NOTICE TO EXPORTERS OF RAGS, BONES, ETC.

NOTICE is hereby given to intending shippers of Rags, Bones, Horns, Hoofs, &c., or any other articles which may be deleterious to the health or safety of persons on board passenger ships, as provided by the 29th section of the *Passengers Act*, 1855 (18 and 19 Victoria, cap. 119), that if it is intended to ship such articles in a vessel being a "passenger ship" within the meaning of the Act, it will be necessary to give notice to the Immigration Agent, or Assistant Immigration Agent (as the case may be), of such intended shipment, in order that the articles may be surveyed, and a certificate obtained from the Emigration Officer that they are fit for shipment, without which they cannot be allowed to be exported in a "passenger ship."

MUNICIPAL EXEMPTION, BRUNSWICK.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for the Establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted that nothing in the said Act contained should authorize the interference by any municipal council constituted under the said Act, with any public place or building, of what description soever, not erected or constructed by such municipal council, that might be excepted from the jurisdiction of such municipal council by any Proclamation made or to be made by the Lieutenant Governor: And whereas it is deemed expedient to except the buildings hereinafter mentioned from the jurisdiction of the council of the municipal district of Brunswick: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, do, by this my Proclamation, with the advice of the Executive Council, except from the jurisdiction of the municipal council of Brunswick the following public buildings situate and being within the said municipal district, that is to say:—

The places of public worship called and known as

The Church of England,
The Wesleyan Chapel,
The Scotch Church,

and the respective school houses belonging to the said several denominations.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, this thirteenth day of September, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, and in the twenty-second year of Her Majesty's Reign.

MUNICIPALITY OF BALLAARAT EAST.

BYE-LAW No. 12.—FOR THE APPROPRIATION OF THE SUM OF FOUR THOUSAND POUNDS PAID OUT OF THE PUBLIC REVENUE FOR THE YEAR 1857, AS A SECOND INSTALLMENT OF THE GRANT-IN-AID OF THE FIRST YEAR'S REVENUE OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF BALLAARAT EAST.

WHEREAS by the Act 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the Establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that every work proposed to be executed by any municipal council by funds raised by aid from the Government, whether by endowment or otherwise, shall be the subject of a distinct and separate bye-law; and whereas by a vote of the Legislative Assembly of the Session 1857, the sum of £17,500 was granted in aid of municipalities which were created during that year; and whereas a second instalment of the grant-in-aid of the first year's revenue of the said municipal council of £4000 has been received subject to the conditions of the said recited Act: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Ballarat East, that the said sum of £4000 shall be expended as under:—

Making 100 chains of footpath on the Main road, with bluestone kerbing	£2300
Making 100 chains of footpath on the Main road with 3" sawn planks	1700
	£4000

MUNICIPALITY OF BALLAARAT EAST.

BYE-LAW No. 14.—FOR AN ASSESSMENT OF HOUSE AND LAND PROPERTY WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT FOR THE YEAR OF 1859.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to make an annual assessment of all property in houses and lands within the limits of such municipal district, according to its fair average annual value: Be it therefore enacted that the assessment on the annual value of property within the municipality of Ballarat East, estimated at £88,093 1s. 6d., as approved of by the Justices of the peace in petty sessions assembled, shall be the value on which the rate of One shilling in the pound shall be levied, and shall be legal and in force for the municipal year commencing the 1st June, 1858, and ending the 1st June, 1859.

BYE-LAW No. 15.—FOR IMPOSING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING IN THE POUND ON THE RATEABLE PROPERTY OF THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF BALLAARAT EAST FOR THE CURRENT YEAR.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to impose a rate on all houses and lands within the limits of such municipal district, according to the fair average annual value thereof, such rate not to exceed the sum of Two shillings in the pound of such value: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Ballarat East, that a rate for the current year of One shilling in the pound on the annual value of all property in houses and lands within the limits of the said municipal district be imposed and levied, and be due and payable in two equal sums (except such annual rate shall not in any case exceed Twenty shillings, then and in every such case the rate shall be collected in one whole sum), the first on the 30th day of September, 1858, and the second on the 30th March, 1859.

