SECTIONS V. TO X. OF TOWN AND COUNTRY POLICE  
ACT EXTENDED TO THE TOWNSHIP OF ARARAT.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir Henry Barkly, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty (Number 14), intituled, *An Act to provide for the Management of Towns and other places in Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted that so many of the provisions of the said Act as relate to the good order of towns and other populous places, being sections numbered V., VI., VII., VIII., IX. and X., in the said Act, should extend to and be in force in such cities, towns, districts, and places as the Lieutenant Governor might by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* declare to come under the operation of the same respectively, or any of them, and that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor to define the limits of such places: Now I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby declare that the township of Ararat shall come under the operation of the sections of the said Act numbered respectively V., VI., VII., VIII., IX. and X.:

And I do hereby define the limits of the said township of Ararat to be as follow, that is to say:—Commencing at a point 12,150 links, more or less, north from the north-east corner of allotment 2 of section 2, parish of Burrumbidgee; thence by a line bearing north 12,000 links; thence by a line bearing east 16,000 links; thence by a line bearing south 12,000 links; and thence by a line bearing west 16,000 links to the point of commencement.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this seventh day of September, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, and in the twenty-second year of Her Majesty's Reign.

BYE-LAW.—[9th April, 1858.]

AT a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Maryborough, begun and holden at Maryborough, in the said district, on the 9th day of April, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

*Special rule for the first party erecting steam machinery in wet abandoned leads.*—The first party applying to the mining board for permission to erect steam machinery in a wet abandoned lead may have allotted to them by the said board the following area of ground, fifty (50) feet each man in length of the lead by the full width of the lead: Provided such width does not exceed three hundred and fifty (350) feet, and also provided the number of shareholders in such party does not exceed twenty-five (25): such grant to be subject to forfeiture as provided for in bye-law 58. **NOTICE TO MARINERS.**

THE attention of the masters and owners of vessels is called to the following regulations respecting Lights and Fog Signals to be carried and used by sea-going vessels, to prevent collision, which have been issued by the Admiralty, the non-compliance with which renders the defaulter liable to a penalty of Twenty pounds.

ADMIRALTY REGULATIONS AS TO LIGHTS AND FOG SIGNALS TO BE CARRIED BY STEAM AND SAILING VESSELS, UNDER "THE MERCHANT SHIPPING ACT, 1854."

*Admiralty Notice respecting Lights and Fog Signals to be carried and used by Sea-going Vessels, to prevent collision.*

By the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, &c.

By virtue of the power and authority vested in us, we hereby revoke, as from and after the thirtieth day of September, 1858, the regulations made and published by us on the first day of May, 1852, relating to the lights to be carried by sea-going vessels to prevent collision: And we hereby make the following regulations, and require and direct that the same be strictly observed and carried into effect on and after the first day of October, 1858:—

**STEAM VESSELS.**

All sea-going steam vessels, when under steam, shall, between sunset and sunrise, exhibit the following lights:—

1. A bright white light at the foremast head.  
A green light on the starboard side.  
A red light on the port side.

2. The mast-head light shall be so constructed as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least 5 miles, and shall show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 20 points of the compass, and it shall be so fixed as to throw the light 10 points on each side of the ship, viz.: from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on either side.

3. The green light on the starboard side and the red light on the port side shall be so constructed as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least 2 miles, and show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass, and they shall be so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on the starboard and on the port sides respectively.

4. The side lights are to be fitted with inboard screens projecting at least 3 feet forward from the light, so as to prevent the lights from being seen across the bow.

5. Steam vessels under sail only are not to carry their mast-head light.

**FOG SIGNALS.**

All sea-going steam vessels, whether propelled by paddles or screws, when their steam is up, and when under way, shall in all cases of fog use as a fog signal a steam whistle, placed before the funnel at not less than 8 feet from the deck, which shall be sounded once at least every five minutes; but when the steam is not up, they shall use a fog horn or bell, as ordered for sailing ships.

**SAILING VESSELS.**

1. All sea-going sailing vessels when under way or being towed shall between sunset and sunrise exhibit a green light on the starboard side and a red light on the port side of the vessel, and such lights shall be so constructed as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least 2 miles, and shall show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass, from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on the starboard and on the port sides respectively.

2. The coloured lights shall be fixed whenever it is practicable so to exhibit them; and shall be fitted with inboard screens projecting at least 3 feet forward from the light, so as to prevent the lights being seen across the bow.

3. When the coloured lights cannot be fixed (as in the case of small vessels in bad weather), they shall be kept on deck between sunset and sunrise, and on their proper sides of the vessel ready for instant exhibition, and shall be exhibited in such a manner as can be best seen on the approach of, or to, any other vessel or vessels, in sufficient time to avoid collision, and so that the green light shall not be seen on the port side, nor the red light on the starboard side.

