TRANSFERABLE AND REMITTABLE GOVERNMENT DEBENTURES.

HIS Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to direct that sealed tenders be invited, to be received at the Treasury, Melbourne, until Noon of the eighth day of June, 1857, from persons desirous to advance the whole, or any portion of the sum of One hundred and eighty-seven thousand pounds sterling, secured by debentures, to be issued by the Treasurer under authority of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 40, as follows:—

1st. Each tender must be for an even sum of hundreds of pounds, and must state the year in which the tenderer wishes the debentures he tenders for to be payable, and whether in Melbourne or London, and also where the interest is to be payable.

2nd. The tenders must be sealed and endorsed "Tender for Government Debentures," and addressed to the Treasurer.

3rd. Should the tender be accepted debentures in the form set forth in the schedule A to the said Act will be issued for (£100) One hundred pounds each, secured upon the general revenue of the colony of Victoria, and made a first charge thereon, and will bear interest from the 1st July, 1857, at the rate of Six pounds (£6) per centum per annum, payable half yearly, on the 1st January and the 1st of July, the first payment of such interest being due on the 1st January, 1858.

4th. Any change in the place at which the principal or interest is payable may be made by the holder giving six months notice, in writing, in the manner prescribed by the Act.

PUBLIC HEALTH ACT EXTENDED TO MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF ST. KILDA.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed by the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the Colony of Victoria, in the eighteenth year of Her present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for promoting the Public Health in populous places in the Colony of Victoria," it was amongst other things enacted,

that the said Act, or any clause or section thereof, should apply to such city, town, district, or place in Victoria as the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, might by Proclamation see fit to direct: And whereas it is deemed expedient to extend the said Act to the municipal district of St. Kilda: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation, in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act, declare and appoint that the said Act shall apply to, and be in force in, the municipal district of St. Kilda, the boundaries whereof are set forth and defined in a Proclamation bearing date the twelfth day of February, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven.

MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF SOUTH BARWON.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the Colony of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," it was amongst other things enacted, that any district of the colony of Victoria, the area whereof should not exceed nine square miles, and which should contain a population of householders not less than three hundred, might, subject to the provisions of the said Act, be constituted a municipal district as thereafter mentioned, provided that no one point in any such area should be distant more than six miles from any other point; And it was further enacted that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, on the receipt of a petition signed by not less than one hundred and fifty householders resident within any such district, praying that such district might be declared a municipal district under the said Act, to cause the substance and prayer of such petition to be published in the *Government Gazette*, and (if no counter petition, signed by an equal or greater number of householders resident within such locality, should have been delivered at the office of the Colonial Secretary within one month from the date of such publication) the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice aforesaid, might, if he should think fit, declare by Proclamation such locality a municipal district by a name to be mentioned in such Proclamation, and also by the same or any other Proclamation might define the limits and boundaries of such municipal district, and such limits and boundaries at any time thereafter in the same manner, on receipt of a similar petition, might vary and alter, but so as in no case save as thereafter mentioned to include within the limits or boundaries of such municipal district an area of more than nine square miles, and upon the publication of any such Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, such locality so defined should be deemed and taken to be a municipal district within the meaning of the

said Act; And whereas a petition has been presented to His Excellency the Governor by the householders residing on the south side of the River Barwon, and within the corporate limits of the town of Geelong, the substance and prayer of which petition have been published as directed by the said Act: And whereas the mayor and town council of the town of Geelong and the said petitioners have adjusted the relative proportions of their respective liability in regard to the loan effected by the said mayor and town council: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, do by this my Proclamation, in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act, with the advice of the Executive Council, declare that the district hereinafter described and named shall be a municipal district within the meaning of the said Act, that is to say:—

MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF SOUTH BARWON—Commencing at a point on the eastern bank of the River Barwon, being the south-west angle of allotment 1, north of section 25, parish of Barrarbool; thence by the southern banks of the said river to the eastern boundary of the Race Course; thence by the eastern and southern boundaries of the Race Course to a point one chain due north of the north-east angle of allotment J, section 4, parish of Connewarre; thence by a line bearing south to the south-east angle of allotment K, section 4, in the same parish; thence by a line bearing west to the south-west angle of portion 16, parish of Duned; thence by a line bearing north to the north-west angle of allotment 8, section 18, parish of Moorpanyal; thence by a line bearing west, being the northern boundary of section 25, parish of Barrarbool, to the River Barwon; and thence by the eastern bank of that river to the commencing point.

And I do hereby, with the advice aforesaid, direct that the council of the said municipal district shall be called by the name and style of "The Municipal Council of South Barwon."

PETITION FOR MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS.

CARISBROOK.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council, 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition to His Excellency hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and fifty-two householders and landowners in the township and parish of Carisbrook, in the county of Talbot.