The foregoing Bye-laws, Nos. 14, 15, made by the municipal council of Ballarat East, have been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council. Gazetted on the 21st day of September, 1858, pursuant to 18 Victoria No. 15, sec. 33.

MUNICIPALITY OF BEECHWORTH.

BYE-LAW No. 26.—FOR REGULATING THE PUBLIC MARKET OF THE MUNICIPALITY, AND FOR DETERMINING AND LEVYING RATES, TOLLS, RENTS AND DUES, IN RESPECT THEREOF, AND OF THE COMMODITIES EXPOSED FOR SALE THEREIN.

WHEREAS His Excellency the Governor in Council, approving of the desire of the inhabitants of this municipality for a public market, has, by Proclamation of the 14th day of

June, 1858 (in pursuance of the provisions of the 3rd Victoria No. 19), set apart and appropriated allotments 11, 12, 13, 14 and 15, of section IX. in this township, as a site for same; and whereas by the 18th Victoria No. 15, the care and management of any public market established within a municipality is vested in the municipal council of the district; and whereas such council is also by the same Act empowered to fix and levy tolls, dues, &c., in respect thereof: Be it and it is hereby enacted by the municipal council of Beechworth, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, the following regulations shall be in force respecting the aforesaid market, and the hereinafter stated tolls, rates, rents and dues shall be paid and levied in respect of the goods taken thereto for sale, namely:—

1. That the said market shall be called and known as "The Beechworth Market."

2. That it shall be lawful for the said council (and they are hereby so authorised and empowered), to erect or cause to be erected, if they shall think fit, on the hereinbefore mentioned market site, or to let on lease or otherwise (if it shall seem to them more advisable or advantageous so to do) at such rent or rents as they may from time to time affix thereon, and to relet the same so often as the periods of such letting shall expire or be otherwise determined, for any period not exceeding three years, the said site as a whole or in different portions as they may deem best, for the purpose of having erected thereon the hereinafter mentioned buildings and enclosures, that is to say:—To enclose (or for the purpose of leaving enclosed, as the case may be), that half of the site having a frontage of one hundred and sixty-five feet to Loch street, and one hundred and sixty-five feet to Williams street, and containing five-eighths of an acre, in such manner as may be shown in the design to be selected by the council and marked B on that design, which shall then be appropriated and used for the sale of hay, grain, green fodder, straw and firewood, and shall be termed "The Hay and Corn Market;" and on the other equal half of the said market site marked A on the said design, and having equal frontages of one hundred and sixty-five feet to Ford street and to Williams street, and also containing five-eighths of an acre, to erect or for the purpose of having erected thereon, as the case may be, such shops, sheds, stalls and other conveniences, in accordance with the before-mentioned design as the municipal council may deem necessary, for the sale of fruit, vegetables, roots, poultry, eggs, pork, butter, garden and farm produce (except such as is hereinbefore appointed to be sold in the hay and corn market), butchers' meat, fish, wildfowl, rabbits, and such other articles of food as the said municipal council may allow to be exposed and sold in that part of the said market; and that it shall be unlawful for any person to expose for sale or to sell in either of the above described portions of the said market, any other article or thing than such as is above enumerated or referred to as allowed to be sold therein respectively.

3. That in the event of the municipal council themselves erecting the said fences, enclosures, shops, sheds, stalls, or other conveniences, as empowered by the foregoing clause, it shall be lawful for such council to let the same, or any of them, on lease or otherwise as to them may seem most desirable and advantageous, for any period not exceeding three years, at such rent or rents as they may from time to time affix thereon, and to relet the same whenever and so often as the periods of such lettings shall expire, or be otherwise determined; and that for the more satisfactorily regulating and classifying the arrangements of the said market, each and every lease or agreement for the letting of a shop, shed, stall, or other convenience, or of a site for erecting the same, shall contain a clause setting forth the articles or class of articles or commodities for the sale of which such premises have been let; and that no other article or articles or class of articles or commodities shall be exposed for sale or sold in or on the said premises than such as is and are named and referred to in the said several leases or agreements respectively, without the consent, in writing, of the said council being first had and obtained.

