**DESCRIPTION OF THE AGRICULTURAL RESERVE IN THE PARISH OF BOCHARA, COUNTY OF DUNDAS.**—Commencing at the south-east angle of portion 10, section 1, parish of Bochara, where it intersects the Grange Burn; thence by a line bearing north five miles, more or less; thence by a line bearing west to the Wannon River; thence by the Wannon River to its junction with the Grange Burn; and thence by the Grange Burn easterly to the commencing point.

**DESCRIPTION OF THE AGRICULTURAL RESERVE IN THE PARISH OF NORTH HAMILTON, COUNTY OF DUNDAS.**—Commencing at the south-west angle of portion 20, section 1 A, parish of North Hamilton, where it intersects the Grange Burn; thence by a line bearing north five miles, more or less; thence by a line bearing east seven miles and twenty chains, more or less, to the western boundary of the parish of Warrayure; thence by a line bearing south to the Grange Burn; and thence by the Grange Burn westerly to the commencing point.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, "*An Act for the Establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*," it was amongst other things enacted, that any district of the colony of Victoria, the area whereof should not exceed nine square miles, and which should contain a population of householders not less than three hundred, might, subject to the provisions of the said Act, be constituted a municipal district as thereinafter mentioned, provided that no one point in any such area should be distant more than six miles from any other point; And it was further enacted that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, on the receipt of a petition signed by not less than one hundred and fifty householders resident within any such district, praying that such district might be declared a municipal district under the said Act, to cause the substance and prayer of such petition to be published in the *Government Gazette*, and (if no counter petition, signed by an equal or greater number of householders resident within such locality, should have been delivered at the office of the Colonial Secretary within one month from the date of such publication) the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice aforesaid, might, if he should think fit, declare by Proclamation such locality a municipal district by a name to be mentioned in such Proclamation, and also by the same or any other Proclamation might define the limits and boundaries of such municipal district, and such limits and boundaries at any time thereafter in the same manner on receipt of a similar petition might vary and alter, but so as in no case save as thereinafter mentioned to include within the limits or boundaries of such municipal district an area of more than nine square miles, and upon the publication of any such Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, such locality so defined should be deemed and taken to be a municipal district within the meaning of the said Act; And whereas a petition has been presented to His Excellency the Governor by the landowners and householders of Ballarat East, the substance and prayer of which petition have been published as directed by the said Act, and no counter petition has been delivered in opposition thereto within the time allowed by law: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, do by this my Proclamation, in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act, with the advice of the Executive Council, declare that the district hereinafter described and named shall be a municipal district within the meaning of the said Act, that is to say:—

THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF BALLARAT EAST.—Commencing at the north-eastern angle of the municipal district of Ballarat; thence by a line bearing east, and by the River Yarrowee eastward two miles and forty chains; thence by a line bearing south two miles and forty chains; thence by a line bearing west three miles and ten chains, more or less, to the River Yarrowee aforesaid; and thence northwards by that river and by the eastern boundary of the municipal district of Ballarat to the commencing point.

And I do hereby, with the advice aforesaid, direct that the council of the said municipal district shall be called by the name and style of "The Municipal Council of Ballarat East."

THE LOCAL COURT DISTRICT OF BALLAARAT shall comprise the following portion of the said colony, viz.:—Commencing at the source of the Emu Creek, in the main dividing range; thence southwards by the Emu Creek, and by a line bearing south to the Gnarket Ponds; thence southwards by the Gnarket Ponds to a point due west of the junction of the Naringhil Creek with the Woody Yaloak Creek; thence by a line bearing east to the Yarrowee or Leigh River; thence northwards by the Yarrowee or Leigh River to a point due east of Hardie's Hill; thence by a line due west to Hardie's Hill; thence by a line bearing north 52 degrees 30 minutes west six miles and seventy-six chains to the south-west angle of the Buninyong Race-course reserve; thence by a line bearing north 6 degrees 30 minutes east five miles and fifty-two chains; thence by a line bearing north 73 degrees east one mile and twenty-nine chains to the Yarrowee or Leigh River aforesaid; thence by a line bearing south 66 degrees east five miles and thirty-five chains, to the north-east angle of portion A, north of Mount Buninyong; thence northwards by the Mount Buninyong range to the main dividing range; and thence westerly by that range to the commencing point.