The petitioners state that they are householders and landowners in the town and parish of Carisbrook, and are convinced that it will conduce to the improvement, welfare and good government of the township if it were incorporated into a municipal district under 18 Victoria No. 15, and they propose the following boundaries, viz.:—Commencing at the north-western point of suburban allotment 4, parish of Carisbrook, and running in a south-westerly direction one hundred and sixty-one chains; thence due south three hundred and thirty-two chains to the Government road from Carisbrook to Amherst; thence due east eighty-two chains, crossing Back Creek and Mount Greenock Creek; thence in a north-easterly direction four hundred and twenty chains to the south-east corner of the cemetery; thence due north, running along the boundary of the cemetery eight chains to the main Government road to Melbourne through Tarragower; and thence in a north-westerly direction two hundred and twenty-two chains to the commencing point.

The petitioners further state that the proposed municipal district contains nine square miles, that no one point in it is more than six miles distant from any other point, and that more than three hundred landowners and householders are resident within it.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"That Your Excellency will be pleased, by proclamation in the usual manner, to declare the district of Carisbrook a municipal district, under the provisions of the Act of Council before mentioned."

LOCAL COURT REGULATIONS.

REGULATIONS made by the Local Court of the district of Avoca.

RULES FOR WATER PRIVILEGES.

xxx. *Making and holding dam to contain water.*—No waterhole, race, or dam shall be cut or made in any place where any number of miners may be obtaining their livelihood by sinking, or on workable ground supposed to contain gold in a payable quantity, or where it would be injurious to other mining operations or the supply of water.

Any person or persons desirous of making and holding any waterhole, race, or dam to contain water, shall make application to the warden, and post a notice of such application on the site applied for for seven days; when, if it can be proved satisfactorily that the site applied for is in conformity with the abovementioned particulars, a written authority may be given to the applicant, but such authority shall not prevent any licensed miner from washing any auriferous earth with tub and cradle at the aforesaid waterhole or dam beyond 30 feet from the main artificial embankment of the same, providing such parties be careful to remove all tailings and such like, so that the dam or waterhole be not injured thereby.

xxxii. *Transfer of water privileges.*—In no case shall it be lawful to transfer any right for water privileges to any other party; but any person or persons about to take possession of any water privileges previously held by another, must first obtain a written sanction from the warden before they can lay claim to the same.

xxxiii. *Water reserved.*—No washing or puddling shall be allowed in any hole which the warden or other proper authority may consider requisite to be reserved for drinking or culinary purposes, and notice of such reservation must be kept posted on the ground immediately adjoining.

xxxiv. *Claims forfeited.*—All right to any race, waterhole, or dam, shall become forfeited when left unoccupied for the space of fourteen days, unless sickness or some other sufficient cause shall be shown for leaving it.

xxxv. *Undermining, injuring, &c., of embankment of dam, &c.*—No person or persons shall undermine, remove, or anywise injure any embankment, whether natural or artificial, of any waterhole, race, or dam, except by special permission in writing from the warden of this district.

xxxvi. *Application and extent of ground for puddling machine.* Any person or persons desirous of erecting a puddling machine to be worked by horse or steam power, shall make application to the warden and post a notice on some conspicuous place on the site applied for for seven days; when, if it can be proved satisfactorily that the site applied for is in strict conformity with the foregoing regulation, a written authority may be given to the applicant. The area allowed for the erection of any puddling machine shall be 40 x 40 feet, and 24 x 24 feet for the depositing of washing stuff, and no greater area shall be allowed except by special permission from the local court.

xxxvii. *Puddling machine where to be erect'd, and how dealt with.*—No machine for puddling auriferous earth by horse or steam power shall be erected in any place where any number of miners may be obtaining their livelihood by sinking, nor shall any such machine be placed on workable ground supposed to contain gold in a payable quantity, nor in any place where the sludge of such machine shall be injurious to other mining operations, or the supply of water, ground under clay excepted.

All parties discharging sludge or water from any machine or other puddling apparatus shall make a good and proper drain to join and fall into the main channel or drain of the gully or flat in which such machine is situated; should there exist no main channel for the effectual carrying off of sludge or superfluous water, the warden may direct the owners of such machines to make a general drain, and shall prescribe the course, position, depth and inclination, removal of obstructions, the allotment of work among the different owners or such other directions as he may deem desirable; or should it be deemed requisite, the warden may direct the owners of such machines to make a good and proper dam or reservoir for the reception of such sludge or superfluous water as may be discharged from the same.

In no case will such sludge or water be allowed to run upon or across any public road or footpath in common use, or on workable ground, to the detriment of other miners.

The foregoing Regulations, Nos. xxxi. to xxxvii., have been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council.

