DUNOLLY GAOL.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS a certain building has been erected at Dunolly, in the colony of Victoria, at the public expense, as and for a lock-up for police purposes; And whereas it is expedient to proclaim the same to be a gaol within the meaning of an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the said colony, passed in the sixteenth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, "An Act to make provision for the better control and disposal of Offenders." Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of the said Colony, in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act, do hereby proclaim the said building at Dunolly as and to be a public gaol, prison, and house of correction, within the meaning of the said Act, for the district of Dunolly aforesaid.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twenty-sixth day of March, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and in the twentieth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF MARYBOROUGH.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the Colony of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for the Establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," it was amongst other things enacted that any district of the colony of Victoria, the area whereof should not exceed nine square miles, and which should contain a population of householders not less than three hundred, might, subject to the provisions of the said Act, be constituted a municipal district as thereafter mentioned, provided that no one point in any such area should be distant more than six miles from any other point; And it was further enacted that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, on the receipt of a petition signed by not less than one hundred and fifty householders resident within any such district, praying that such district might be declared a municipal district under the said Act, to cause the substance and prayer of such petition to be published in the *Government Gazette*, and (if no counter petition, signed by an equal or greater number of householders resident within such locality, should have been delivered at the office of the Colonial Secretary within one month from the date of such publication) the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice aforesaid, might, if he should think fit, declare by Proclamation such locality a municipal district by a name to be mentioned in such Proclamation, and also by the same or any other Proclamation might define the limits and boundaries of such municipal district, and such limits and boundaries at any time thereafter in the same manner on receipt of a similar petition

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might vary and alter, but so as in no case save as thereafter mentioned to include within the limits or boundaries of such municipal district an area of more than nine square miles, and upon the publication of any such Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, such locality so defined should be deemed and taken to be a municipal district within the meaning of the said Act; And whereas a petition has been presented to His Excellency the Governor by the landowners and householders within the township of Maryborough, the substance and prayer of which petition have been published as directed by the said Act, and no counter petition has been delivered in opposition thereto within the time allowed by law: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, do by this my Proclamation, in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act, with the advice of the Executive Council, declare that the district hereinafter described and named shall be a municipal district within the meaning of the said Act, that is to say:—

MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF MARYBOROUGH.—Commencing at the north-east angle of the town reserve of Maryborough; thence west one mile and sixty chains; thence south two miles and sixty chains; thence east one mile and sixty chains; and thence north two miles and sixty chains to the commencing point.

And I do hereby, with the advice aforesaid, direct that the council of the said municipal district shall be called by the name and style of "The Municipal Council of Maryborough."

BALLAARAT CEMETERY.

REGULATIONS made by the Trustees of the Public Cemetery established at Ballaarat.—

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE BALLAARAT GENERAL CEMETERY.

1. All charges must be paid when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.

2. By the 8th section of the Act, "Any person making a vault, or erecting and placing a monument in the cemetery, by and with the permission of the trustees, under these rules, and upon the payment of the charges therein mentioned, is entitled to have, maintain, and keep a vault, monument, or tombstone according to the terms of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person and his representatives for ever."

3. Application for such permission to be made at the office of the trustees. A certificate of permission, in the form set out in the schedule, will be granted to the party applying for such permission on payment of the charges in the schedule.

4. The charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in such cemetery on a certificate of a minister of religion, or other evidence, proving to the satisfaction of the trustees that such person was a pauper, or that the relations and friends of the deceased are unable to pay the costs and charges.

5. Orders for interment to be given to the secretary, at the office of the trustees; such notice to be given between the hours of Ten a.m. and Three p.m. the previous day.

6. The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug, but parties wanting brick graves or vaults will be required to construct them under the direction of the surveyor; and in case interment is to be made in any private grave or vault, the consent (in writing) of the party entitled thereto must be left with the order.

7. The name, age, late place of residence, and probable cause of death of the deceased, must be stated at the time of giving the order.

8. The time fixed for the funeral to be the time when the procession is to be at the cemetery, and the same must be punctually observed.

9. Until otherwise ordered, the usual hours fixed for the performance of funerals will be from Ten a.m. to Six o'clock p.m. in the months of September to April inclusive, and from Ten a.m. to Four o'clock p.m. in the other four months.

10. All monuments, vaults, graves, and grave-stones, to be kept in repair and proper condition, at the expense of the owners.

11. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave to be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of freestone, slate, or iron.

12. A plan of every monument and tombstone proposed to be erected and placed, shall be exhibited to the said trustees before permission for the erection thereof is given, and the said trustees shall be at liberty to withhold such permission and prevent the erection of any monument or tombstone which shall appear to them inappropriate or unbecoming, and shall determine and fix the position of any monument or tombstone which may be proposed to be erected, according to the description, size, and character thereof, having reference to the general plan for ornamenting the said cemetery in an appropriate manner.

13. No catacombs, or any wooden fencing allowed.

14. No servant or other person employed by, or engaged in any duty on behalf of the trustees, will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.

15. The ground will be open daily to the public from sunrise to sunset.

16. A plan of the cemetery, showing the situation of the purchased and other graves, is kept at the office, and may be inspected at the charge set out in schedule, and registers of all grants are kept by the secretary.

17. Any person who shall wantonly and wilfully destroy, or do, or cause to be done, any damage to any monument, vault, tombstone, building, erection, railing, fence, shrubbery, tree or plant, in the said cemetery, will be guilty of a misdemeanor, and being convicted thereof, will be liable for every such offence to a penalty not exceeding £20, or at the discretion of the justices, to imprisonment for any period not exceeding three months; and any person who shall do or cause to be done any injury to any such monument, vault, tombstone, building, erection, railing, shrubbery, tree or plant, whether the same shall have been done wilfully or wantonly or otherwise, howsoever, shall be liable to pay damages and compensation, which shall be recoverable in any court of competent jurisdiction in the colony, by the trustees of said cemetery, or any person injured by such damage.

18. The trustees reserve the right to make any alterations from time to time in these charges and regulations.
