PUBLIC WORSHIP.

HIS Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to direct that the Regulations of 28th January, 1856, shall be cancelled, and the following Regulations substituted in their place, to take effect from the 1st January, 1857.

1. The sum of £50,000 shall be apportioned amongst the several denominations of Christians, according to the numbers of each on the last preceding Census.

2. A schedule, shewing the distribution among the several denominations, may be inspected at the Treasury.

3. The Head of every Christian denomination intending to claim aid under these Regulations is requested to send a notice to the Treasurer in the accompanying form (A).

4. Should any denomination omit or not wish to claim the amount apportioned to it on or before the 31st December of the year in which such apportionment shall be made, the amount apportioned to such denomination shall immediately after such date revert to the consolidated revenue.

STIPENDS.

5. A sum not exceeding one-half of the amount apportioned to each denomination will be applicable to the payment of stipends.

6. At any time after the apportionment referred to in the 1st section, the head of any denomination may apply to the Treasurer in the form (B), for such stipends as may be required for ministers of that denomination.

7. In cases where a minister is appointed for the first time to any church or chapel, the above application must be accompanied by a certificate in the form (C), signed by at least one hundred adults.

8. No stipend exceeding £500 will be granted, except to the head of a denomination.

9. Payments of stipends, when sanctioned by His Excellency, will be made monthly at the Treasury upon the usual form of voucher.

10. On or before the 15th day of January in each year the head of each denomination is required to send to the Treasurer an account in the accompanying form (D), shewing the contributions received during the previous year in aid of such stipends. Should the amount of these contributions received by any denomination fall short of the sum required, a corresponding reduction will be made in the sum allotted to that denomination for the ensuing year.

11. A statement in the form (E) is required to be sent by the head of each denomination to the Treasurer, on or before the 5th of January in each year, shewing the amount of stipend received by each minister during the previous year, and certifying that he has during such time as he shall have received that stipend faithfully performed the duties allotted to him.

BUILDINGS.

12. The whole of the amount apportioned to each denomination will be applicable towards the erection of churches, chapels, and ministers' dwellings.

13. Applications for aid in this respect must be made in form (F) by the head of the denomination to the Treasurer, and must be accompanied by satisfactory proof that the land upon which the buildings are to be erected has been duly conveyed to a trustee or trustees approved by the Governor in Council.

14. No application for aid towards the erection of a church or chapel can be entertained until £200 at least, shall have been raised by contributions, and actually paid over to the trustees; and in like manner £50 at least must have been raised and paid over in the case of an application being made to erect a minister's dwelling; and in support of each application, the head of denomination must forward a list of the contributors, with the amount which each has paid over to the trustees, with a certificate in the accompanying form (G) signed by the trustees that they have actually received the sums therein shewn for the erection of the building in question.

15. Upon the above conditions being complied with, grants will be sanctioned by the Governor out of the sums apportioned to each denomination, equal to twice the amount paid to the trustees. But the total amount of the grants to any church or chapel will not exceed £3000, or to any minister's dwelling £600.

16. Payments (in sums of not less than £50 each) will be made to the trustees from time to time as the building progresses, upon the production of an account in the usual form, supported by the necessary vouchers, for the sums actually expended, and by a certificate from a clerk of works, or (where no such officer is resident within a reasonable distance) from a stipendiary magistrate, that he has examined the building, that the workmanship and materials are good and sufficient, and that he believes the sum specified in the account to have been actually laid out.

LOCAL COURT REGULATIONS.

BEECHWORTH.

REGULATIONS made by the Local Court of the district of Beechworth:—

XLV. *Protection for claims during failure of water.*—Persons holding registered or extended claims shall not forfeit their right to such claims when compelled to cease working in consequence of a temporary deficiency of water for washing purposes, provided there be one man holding a miner's right constantly in attendance upon such claim.

XLVI. *Bed claims upon Reid's Creek.*—The extent of bed claims upon Reid's Creek shall be eighty (80) yards in length by one hundred (100) yards in breadth to each claimholder, provided that eight (8) men holding the miner's right be constantly employed upon such claim.

XLVII. *Protection of tail races.*—A tail or drainage race shall be considered private property and protected to the holder thereof in the same way as other races.

The foregoing Regulations, Nos. XLV. to XLVII., have been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council.

LOCAL COURT REGULATIONS.

CASTLEMAINE.

