LIGHTNING was seen at long intervals on the eastern horizon on the 11th.
 SOLAR HALOS were seen on the 9th about 45° in diameter; and on the 20th, about 48° in diameter.
 LUNAR HALOS were seen on the 15th, 30° in diameter; 16th, 30° in diameter; 17th, 30° in diameter; 20th, 30° in diameter; 21st, 4° in diameter; 26th, 30° in diameter; and 28th, 32° in diameter.
 There was HOAR FROST at early morning on the 2nd, 3rd, and 26th.
 Fog was present on the 1st (clearing a little at 2 p.m.), and on the 18th at early morning.
 HAIL fell at or near Melbourne on the 4th, at 1 p.m.; on the 15th, at 11.30 a.m.; and on the 21st, at 4.30 p.m.
 SHOOTING STARS.—On the 6th, at 7.55 p.m., small rapid meteor from E. to W., passing about 5° above Nbn. Maj.; 13th, at 9.35 p.m., splendid train meteor from E. to W., disappeared near Nbn. Maj.; 9.44 p.m., small bright rapid meteor from S. to N., about 20° above N.N.W. horizon; 17th, at 10.7 p.m., splendid blue train meteor, motion slow, from N. to S., first appeared about 20° above S. horizon; 10.13 p.m., small very faint meteor from N.W. to S.E., passing near the Pole; 10.20 p.m., very rapid small faint meteor from N.W. to S.E.; 21st, at 10.17 p.m., bright meteor about 20° above S.E. horizon, descending slowly in a right line to the horizon; and on the 31st, at 9.26 p.m., small faint meteor from N.N.E. to S.S.W., about 20° above S.E. horizon. Meteors were also seen on the 19th and 28th, but their paths were not noted.

 COPIES OF QUESTIONS.

At a meeting of the Examiners, on the 19th day of July, 1858, under the Regulations of the Board of Land and Works, dated the 13th May, 1858, the following subjects, and questions thereon, were adopted for the examination, which is to commence on the 26th instant, of candidates for the three vacancies in the Survey Department as assistant surveyors.

SUBJECTS.

The numerals between parentheses prefixed to each question denote the value of the questions.

- (Value 50).—1st. Professional antecedents.
- (Value 100).—2nd. Mathematics.
- (Value 100).—3rd. Practical surveying.

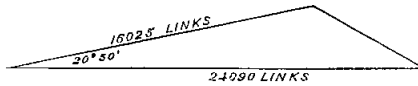
PROFESSIONAL ANTECEDENTS.

- (10).—Q. 1. What is your age?
- (10).—Q. 2. With whom did you serve your time? and with whom and where have you been since engaged?
- (20).—Q. 3. What surveys have you been engaged upon, and for how long? State the actual number of years you were engaged in surveying, and also in drawing, distinguishing each. Hand in any drawings you may have as specimens of your ability to lay down your surveys.
- Have you had any colonial experience in surveying? If so, state where and when.
- (10).—Q. 4. What professional certificates have you?

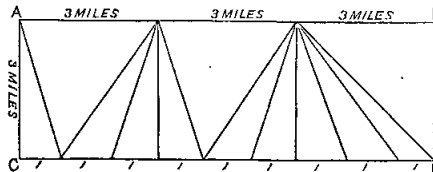
MATHEMATICS.

- (3).—Q. 1. Multiply $\frac{3}{4}$ by $\frac{8}{9}$ by $\frac{5}{6}$, and divide the result by $\frac{1}{2}$.
- (3).—Q. 2. Multiply 49.50 chains by 75.35 chains, and make out the acres, rods and perches.
- (3).—Q. 3. Divide 50.66 chains by 91.42 chains, and multiply the result by 0.50 links, and give the quantity in perches.
- (3).—Q. 4. Extract the square root of 5000 by the usual mode, and do it also by logarithms.
- (3).—Q. 5. What is the side of a square in chains which contains 750 acres?
- (3).—Q. 6. How many, and what parts of a triangle must you have, in order to find the remainder?
- (7).—Q. 7. Having one acute angle of a triangle, with its longest side, what must be the conditions of its other angles and sides, so that you may be able to find an area for it?

- (7).—Q. 8. Having the three sides of a triangle—not being a right angled one, how do you find the area by the common mode? and how can you find the same out by logarithms?
- (10).—Q. 9. Having two sides of a triangle, with the angle included, how do you find the area of it, and the third side? Work out the following example:—

No. VIII.—BYE-LAW RELATING TO SINKINGS ON OLD WORKINGS.
[25th August, 1858.]

AT a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Ararat, begun and holden at the Shamrock Hotel, Barkly street, Ararat, in the said district, on the 25th day of August, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

1. That on all old leads or old workings newly abandoned each miner shall be entitled to hold and work a claim to the extent of sixty (60) feet square; and on all old leads or workings that have been abandoned for the space of six months from the time of its original working out, each miner shall be entitled to hold and work a claim of the extent of thirty (30) feet along the course of the lead with a frontage to the extent of two hundred (200) feet in width, but such width in no case shall include any new or unworked ground.