LOCAL COURT REGULATIONS.

MOUNT EGERTON.

REGULATIONS made by the Local Court of the district of Mount Egerton.

QUARTZ REEFS.

CHAP. I.—*The dimensions of claims on quartz reefs.*
i. The length of ground to be held by virtue of each miner's right shall be twenty feet per man along the course of the reef.

ii. Eighty feet shall be the maximum extent in length allowed to each party of miners to be held as one claim.

iii. The discovery or Crown claim shall be one hundred feet in length.

iv. In abandoned ground double extent in length shall be allowed, without extra width.

v. A width of sixty feet on both sides of a reef, with all its dips and angles, shall be allowed to each claim.

vi. The divisional line between claims shall be a line running east and west through the end pegs.

vii. The southern peg of each claim shall have the number of the claim attached to it in a conspicuous manner; the numbering of the claims to commence at the Crown claim, and to be continued northerly and southerly from it.

viii. The double banking of claims on the known course of a quartz reef shall not be allowed.

CHAP. II.—*The working of quartz reefs.*

i. *Forcible occupation prohibited.*—To prohibit the forcible occupation of claims which have been at all worked, it shall be held necessary as a preliminary step, without which permission shall not be given, that where a claim or share in a claim is supposed to have become forfeited or abandoned, the former holders, if on these gold fields, and in the habit of frequenting it, be served with written notice of intention to occupy; and upon proof of service of notice, or of posting of it at the claim for twenty-four hours when the holders are not known, the justice shall, either with assessors or without them, as may be required by Act of Council, decide the possession of it: provided that reasonable excuse for absence, irrespectively of any fixed period for absence, be accepted at the hearing of the dispute, and have its due weight.

ii. *Purality of shares.*—Any person shall be allowed to hold any number of shares in one claim or in several claims, on one reef or on several reefs, provided that each share be efficiently worked by a substitute in conformity with the regulations.

iii. *Amalgamation of claims.*—Permission will be given to the holders of adjoining claims to unite in the working of them more profitably, upon receiving the sanction of the local court; and such permission shall be given subject to the regulations in force on these gold fields, and any special conditions which the court may find it necessary to impose for the security of the mining interest.

iv. *Registration of claims as unworked.*—A party of miners who, from want of means or other good cause, are compelled to temporarily abandon their claim, and their case upon investigation is found to be one of peculiar hardship and to have been attended with a large amount of unprofitable work, shall be allowed to leave and register the said claim as unworked for a period not exceeding two months at a time, upon making application to that effect to the local court: provided that written notice of the said application about to be made has been properly served upon the holders of the adjoining claims, and that the sanction of the court to the said registration shall then be given.

ALLUVIAL SINKINGS.

CHAP. III.—*Dimensions of claims in alluvial sinkings.*

i. Twenty feet per man shall be allowed along the lead or gutter on alluvial dry sinkings, with a width of forty feet.

ii. Eighty feet along the lead or gutter, by forty feet in width, shall be the maximum size of each claim in dry sinkings.

iii. The discovery or Crown claim, in dry sinkings, shall be of double extent in length along the lead or gutter without extra width.

iv. Thirty feet per man along the gutter shall be allowed in alluvial wet sinkings with a width of forty feet.

v. One hundred and twenty feet along the gutter, with a width of forty feet, shall be the maximum size of each claim in alluvial wet sinkings.

vi. The discovery or Crown claim in alluvial wet sinkings shall be of double extent along the gutter without extra width.

vii. In surface sinkings not exceeding six feet in depth, fifty feet square shall be allowed to each man.

CHAP. IV.—*The working of alluvial sinkings.*

i. Where a recognised gutter exists, the double banking of the claims on it shall not be allowed.

ii. In alluvial sinkings the shaft must be as near as possible to the centre of the claim.

iii. The corner pegs of each claim must be kept constantly in their places, and are not to be less than two feet from the ground.

iv. The amalgamation of claims in wet sinkings will be allowed upon receiving the sanction of the local court, provided that due notice, in writing, of the proposed amalgamation has been properly served upon the holders of the claims contiguous to, and not to be included in, the proposed amalgamation.

v. Before erecting a dam to collect water, the sanction of the local court must be obtained.

The foregoing Regulations, Chapters i. to iv., have been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF RICHMOND.

THE SECOND HALF-YEARLY REPORT OR STATEMENT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF RICHMOND, FOR SIX MONTHS FROM THE 2ND DAY OF NOVEMBER, 1856, TO THE 2ND DAY OF MAY, 1857, PURSUANT TO THE 43RD SECTION OF THE MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS ACT.

BOUNDARIES OF THE MUNICIPALITY.