4. That the said council shall be and are hereby empowered to impose, levy and collect all such rates, tolls and dues in respect of and on all articles brought or taken into the said market or any of the shops, sheds, or stalls thereof, for sale or sold therein, as are set forth and enumerated in Appendix A, in the schedule to this bye-law annexed.

5. That the council may appoint, at such salary and with such assistants or laborers at such salaries as they may deem fit, a market inspector, whose duties shall be generally as described in Appendix B, in the abovementioned schedule, and that it shall be lawful for the said council to discharge such inspector and to appoint another in his place whenever and so often as to them shall seem necessary.

6. That the said market shall be open for the sale of all articles hereinbefore enumerated (or hereafter to be allowed as hereinbefore provided for), on every day throughout the year (Sundays, Christmas Day, and Good Friday only excepted), during the hours and periods following, that is to say: During the months of May, June, July, and August, from Six o'clock in the morning until Six o'clock in the evening; and during the remaining months of the year, from Five o'clock in the morning until Seven o'clock in the evening; except that on Saturdays throughout the year the market shall remain open until Ten o'clock in the evening: Provided, nevertheless, that this regulation shall not apply to the "Hay and Corn Market," which

shall not be open on any day after Four o'clock in the afternoon throughout the year.

7. That the holder of every shop, shed, or stall in the said market shall, within one hour after the opening of the market, thoroughly cleanse his or her shop, shed, or stall, and the footways and gutters in front thereof or adjoining thereto; any such holder neglecting or refusing so to do, shall, on conviction thereof before any two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum or penalty not exceeding Forty shillings.

8. That any person guilty of the following offences, omissions, or neglect, shall, on conviction thereof as aforesaid, forfeit and pay for every such offence or omission a sum or penalty not exceeding Five pounds, that is to say:—

- i. Selling or exposing for sale in the said market any commodity before the times appointed for opening, or after the times appointed for closing such market, or on the days excepted as those on which a market is not to be held.
- ii. Selling or exposing, or otherwise offering for sale in the said market, any commodity not named in and allowed by this bye-law to be sold there.
- iii. Selling or exposing, or otherwise offering for sale in any particular shop, shed, or stall in the said market, any other commodity than such as are set forth in the lease or agreement under which such portion of the market is held.
- iv. Refusing or neglecting to pay on demand for same being made by the market inspector, or other officer appointed by the council for the purpose of collecting it, any rate, rent, toll or due which may be due from him or her in respect of any shop, shed, stall, or convenience, or in respect of any article sold or exposed for sale in the market.
- v. Placing any matter or thing so as to cause an obstruction in any part of the market, and refusing or neglecting to remove same on being by the market inspector required so to do.
- vi. Placing or keeping any wagon, cart, dray, barrow, or other vehicle in any part of the said market contrary to the direction of the market inspector.
- vii. Placing any hook, nail, or peg, or otherwise in any way injuring or defacing any part of the market buildings, or fitting up or enclosing any part of it, without the consent in writing, or contrary to the directions of the market inspector, or refusing or neglecting to remove any hook, nail, peg, or fittings, when required by the said inspector so to do.
- viii. Sweeping or causing to be swept, or placing or causing to be placed, any dirt, refuse or rubbish in or upon any of the gutters, drains, paths, roads, &c., of the said market, and allowing the same there to remain, and neglecting or refusing to remove it to the hereinafter appointed receptacle for such refuse, &c.
- ix. Being in the market in a drunken or disorderly state, or exciting any riot or disturbance, or cursing or swearing, or using any gross, indecent, or abusive language, or being guilty of any gross or indecent conduct therein.
- x. In any way resisting or obstructing the market inspector, his assistants, or laborers, in the discharge of their respective duties.
- xi. In any other manner than as above specified, interfering with or obstructing the proper regulation and good management of the market.