REGULATIONS made by the Local Court of the district of Castlemaine:—

XXXVII.—*Side lines of quartz claims.*—When the true position of quartz reefs or veins has been ascertained, the general plane of which descends at an angle with the horizon less than ninety (90) degrees, the boundary line shall in all cases be a line laid off at a right angle with a base or datum line passing through the whole of the known line of such reef or vein. Should a dispute arise where the general direction of the reef or vein is not known with certainty, the authorised officer, previous to any measurement made below, may fix upon some distant point which shall be taken to mark the direction of the reef for the purpose of deciding the particular dispute then before him.

XXXVIII. *Deposit of refuse soil.*—All leaseholders shall be allowed to deposit the excavations from their first paddock on the waste lands of the Crown, provided always that no miner be at the time working on the said ground where such deposits are placed. This rule to repeal No. 21 of regulations gazetted 7th November, 1856.

LEUCHTHURM IN DER WESER AUF DEM HOHEN WEGE.

AN der Stelle der bisherigen Bremer Baake auf 53°, 42', 51" nördlicher Breite und 8°, 14', 52" östlicher Länge von Greenwich ist ein aus Ziegelmauerwerk bestehender, von einer concaven Steinböschung umgebener Leuchthurm erbaut worden. Der Thurm ist achteckig und auf 34 Fusz über ordinaier Fluth von einer mit einem eisernen Geländer eingefassten Terrasse umgeben.

Das Licht ist ein catadioptrisches nach Fresnel'schem System 2ter Ordnung, es steht 107 Fusz über ordinaier Fluth und ist ein festes weisses Licht. Die Beleuchtungsfläche ist in dem Kreise der Compasstriche von Süden durch Osten bis Nord-West zum Westen enthalten.

Vom äussersten Leuchtschiff paßt man den Thurm in Süden zum Osten $\frac{1}{2}$ Ost, und hat derselbe die Langwarder Kirche im Süden hinter sich.

Vom 1. December dieses Jahres an wird das Licht von Sonnenuntergang bis Sonnenaufgang brennen und von diesem Tage an das Binneneuchtschiff von seiner Station entfernt werden.

Zur bessern Orientirung für die Weser einsegelnde Schiffe, ohne übrigens den Gebrauch des Loths überflüssig zu machen, ist auf dem Leuchthurm circa 38 Fusz über ordinaier Fluthhöhe noch ein kleines weisses Licht aufgestellt, welches bei hellem Wetter auf 7 Seemeilen sichtbar sein wird. Dies Licht wird unsichtbar werden, wenn man der schwarzen Tonnen Wall in der Gegend der II und J Tonne zu nahe kommt. In das Dwasgat einsegelnd, wird, sobald man in die Linie der rothen Tonne kommt, das Licht einen röthlichen Schein annehmen und unsichtbar werden, wenn man in die Linie der schwarzen W A Tonne gelangt. NOTICE TO MARINERS.

LIGHTHOUSE ON THE WESER UPON THE FLAT CALLED THE HOHE WEG.

Notice is hereby given that in place of the wooden Bremen Beacon situated in 53 deg. 42 min. 51 sec. north latitude and 8 deg. 14 min. 52 sec. east longitude from Greenwich, a light-house has been erected; it is built of bricks, and at the base surrounded with a sloping masonry of stone. This lighthouse is of an octagonal form, and at the elevation of 34 feet above common high water mark it is surrounded by a terrace with an iron railing.

The light is catadioptric according to Fresnel's system of the second order; it is 107 feet above high water at ordinary tides, and is a fixed white light. In clear weather it will be visible at the distance of 15 of 16 nautical miles, and may therefore be seen from the first or outer buoy called the key buoy. The light will be visible within all the points of the compass from south round east to north-west by west.

From the outer light vessel the lighthouse bears south by east $\frac{1}{4}$ east, and from the lighthouse the church of Langwarden bears south.

The light will be first lit on the 1st of December next, and will continue to burn every night from sunset to sunrise, and from that day the inner light-vessel will be removed from her station.

For the convenience of mariners entering the Weser, but by no means to induce them to neglect the use of the lead, a small white light will be shown from the lighthouse at an elevation of 38 feet above common high water mark, which in clear weather will be visible at the distance of 7 nautical miles. This light will disappear to those who are nearing too much the black buoy (or starboard) side, near buoys II and J. To those entering the Dwasgat it will assume a reddish color in a line with the red buoy, and will disappear when they reach the line of the black W A buoy. This smaller light will be visible between the bearings of north by west $\frac{3}{4}$ west round northward to east by south.

SECOND HALF-YEARLY REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF
CASTLEMAINE.