### PETITION FOR MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS. WARRINGAL OR HEIDELBERG.

**I**N pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition to His Excellency, hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and fifty-one inhabitants and householders of the township of Warringal, otherwise called Heidelberg, in the county of Bourke.

The petitioners state that they are subjected to great inconvenience and danger from the condition of the streets and roads in their locality, the communication between the township and Melbourne having been during last winter all but cut off, and the streets rendered nearly impassable for both foot passengers and vehicles.

That any general regulations promotive of cleanliness, health and convenience are in the present state of things impracticable, and that hence the township is consigned to utter neglect, and the value of property deteriorated, many persons having removed, and others having been deterred from coming to reside.

The petitioners state further that they feel convinced that the formation of the township into a municipality, under the Act 18 Victoria No. 15, will be the most certain mode of making provision for its present and future requirements.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—  
“Your petitioners therefore pray that your Excellency will be pleased to cause the said township of Warringal or Heidelberg to be proclaimed a municipality under the provisions of the said Act.”

XXVII. Bridges.—When a race shall be carried through any public road, the party cutting such race shall build a substantial bridge, such as the warden shall direct, and it shall be the duty of the party in possession of the race to keep such bridge in good repair.

XXVIII. Working or clearing beds of creeks.—When the working or clearing beds of creeks or waterholes would be no injury to the public, permission may be granted to parties of miners to

undertake the same; the portions of such beds of creeks or waterholes allowed to each miner will be twenty (20) yards in length, irrespective of the breadth, but no party shall be entitled to hold more than one hundred and sixty (160) yards. Parties having cut races to enable them to work the bed of the creeks or waterholes shall be entitled to work the length and breadth of the race, provided it does not exceed the length of the claim. Such conditions relative to the working of such beds of creeks and waterholes as the interest of the public may require will be imposed, and, if deemed expedient, a sum of money as a deposit may be taken from each miner to ensure the due performance of the same.

This rule to repeal No. 11. of the Mount Blackwood Local Court Regulations, gazetted on the 12th day of September, 1856.

xxix. *Notices of applications for leases, &c., to be posted.*—All parties lodging applications for leases and permissions that require the special sanction of the local court, shall conspicuously place upon the ground applied for, a notice of their intention, on or before the date of such application.

xxx. *Surveyor.*—A competent surveyor shall be appointed by the local court, who shall report upon applications for leases and permissions, and who shall draw such plans and prepare such estimates as may be necessary.

xxxi. *Sluice-heads of water.*—Sixteen (16) square inches of water shall be considered a sluice-head, such water to be taken six (6) inches below the surface of the water in the dam or creek whence drawn. All water privileges, for whatever purpose granted, shall be founded on the above measurement, and applicants must state the number of such sluice-heads they require.

xxxii. *Conditions imposed on leased lands.*—It shall be lawful for the local court, in approving of the issue of any lease, to impose a written condition, giving parties the privilege of cutting a race or races through such leased ground, provided the application to cut such race or races be made to the local court.

xxxiii. *Leased lands to be marked by corner posts.*—Strong posts (with a small white flag attached), of not less than six (6) feet high, must be placed at each corner, to mark the limits of all leased grounds; such posts to be kept in good repair.

#### LOCAL COURT REGULATIONS.

HEPBURN.

