PENTRIDGE.

IT is hereby notified that a memorial has been addressed to His Excellency the Governor by certain landowners and others at Pentridge, representing that the inhabitants of Pentridge, alive to the necessity of improving their roads, are desirous of their locality being erected into a road district, to be called the "Pentridge Road District," and to comprise the following area, viz.:—

PROPOSED DEVIATION.

NOTICE is hereby given that a map and survey plan, describing the exact course and bearings of, and the admeasurements required for, a deviation in the Heidelberg road, in the parishes of Keelbundora and Jika-jika, in the county of Bourke, proposed to be made by the Board of Land and Works, together with a description of the lands through which the same is proposed to pass, and the names of the owners and occupiers thereof, so far as known, and also an estimate of the expense of the said work, have been deposited at the Public Lands Office, Melbourne, the particulars of which are as follow:—

DESCRIPTION OF DEVIATION OF THE HEIDELBERG ROAD THROUGH SECTION 1, PARISH OF KEELBUNDORA, AND SECTION 121, PARISH OF JIKA-JIKA, IN THE COUNTY OF BOURKE:—Commencing at a point on the north side of present road, which point is 10 chains westerly from the north corner of the Darebin Hotel; from thence by a curve 960 links radius, 345 links in length, bearing N. 52° E.; thence 700 links to the Darebin Creek, N 31° E., the road is one chain wide and contains an area of 1a. 0r. 9p., the property of Thomas Wills; thence with the same bearing 805 links to the boundary between the property of Mr. Dunne and Mrs. Hordern, the road passes through

the property of Mr. Dunne, and contains an area 3r. 8p.; thence by a line, being the N.W. boundary of the road, 500 links to a point 320 links from the north boundary of Mrs. Hordern's property, and will contain an area of 23p.

The estimated cost of effecting the said work is £268.

All persons affected by the proposed road are requested to set forth in writing, addressed to the President of the Board of Land and Works, Office of Roads and Bridges, Melbourne, within forty days from the first publication of this notice, any well-grounded objections that they may have to the said road, failing which they will be thereafter precluded from making any such objections or claiming any compensation whatsoever.

Sir,

I have the honor to inform you that, in obedience to the appointment of the Governor in Council, I presided at the meeting held here on the 19th instant, for carrying out the instructions in the tenth clause of the Municipal Institutions Act, in relation to the township of Ararat.

After the meeting was duly constituted, Mr. Henry Conway Jones and Mr. James McLean were chosen assessors, and the following matters were brought forward:—

1. It was carried unanimously that the council should consist of seven members.

2. That the municipal councillors should not be paid.

3. The meeting proceeded to the election of councillors, when sixteen gentlemen were duly proposed and seconded, and on a show of hands I declared seven of these gentlemen duly elected, unless a poll was demanded, which was the case, and consequently further proceedings were put off till next morning, the 20th, when the poll was opened at Eight o'clock in the morning, and continued open until Four o'clock.

There were 223 electors who polled during the day, and the following is the result:—

MUNICIPALITY OF NEWTOWN AND CHILWELL.

BY-LAW No. 9.—FOR THE EXPENDITURE OF ONE THOUSAND THREE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-SEVEN POUNDS SIXTEEN SHILLINGS AND SIXPENCE FOR MAKING THE WEST SIDE OF LA TROBE TERRACE.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that all sums of money received from the Public Revenue and expended by municipal councils for public works, shall be submitted for the sanction of His Excellency the Governor: And whereas it is requisite that a sum of One thousand three hundred and thirty-seven pounds sixteen shillings and sixpence should be expended in forming and metalling certain portions of the west side of La Trobe terrace, agreeably to the specifications submitted to the Government: Be it therefore enacted by the council of the

municipality of Newtown and Chilwell, that the sum of One thousand three hundred and thirty-seven pounds sixteen shillings and sixpence be expended for the aforesaid purposes.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 9, made by the municipal council of Newtown and Chilwell, has been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF RICHMOND.

BYE-LAW No. 12.—A BYE-LAW FOR IMPOSING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING IN THE POUND FOR THE CURRENT YEAR.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to impose a rate on all houses and lands within the limits of such municipal district, according to the fair average value thereof, such rate not to exceed the sum of Two shillings: Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district of Richmond, that a rate for the current year of One shilling in the pound of the fair average value of all property in houses and lands within the limits of the municipal district, be imposed and levied.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 12, made by the municipal council of Richmond, has been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF RICHMOND.

A BYE-LAW TO REGULATE THE CONDUCTING OF ELECTIONS OF MEMBERS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF RICHMOND.

THE municipal council of Richmond, in exercise and execution of the power to them given by section 26 of *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria* (18 Victoria No. 15), and of all other powers and authorities enabling them in this behalf, do hereby order and direct as follows:—

1. In case a poll shall be demanded as required by section 19 of the said Act, such poll shall be taken by secret ballot at the court house, or some other convenient room within the municipality, and the chairman of the municipal council shall cause not less than six divisions or enclosed desks to be made in such court house or room, each of which shall be provided with ink, pens and blotting paper, or with lead pencils, for the purpose of enabling the electors to secretly mark the ballot papers as hereinafter provided; and the chairman shall also cause to be erected a barrier to divide the part of such room used for taking the poll from the other part thereof.

2. No person other than the chairman, the clerk to the council, and such other person or persons as the chairman may require to assist him in taking the poll, the scrutineers of the several candidates appointed as hereinafter mentioned, and the electors who shall for the time being be tendering their votes, shall be entitled to be at the polling side of the barrier during such poll, and any person other than such persons as aforesaid who shall intrude in such part of the room during the continuance of such poll, and on being required by the chairman to withdraw, shall refuse so to do, shall on conviction forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Twenty pounds: Provided always that it shall be lawful for the chairman to summon to his assistance within such barrier any member or members of the police force for the purpose of preserving the public peace, quelling any breach thereof that may have arisen, and for removing from within such barrier, or from the court house, or polling room, any person or persons who may in his opinion be obstructing the polling, or wilfully violating any of the provisions of this bye-law or of the said Act.

