EXEMPTED BUILDINGS, ETC., AT BELFAST.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "*An Act for the Establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*," it is amongst other things enacted that nothing in the said Act contained should authorise the interference, by any municipal council constituted under the said Act, with any public place or building, of what description soever, not erected or constructed by such municipal council, that might be excepted from the jurisdiction of such municipal council by any Proclamation made or to be made by the Lieutenant Governor: And whereas it is deemed expedient to exempt certain places and buildings from the jurisdiction of the council of the municipal district of Belfast: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, do, with the advice of the Executive Council, by this my Proclamation, except from the jurisdiction of the municipal council of Belfast the following public places and buildings, situate and being within the said municipal district, that is to say:—

The Church of England, and Parsonage and School.
The Presbyterian Church and School, and Presbytery.
The Benevolent Asylum.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this eighteenth day of April, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and in the twentieth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

LOCAL COURT DISTRICTS OF FRYER'S CREEK, HEPBURN, CASTLEMAINE, AND TARADALE.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and seal of the colony of Victoria, bearing date the sixteenth day of November in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, it was amongst other things declared and appointed that the districts of Fryer's Creek and Hepburn therein defined should be respectively the districts of separate local courts within the meaning of an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of the said colony, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "*An Act to amend the Laws relating to the Gold Fields*;" And whereas by another Proclamation bearing date the twenty-ninth day of December, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, it was amongst other things declared and appointed that the district of Castlemaine therein defined should be a local court district within the meaning of the said Act; And whereas it is deemed expedient to alter the

said several districts of Fryer's Creek, Hepburn and Castlemaine respectively, and the boundaries thereof, and to appoint a new local court district, to be called the local court district of Taradale: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, do by this my Proclamation, in pursuance of the authority vested in me by the said Act, with the advice of the Executive Council, alter the said several districts of Fryer's Town, Hepburn, and Castlemaine respectively, and the boundaries thereof, in the manner hereinafter mentioned; and with the advice aforesaid, I do hereby appoint that the district of Taradale hereinafter described shall be the district of a separate local court, that is to say:—

THE LOCAL COURT DISTRICT OF FRYER'S CREEK shall consist of the following portion of the said colony:—Commencing at the junction of the Deep Creek with the River Loddon; thence south-easterly by the south bank of the River Loddon to its junction with Campbell's Creek; thence by a line north-easterly to a hill known as "The Monk;" thence by a line north-easterly to a bridge across Forest Creek near its junction with Wattle Creek; thence easterly by the main Melbourne and Castlemaine road, to the dividing range separating the waters flowing to the Rivers Coliban and Loddon; thence southerly by that range, to a point due east of the junction of the Middleton Creek with the River Loddon; thence west to the said junction of the Middleton Creek with the River Loddon; thence by a line westerly to the south-east angle of the parish of Carisbrook; thence by the eastern and northern boundary lines of the said parish, and by the Deep Creek to the commencing point.

THE LOCAL COURT DISTRICT OF HEPBURN shall consist of the following portion of the said colony:—Commencing at the south-east angle of the parish of Carisbrook; thence by a line easterly to the junction of the Middleton Creek with the River Loddon; thence east to the dividing range separating the waters flowing to the Rivers Coliban and Loddon; thence southerly by that range to the most western source of the Coliban River; thence westerly by the Main Dividing Range to the source of the Bullarook Creek; thence by the Bullarook Creek to its junction with the Tullaroop Creek; thence by a line bearing west to Mount Greenock Creek; thence by Mount Greenock Creek and the southern boundary of the parish of Carisbrook aforesaid to the commencing point.