**R**EGULATIONS made by the Local Court of the district of Hepburn:—

##### REPEAL OF FORMER REGULATIONS.

As it is expedient that the mining rules and regulations passed from time to time by the local court of this district, and assented to by His Excellency the Governor in Council, should be revised and consolidated, all rules and regulations therefore which at any time previous to the date hereof have been passed and assented to shall be repealed, and the following substituted in lieu of them so soon as the repeal of the former and the substitution of the latter shall have been assented to by His Excellency the Governor.

i. *Cement or rock sinking.*—In all cases of cement or rock sinking, and in all other cases of alluvial sinking, when the depth exceeds (50) fifty feet, the size and extent shall be—

- For one miner, 20 feet x 20 feet.
- For two miners, 20 feet x 40 feet.
- For three miners, 30 feet x 40 feet.
- For four miners, 40 feet x 40 feet.
- For five miners, 40 feet by 50 feet.
- For six miners, 40 feet x 60.

ii. *Alluvial sinking under 50 feet in depth.*—In all cases of alluvial sinking, except those provided for in rule No. 1, the size and extent shall be—

- For one miner, 15 feet by 15 feet.
- For two miners, 15 feet x 30 feet.
- For three miners, 22½ feet x 30 feet.
- For four miners, 30 feet x 30 feet.

iii. *Definition of sluicing claim.*—For the purposes of these regulations a sluicing claim shall mean a claim which is worked with boxes placed upon the claim with water from some permanent spring or creek running at least six months of the year, brought either through a race or raised from the creek by pumps or other machinery, and the ground must be worked from the surface to the bed rock.

iv. *Sluicing claims.*—Sluice washing and other water privilege will only be allowed by special sanction from the warden or other authorised person, where it can be satisfactorily proved that no injury will result to the public by conferring such privilege.

v. *Claims in the beds of creeks.*—In the beds of the creeks below high water mark, the size of claims shall be as follows, a permission for which may be obtained upon application to the warden of the district:—

- For one miner, 15 yards, irrespective of width.
- For two miners, 30 yards " "
- For three miners, 45 yards " "
- For four miners, 60 yards " "

vi. *Bank or hill sluicing.*—All parties applying for sluicing claims other than in the beds of creeks must do so in writing, such applications to be taken into consideration at the next meeting of the local court, by which claims may be allowed on any part of the district, provided the provisions of Regulation No. 4 are complied with.

vii. *Size of sluicing claims.*—The extent of sluicing claims shall be—

- For one miner, 15 yards x 40 yards.
- For two miners, 30 yards x 40 yards.
- For three miners, 45 yards x 40 yards.
- For four miners, 60 yards x 40 yards.

viii. *Extended claims.*—In cases where a much greater amount of labor and expense than usual is necessary to prepare for working a claim, and in cases of surfacing where the average depth is not over three feet, it shall be at the discretion of the court to allow an extended claim, such extended claim in no case to exceed one hundred yards by one hundred yards for any number of miners, viz.:—

- For one miner, 50 yards x 50 yards.
- For two miners, 50 yards x 100 yards.
- For three miners, 75 yards x 100 yards.
- For four miners, 100 yards x 100 yards.

ix. *Reservation of water rights.*—All registered water rights granted from springs or other sources liable to become dry in summer shall not be forfeited in consequence of the owners working elsewhere upon other claims during the time the race is dry, or has not sufficient water for its purpose, provided one of the party remains in charge of the race during the dry season.

x. *Right to races, &c.*—All right to any race cut for conveying water, tail race, or other privilege granted for using water in the creeks or out of the creeks becomes forfeited when abandoned, if in the creeks for the space of one week, and if out of the creeks for one month, unless sickness or other sufficient cause be shewn for leaving it.

xi. *Tail races, &c.*—All parties obtaining permissions for sluicing claims or puddling machines shall be subject to certain conditions, by which parties working above them shall be secured a tail race, although no tailings from such race shall be allowed to accumulate on the lower claim.

xii. *Size of quartz claims.*—The size of claims on quartz reefs shall be for each miner twenty feet along the reef, including all the dips and angles, provided there shall not be more than six men in each party.

