ROAD THROUGH THE PARISH OF BULLA-BULLA.

(Amended Description.)

NOTICE is hereby given that a map and survey plan, describing the exact course and bearings of, and the admeasurements required for, a road through the parish of Bulla-bulla, in the county of Bourke, proposed to be made by the Central Road Board, together with a description of the lands through which the same is proposed to pass, and the names of the owners and occupiers thereof, so far as known, and also an estimate of the expense of the said work, have been deposited at the Public Lands Office, Melbourne, the particulars of which are as follow:—

The road commences at a point on a public road (dividing sections iv. and viii. from sections v. and vii.) 41 chains from the south-west corner of section iv., bearing west 36 degrees 25 minutes north, 52 chains; thence west 37 degrees 45 minutes north down Lighthouse Gully, 17 chains 60 links; thence west 11 degrees 10 minutes north, 7 chains 90 links; thence north 40 degrees west, 21 chains; thence by a curve to a point on the Deep Creek, bearing north 31 degrees 30 minutes west, 8 chains 50 links; thence north 37 degrees 57 minutes east, 22 chains 20 links; thence north 15 degrees 58 minutes west, 16 chains 50 links; thence north 59 degrees 50 minutes west, 19 chains 50 links; thence west 19 degrees 20 minutes north, 14 chains 60 links; thence due north, 22 chains 60 links, passing through the property of David Patulla, joining the road at the south side of section xiii.

The quantity of land required to be taken for the proposed road is twenty acres thirty-eight perches, and the cost of effecting the said work is to be defrayed by the petitioners applying for the road.

PROPOSED ROAD FROM WARRINGAL TO THE MOONEE PONDS.

(Amended Description.)

NOTICE is hereby given that a map and survey plan, describing the exact course and bearings of, and the admeasurements required for, a road from Warringal to the Moonee Ponds, in the parishes of Keelbundora and Jika Jika, in the county of Bourke, proposed to be made by the Central Road Board, together with a description of the lands through which the same is proposed to pass, and the names of the owners and occupiers thereof, so far as known, and also an estimate of the expense of the said work, have been deposited at the Public Lands Office, Melbourne, the particulars of which are as follow:—

The road commences at the north-west corner of Warringal reserve, and bears west through section 3, parish of Keelbundora, the property of Thomas Farrell and to the Darebin Creek, distance 107 chains 50 links (the road is one chain wide, and occupies an area of 10 acres 3 roods); thence due west to the north-east corner of section 141, parish of Jika Jika; thence west 1 chain; thence south 40 chains, thence west 59 chains to the Moonee Ponds. That portion of the road passing through section 141 is one chain wide, and occupies an area of 9 acres 3 roods 24 perches, the property of Collier Robertson.

LOCAL COURT REGULATIONS.

FRYER'S CREEK.

REGULATIONS made by the Local Court of the district of Fryer's Creek:—

i. *Interpretation of the word "claim"*.—For the purposes of these regulations, the word "claim" shall be understood to mean the portion of Crown land which each person or company shall be entitled to occupy, or to occupy or mine in, under any document, license, or lease issued by authority; also that portion of land assigned to any person or persons by any warden or other competent officer, and which may be occupied by any dwelling-place or stable, with a reasonable amount of ground around them, or by any dam or water-hole, machine, private cart road, drain, or as drainage ground for the supply of water to any engine, mill, or machine.

ii. *Extent of claim on new ground*.—The extent of claim to which each miner's right shall entitle the holder shall be—

In sinking under 20 feet, 12 feet by 12 feet to each miner;

In sinking over 20 feet and under 30 feet, 12 feet by 18 feet to each miner;

In deep or hard hill sinking over 30 feet, 18 feet by 18 feet to each miner;

beyond which no greater area (except as provided for by the rules of the local court) will be granted, unless where it can be proved satisfactorily that two or more parties of miners taking up claims in the usual manner on worked or flooded ground, can, by combining, overcome any natural difficulties which may exist by means not detrimental to the interests of the public or other authorised miners. Such combinations may be authorised under the distinct condition that the ground must be worked by the same number of miners as would be required were it divided into the smaller claims.