9. That the space marked "R" in the plan of the said market shall be set apart and enclosed for the receipt of rubbish or refuse matter, and that to such receptacle all rubbish or refuse matter produced within the said market, or in the shops, sheds, or stalls thereof, or on or in the streets, footpaths, or gutters adjoining to the same shall be conveyed; and such of said rubbish or refuse matter as is hereinbefore directed to be removed and cleansed away by the persons occupying the shops, sheds, or stalls, shall in every such case be removed to this receptacle by such persons respectively.

10. That all shops, sheds, or stalls, in the said market, shall invariably be erected under the supervision of the municipal surveyor, or such other person as the said council may appoint for that purpose, to a uniform plan and elevation, in accordance with the design sanctioned by such council, who, however, shall nevertheless have power to alter and modify the same as and whenever they may deem it expedient so to do; and that any person who shall erect, or cause to be erected, any shop, shed, or stall, otherwise than in accordance with the said plan and elevation, and the directions of the said municipal surveyor or other duly appointed person as aforesaid, without the sanction in writing of the council to such deviation therefrom, under the hand of the chairman, countersigned by the town clerk, or who shall without the sanction aforesaid, pull down or alter any shed already erected, shall on conviction thereof as aforesaid, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum or penalty not exceeding Fifty pounds.

11. That any person desirous of having his or her name or business painted on or affixed to any shop, shed or stall, held by him or her, or to have any shed or stall enclosed or otherwise altered in any particular way as to its fittings, for better convenience, may have such name or business so painted, and such alteration effected, at his or her own cost, provided it is done in accordance with the directions of the municipal surveyor or other person duly appointed as hereinbefore mentioned; and any one proceeding to have any such painting or alteration effected otherwise than in accordance with such direction, or re-

fusing or neglecting to obliterate or remove such improperly effected work when requested by the market inspector so to do, shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum or penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

12. That any person willfully misrepresenting the weight of any article sold by him or her in the said market, or any part thereof, with intent to defraud the purchaser or intending purchaser, shall, on conviction as aforesaid, forfeit and pay for each and every such offence a sum or penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

13. That any person offending against this bye-law in any particular, for which no specific penalty has been already hereinbefore provided, shall, upon conviction before any two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum or penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

14. That the said council may, from time to time, as they shall deem necessary or expedient, repeal, alter, or amend, any any of the regulations, provisions, rules, conditions, tables, and forms in this bye-law, or in the schedule hereto appended, contained, and substitute others for those repealed; and such substitutions, alterations and amendments shall, upon receiving the approval of His Excellency the Governor of the colony, stand in the place of and have the same force and effect as those thereby repealed, altered or amended, previously had.

APPENDIX B.

DUTIES OF THE MARKET INSPECTOR.

1. To see that the market regulations as set forth in this bye-law are duly observed, and to proceed against offenders in all cases of non-compliance therewith.
2. To preserve order and regularity within the market and its precincts, and to cause to be apprehended any person creating a riot or disturbance, or offending against decency, or acting in any way likely to provoke a breach of the peace therein.
3. To inspect all articles intended for human food exposed for sale in such market, and to seize any that he may find bad and unwholesome; and on such articles being examined by any two or more members of the municipal council, and certified by them in writing to be bad or unwholesome, then to destroy the same or cause the same to be destroyed, and to prohibit the sale within such market or its precincts of any articles which he may consider noisome or offensive.
4. To take charge of any weighbridge, and such scales and weights as the council may provide for the said market; and to examine all other scales and weights, and all measures that may be used or kept for use therein by others, and to seize such as may be found to be fraudulent or defective.
5. To collect all rates, rents, tolls and dues connected with the said market.
6. And generally to be responsible to the said council for the due governance and control of the said market, and of such persons as may from time to time, by the permission or authority of such council, be employed therein under his directions.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 26, made by the municipal council of Beechworth, has been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF MARYBOROUGH.