THE LOCAL COURT DISTRICT OF CASTLEMAINE shall consist of the following portion of the said colony:—Commencing at a point on the River Loddon six miles north of the northern boundary line of the parish of Tarnagulla; thence by a line south-easterly to the south-western angle of the parish of Ravenswood; thence by the southern boundary of the said parish to the parish of Harcourt; thence by the western and northern boundaries of the said parish of Harcourt and a line south-easterly to Mount Alexander; thence southwards by the Mount Alexander range and the dividing range separating the waters flowing to the Rivers Coliban and Loddon to the main road to Castlemaine; thence by the main road to Castlemaine to a bridge across Forest Creek near its junction with Wattle Creek; thence by a line south-westerly to a hill known as "The Monk;" thence by a line south-westerly to the junction of Campbell's Creek with the River Loddon; thence by the River Loddon to the parish of Tarnagulla aforesaid; thence by the southern, eastern, and northern boundary lines of the said parish of Tarnagulla and the River Loddon to the commencing point.

THE LOCAL COURT DISTRICT OF TARADALE shall consist of the following portion of the said colony:—Commencing at the source of the Myrtle Creek; thence by the southern banks of the said Myrtle Creek to its junction with the Coliban River;

thence by the Coliban River to its junction with the Campaspe River; thence southerly by the Campaspe River to its junction with Piper's Creek; thence southerly by Piper's Creek to its source in the main dividing range; thence by the main dividing range to the most western source of the Coliban River; and thence by the dividing range, separating the waters flowing to the rivers Coliban and Loddon, to the source of the Myrtle Creek, near Mount Alexander, the commencing point aforesaid.

His wife and two children reside at Port Fairy. Transported to V.D.L. in 1828, per *Woodford*, under sentence for 14 years. Arrived in this colony per *Rebecca*, in 1849. He was tried at Belfast in February, 1854, for forgery and uttering, and received a sentence for 7 years.

Particular marks.—A front tooth in the upper jaw lost, three scars on the back of the head, a scar on the right side of the head, two scars on the left temple, scar on the left side of the chin, first joint of the right hand forefinger lost, scar in the bend of the left arm, burn marks on the right shoulder blade and centre of back.

GENERAL ORDER.

IT has been represented to the Major General commanding the Troops in Australia and New Zealand that there are, at this juncture, very many deluded men in these colonies who bitterly repent of their folly in having, on their first arrival, and as young soldiers, deserted from their regiments, but who are afraid of surrendering themselves on account of the severe penalties which are the just and inevitable awards of desertion:

Moved by these considerations, the Major General ventures so far to interfere in their behalf, that he engages to remit the imprisonment with or without hard labor which, in this command, is the usual punishment of desertion for a first offence, when unattended with aggravated circumstances; provided, however, that offenders of this class, who have now an opportunity of surrendering themselves, shall do so before the celebration of Her most gracious Majesty's Birthday, on the 24th May next ensuing.

The once ill-advised men who so give themselves up to the authorities will again be received into their respective corps, with no other penalty than the forfeiture of the advantage of past services, which the Major General has no power to remit.

They will be restored to the companionship of those true soldiers who faithfully perform their engagements. But should they fatally for themselves otherwise determine, many such deserters may for a while, it is true, continue to elude the untiring and ever-renewing search that at all times places them in danger of being apprehended.

In this condition the consciousness of guilt, the dread of detection, and the certainty that whenever brought before a military tribunal they will assuredly incur the punishment for desertion prescribed by the Articles of War, are circumstances more than sufficient to render life a burthen.

MUNICIPALITY OF BEECHWORTH.

BYE-LAW No. 7.—FOR REMOVING THE BODIES FROM THE OLD GRAVEYARD IN CAMP AND LOCH STREETS, TO THE NEW CEMETERY.

WHEREAS by the 18 Victoria No. 15, sec. XXVII, municipal councils are invested with the care and management of public streets, cemeteries, &c., and whereas a graveyard, which, when originally formed, was in the bush, now occupies a position in the centre of this township, namely, partly upon a portion of the lands lately sold in Camp street and partly upon Loch street itself, but no bodies have been interred therein for about three years, and whereas by Bye-law No. 4 of this council, assented to by His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, and gazetted on the 30th of January last, certain improvements are decided to be effected in this municipality which will occasion the necessity of clearing away that portion of the said graveyard which is upon Loch street, and whereas, in disposing of the other portion of the said graveyard by public auction, the Government made no stipulations for the removal of the bodies, and therefore they may be subject to rough removal or disturbance by reason of any building operations or other works that may be carried on upon such portions of the ground: Be it, and it is hereby therefore ordered and enacted by the municipal council of Beechworth, that tenders be called for and a contract taken forthwith for the removal of all bodies or remains of bodies to be found in the said Old Graveyard in Camp and Loch streets, to the New Cemetery, together with any palings, headboards, or other marks about the same; that separate graves be prepared for such as be found separately interred; that all remains found without coffins be placed in new coffins; and that the whole thereof be conveyed to, and interred in, the New Cemetery, with all proper decency and order, under the superintendence and with the attendance of this municipal council.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 7, made by the municipal council of Beechworth, has been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council.