Any such combination of miners must be in possession of a written sanction from the warden, to be produced when required.

iii. *Extent of claim on old workings*.—Old workings, that is, ground partially worked and abandoned—first, when the sinking is under thirteen feet the extent of claim shall be twenty (20) feet by twenty (20) feet to each miner; secondly, when the sinking is thirteen (13) feet and feet and upwards, requiring tail race or other expensive outlay, the extent of claim shall be thirty (30) feet by thirty (30) feet to each miner; thirdly, when the ground is wet, or flooded, of an average depth of twenty (20) feet at least, and the application of horse, water, or steam power is introduced for the effectual working of the same, forty (40) feet by forty (40) feet shall be allowed to each miner.

iv. *Extent of claim for deep sinking on new ground*.—The local court, wishing to encourage miners in prospecting and working deep and hard hills, extends the claim of each miner to thirty (30) feet by thirty (30) feet, provided the depth of sinking exceeds thirty-five (35) feet.

v. *Working or clearing beds of creeks*.—Where the working or clearing of beds of creeks or water-holes would be no injury to the public, written permission may be granted to parties of miners to undertake the same. The portion of such beds of creeks or water-holes allowed to each miner shall be not less than six (6) yards or more than ten (10) yards in length, irrespective of breadth. The holders of such claims must be in possession of a written authority from the warden, who will determine the extent of such claim as the interests of the public may require.

vi. *Extent of quartz claims*.—The extent of quartz claim for each miner shall be twenty (20) feet along the vein, to be limited to six (6) men.

vii. *Width of quartz claims*.—The width of quartz claims from east to west shall be three hundred (300) feet, i.e. one hundred and fifty (150) feet on each side of the working shaft or the correct line of reef when ascertained.

viii. *Amalgamation of quartz claims*.—Parties of miners holding adjoining quartz claims may combine for the purpose of expediting their work by the introduction of machinery. The areas of amalgamated claims shall in all cases be limited to twelve (12) men holding miner's rights in such company. In no case will amalgamated claims be permitted without a written sanction from the warden.

ix. *Marking of claims*.—All leases, extended alluvial and registered claims, shall be marked by posts placed firmly in the ground at least two (2) feet high above the surface, with the number of lease or claim, and area occupied, written and posted on the inner side facing the ground so occupied. All claims held for mining purposes, and not provided for as above (except quartz claims), shall be properly marked by posts at the corners, of at least one (1) foot above the surface, and always kept easily distinguishable. All quartz claims shall be marked in length by two posts, standing at least three (3) feet above the surface, placed along the line of reef at the northern and southern extremities of the claim. The boundary lines east and west shall in every case be run at right angles with the line of reef, and which, in cases of dispute, may be determined by the warden.

x. *Registration of claims*.—Any party sinking for or on a quartz vein, who are compelled to abandon the same for want of means, shall be allowed to register their claim for not more than three (3) months, and at the rate of one month at a time, provided the claim shall be sufficiently worked to justify the warden in allowing such privileges. Any party who shall have expended considerable labor on an alluvial claim, and may

be unable to obtain the reward of their labor through the flooding or other uncontrollable circumstances, shall be allowed to register such claims as unworkable; but the allowing of such registration shall be at the discretion of the warden. Parties wishing to register claims for periods longer than three (3) months must make application to the court.

xi. *Plurality of claims*.—Any miner or other residents in the district can hold claims in more than one place, provided he or they shall not have more than six (6) claims, that is for six (6) men in each claim, and that the said claims shall be separate at least six (6) claims distant, and that the holder or holders of such claims shall keep employed the number of licensed miners specified by these rules.

xii. *Stacking quartz*.—Any person wishing to retain possession of any quartz, stone, casing, or other substance containing gold, the produce of a quartz claim he is about to relinquish, may do so for any period not exceeding one year, provided that he stack such stone, casing, or other substance in a proper manner, on ground not supposed to be workable, erect close to such stack a post, with his name, address, and date of stacking legibly painted thereon, and register the same with the clerk of the local court.