ELECTIONS.

IN consequence of the resignation of Councillor Palmer on 2nd September, an election for a member in his place was held, and Wm. E. Richards, Esq., was elected with 147 votes, and took his seat on the 30th September. This gentleman, however, resigned on 6th January, and a meeting has been called for the election of a member in his place.

MEETINGS.

The council have continued to use the Survey Office as their place of meeting. Out of the 26 weekly meetings 24 have been held, at 2 there being no quorum. The attendance of members has been as follows:—

There were 3 meetings of the whole council in committee, at which the attendance was:—The chairman, 3; Councillor Hinds, 3; Councillor McMillan, 2; Councillor Smith, 2; Councillor Wheeler, 1; Councillor Paynter, 1; Councillor Palmer, 1.

The Finance Committee held 20 meetings:—Councillor Paynter, chairman, attended 14; Councillor Hinds, 15; Councillor Smith, 14; and the chairman of the council, 6.

The Public Works Committee held 16 meetings:—Councillor Smith, chairman, attended 13; Councillor McMillan, 13; Councillor Richards, 3; and the chairman of the council, 11.

The Legislative Committee held 5 meetings:—Councillor Wheeler, chairman, attended 3; Councillor Paynter, 3; Councillor Richards, 2; and the chairman of the council, 5.

OFFICERS.

During the year, circumstance led to a change in the surveyorship, and on the 9th September, Mr. Alfred Price was elected town surveyor at a salary of £300 per annum, with fees. On 29th July, Mr. Jas. Davis was elected to the office of inspector of nuisances and weights and measures at £150 per annum; his duties, however, becoming enlarged, his salary was, on 23rd December, increased to £200 per annum as town inspector. On the 27th August, Mr. Edward Martin was elected as collector of rates, market and other dues at a salary of £200.

BYE-LAWS.

No. 3. For levying a rate of 6d. in the pound was passed on 5th August, and assented to on 21st October.

No. 4. For removing the fence of the old cemetery and clearing Templeton street, passed 5th August, has not been assented to.

No. 5. For appropriation and expenditure of £3750, first moiety of the grant made by the Legislature, passed 5th August, not yet assented to.

No. 6. Prohibiting deposit of night soil or manure except in some public depot, passed 27th August, assented to 26th September.

No. 7. Appointing a manure depot, passed 16th September, assented to 7th October.

No. 8. Prohibiting the keeping of swine within certain limits of the township, passed 9th September, assented to 7th October.

No. 9. For removal of remains of bodies from Old Cemetery in Templeton street to the Campbell's Creek Cemetery, passed 28th October, and assented to 18th November.

No. 10. For making and maintaining roadways over footpaths and drains to private premises, passed 28th October, assented to 28th November.

No. 11. For regulating and licensing butchering and slaughtering within the towns, passed 11th November, assented to 5th December.

No. 12. Amending No. 1. For regulating the Proceedings of Council, passed 25th November, not yet assented to.

No. 13. For licensing and regulating nightmen carters, passed 2nd December, assented to 16th January.

Bye-laws for the prevention of fires, for regulating buildings, for making public all bye-laws and plans of works one week previous to consideration, and for removing all obstructions from all footpaths, are now also brought forward.

MEMORIALS, ETC., RECEIVED.

The ratepayers, inhabitants and individual parties have addressed themselves to the council on various matters, some of which have been beyond the power of the council, and others they have not thought fit to deal with at present. Regarding nuisances complained of, the council have made the needed provisions as far as possible. One memorial was for the non-removal of tents outside the town boundary, which the council had not interfered with, but merely with permanent buildings erected within the town on unsold crown lands. The demands upon the council for road making and improvements in different localities are evidently more than the council have the means to provide for.

MEMORIALS AND CORRESPONDENCE SENT.

The council have memorialised his Excellency and addressed communications to the government departments and local authorities on many matters, among others the following:—

(a) Repeated applications for the completion of Forest street, by Market square, and the alteration of the creek line, to which nothing has yet been done, but as far back as 29th July it was promised that a sum would be placed on the Estimates for the purpose.

(b) On post office conveyances, by which it has been granted that letters posted after 5½ p.m. can be forwarded by the morning mail, and the Post Office is opened from 7½ to 8 a.m. for receiving and forwarding letters on payment of the too late fee.