HEATHCOTE CEMETERY.

RULES and Regulations of the Heathcote General Cemetery:—

1. All charges must be paid when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.

2. Any person making a vault, or erecting and placing a monument in the cemetery, by and with the permission of the trustees, under these rules, and upon the payment of the charges therein mentioned, is entitled to have, maintain, and keep a vault, monument, or tombstone according to the tenor of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person or persons, and his or their heirs, or near relations, for ever.

3. Application for such permission to be made at the office of the trustees. A certificate of permission will be granted to the party applying for such permission, on payment of the charges in the schedule, signed by one of the trustees.

4. The charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in such cemetery, on a certificate of a minister of religion, or other evidence, proving to the satisfaction of the trustees that such person was a pauper, or that the relations and friends of the deceased are unable to pay the costs and charges.

5. Orders for interments to be given either to the keeper, or at the office of the trustees. If at the office of the trustees, such notice to be given between the hours of Ten a.m. and Three p.m. the previous day; if not, an extra charge will be made.

6. The name, age, late place of residence, and date of death of the deceased must be stated at the time of giving the order.

7. Until otherwise ordered, the usual hours fixed for the performance of funerals will be from Ten a.m. to Six o'clock p.m. in the months of September to April inclusive, and from Ten a.m. to Four o'clock p.m. in the other four months, except Sundays, when the only hours for funerals will be from Two to Five o'clock p.m. throughout the year.

8. All monuments, vaults, graves, and gravestones to be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owners.

* The former regulations were Gazetted on the 16th of last September, page 1561 of 1856.

9. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave to be bricked in, and covered by a slab of freestone, slate, or iron.

10. The positions of all graves to be determined by the trustees.

11. All graves must be sunk to a depth of not less than 7 feet.

12. A drawing of every stone, tomb, pedestal, and plan of every monument or tablet proposed to be erected, and a copy of every epitaph or inscription to be submitted to the trustees for approval, who are to determine and fix the position of any unobjectionable monument, according to the description, size, and character thereof, having reference to the general plan of ornamenting the said cemetery in an appropriate manner.

13. No servants or other person employed by, or engaged in any duty on behalf of the trustees, will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.

14. A plan of the cemetery, shewing the situation of the purchased and other graves, is kept at the Survey Office, and may be inspected at the charge set out in the schedule, and registers of all grants are kept by the secretary.

15. The keeper has orders to turn out or to take into custody (as the case may require) any person who shall behave indecorously, or commit any trespass or injury to the trees, flowers, or erections, or otherwise infringe the Act of Council relating to the cemetery, or the regulations for the protection of the same; and such person will be proceeded against according to the provisions of the 14th section of the Act 7 Victoria No. 12.

16. The trustees reserve the right to make any alterations from time to time in these charges and regulations.

CITY COUNCIL OF MELBOURNE.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of New South Wales, 14 Victoria No. 20, intituled, "*An Act for regulating the formation, drainage and repair of streets, courts, and alleys, on private property within the city of Melbourne*," it is, amongst other things enacted, that where any street, court, or alley on private property in the city of Melbourne, shall not be, or shall not have been sufficiently paved, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired, to the satisfaction of the council of the said city, it shall be lawful for the said council, at any time, and from time to time, by any order under the hand of the mayor or town clerk of the said city, for the time being respectively, to order that any such street, court or alley, or any part thereof, shall be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired, in such manner and within such time as to the said council may appear expedient, and thereupon the owners of the tenements adjoining or abutting upon such street, court or alley, on each side thereof, shall, in such manner and within such time as shall be expressed in such order, at their respective costs, charges and expenses, remove all obstructions, and well and efficiently pave, flag and macadamise, level, drain and sewer, or otherwise complete or repair so much of the said street, court or alley, to the centre thereof, as may be opposite to and co-extensive with their respective tenements, adjoining or abutting on such streets, courts or alleys respectively.