And it shall be competent for the warden of the district to declare relinquished any stone, casing, or other substance not so stacked and taken from a claim then abandoned.

xiii. *Prospecting alluvial workings*.—For the encouragement of prospecting, persons discovering any new alluvial gold workings may have allotted to them by special sanction, an extent of ground equal to double the ordinary area of mining claims, provided the discovery be made public without unnecessary delay.

xiv. *Prospecting quartz reefs*.—Any persons prospecting for a quartz reef may have allotted to them double claims for each man employed, to be limited to four (4) men.

Parties having claims upon a quartz reef, or supposed reef, who have not struck auriferous quartz, can hold the said claim by employing half the number of men for which there are claims marked off.

xv. *Leases*.—Leases for mining auriferous lands may be approved for periods not exceeding twelve (12) months. Such leases will be renewable, provided the regulations of the local court be complied with, but in every case subject to the recommendation of the court. Alluvial lands partially worked and abandoned, in square or rectangular blocks, and quartz reefs with the dip or underlay, may be leased in areas proportionate to the number of miners and the description and power of machinery. Applicants for said leases to state in writing to the clerk of the court (having previously pegged the ground, as in ordinary cases) the number of hands they guarantee to employ, and the description and power of machinery they will have actually at work within a given time of the date of application.

All alluvial lessees will be required to employ men upon said leases at least in the following proportion, viz.:—

(1) quarter of an acre	...	(4) four men.
(2) half an acre	...	(6) six men.
(3) one acre	...	(12) twelve men.

xvi. *Erection of machinery*.—Any party requiring ground whereon to erect machinery, shall make a written application to the clerk of the local court; notice of such application to be posted on the ground applied for and on the court house for eight (8) days. If no sufficient objections to such permission shall have been made in writing, the court may allow the exclusive possession (except as against the Crown only) by the occupant of such ground.

xvii. *Deposit of refuse soil*.—All leaseholders shall be compelled to deposit the soil from their excavations within the boundaries of their stakes.

xviii. *Parties objecting to the granting of leases*.—All parties having objections to urge against the granting of any lease, &c., must do so in writing, addressed to the clerk of the local court, and be in personal attendance on the day of sitting, in order to answer any questions that may be put by the court touching their objections.

xix. *Water privileges*.—Any person or persons desirous of making or holding any water-hole, race, or dam to contain water, shall make application to the warden, and post a notice of such application on the site applied for one week, when, if it can be satisfactorily proved that no injury will result to the public by conferring such a privilege, a written authority may be given to such applicant. All such reservoirs (where practicable) to be constructed on the side of the gully or flat, and excavated to the bed rock.

xx. *Puddling machines, sludge, &c.*.—No machine for puddling auriferous earth by horse or steam power shall be erected in any place where any number of miners may be obtaining their livelihood by sinking, nor shall any such machine be placed on workable ground supposed to contain gold in a payable quantity, nor in any place where the sludge from such machine shall be injurious to other mining operations or the supply of water.

All parties discharging sludge or water from an engine, mill, machine, or other apparatus, shall make a good and proper drain, to join and fall into the main channel or drain of the gully or flat in which such machine is situated. Should there exist no main channel for the effectual carrying off of sludge or superfluous water, the warden may direct the owners of such machines to make a general drain, and shall prescribe the

course and position, depth and inclination, removal of obstructions, the allotment of work among the different owners, or such other directions as he may deem desirable. In no case shall such water or sludge be allowed to run upon or across any public road or footpath in common use, or on workable ground, to the detriment of other miners.

xxi. *Written agreements.*—All persons engaged in or entering into any partnership or company for mining purposes shall draw up and attest a written agreement, specifying the intent, terms, and property of such company or partnership; such agreement to be produced when required.

xxii. *Water-holes.*—Any person wishing to preserve a water-hole for domestic purposes must make application to the warden, and, if deemed by him expedient, an authority in writing will be given to set apart the same, when the applicant must erect an upright pole over the hole, crossed by two bars of wood (thus †); and any person maliciously destroying or injuring the same shall, upon conviction for every such offence, be adjudged to pay a fine not exceeding twenty shillings.

xxiii. *Shape of alluvial claims.*—That all claims in alluvial workings, under whatever document held and irrespective of extent of claim, must be (as per Gold Fields Act) taken in square or rectangular blocks not exceeding in length twice their breadth, and if otherwise marked cannot be lawfully held except as heretofore provided for.