BYE-LAW No. 12.—FOR LEVYING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING IN THE POUND FOR THE CURRENT YEAR.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the Establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to impose a rate on all houses and lands within such district, according to their fair average annual value, such rate not to exceed Two shillings in the pound: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Maryborough, that a rate of One shilling in the pound for the current year be levied on all property in houses and lands within this municipal district, one moiety to be collected on and after twenty days from the issue of the notices, and the other on and after the 1st of January, 1859.

MUNICIPALITY OF PRAHRAN.

BYE-LAW No. 55.—A BYE-LAW FOR REGULATING THE DRIVING OF CATTLE INTO OR THROUGH THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF PRAHRAN.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the suppression of nuisances, the preservation of public health, and the general good rule and government of such municipal district; and whereas it is necessary for the safety of the public to regulate the driving of cattle into and through this municipal district: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Prahran, that no cattle intended for sale, slaughter, or shipment, or when passing from one part of the country to another, shall be driven into or through this municipal district excepting between the hours of Nine of the clock at night and Eight of the clock in the morning; and any person who shall drive, or cause to be driven, any cattle except oxen in yoke into or through this municipal district, contrary to this bye-law, shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Ten shillings for every head of cattle so driven, upon conviction before two or more justices of the peace.

BYE-LAW No. 56.—A BYE-LAW TO PREVENT THE DEPOSITING OF GLASS, FILTH, RUBBISH, OR OTHER MATTERS OF A SIMILAR NATURE, UPON THE STREETS, FOOTPATHS, RIGHTS-OF-WAY AND UNENCLOSED LAND WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF PRAHRAN.

WHEREAS by Act of Council 18 Victoria No 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the suppression of nuisances, the preservation of the public health, and the general good rule and government of such municipal district; and whereas it is necessary to make a bye-law for the more certain prevention of the nuisances occasioned by the depositing of glass, filth, rubbish, and other matters of a similar nature, upon the streets, footways, right-of-ways, and unenclosed land within the municipal district: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Prahran, that from and after the date of this bye-law coming into operation, it shall not be lawful for any person to deposit any glass, filth, rubbish, or other matter of a similar nature upon the streets, footways, right-of-ways, or public place, or deposit any glass, filth, or injurious matter or thing upon any unenclosed land within this municipal district; and any person who shall so offend shall, upon conviction before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding Twenty pounds.

The foregoing Bye-laws, Nos. 55 and 56, made by the municipal council of Prahran, have been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council.

SANDHURST MINING DISTRICT.

BYE-LAW.—ADDITIONS TO BYE-LAW No. III.—[20th August, 1858.]

AT a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Sandhurst, begun and holden at Sandhurst, in the said district, on the 20th day of August, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that it is to say:—

1. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in clause No. 9 of Bye-law No. III., when any machine owner shall be in possession of two machines, standing immediately adjoining, he shall only be required to pay on account of the second machine one-half of the fee as fixed in the aforesaid clause.
2. Whenever the expenses of any district drainage committee shall not amount to the sum raised by fees in such district it shall be lawful for the committee to remit the balance of money, and to cause it to be distributed in the proportion in which it was paid to those machine owners upon whom it had been levied.
3. When the owner of any machine shall prove to the satisfaction of the committee of his district that he is unable to work such machine, it shall be lawful for such committee (if two-thirds of the members shall agree) to remit the fees payable on account of such machine, and to fix the time during which such machine shall be exempted from payment of fees.

The undersigned members of the said mining board concurred in making the foregoing additional clauses to bye-law No. III.




THE FOURTH HALF-YEARLY REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF EAST COLLINGWOOD.

THE municipal council have to report the following:—

MUNICIPAL OFFICERS.

The resignation of Mr. Lloyd Taylor, as municipal surveyor, was accepted by council on the 18th August last.

Mr. James E. Austin, C.E., has been appointed his successor.

BYE-LAWS.

