February, when Messrs. Smith, Palmer, Stephen, Oliver, Walker, Berry, Campbell and King, were duly proposed, and a poll demanded, which was carried out on the 21st February. In accordance with the bye-law for regulating elections of councillors, three polling places were opened. No. 1 in Gardiner's Creek road, No. 2 in Chapel street, and No. 3 in Windsor. The chairman presided at No. 2, councillor Crews at No. 1, and councillor Pye at No. 3. The following was the result:—For Mr. Wm. Smith, 337; Mr. John Palmer, 314; Mr. F. J. S. Stephen, 216; Mr. Wm. Oliver, 208; Mr. Alexr. Walker, 160; Mr. G. Berry, 129; Mr. John Campbell, 72; Mr. P. A. King, 35. The declaration of the poll was made by the chairman, at the court house, on Monday, the 23rd February, as follows:—Mr. Wm. Smith, elected for three years, and Messrs. Palmer and Stephen, for two years.

At the first meeting, F. J. Sargood, Esq., M.P., was unanimously elected chairman.

The council have held 27 meetings, of which the chairman has attended 26, councillor Mason 26, councillor Palmer 26, councillor Crews 25, councillor Pye 22, councillor Stephen 17, and councillor Smith 14.

The finance committee have held 12 meetings, of which councillor Mason has attended 10, councillor Smith 9, and councillor Pye 8.

The Public Works Committee have held 29 meetings, of which councillor Crews attended 28, councillor Palmer 26, and councillor Smith 20.

The Legislation and Rate committee have held 8 meetings, of which councillor Crews has attended 8, councillor Mason 8, and councillor Stephen 2.

## MUNICIPAL MAGISTRATES.

William Smith and George Rolfe, Esqrs., have been appointed magistrates for this municipal district.

## BYE-LAWS PASSED AND ASSENTED TO BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR.

A bye-law to enforce the cleansing of chimney flues.

A bye-law for the better prevention of fire.

A bye-law has also been passed by the council to prevent nuisances arising from suffering cattle to be at large in the streets and unenclosed places within the municipal district of Prahran, which has not yet received the assent of the Governor in consequence of an amendment being required.

## EXTENSION OF BOUNDARY.

A petition has been prepared, and is in course of signature, praying His Excellency the Governor to extend the boundary of the municipality to the centres of the boundary road on the east, the Dandenong road and Wellington street on the south, and the Punt road on the west, instead of the building line as at present fixed.

## PROCLAMATION OF STREETS.

Fifty-seven streets have been proclaimed in accordance with the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 14, a list of which may be seen at the council rooms, containing the width of street, carriage and footways.

## PUBLIC WORKS.

During the half-year 83 chains of the Commercial road has been formed, kerbed and metalled; 80 chains of High street have been metalled, and 40 chains kerbed; Chapel street kerbed at the entrance of the principal streets running therefrom, the channels have been pitched and the corners kerbed with bluestone kerbing. The Central Road Board have metalled the entire length, 100 chains, £6000 having been voted by the Legislative Assembly for that purpose. £2052 9s. 4d. of this amount has been paid to the council for contracts already carried out by them for forming the said street.

York street, 27 chains formed and pitched.

Channel on the east side of Chapel street, from Gardiner's Creek road to High street, pitched with bluestone.

Argo street, Ralston street, Princes street, Kent street and part of Greville street, formed and drained.

Stone culvert placed in Williams road, and the wood culvert removed to another part of the same road.

Culvert placed in Sargood street, 38 chains of channelling pitched in Commercial road and High street.

The importance of an efficient drainage has occupied the serious consideration of the council from the establishment of the municipality, and they have succeeded in carrying out this object, acting under the advice of C. Hodgkinson, Esq., C.E. and district surveyor. The large flow of surface water which used to accumulate in Chapel street is now divided, and carried off by two courses; and when Union street is formed and the channel pitched (which it is the intention of the council to carry out immediately), the principal outlets will be completed. To the present time above five miles of the principal thoroughfares have been formed on the permanent level, and three miles and a quarter metalled, and it will be satisfactory to the ratepayers to know that this great and permanent improvement has been made without injury to the drainage of scarcely any private property in the district; and it is worthy of observation that there is no property which drained into the public thoroughfares before any improvements were made but what may still be drained by a very small outlay.

The council have succeeded in obtaining a promise from the Central Road Board to erect footways over the bridge leading to Richmond, so as not to interfere with the carriage-way.

The council have also urged upon the Road Board the necessity of pitching the channel on the north side of Gardiner's Creek road, opposite to Murphy's Paddock, and completing the forming and metalling of the road from Toorak to the eastern boundary. The forming and metalling is now being proceeded with, and the Board have promised to carry out the channelling so soon as they have funds in hand.

The use of the loam ground on the south reserve, being within the municipality of St. Kilda, has been withdrawn, and another site granted beyond the eastern boundary.

## POSTAL DELIVERY.

The council have to regret that the Post Office authorities have only partially carried out their wishes, expressed at an interview with Mr. Watts, the inspector. The council requested that the delivery should extend to the River Yarra on the north, the Dandenong road and Wellington street on the south, Williams road on the east (taking both sides of the road), and the Punt road on the west.

## BOARD OF HEALTH.

The council, as the District Board of Health, have to report the continued willingness on the part of the inhabitants to remove any nuisances that have been brought under their notice; and it will be found, on reference to the weekly abstracts of births and deaths, that this district is second to none as regards the health of its inhabitants.

The municipality contained, on the 1st April last, according to the return of the enumerator:—

4118 males, 4054 females; total, 8172.

1954 houses; number of rooms, 6923.

The assessment of the district, for 1857, amounts to above £95,000; gross amount of rate at 1s. in the pound, £4750.