xxiv. *Construction and management of races and water channels.*—In all cases where races and water channels are required for draining the ground and carrying off surplus water and sludge, such races and channels may be constructed through any unoccupied ground, and shall be reserved and protected for their proper uses. All such races and channels shall become common or main races and channels, provided that all parties wishing to run a head or side race into, or otherwise use such main races, shall contribute a fair proportion in labor or cash towards constructing and repairing the same, and shall, when required, clean out and otherwise keep in order or repair such main races, in proportion to the number of men, the use made of and benefits derived from such races.

xxv. *Wall between claims.*—In all cases a wall shall be left between the claims of different parties of miners, viz., between quartz claims a wall of three (3) feet, and between alluvial claims a wall of two (2) feet; such wall not to be worked without the consent in writing of both parties. All parties shall keep their banks and walls properly timbered, to the satisfaction of the warden or other visiting inspector of mining operations. Should any miner or miners, in marking off a claim, neglect to leave the proper space for the wall, it shall be competent for the warden to deduct such space for wall from the claim last marked off; and should any miner mark off more than the proper width for such wall, the warden may curtail such excess, and assign it as he may deem advisable; or may order the boundary posts to be removed to their proper relative position.

Any breach of the above rule to be proceeded against under the 23rd clause of the Act of Council, 18 Victoria No. 37.

xxvi. *Business area.*—Each business license shall entitle the holder to occupy an allotment of ground sixty (60) feet by sixty (60) feet, and a space of twenty (20) feet shall be left between each place of business available for mining purposes, and the business premises may be undermined, with the sanction in writing of the warden.

The foregoing Regulations, Nos. 1. to xxvi., have been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council.

Private Advertisements.**BYE-LAWS, RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE MELBOURNE AND HOBSON'S BAY RAILWAY COMPANY.**

THE Melbourne and Hobson's Bay Railway Company, and also the shareholders thereof, pursuant to, and by virtue and in exercise of all and every the powers, authorities, and privileges given to or conferred on them respectively, by an Act of the Legislature of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to incorporate a company to be called 'The Melbourne and Hobson's Bay Railway Company,'" and also by another Act of the Legislature of the said colony, known and cited as "The Melbourne and Hobson's Bay Railway Extension Act, 1856," or either of the said Acts, and also of all other powers and authorities enabling the said company in this behalf, do respectively hereby make, pass, enact, and establish the bye-laws, rules and regulations following, that is to say:—

1. All bye-laws, rules and regulations heretofore passed or made by virtue of the powers, authorities and privileges aforesaid, shall henceforth cease and determine, and the same are hereby altered, annulled and made void.

2. At each half-yearly meeting of the company two shareholders shall be elected to audit the accounts of the company for the ensuing half-year; and in the event of such election not being made, or if any auditor elected shall die, or shall refuse or become unable to act, the directors shall appoint some shareholder or shareholders to fill the vacancy or vacancies.

3. The accounts of the company shall be made up to the last day of April and the last day of October in each year, by the accountant, and be audited by the auditors elected at the previous half-yearly meeting, or appointed as aforesaid; and a just and true statement or balance-sheet of the moneys received and expended during the previous six months shall be certified by the auditors under their respective hands, which statement or balance-sheet shall be printed, and a copy forwarded one week before the then ensuing general meeting of the company to every shareholder residing within the colony of Victoria.

4. The common seal of the company shall be kept in the chief office of the company, in the city of Melbourne, in a box having two locks of different kinds thereon, and the secretary

shall be responsible for the safe custody and care of the box containing such common seal, and that the key of one of such locks shall be kept by the secretary, and the key of the other of such locks by the president or one of the directors.

5. The common seal shall not be affixed to any deed or document without the authority of the board of directors; and every deed or document so sealed shall be countersigned by one of the directors and by the secretary, or, in case of the illness or unavoidable absence of the secretary, by the president and by one other of the directors of the company.

6. Every vote or resolution passed at any meeting of the board of directors, or at any general meeting of the company, requiring for its legal efficacy the affixing the common seal to any deed or document, shall be deemed a sufficient authority for affixing the common seal thereto.