The following bye-laws have been adopted by the municipal council since the publication of the last half-yearly report:—

No. 14 Bye-law.—To authorise the municipal council of East Collingwood to apply the legislative grant of Three thousand pounds in the execution of specified public works, and in the purchase of road materials.

No. 15 Bye-law.—To regulate by means of standing rules and orders the proceedings of the municipal council of East Collingwood.

No. 16 Bye-law.—To authorise the municipal council of East Collingwood to apply the legislative grant of £4416 2s. 5d., in the execution of specified public works, and in the purchase of road materials.

The exaggerated opinions formed by tenderers of the magnitude and difficulty of this work (requiring to be cut to a great depth through bluestone), one tender for the same being upwards of £6000, induced the municipal council to attempt the work under active supervision, by the usually unsatisfactory mode of day labor. Particulars of the expenditure thereon are subjoined. It has since been let by contract.

SANITARY CONDITION OF EAST COLLINGWOOD.

The health officer, Dr. Livingstone, reports that the municipality continues to maintain its high character for health.

Mr. Samuel Allen, the deputy registrar of births and deaths for Collingwood, has opened an office (open from Ten to Four o'clock on business days) at the corner of Smith and Gertrude streets.

PETITIONS AND MEMORIALS FROM RATEPAYERS.

Fourteen petitions, with the aggregate number of 410 signatures, have been presented to the municipal council during the past half-year. In every case the municipal council have been solicitous to comply with the wishes of the petitioners whenever practicable.

ATTENDANCE OF MEMBERS OF COUNCIL FROM 21st APRIL TO 6th OCTOBER, 1857, BOTH INCLUSIVE.

There have been twenty-six meetings (including one adjourned) of the municipal council.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The municipal council, with a view to afford increased security to the ratepayers against fire, have been in communication with the Sewerage and Water Commission, and with Clement Hodgkinson, Esq., C.E., respecting the fixing in suitable places in the municipality fire plugs in the mains to be laid therein.

The preceding council having entered into a conditional agreement to lease or purchase a site in Wellington street for a market, the municipal council considered it desirable to cancel such agreement through the municipal solicitor, for the sum of Forty pounds.

The chairman of council having occasion to be absent from Victoria during the then ensuing municipal election, he appointed councillor Greenwood to conduct the same.

The nomination meeting was held in Vere street on the 7th of October, and the election in the council chamber on the 8th of that month. Councillor Greenwood appointed Mr. William Walker deputy returning officer.

The following gentlemen were proposed as candidates, the first three being elected councillors to supply the vacancies occasioned by the retirement of councillors Finlay, Coleman, and Owen.

FINANCE.

The municipal council being deeply impressed with the great advantages which would result to occupiers and owners of property in East Collingwood, by the forming and metalling simultaneously the streets now only laid out, earnestly endeavoured to effect a loan of £10,000 for such purposes, repayable with interest by annual instalments, extending over seven or ten years; but there being a defect in the Municipal Institutions Act, and the municipal council not being empowered to issue municipal debentures, could not succeed in obtaining a loan for the requisite term. The attention of the draughtsman of the Municipal Reform Bill will be directed to this defect in the Act. A schedule of proposed public works, contingent on obtaining this loan, was carefully prepared.

The municipal council received an instalment of £3000 of the legislative grant of £66,000 to eleven municipalities, and a subsequent final payment of £4416 2s. 5d., such grant being apportioned to each municipality according to the amount of rates collected in each for the municipal year.

THE FIFTH HALF-YEARLY REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF EAST COLLINGWOOD.

The council have to report the following:—

MUNICIPAL OFFICERS.

The overseer, H. Morrison, having resigned, the municipal surveyor undertook to provide the requisite superintendence by himself and others at an increase of salary of £150 per annum.

The town clerk's salary was increased £25 per annum, making it equal to that of town clerks of other municipalities.

An additional salary of £40 per annum to the rate collector for performing duties of valuator, was offered to that officer, but declined.

BYE-LAWS.