**FOG SIGNALS.**

All sea-going sailing vessels, when under way, shall, in all cases of fog, use when on the starboard tack a fog horn, and when on the port tack shall ring a bell. These signals shall be sounded once at least every five minutes.

Sailing pilot vessels are to carry only a white light at the masthead, and are to exhibit a flare-up light every 15 minutes, in accordance with Trinity House regulation.

**VESSELS AT ANCHOR.**

All sea-going vessels when at anchor in roadsteads or fairways shall, between sunset and sunrise, exhibit where it can best be seen, but at a height not exceeding 20 feet above the hull, a white light in a globular lantern of 8 inches in diameter, and so constructed as to show a clear, uniform, and unbroken light all round the horizon, at a distance of at least 1 mile.

*The following are the Enactments having reference to the above Regulations:—*

"THE MERCHANT SHIPPING ACT, 1854,"

(17 and 18 Vict. cap. 104.)

**LIGHTS AND FOG SIGNALS, AND MEETING AND PASSING.**

CCXCV. *Regulations as to lights and fog signals.*—The following rules shall be observed with regard to lights and fog signals; (that is to say.)

(1.) The Admiralty shall from time to time make regulations requiring the exhibition of such lights, by such classes of ships, whether steam or sailing ships, within such places and under such circumstances as they think fit, and may from time to time revoke, alter, or vary the same:

(2.) The Admiralty may, if they think fit, make regulations requiring the use of such fog signals by such classes of ships, whether steam or sailing ships, within such places and under such circumstances as they think fit, and may from time to time revoke, alter, or vary the same:

(3.) All regulations made in pursuance of this section shall be published in the *London Gazette*, and shall come into operation on a day to be named in the *Gazette* in which they are published, and the Admiralty shall cause all such regulations to be printed, and shall furnish a copy thereof to any owner or master of a ship who applies for the same, and production of the *Gazette* containing such regulations shall be sufficient evidence of the due making and purport thereof:

(4.) All owners and masters shall be bound to take notice of the same, and shall, so long as the same continue in force, exhibit such lights, and use such fog signals, at such times, within such places, in such manner, and under such circumstances as are enjoined by such regulations, and shall not exhibit any other lights or use any other fog signals, and in case of default the master or the owner of the ship, if it appears that he was in fault, shall for each occasion upon which such regulations are infringed incur a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

CCXCVI. *Rules as to ships meeting each other.*—Whenever any ship, whether a steam or sailing ship, proceeding in one direction, meets another ship, whether a steam or sailing ship, proceeding in another direction, so that if both ships were to continue their respective courses they would pass so near as to involve any risk of a collision, the helms of both ships shall be put to port so as to pass on the port side of each other; and this rule shall be obeyed by all steam ships and by all sailing ships whether on the port or starboard tack, and whether close-hauled or not, unless the circumstances of the case are such as to render a departure from the rule necessary in order to avoid immediate danger, and subject also to the proviso that due regard shall be had to the dangers of navigation, and, as regards sailing ships on the starboard tack close-hauled, to the keeping such ships under command.

CCXCVII. *Rule for steamers in narrow channels.*—Every steam ship, when navigating any narrow channel, shall, whenever it is safe and practicable, keep to that side of the fairway or mid-channel which lies on the starboard side of such steam ship.

CCXCVIII. *If collision ensues from breach of the above rules, owner not to be entitled to recover.*—If in any case of collision it appears to the court before which the case is tried that such collision was occasioned by the non-observance of any rule for the exhibition of lights or the use of fog signals issued in pursuance of the powers hereinbefore contained, or of the foregoing rule as to the passing of steam and sailing ships, or of the foregoing rule as to a steam ship keeping to that side of a narrow channel which lies on the starboard side, the owner of the ship by which such rule has been infringed shall not be entitled to recover any recompense whatever for any damage sustained by such ship in such collision, unless it is shown to the satisfaction of the court that the circumstances of the case made a departure from the rule necessary.

CCXCIX. *Breaches of such rules to imply wilful default.*—In case any damage to person or property arises from the non-observance by any ship of any of the said rules, such damage shall be deemed to have been occasioned by the wilful default of the person in charge of the deck of such ship at the time, unless it is shown to the satisfaction of the court that the circumstances of the case made a departure from the rule necessary.

THE subjoined scale of dietary allowances to the patients and attendants in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum has been approved and directed to come into operation on the 1st day of October next, in lieu of the scale hitherto observed, viz. :—

#### SCALE OF DIETARY ALLOWANCES FOR THE PATIENTS AND ATTENDANTS IN THE LUNATIC ASYLUM, AT YARRA BEND.

##### Attendants.

1 lb. bread, 1 lb. meat, 1 lb. vegetables,  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz. salt, 1 oz. rice, 1 gill of milk,  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz. tea, and 4 oz. sugar, daily.

##### EXTRA ALLOWANCE TO NIGHT ATTENDANTS.

$\frac{1}{2}$  gill of milk, 2 oz. sugar, and  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz. of tea, daily.