7. The secretary shall cause a true copy of every deed or document (except share certificates), bye law, rule or regulation, which shall be sealed with the common seal of the company, to be entered in a book or books to be kept for that purpose; and the secretary and director, or the directors, as the case may be, in whose presence such common seal shall have been affixed, shall add to such copy a certificate, under their respective hands, of the correctness of such copy, which book or books shall be preserved as one of the records of the company.

8. The secretary shall be the chief officer of the company, and shall (subject to the control of the board of directors and of the meetings of the company) have the entire general superintendence and management of the affairs of the company, and be responsible to such board for the due execution and carrying into effect of the resolutions and orders from time to time passed and made by the board of directors and such meetings; and no station-master or pier master shall obey any instructions or orders other than those of the secretary of the company; and no inferior officer or servant of the company shall obey any instructions or orders other than those of his immediate superior or of the secretary.

9. The dividend declared at any general half-yearly meeting of the company shall belong and be payable, and paid to shareholders whose names shall appear in the books of the company as the proprietors of the shares comprising the capital stock of the company, on the Tuesday previous to the day appointed for the holding of such half-yearly meeting. And in case any proprietor shall, during the intermediate period, transfer or sell any share or shares, the secretary or other proper officer, shall not enter the memorial of such transfer or sale in the books of the company, or indorse such entry on the transfer, or deliver any new certificate to the purchaser, or make or sign any indorsement of such transfer on the certificate of any share until after such half-yearly meeting.

10. No person will be admitted to the booking office at any station whilst the door is closed for making up and dispatching any train, and no passenger will be allowed to take his or her seat in or upon any carriage used on the railway, or to travel therein upon the railway, without having first paid his or her fare and obtained a ticket.

11. Tickets will be issued conditionally; that is to say, in case there shall be room in the train for all the passengers to whom tickets shall have been issued. If there shall not be room for all such passengers, the holders of periodical tickets shall have priority over holders of return and single tickets, and the fare will be returned on application to the station-master to the holders of such return and single tickets as shall be unable to obtain seats.

12. Each passenger, on paying his or her fare, will be furnished with a ticket, which he or she is to show whenever required by the station master, or porter authorised by him, or by the guard in charge of the train; and if it be a journey or return ticket, he or she must allow it to be marked when required; and every ticket (whether single, return, or periodical), must be delivered up on demand of any guard or other servant of the company authorised to collect tickets.

13. No periodical ticket so delivered up will be retained, unless the period for which the same was granted shall have expired (except in cases of infringement of either the seventeenth, the nineteenth, or the twentieth section of these bye-laws).

14. Each passenger not producing or delivering up his or her ticket, will be required to pay a sum equal to the fare from the place whence the train originally started.

15. Every person attempting to defraud the company by travelling upon the railway without having previously paid his or her fare, and obtained a proper ticket, or by riding in or upon a carriage of a superior class to that for which he or she has taken out a ticket, or by continuing his or her journey in or upon any of the company's carriages beyond the destination for which he or she has paid his or her fare, or by obtaining a return or periodical ticket, or endeavoring to use it after or beyond the time for which it was originally granted, or by attempting in any other manner to evade the payment of his or her fare, shall pay to the company the sum or penalty of five pounds.

16. No return or periodical ticket will be available for special trains.

17. No passenger will be allowed to ride outside under any circumstances whatever, nor will any passenger be allowed to get into or upon, or to quit any carriage after the train has been put in motion; and any person doing so, or attempting to do so, shall pay to the company a sum or penalty of five

pounds, and be expelled from the company's premises, and forfeit his fare and ticket of what kind soever such ticket may be.

18. Dogs will be conveyed and charged for, but they will not on any account be allowed to accompany passengers in the carriages.

19. Smoking is strictly prohibited in the carriages (except as after mentioned,) and in and upon the company's stations and premises, and every person smoking in a carriage (except in the one which may be set apart specially as a smoking carriage,) shall pay to the company a sum or penalty of five pounds; and every person persisting in smoking in a carriage, (except the smoking carriage,) or in or upon any station or other premises of the company, after having been warned to desist, shall, in addition to such penalty be immediately, or if travelling, at the first opportunity, expelled from the company's premises, and forfeit his fare and ticket of what kind soever such ticket may be.