No. 17.—To impose a rate of one shilling in the pound, in two equal moieties upon the rateable property of the municipality, valued at £84,578, for 1858.

PUBLIC WORKS BY THE GOVERNMENT.

The works on the approaches to Collingwood Bridge have been resumed after a long interval of suspension, and an attempt made by trial levels to find a better gradient than that previously decided upon, but without any improvement being attainable.

The additional works on Reilly street drain, so essential to the health, comfort and convenience of numerous ratepayers in East Collingwood, were delayed several weeks after tenders had been received, on the alleged grounds of the desire of the inhabitants of Fitz Roy Ward to participate in the grant, towards which the city council had not contributed anything, though the municipal council of East Collingwood had contributed £350, and also to an excess of amount of tender beyond that of grant. The work in part has now been let.

Public Works projected, in progress, and completed.

PUBLIC WORKS PROJECTED.

Forming and metalling Raphael, Cambridge, and Oxford streets, and Victoria parade in part.
Forming Sydney, Cromwell, Stafford, Yarra, Campbell, Lithgow, and Mollison streets.

Improved level of Smith street, when the city, or Fitz Roy as a municipality, can appropriate the requisite funds.

PUBLIC WORKS IN PROGRESS.

Forming and metalling Bloomberg street, Glasgow street, and Northumberland street and Wellington street in part.
Forming Lower Vere, Palmer, Campbell, and Lower Perry streets, and Cambridge street, in part, Regent, Studley, and Bedford streets.
Forming a drain in Gold street.
Forming and metalling Peel street in part, and Rokeby street.
Road metal and pitchers.

PUBLIC WORKS COMPLETED.

Forming, metalling, pitching, and kerbing Upper Gipps street.
Pitching and kerbing Victoria street.

Forming and metalling Victoria street, jointly with the Municipal Council of Richmond.

Kerbing and channelling and forming footways of Victoria parade.

Forming Lower Gipps street in part, and Liverpool, Park, and Byron streets.

Re-forming, pitching, and metalling Hoddle street in part, north of Johnston street.

Forming north and south channels, and metalling Ramsden street.

Repairing and painting twenty-three lamp pillars and lanterns.

Gum kerbing and pitching west side of Wellington street.

Metalling Sackville, Easey, and Burlington streets.

Making numerous pitched crossings in all parts of the municipality.

The sanitary condition of the municipality continues to be favorably distinguished.

There is, however, great necessity for recording deaths under scientific classifications, and for dividing the municipality into sanitary districts, so that the local seats of disease may be promptly discovered by medical men. An application to the Registrar General on the former point was unsuccessful.

PETITIONS AND MEMORIALS FROM RATEPAYERS.

Eight petitions, with the aggregate number of 307 signatures, have been presented to the municipal council during the past half-year. In every case the municipal council have been anxious to comply with the attainable wishes of the petitioners.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The council having tried, on a large scale, the employment of labor by the day, but from experience thereof have been compelled to resort to letting works by tender, which system they have acted upon since 1st November last.

The council have had correspondence with the Sewerage and Water Commission, on supplying stand pipes, mains, and fire plugs, the latter amounting to nearly £4000. They proposed that the commission should supply them and receive payment of principal and interest by annual instalments, which the commission could not comply with. Only one stand pipe has been placed in Wellington street.

An improvement committee was appointed, but the indisposition of the Legislative Assembly to legislate upon any but pressing constitutional questions, prevented any advantageous effort being made on this and the preceding question. The council hope to prosecute their labors upon this subject with a better prospect of success the ensuing session.

Mr. Charles Le Cren's tender to value the municipality for assessment was accepted. A portion of the members of the council considered hotels and some special properties ought to be valued higher than had been done by Mr. Charles Le Cren, and that a per centage ought to be added to his entire valuation, but it was ultimately adopted without alteration.

But few appeals were made against the valuation, and the revising bench made but little alteration in individual or aggregate amount.

Twenty-three lamp pillars and lanterns have been fixed in different parts of the municipality, and are now regularly lighted.