##### Patients.

Sundays and Thursdays.—12 oz. meat (baked), 1 lb. vegetables, and 3 oz. bread.

Mondays, Wednesdays and Saturdays.—12 oz. meat, with 1 lb. vegetables and 1 oz. rice, made into broth.

Tuesdays.—12 oz. meat and 3 oz. flour made into a pie, with dripping in the crust.

Fridays.—4 oz. rice and 1 oz. sugar made into a pudding.

The breakfast and supper to be the same daily throughout the year, viz., 12 oz. bread,  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz. tea,  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz. sugar, and 1 gill milk for both meals.

##### EXTRA ALLOWANCE TO WORKING MALE PATIENTS.

Sundays.—3 oz. flour and 1 oz. sugar.

Other days.—8 oz. bread and 1 pint of beer.

##### EXTRA ALLOWANCE TO WORKING FEMALE PATIENTS.

Sundays.—3 oz. flour and 1 oz. sugar.

Other days.—4 oz. bread,  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz. tea,  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz. sugar,  $\frac{1}{2}$  gill of milk.

##### EXTRA ALLOWANCE TO PAY PATIENTS.

Daily.—1 oz. butter and  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz. coffee.

12 oz. roast beef, and pudding consisting of  $\frac{1}{2}$  lb. flour,  $\frac{1}{2}$  lb. raisins, and 1 oz. suet, on Christmas day and the Queen's Birthday, for patients only.

1 oz. pepper and 25 oz. salt to be drawn daily for every 100 full rations to patients.

No. 16. To prevent the nuisance arising from exposing goods for sale, and blocking up the footpaths on the township of Ballaarat.

No. 17. For imposing a rate of one shilling and sixpence in the pound upon all assessable property within the municipal district of Ballaarat, for year ending 16th January, 1859.

## GOVERNOR'S VISIT.

The municipal councils of Ballaarat have had the honor of entertaining His Excellency Sir Henry Barkly, on Ballaarat, during the early part of the present half-year, and they feel assured the greater attention the wants of the district has received from the Government during the past half-year has resulted from that visit.

## STATISTICS.

This municipal council, in conjunction with the municipal council of Ballaarat East, collected all the statistical information that could be obtained with reference to the value of machinery employed in mining operations, and the amount of revenue paid into the Government treasury from the gold fields of Ballaarat, the particulars of which were published in the form of a pamphlet under the title of "Facts and Figures," but as the details of the work comprised the whole of the Ballaarat gold field without particularising the revenue and expenditure in each municipality, received and expended by the Government, it would be injudicious to make extracts from the pamphlet as "Statistics of the Municipality," but the municipal council would recommend the perusal of the work in question, as it contains much valuable information relating to the resources of the gold fields of Ballaarat and its vicinity.

## WATER SUPPLY.

The municipal council of Ballaarat appointed a deputation to Melbourne to oppose the passing of bill in the Legislative Assembly, brought in by J. B. Humfray, Esq., M.L.A., to repeal the bye-law No. 7, and to give the municipal council of Ballaarat East power over the roads of this district to lay pipes from Yuille's Swamp to the Flat. 1st, On the grounds that the Swamp is not a sufficient source to rely upon for a supply of water for domestic and other purposes for a population such as is at present resident on Ballaarat and Ballaarat East. 2nd, The municipal council have determined to oppose any interference with the management and control of this district, and as they are empowered by the Municipal Act to make bye-laws for securing the necessary supply of water for domestic and irrigation purposes, and also for the general good rule and management of the district as such council may see fit, they consider any interference on the part of the Legislature would be a violation of the principles of the Act under which they are incorporated.

## FINANCE.

According to the valuations' return (Messrs. Snelling and Farre) of the land and buildings in this district, irrespective of the churches, schools, hospital, &c., the nett value of the property is £328,126. The annual value is arrived at by taking 12½ per centum giving £41,015 15s., upon which the rate was levied and made payable on the 15th May and the 15th November, 1858, up to the 16th July; of the first moiety the sum of £725 3s. has been collected.

## BOTANICAL GARDENS.

The Government have granted to the municipal council of Ballaarat for the purposes of a botanical garden about 80 acres of land on the west side of Yuille's Swamp, previously occupied as a police paddock.

## ELECTIONS.

On the 31st of March, Councillor Cummins resigned his office as member of the municipal council of Ballaarat.

At a public meeting of ratepayers held at the Council Chambers, Sturt street, on the 1st day of May, the chairman, James Stewart, Esq., M.D., in the chair, the following gentlemen were proposed as candidates:—Robert Lewis, Esq., and John Smith Carver, Esq. A poll was demanded, which took place on Monday, the 3rd day of May, when Councillor Lewis was returned as member of the municipal council of Ballaarat, in the place of Councillor Cummins, resigned.
