Block No. 8.—Commencing at the south-eastern angle of block No. 8, township of Queenscliff, where the northern side of Flinders street intersects the western side of Hesse street; thence by a line bearing north 15 degrees east 10 chains; thence by a line bearing north 75 degrees west 5 chains; thence by a line bearing south 15 degrees west 10 chains; and thence by a line bearing south 75 degrees east 5 chains to the commencing point.

Block No. 9.—Commencing at the south-eastern angle of block No. 9, township of Queenscliff, where the northern side of Flinders street intersects the western side of Learmonth street; thence by a line bearing north 15 degrees east 10 chains; thence by a line bearing north 75 degrees west 5 chains; thence by a line bearing south 15 degrees west 10 chains; and thence by a line bearing south 75 degrees east 5 chains to the commencing point.

SECTIONS V. TO IX. OF TOWN AND COUNTRY POLICE ACT EXTENDED TO QUEENSCLIFF.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the Colony of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intitled, "*An Act to provide for the Management of Towns and other places in Victoria*," it was amongst other things enacted, that so many of the provisions of the said Act as relate to the good order of towns and other populous places, being sections numbered V., VI., VII., VIII., IX. and X. in the said Act, should extend to and be in force in such cities, towns, districts, and places as the Lieutenant Governor might by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* declare to come under the operation of the same respectively, or any of them, and that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor to define the limits of such places: Now I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, do by this my Proclamation, in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act, declare and appoint that the sections of the said Act, being numbered V., VI., VII., VIII. and IX., shall extend to and be in force within the township of Queenscliff, in the county of Grant: and I do define the limits of the said township to be the same as are hereinafter set forth, that is to say: Commencing at a point on Lonsdale Bay, the south-west angle of section No. 21 of the township, bearing north 61 degrees east, distant 28 chains 50 links; bounded on the west by a line bearing north 7 degrees 20 minutes west 13 chains; on the north by Swan Bay; on the east by Port Phillip Bay; and on the south by Lonsdale Bay westerly to the commencing point.

LOCAL COURT REGULATIONS.

MOUNT BLACKWOOD.

REGULATIONS made by the Local Court of the district of Mount Blackwood:—

xxi. *Notice of application to be given.*—In all cases of applications for permissions that require the special sanction of the local court, notice must be given through the chairman or clerk of the local court at least eight days previous to any day of sitting of said court upon which such application can be entertained.

xxii. *Extent of claims.*—The area of all claims for sinking in unworked ground shall be twenty-four (24) feet by twenty-four (24) feet for each miner. In wet ground or where slabbing is required, double or treble claims may be obtained by special sanction of the local court.—This rule to repeal Nos. i. and vii. of regulations, gazetted 12th September, 1856.

xxiii. *Surfacing.*—The area of all claims for surface washing where the average depth does not exceed three (3) feet, shall be for each miner fifty (50) feet by fifty (50) feet. No claim to be taken except sanctioned by the local court.

xxiv. *Surface claims not to interfere with general sinking.*—Claims allowed for surfacing shall not interfere with general sinking. The warden of the district shall have power, upon the recommendation of the local court, to enforce such regulations as may be necessary to enable such general sinking to be carried on.

xxv. *Sluicing and puddling claims.*—The area of all claims for sluicing or puddling shall be, on unworked ground twenty-four (24) feet by twenty-four (24) feet, and on worked ground fifty (50) feet by fifty (50) feet for each miner. No claim to be taken except sanctioned by the local court.—This rule to repeal No. ix. of regulations, gazetted 12th September, 1856.

xxvi. *Authority to hold possession pending decision of local court.*—When application has been made for any permission or lease, the warden shall have power to issue to the applicants written authority to hold possession of the privilege applied for, until the local court has decided whether it will give its sanction or not.

The foregoing Regulations, Nos. xxi. to xxvi., have been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council.

THE SECOND HALF-YEARLY REPORT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF BALLAARAT.—HALF-YEAR ENDING THE 16TH JANUARY, 1857.

PUBLIC WORKS.

THE completion of the contract of Messrs. Martin and Scott for forming and metalling sixty-eight chains, portions of Lydiard, Armstrong, Dana and Mar streets

2. Thirteen chains of road on the south side of Sturt street.
3. The formation of a road across the White Flat, twenty chains.
4. The erection of a timber bridge across the Creek Yarrowee, to unite the township with Golden Point.
5. Repairing road and bridge on the road leading to the manure depot.
6. Forming approaches to the weighbridge, and erecting counting-house.

BYE-LAWS.

No. 7. A bye-law to provide for the necessary supply of water for domestic, sanitary, and other purposes, from Yuille's Swamp.—Assented to on the 24th day of October, 1856.

The municipal council purchased the weighbridge belonging to Messrs. Howe and Herring, upon the recommendation of Mr. Campbell, the engineer engaged to report thereon, but owing to the mismanagement of the persons employed in fixing the machine, the council regret up to the present time it has been useless; but they trust with the additions and improvements now in progress the weighbridge will be made very efficient.

WATER SUPPLY.

The municipal council during the past half year renewed the applications to the Government for a grant or loan of money to carry out this work, and they have also forwarded a copy of the town surveyor's report on the proposed water supply to Peter Lalor, Esq., M.L.A., who has promised to bring the subject before the Legislative Assembly, and endeavor to obtain a grant of money for that purpose.

During the early part of the present half year, a gentleman from the department of the Honorable the Commissioner of Public Works visited Ballaarat for the purpose of examining the swamp and reporting on the supply of water that could be obtained for these works, but up to the present time the council are without any definite information as to the support the scheme will receive from the Government.

The following applications have been made to the Government:—

1. For ten acres of land for the purposes of the agricultural society.—Granted.
2. For ten acres of land for the purposes of a cricket club.—Granted.
3. For the formation of Doveton street south.—Not granted.
4. The council have also applied to the Government for the sum of thirty thousand pounds to form the leading streets within the township and municipal district, but they have not yet received any information as to the sum that will be placed on the estimates for the municipality of Ballaarat for the present year, 1857.

ELECTIONS.

Councillor Davies was elected a member of council on the 20th August, 1856, in the place of the late Alexander Binney Ranken, Esq., who resigned.