An application having been made by the secretary of the mechanics' institution that the council would use its influence to raise such an institution for Collingwood, the council resolved that pecuniary aid could only be given to an institution open to all the ratepayers free from charge, such as a public library.

From considerations of public usefulness and a desire to afford efficient protection to the inhabitants from fire, the council have agreed to contribute quarterly £12 10s. towards the Collingwood Fire Brigade.

The fearful and distressing accounts of the outrages committed by the mutinous Sepoys in India, induced the council to convene a public meeting thereon, when several gentlemen offered their valuable services to collect subscriptions for the sufferers. The municipality was divided into eleven districts, a general committee was appointed, the chairman and town clerk being respectively chairman and secretary thereof, gentlemen appointed to collect subscriptions, which gentlemen, with few exceptions (some having subsequently declined), have zealously and efficiently performed this duty. The sum of £236 12s. 2d., less £11 11s. for expenses, was collected.

The honorary consulting engineer, C. Hodgkinson, Esq., having been appointed Acting Surveyor General, the municipal councils of Emerald Hill, East Collingwood, and Richmond, respectively, contributed towards a testimonial—a silver tea service—which was presented to Mr. Hodgkinson as a slight acknowledgment of the eminent services he had rendered to these municipalities.

FINANCE.

The council collected from rates for 1857 the sum of £3364 19s. 7d., and the first instalment of the legislative grant of £100,000 to about nineteen municipalities was £5067,* being the portion of such grant in proportion to amount of rates collected. The remaining instalment is anticipated to be paid in June or July ensuing.

To augment the amount of claim upon legislative grant, additional aid was employed to collect rates, the commencing to do which was much later than usual from circumstances the rate collector could not control.

The following bye-laws have received the assent of His Excellency the Governor since the publication of the last report, viz:—

Bye-law No. 12.—To prevent danger from fire, arising from the erection of inflammable agricultural produce within the municipality.

Bye-law No. 13.—To regulate and fix the rates of tolls and dues to be taken for weighing at the Kilmore weighbridge, Sydney street.

PUBLIC WORKS FINISHED OR IN PROGRESS.

The contract for the formation, making, and metalling of Union street, from Sydney street to the Episcopal Church, has been completed in a most satisfactory manner, and also a contract for the supply of road metal for repairs.

A substantial culvert has been erected at the junction of Powlett and Allan streets. Contracts have been entered into for the kerbing and channelling of Sydney street, from Foot street to Mitchell street, and for forming, pitching, metalling, and making that portion of Foot street between Church and John streets. This latter will complete the metalled road to the General Cemetery. It is in contemplation to reconstruct the water channels and to metal a portion of Mitchell street, between Chapel and Sydney streets.

WEIGHBRIDGE.

The want of a weighbridge had long been felt and complained of. To meet the wishes of the public, and to keep pace with the increasing trade of the town, the council accepted the offer of Messrs. Cairns, Wilson and Amos, of Melbourne, "to supply, transport, and guarantee for six months a seven tons weighing machine." It has been erected in a most accessible position, at the junction of Sydney and Mill streets.

FIRE-ENGINE.

The inhabitants have long desired that the town should possess a fire-engine. In compliance with that desire, a fire-engine has been purchased, which it is hoped will be found to answer, if, unfortunately, any casualty should arise requiring its being brought into use.

ELECTION.

The annual election to fill the vacancies occasioned by the retirement by rotation of councillors Reay Clarke, John McPherson, and Edward Leahy, took place on the 9th August last, when Messrs. James Thomas, Thomas De Courcy Meade, and Thomas Bossence were duly elected by polled votes to fill

the vacant seats at the first meeting, on the 10th ultimo. Councillor Frederick Williams Cadwallader Beavan was unanimously re-elected chairman for the ensuing municipal year.

CORRESPONDENCE.

An active correspondence has been maintained with the Government, and with the various municipalities throughout the colony, in reference to municipal matters.

The chairman attended three meetings of the Municipal Conference held in Melbourne in May and June last.