2. No miner or miners will be allowed to take up any block claim on any frontage lead.

3. That any number of miners may form themselves into companies and may occupy ground to any extent in the aforesaid proportions, and may make any regulations to regulate their own proceedings that are best suited to the constitution of their company, provided that men be kept on the ground in proportion to the extent occupied.

4. No partially worked ground where gold has not been obtained in payable quantities shall be eligible for occupation under this bye-law, unless first declared abandoned by the mining board of the district, or by the surveyor acting under its authority; or if occupied, and a new lead discovered running through, the same parties shall not be entitled to hold more than ordinary claims for the number of men employed thereon.

5. On all wet leads parties shall bale their fair share of water, either by machinery or other means, on the pains of forfeiting their ground; but the warden may at all times extend to them all the privileges named in the bye-law relating to frontage leads in reference thereto.

6. That all parties shall mark out their claims with a post three (3) feet high at each corner thereof, which post must be kept visible until the ground is abandoned.

7. Within forty-eight (48) hours from the time of marking out, all parties shall begin to work at their claims in a bona fide manner, and shall continue to do so every lawful day until the same be abandoned.

8. A list of all the shareholders' names shall be kept posted at all times on some conspicuous part of every such claim, and any miner at any time, on application to the warden, may take possession of any unoccupied share in any such claim, but subject to any reasonable amount of expenses that may be incurred thereon; such amount, if disputed, to be settled by arbitration.

PUBLIC HIGHWAY ON THE SOUTH BANK OF THE RIVER YARRA.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency **SIR HENRY BARKLY**, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS it is expedient that a common and public highway should be created in the direction hereinafter described: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim and order that the piece or portion of land hereinafter described, situate on the south bank of the River Yarra Yarra, within the municipal district of Emerald Hill, shall at all times hereafter be a common and public highway or road for all the liege subjects of Her Majesty to go, return, pass and repass, on foot and on horseback, and with horses, carts, and carriages, every year, at all times of the year, at their free will and pleasure, that is to say:—

On the south bank of the River Yarra Yarra from Clarendon street to the Falls of the said river, commencing at a point on the north-eastern side of Clarendon street aforesaid, bearing north twenty-eight degrees west, and distant twenty-three chains and four links more or less from the intersection of the north-eastern side of Clarendon street aforesaid and the western side of the Sandridge road; proceeding thence by a line bearing north forty-nine degrees ten minutes east to the River Yarra Yarra, such road being ninety-nine feet in width, and the line above described being its northern boundary.

TARADALE PUBLIC CEMETERY.

REGULATIONS made by the Trustees of the Public Cemetery established at Taradale:—

1. All charges must be paid when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.
2. By the 8th section of the Act, "Any person making a vault, or erecting and placing a monument in the cemetery, by and with the permission of the trustees, under these rules and upon payment of the charges therein mentioned, is entitled to have, maintain and keep a vault, monument, or tombstone, according to the tenor of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person or persons, and his or their heirs or near relations for ever."
3. Application for such permission to be made to the trustees. A certificate of permission, in the form set out in the schedule, will be granted to the party applying for such permission on payment of the charges in the schedule.
4. The charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person on a certificate of a minister of religion, or other evidence, proving to the satisfaction of the trustees that such person was a pauper, or that the relatives and friends of the deceased are unable to pay the costs and charges.
5. Orders for interments to be given at the office of the trustees on the previous day.
6. The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug, but parties wanting brick graves or vaults will be required to construct them under the direction of the surveyor employed by the trustees for that purpose; and in case interment is to be made in any private grave or vault, the consent (in writing) of the party entitled thereto must be left with the order.
7. The time fixed for the funeral to be the time when the procession is to be at the cemetery, and the same must be punctually observed.
8. Until otherwise ordered, the usual hours fixed for interments will be from nine o'clock a.m. to six o'clock p.m.
9. All monuments, vaults, graves and grave-stones to be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owners, in default of which they will be removed by the trustees.
10. Each coffin in a vault or brick grave to be bricked in and cemented; and the grave or vault to be covered in and cemented also.
11. A drawing of every stone, tomb, pedestal, and plan of every monument or tablet proposed to be erected, to be submitted to the trustees for approval, who are required by the 8th section of the Act "to determine and fix the position of any unobjectionable monument according to the description, size and character thereof, having reference to the general plan for ornamenting the cemetery in an appropriate manner.
12. No catacombs, or any wooden fencing, allowed without first submitting a plan for the approval of the trustees.
13. A plan of the cemetery, showing the situation of the purchased and other graves, is kept at the office, and may be inspected at the charge set out in the schedule, and registers of all grants are kept by the trustees.
14. Any person who shall wantonly or wilfully destroy, or do, or cause to be done, any damage to any monument, vault, tombstone, building, erection, railing, fence, shrubbery, tree or plant, will be proceeded against as directed by the 14th section of the Act.
15. The trustees reserve the right to make any alterations from time to time in these charges and regulations.