Many applications for the payment of the second moiety of the grant of £7500, made by the Legislature without success, although on 29th July, the account for that payment was received from the Colonial Treasurer, with a promise of payment thereof on its return, which was immediately complied with, since when objections have continually been raised, which the council believe to be utterly beyond the law, and of a similar nature to others made demanding the collection of a shilling rate and other exigencies, which were so stoutly resisted at the first by this and several other municipalities, to the protests of which the Government then had to yield.

(c) For the erection of a powder magazine, which is now nearly completed, and expected to be soon placed at the disposal of the public, removing this dangerous deposit from the stores in the centre of the township.

Amended plan for public buildings on section 14, setting out sites for a town hall in the centre thereof, sites for the sub-treasury and gold office, and for the electric telegraph, which buildings are now being erected; sites for the use of the fire-brigade and for a mechanics institute, which are in the course of being availed of; sites for the post office and for court houses and a lock-up, for which it is understood that sums will be placed on the estimates. The council have granted a site on the section for a savings bank, and a site for a police station has been applied for.

(a) Against the nomination for the North Western Province taking place at Kyneton, that town being on the confines of an extensive district, whilst there were three large gold-field townships far more central and important and containing more electors, but granted, though the Government admitted the claims of Castlemaine in respect thereto.

(d) For the erection of a jail, for which a sum has to be placed on the estimates, and which so far progresses that a stockade is erected on the site.

For two acres for a manure depot, for one acre for a pound, granted and surveyed; also land for a cemetery has been promised, but as yet no locality fixed on.

(a) For a portion of the £500,000 proposed to be expended on roads.—Acknowledged.

(e) For the appointment of a local road board from the council.—Not granted.

(a) For the removal of telegraph posts from the centre of the footpaths.—Reply that they were placed 11 feet 9 inches from the building line, but they still remain in the middle of the pathways at several crossings.

To the resident warden for protection to two old cemeteries, one on Pennyweight Flat, one at Diamond Gully, Winter's Flat.—Accorded, and intention stated of having the same fenced in.

For repairs to the Governor's and Sheriff's bridges.—Replies received—that the same were effected; but further remonstrance thereon has been made—not yet replied to.

(b) For county court sittings every month.—Replied to that a new law on the subject would be introduced, and there is every reason to believe that monthly sittings will be accorded not only to this but the surrounding districts, as sought for by this council and in justice to all.

(c) For £300 for clearing away thistles, for £3000 for fencing and laying out the botanical gardens.—Acknowledged.

(d) For the making of the Bendigo road through Barker street instead of, as projected by the district engineer, round by the camp and along Barker's Creek.—Under consideration.

(e) For lands along Barker's Creek for park reserve, &c.—Granted, conditional on the line of railway and position of the Castlemaine station.

(a) For £20,000 for making the roads to the gold fields and other neighboring places westward.—Replied to, that next year some sums might be laid out thereon, but that now it was considered best to complete the main Mount Alexander road.

(d) For £300 for a letter carrier.—To be considered. For repairs to Campbell's Creek road.—Not yet fully replied to, nor the works done.

(d) Against the union of the offices of resident warden and police magistrate in one person.—Reply, that such was not intended, but some new arrangements thereon were contemplated by Government.

(a) On the first report of the chance of the main line of railway from Melbourne to the Murray deviating from this town, the council memorialized and received an assurance from

- (a) On proposal of the chairman.
- (b) On proposal of Councillor Wheeler.
- (c) On proposal of Councillor McMillan.
- (d) On proposal of Councillor Paynter.
- (e) On proposal of Councillor Smith.

Government that their fears and suspicions with respect to the deviation of the line from Castlemaine were groundless. The council had previously twice petitioned for the line to be made direct to this town and with the utmost speed, and the important question never required nor received pressure from without to cause it to be taken up by the council.

* For stopping the practice of building on Crown lands in the township and immediately adjoining purchased lands.—Not yet decided.

MISCELLANEOUS.

At the conference of the municipal delegates at Melbourne, Councillor Palmer ably represented the interests of this district, and several most useful resolutions were come to for the obtaining of an amended Municipal Act, and further information on the subject is now invited by the Surveyor General.

A design for the corporate seal has been approved by the Government, and is daily to be expected from Melbourne.

The council presented an address of congratulation to His Excellency on his arrival, which was courteously received and replied to.

The Health of Towns Act has been gradually and partially brought into effect. The health officer and inspector have sent in their reports containing many valuable suggestions; and this local Board, in sending their quarterly reports to the central Board, have been enabled to state that the sanitary condition of the district is generally most favorable: at the same time they must not disguise the fact that much remains to be done, especially in the more populous part of the town, to preserve this healthful condition, and that moreover much depends in this respect on the inhabitants themselves.