20. Any person found in a carriage or station, or upon the company's pier or premises in a state of intoxication, or committing any nuisance, or wilfully interfering with the comfort of the passengers, shall pay to the company a sum or penalty of five pounds, and shall immediately, or if travelling, at the first opportunity, be expelled from the company's premises, and forfeit his fare and ticket of what kind soever such ticket may be.

21. Any passenger cutting the linings, removing or defacing the number plates, breaking the windows, or otherwise wilfully damaging or injuring any carriage on the railway, shall pay to the company a sum or penalty of ten pounds in addition to the amount of damage done.

22. No gratuity is under any circumstances allowed to be received by the company's servants on pain of immediate dismissal.

23. Every passenger, on arriving at the station for which he or she may have taken a ticket, or to or from which he or she may hold a periodical ticket, shall quit the station and premises of the company, and no person shall be allowed to loiter about the company's stations, pier or premises, or any part thereof; and if any passenger or other person shall refuse to quit the station, pier, or premises aforesaid, on being requested so to do by the pier-master or any station-master, or other servant of the company, such passenger or person may be expelled by such pier-master, station-master, or other servant as aforesaid, from the company's premises, and in addition thereto shall pay to the company a sum or penalty of two pounds.

24. No drayman, carter, porter, or other person will be allowed to come into, or upon, the company's premises, for the purpose of removing luggage or goods, either with or without a dray, or hand-cart, or truck (unless required by a passenger, and specifically engaged by him for the express purpose); and no person will be allowed to come into, or upon, the company's premises, for the purpose of touting or soliciting custom for hotels or boarding-houses, or any custom or hire of any kind whatsoever; and any drayman, carter, porter, or other person evading or attempting to evade this regulation, or refusing or neglecting to quit the company's premises when thereto required by the pier-master or any station-master, or other servant of the company, shall be expelled from the company's premises, and in addition thereto shall pay to the company a sum or penalty of ten pounds.

25. All goods and merchandise (whether bonded or free), and all luggage arriving at the Melbourne terminus, shall be removed from the platforms and sheds within twelve working hours, and any free goods, merchandise, or luggage not removed by that time, may be stored at the risk and expense of the consignees or owners, and will then become subject to such charges as may from time to time be fixed by the directors of the company; and any bonded goods or merchandise which shall not be removed within the period aforesaid, shall be subject to the payment of the sum of one shilling per ton per day, until the removal of the same from the company's premises.

26. Any goods, merchandise, or luggage, arriving at any station of the company (other than the Melbourne terminus), which shall not be removed from their premises within twelve working hours, may be forwarded to Melbourne at the expense of the consignee or owner, and there stored at his risk and expense, and the same will then become subject to the charges mentioned or referred to in section 25.

27. When and so soon as the discharge of the cargo of any vessel at the company's pier shall have been completed (and whether or not such discharge shall happen within the period fixed therefore), the master of the vessel whose discharge shall have been completed shall immediately thereafter cause to be taken on board thereof such sand, or stone ballast as may be required to steady such vessel, and shall thereupon leave the pier and anchor such vessel outside of the company's buoys.

28. Every vessel shall be removed by the master thereof from the company's pier within twelve hours after written notice shall have been left on board by the pier-master, requiring the removal of such vessel, and any master failing to remove his vessel within the period aforesaid, shall pay to the company a sum of twenty pounds per day for every day or fractional part of a day thereafter during which such vessel may occupy a berth at the said pier.

29. The master of any vessel arriving at the pier, shall cause the discharge thereof to be proceeded with beyond the usual working hours, that is to say, in the summer from six o'clock in the morning until six o'clock in the evening, and in

winter from seven o'clock in the morning until five o'clock in the evening, if so required by the secretary or pier-master of the company.

30. Every vessel shall be discharged by stevedores, and such stevedores shall be employed by and at the expense of the agents or master of such vessel, and not by or on behalf of the company.