THE boundaries of the municipality are as follows:—

On the west by the eastern boundary of Hoddle street, from the River Yarra to the centre of Victoria street east; on the north by a straight line along the centre of Victoria street east to its termination, and thence by a straight line to the River Yarra; on the south and east by the River Yarra.

The northern boundary of the municipality has been extended by Proclamation of His Excellency Sir Henry Barkly, No 61—JUNE 2ND, 1857.—4.

from the southern boundary of Victoria street east to the centre of the roadway.

An agreement has been made with the municipal council of East Collingwood for the joint maintenance of the roadway, each municipality separately forming and repairing the footpaths and water channels.

APPLICATIONS TO GOVERNMENT.

The council have maintained a correspondence with the various departments of the Government on important public questions affecting the interest of the municipality, with the following results:—

Branch Post Office be established in Richmond.—Refused.
Tolls on Richmond Bridge road be granted to the municipal council.—No answer.

Second moiety of £5000.—Granted.
Set of standard weights and measures.—None in the colony.
Site for quarries.—Granted.

Destruction of thistles.—Prisoners of the Crown sent to cut them down.

Post Office be not removed from Richmond.—No answer.
Proclamation of fifty-three streets, of certain widths of roadways and footpaths.—Granted.

Footpaths on eastern portion of Hoddle street, generally known as Punt road, be formed.—No answer.

Formation and metalling of Hoddle street, between Wellington parade and Victoria street east.—Declined for the present.

Cleanse channels in Richmond Bridge road from Star and Garter Hotel to Church street.—Granted.

Three thousand pounds, portion of grant in aid, appropriated for 1857.—Granted.

Removal of Punt House from the northern bank of the River Yarra.—To be removed in July.

Dangerous state of bridge across the Yarra connecting Richmond with Hawthorn.—New bridge to be erected.

Government to proclaim, under 34th section of the Municipal Institutions Act, the roads, works, places or buildings which the Government intend should be excluded from the interference of the council.—No answer.

Grant of the two acres of land on which the Court House now stands.—No answer.

Grant of land for site for a fair and cattle market.—Council to select site.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Bye-law No. 1, appropriating £5000, grant in aid, adopted by the council on the 17th September.—Gazetted on the 1st January, 1857.

Bye-law No. 2, to prevent accidents from fires in chimney flues, and to cause water carriers to give prompt aid at fires; and Bye-law No. 3, prohibiting damage to public footpaths and water-courses, and regulating the formation of private drains and crossings, adopted by the council on the 19th December, 1856.—Gazetted on the 13th January, 1857.

Two hundred copies of bye-laws Nos. 2 and 3 have been posted throughout the municipality.

Deputations from the council have waited upon the Honorable the Commissioner of Public Works respecting the appropriation by the Government of the tolls receivable at the Richmond road toll-gate, and the punt on the Yarra at the southern termination of Hoddle street; also pointing out the absolute necessity of forming and metalling that portion of Hoddle street situate between Wellington parade and Victoria street east.—Hitherto without success.

The resignation by councillor Little of his seat in the municipal council of Richmond was accepted on the 14th day of November, 1856; on the 13th day of December following, councillor Egan was elected to fill the vacancy.

Francis Greenway, land and house agent, was appointed rate collector on the 13th day of January, 1857, at a fixed salary of £100 per annum.

Sergeant Boylan, of the Richmond Police, was appointed Inspector of Nuisances on the 30th day of January, at a weekly salary at the rate of £50 per annum.

An adjourned public meeting of the ratepayers held at the Assembly Rooms, Swan street, on Thursday, the 5th of February, authorised the council to borrow the sum of £5000 as a cash credit, if required, to enable the council to carry out the projected public works. An arrangement has been proposed by the Bank of Victoria to advance the council the sum of £5000 as a cash credit at 6 per cent.—As yet no final arrangement has been entered into, the council being at present in sufficient funds to carry on the improvements.

The council held two special meetings on the 6th and 13th April, in addition to the usual meetings, for the purpose of enabling ratepayers to place their names on the municipal electoral roll, 69 of whom availed themselves of the opportunity.

At the annual election held on the 20th April, councillors P. Johnson, H. Johnson, and T. Lambert, were elected to fill the vacancies of P. Johnson, H. Johnson, and Horatio St. John Clarke.

The auditors to the council are J. Anketell, Esq., J.P., and Mr. Charles Britten.

The Honorable Henry Miller, M.L.C., was elected chairman of the council for the present year.

The Public Works Committee consists of D. S. Campbell, Esq., M.L.A., chairman, councillors Burnley, Egan, H. Johnson, and Lambert.

The Finance and Legislative Committee consists of the Honorable Henry Miller, M.L.C., chairman, D. S. Campbell, Esq., M.L.A., H. Johnson, and P. Johnson.