Advances have again been made for the opinion of the council on the subject of mining on Crown lands in the township, but they decline to interfere whilst those lands are not entirely delivered over to their control, as they have before urged that said lands should form the municipal endowment.

The Government have applied to know whether the council would wish the boundaries of the township and municipality made coterminous, but the council have declined to entertain the question, not having received sufficient information as to the reasons or motives of such a change, and unable to see clearly what might be the results.

The census commission have applied to the council, and replies were given, with such information as was required and could be given.

RATES AND APPEALS.

The assessment having been forwarded for assent, and a by-law striking a rate of sixpence in the pound made, was forwarded to the Government on the 8th August, but no answer was received until the 21st October; and during that period no objection was raised nor reason given for the delay by the Government, although more than one appeal was made to them to forward it. On its return the necessary steps were taken to issue notices for the hearing of appeals, and on the 16th November, the Court of Appeal in Petty Sessions was opened by the police magistrate. There were sixty cases of appeal out of over fourteen hundred assessments, of these thirty were allowed, in some abatements of valuation being made, and others struck out in allegations of the parties that they were not proprietors of the premises. The total deductions made from the original assessment was £1640, leaving the present amount of property assessed at £63,673. The hearing of appeals was finally closed on the 10th December, thus necessarily the two moieties of the rate fell due together only in December, and from that time to the date of the assessment being taken, very many and great changes had taken place, as to the proprietorship and occupancy of lands and premises, consequently the cultivation has not progressed as favorably as was to be desired. Many parties too have left the municipality, and others who were not residing here are not easily to be reached, therefore a considerable deficit may be expected in the amount of rates for the past year, but all this deficit will remain a charge upon these premises and be recoverable from future occupants or proprietors.

The town clerk was appointed to support the assessment at the Petty Sessions, and reports that the Bench did not entirely confine itself to the question of value, as the Act appears to direct. There do not appear to be any positive objections to pay the rates, except in the case of Mr. W. W. Wilson, who protests against everything almost that was done in respect thereto, and who still refuses to pay, although his appeal was finally dismissed by the Bench; and in the case of Mr. F. Taylor, who objects to pay on certain property, which he alleges to be free from or by his squatting license. There were two or three cases of plant and machinery being assessed, which were given up on its appearing that they were not strictly rateable.

PUBLIC WORKS.

The works carried into effect since last report have been the formation of drains in Mostyn street and on three sides of Market square, in Barker street, in Hargreaves street, in Urquhart street, and in Lyttleton street.

Repairing of the roadways with metal, and covering with quartz in Mostyn street, Bourke street, Hargreaves street and Urquhart street, and keeping the same in repair for three months.

Repairing table drains at the crossings with large rubble work and covering of quartz.

Making a roadway across the hollow in Barker street, between Campbell and Doveton streets.

The works now to be carried out and contracted for are the erection of cattle yards behind the hospital, the fencing-in of the manure depot near the same, the erection of municipal offices on the town hall reserve.

The works proposed and resolved upon are the clearing of a part of Templeton street, the kerbing of a part of Forest street and making the footpaths; the pitching of the drains with stone in parts of Mostyn and Hargreaves streets, laying the kerbing in the same, and the roadways to be crowned with metal, the footpaths to be formed and covered with gravel; also the erection of 22 lamp posts and lamps at certain corners of streets in the town.

The works proposed and rejected have been the fencing of Market square, and the erection of lamps and lamp posts.—Adjourned for six months from 27th August last.

Appropriations were made out of the fund for the erection of a market, plans of which have been approved, and for the erection of a weighbridge and house, and these can be proceeded with, it is expected, shortly.

Almost immediately after the surveyor's appointment, he proceeded to take plans of the levels of the streets from Campbell street southward with gradients to Forest street, and from Campbell street to Hunter street, with the gradients to Kennedy street. These elaborate plans of levels and gradients have yet to be sanctioned by Government, which, when obtained, the said levels will form a sound basis, not only for all future public works, but for private buildings, and will bind the Government to carry out their roadways and other works on the same basis as the municipality.

FINANCE.

Referring to the accounts of receipt and expenditure, it will be observed that there is an amount due from Government for the removal of the old cemetery, which has been approved, and the account furnished as directed: therefore the return of that sum may be daily expected. Deducting the liability for works undertaken and appropriations made, there will probably remain a surplus of the grant of £7500, to be expended in forming the streets, &c., or other public works, of near £2000.