31. The authorised agents of the company will supply or cause to be supplied at current rates, all ballast of stone or sand which may be required by any vessel arriving at the pier, and no person not authorised by the directors to supply ballast will be allowed to come upon the company's pier, or within the space or distance of three hundred yards therefrom with ballast for any vessel.

32. No boatman, waterman, or other person will be allowed to ply for hire, or otherwise to or from the company's pier, or within the space or distance of three hundred yards therefrom, unless authorised by the directors so to do, and any person infringing this regulation, shall pay to the company a sum or penalty of ten pounds.

The fares to be charged and taken by boatmen or watermen authorised to ply from the company's pier to any part of Hobson's Bay, shall from time to time be fixed and approved of by the directors of the company, and in the mean time such fares shall not exceed the sums or amounts following, that is to say:—

From the pier to Williamstown—
For one person, five shillings
For two persons, three shillings
For three persons, two shillings and sixpence } For each person.
For four or more persons, two shillings

From the pier to any vessel lying without a line drawn from the black buoy to the St. Kilda Bathing Ship, say one quarter of a mile without—

For one person, ten shillings.
For two persons, seven shillings
For three persons, six shillings
For four or more persons, five shillings } For each person.
From the pier to any vessel lying between the black buoy and the St. Kilda white buoy—

For one person, five shillings.
For two persons, three shillings
For three persons, two shillings and sixpence } For each person.
For four or more persons, two shillings

To vessels lying nearer the pier than Williamstown—
For one person, four shillings.
For two persons, two shillings and sixpence } For each person.
For three persons, two shillings

To vessels in the proximity of the pier boundary, or one hundred yards from the company's buoys—

For one person, two shillings and sixpence, and one shilling back; for two or more persons, two shillings there, and one shilling back for each person.

The number of persons allowed to be in each boat shall depend upon the dimensions thereof, that is to say, boats of five feet beam may carry (including crew) one person to every two feet in length. One person additional will be allowed for every additional six inches of beam, and one less for every six inches under five feet beam.

Each boat shall carry free eight pounds weight of luggage or cargo for each person, and shall, if so required, carry one hundred pounds weight in lieu of each person short of the complement allowed.

From any points above named (excepting as respects vessels within one hundred yards from the company's buoys) one half the fare is to be charged back, but the detention is not to exceed one quarter of an hour, and if the detention exceeds that time the fare back is to be equal to the fare there.

Every boatman and waterman authorised by the company shall wear a badge, having displayed thereon his name and number, which badge shall be sewed to the left breast of his coat, jacket, or other external body dress, so that the same may be distinctly visible at all times during the hours he may ply for hire. He shall also have a printed copy of this bye-law, and of any other rules and regulations of the company relating to boatmen and watermen, and shall, on demand, shew the same to any passenger. He shall also have the scale of fares legibly painted within his boat.

From the 1st day of April to the 30th day of September, between the hours of eight o'clock at night and six o'clock in the morning, and from the 1st day of October to the 31st day of March, between the hours of nine o'clock at night and five o'clock in the morning, all fares may be charged double.

Any passenger or passengers requiring a boat with four men may be charged double fares.

When a chequered flag is hoisted at the mast-head of the Flagstaff at Williamstown, all fares may be charged one-half more than those specified, and in foul weather when a blue flag is hoisted, fares may be doubled.

Any dispute as to distances and corresponding fares shall be referred to and settled by the company's pier-master, whose decision shall be final.

33. The company will not be answerable or accountable for any damage to goods or merchandise, nor for leakage, breakage, or rust, unless the same shall happen through the negligence of the company's servants, nor in respect of any goods which

shall have been improperly packed or addressed, nor for plate, china, glass, pictures, wearing apparel, or other valuables, whether of a like nature or otherwise, unless specially entered and paid for as valuable or hazardous goods.

34. No claim for loss will be allowed or recognised unless the particulars of such claim be lodged with the secretary within fourteen days after such loss shall have arisen, and no claim for damage will be allowed or recognised after the removal from the company's premises of the goods or merchandise alleged to have been damaged.

35. The directors of the company may, from time to time, issue and give such regulations and directions for the observance, conduct and guidance of the officers and servants in the employ of the company in the performance and discharge of their respective duties, as the board of directors shall approve of.