xiii. *Registration of quartz claims.*—Parties sinking for or on a quartz vein, who are compelled to abandon the same for want of means, shall be allowed to register their claims for one month at a time, provided the same shall be sufficiently worked to justify the court in allowing such privilege.

xiv. *Quartz crushing machines.*—All machinists crushing quartz for the public shall have on the premises a correct weighing machine, and the quartz shall be weighed by avoirdupois weight, and be deposited under a covered shed if required by the owner thereof.

xv. *Puddling machines.*—No puddling machine shall be allowed in any place where it may be considered injurious to the supply of water or the interests of other miners, and none shall be erected without application having been made to and granted by the local court. A notice to be posted on the ground seven days prior to application.

xvi. *Size of puddling machine claims.*—The size of puddling machine claims (that is on ground partially worked and abandoned) shall be:—

- For one miner, 15 x 40 yards.
- For two miners, 30 x 40 yards.
- For three miners, 45 x 40 yards.
- For four miners, 60 x 40 yards.

xvii. *Prospecting parties.*—Any party discovering new gold workings more than five hundred yards from any established lead shall receive a double or treble claim at the discretion of the warden, provided such discovery be made known without unnecessary delay; provided also, that in the discovery of a new quartz vein or reef, the claim granted to any one party shall in no case exceed one hundred and fifty yards.

xviii. *Business license allotment.*—The holder of a business license shall be entitled to occupy a frontage of thirty feet by sixty feet in depth, which area shall not be undermined without a written sanction from the warden.

xix. *Forceful seizure of claims.*—No party shall be allowed to take forcible possession of a claim, the property of another person; but when a claim is disputed on any of the grounds mentioned in these regulations, the party wishing to take possession of said claim must first make application to the warden of the district to enquire into and decide the case.

xx. *Baling claims compulsory.*—All parties shall be compelled to bale the water from their claims when it can be proved that the accumulation thereof is injurious to the adjoining miners. A notice of six hours to be given to the party or parties so neglecting prior to complaint being made to the warden.

xxi. *Combination of miners allowed.*—Two parties of miners holding adjoining claims may obtain a written sanction from

the warden authorising them to combine for the purpose of working the said claims from one shaft, on the distinct condition that the ground be worked by the same number of miners as would be required were it divided into smaller claims. A notice to be posted on the ground seven days prior to application.

**xxii. Leases.**—Leases for mining auriferous lands may be approved for periods not exceeding twelve months. Such leases will be renewable provided the regulations of the court be complied with, but in every case subject to its recommendation. Alluvial lands partially worked and abandoned in square or rectangular blocks, and quartz reefs with the dip or underlay, may be leased in areas proportionate to the number of miners and description and power of machinery. Applicants to state in writing to the clerk of the court (having previously pegged the ground, as in ordinary cases) the number of hands they guarantee to employ, and the description and power of machinery they will have at work within a given time of the date of application. Notices of application to be posted on the ground fourteen days prior to such application.

**NOTE.**—Applicants for leases, and petitioners against their being granted, should give their names, surnames, present abode, and trade or occupation, or their applications to the court will not be entertained.

**xxiii. Registration of races.**—Races for the supply of water to sluices or puddling machines shall be registered according to priority of date prospectively and retrospectively, the holders of the first race cut on any stream having the first right to water on its own parallel. But no race shall be allowed to hold water for two sluices until all the others on the said parallel shall be supplied with water for one sluice or tom.

**xxiv. Plurality of claims.**—Any duly authorised miner may hold a claim of the authorised extent or share in a claim or claims to the amount of such said extent, provided in all cases that he shall employ in or upon the said claim, share or shares, in exact proportion to their extent, the number of authorised miners required by these regulations.

**xxv. Sale of claims.**—Any duly authorised miner who may be in actual and undisputed possession of a claim or a share or shares, or any part thereof, may at his option sell or transfer the said claim, share or shares, or any part thereof, provided in all cases that he shall first offer the refusal of said claim, share or shares, to his partners or other person interested therein.