And whereas the streets, courts and alleys enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed, marked A have not been sufficiently paved, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired to the satisfaction of the council of the city of Melbourne.

Be it now ordered by the council of the said city, that the streets, courts and alleys enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed, marked A, shall, within forty days from the date of this order coming into operation, be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained, and sewered in such manner as is expressed in the schedule to this order annexed, and marked B; and it is hereby notified to the owners respectively of the tenements adjoining or abutting upon the streets, courts, and alleys enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed, marked A, that if they or any of them shall neglect or omit to remove the obstructions, and pave, flag, macadamise, level, drain, and sewer, or otherwise complete or repair the street, court, or alley on which their tenements respectively adjoin or abut, in the manner and within the time expressed in this order, then the council of the said city will remove all obstructions in the said streets, courts and alleys, and pave, flag, macadamise, level, drain, sewer, and otherwise complete or repair the same, or such parts thereof as shall not have been so done pursuant to this order, and will thereupon ascertain, determine, and charge such respective owners with their several proportionate parts of the costs, charges, and expenses thereof, according to, and co-extensive with, their respective tenements adjoining or abutting on such street, court, or alley, having regard in such apportionment to the state and condition of the pavement, flagging, macadamising, levelling, draining, and sewerage in which such streets, courts, or alleys respectively, or any part thereof, shall or may be at the time of making this order.

SCHEDULE A, REFERRED TO IN THIS ORDER.

Streets, courts, and alleys, ordered to be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained, and sewered.

LOCALITY—LA TROBE WARD.

The private lane or lanes in block 6, allotments 7, 8 and 9, running from Flinders lane to Flinders street.

SCHEDULE B, REFERRED TO IN THIS ORDER.

Manner in which the streets, courts and alleys, enumerated in schedule A, referred to in this order, are ordered to be freed from obstruction, paved flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained, and sewered.

The natural soil is to be reduced or made up as the case may require, so that the longitudinal section of the whole right-of-way shall in no part have an inclination of less than 1 in 120, and where practicable, the entire length is to form one incline. In laying on any stuff it is to be spread in layers of not more than one foot thick. The transverse section of the right-of-way is to show a roadway whose crown shall be one inch above the kerbs of the footways, and in the fall from the crown of the water channels is to be at the rate of 1 in 25.

On either side of the roadway there is to be a water channel eighteen inches wide, consisting of two rows of bluestone pitchers, nine inches deep, and not less than nine inches by fourteen inches on the surface, with upright sides, set in loam and rammed with a rammer weighing forty pounds, so as to subside four inches.

The bottom of the channel is to be seven inches below the top of the kerbs.

On either side of the roadway there is also to be a footway not more than three feet wide, and these are to be separated from the roadway by a red gum plank or kerb ten inches by three, set on edge, and fastened with five-inch spikes to piles four inches by four of red gum, three feet long, driven into the soil.

The footways are to be covered with a coat of gravel three inches thick, and the surface is to fall towards the channel at the rate of 1 in 10. The roadway is to be covered with a coat of broken metal, broken to a two and a-half inch gauge, and laid on seven inches thick at the channels and eight inches at the crown, and this, when necessary, is to be covered with a coat of loam one and a-half inches thick.

Wherever private entrances lead from the rights-of-way they are to be paved to the full width with bluestone pitchers in the same manner as the channels. Paving is to be extended from the channels towards the line of houses or fences, so as to cross the entire footway.

The whole of the work must be done under the inspection and subject to the approval of the city surveyor, who is authorised to order any deviation from these general principles which the particularities of any case may require. No. 612.