3. The chairman of the municipal council shall forthwith on this bye-law coming into operation, provide a suitable box with lock and key, and with a cleft or opening in the top capable of receiving the ballot papers, and which box and key shall be kept by the chairman for the time being, and during the poll the box shall be locked, and stand upon the table at which the chairman shall preside.

4. After a poll shall have been demanded as aforesaid, the chairman shall cause to be printed a sufficient number of ballot papers in the form in the schedule hereto, which he shall keep in his own custody until required for voting.

5. Each elector on presenting himself at the polling place, and stating his name, shall receive from the chairman one of the said ballot papers, and such elector shall at one of the divisions or desks provided for the purpose, strike out the names of such candidates as he does not mean to vote for, and shall forthwith fold up the same in such manner as will conceal the names of the candidates, and display the number on the back, and deposit such ballot paper in the ballot box in the presence of the chairman and his assistants, and of the poll clerks and scrutineers, if any.

6. In case any elector shall be unable to read, or shall be blind, he shall signify the same to the chairman, who shall

thereupon strike out the names of such candidates as the elector may designate, and such act of the chairman shall be deemed to be the act of the voter.

7. Upon delivering the ballot paper to the elector as herein-before provided, the chairman shall write or cause to be written on the back of each ballot paper so delivered to such elector the number corresponding to the number set opposite to the elector's name in the ratepayers' roll, and shall thereupon cause to be checked off upon a printed copy or printed copies of such roll signed by the chairman, such voter's name, and such numbers so corresponding as aforesaid shall be *prima facie* evidence of the identity of the elector whose name shall appear on the roll, and of the fact of his having voted at the election at which such ballot papers were delivered.

8. Every elector may vote for any number of candidates not exceeding the number of members then to be chosen, and any ballot paper recording a greater number of votes shall be rejected at the close of the poll.

9. No elector shall take out of or beyond the limits of the part of the court house or room set apart for taking the poll, any such ballot paper either before or after he has marked the same, and any person wilfully infringing this clause, or obstructing the polling by any unnecessary delay in performing any act within the said court house or room, shall on conviction forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Twenty pounds (£20).

10. In case any candidate or ratepayer shall object to any person tendering his vote, as provided by section 20 of the said Act, or in case the ballot paper as of any person shall have been received, and any other person shall afterwards apply for a ballot paper as of the same person, the chairman shall give to each such person a ballot paper, but in neither of such cases shall the ballot paper be put into the ballot box as directed in clause 5, but shall in the first place be registered by placing the same on a file to be provided for that purpose, or otherwise kept apart, and the chairman shall at the same time make a memorandum of the name of such voter, and the number of the voting paper, and after the close of the poll shall enquire into and decide on such vote, as required by the said Act, and if he shall decide on retaining the same he shall then place such paper in the ballot box, and if he rejects the vote he shall then write on the back of the ballot paper the word "rejected," and keep it separate from the ballot papers in the box.

11. At the close of the poll, or as soon after as conveniently may be, the chairman, in the presence of so many of the scrutineers as may choose to attend, shall count the number of votes polled for each candidate, and make a minute of the same. In the event of the number of votes being found to have been equal for any two or more candidates, one or more of whom, but not all of such candidates, being by the state of the poll, and the number of members to be elected, entitled to be declared elected, the chairman shall, by a casting vote or votes, as the case may be, decide which of the candidates for whom the votes may be equal shall be elected; and the chairman shall then seal up all the ballot papers given out during the poll, together with the copy or copies of the ratepayers' roll used for marking off the voters' names, and the same shall be preserved for six months at least amongst the records of the council.

12. Any person personating or attempting to personate any elector or deceased elector, or who shall vote a second time on the same day, shall upon conviction forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Fifty pounds.

13. Each candidate shall be entitled to appoint, by writing under his hand, to be delivered to the chairman before the time of commencing the poll, one scrutineer, to be present on his behalf in the polling place, and the same may be in the following form:—

To the Chairman of the Municipal Council of Richmond.
I hereby appoint _____ to act for me as scrutineer at the present municipal election.

(Candidate to sign his name)

14. Neither the chairman, his assistants, the scrutineers, or any other person, shall attempt to ascertain for whom any elector shall have voted, except as provided by clause 6 of this bye-law, and except when required so to do by any court judge having competent jurisdiction, and if any person in the discharge of his duty or otherwise shall become acquainted with the name or names of the candidate or candidates for whom any elector shall have voted, he shall not divulge the same, nor by any word or action directly or indirectly aid in the discovery of the same, unless in answer to any question he may be legally bound to answer. Any breach of this clause shall subject the person offending, on conviction, to forfeit and pay for each offence a sum not exceeding (£50) Fifty pounds.

All expenses incurred by the chairman in preparing for and conducting such poll, and carrying into effect this bye-law, shall be paid and discharged by the municipal council out of the rates or other corporate funds.

No funeral will be allowed to take place in the cemetery without a certificate from a deputy registrar or coroner holding an inquest or enquiry, or a magistrate; such certificate to be delivered to the gatekeeper at the cemetery before the funeral enters the gates.

A contract was taken by Messrs. Gray and Co. to quarry and break 400 cubic yards of bluestone metal at 10s. 6d. per cubic yard.

Several minor contracts have been given by the public works committee, and satisfactorily performed by the contractors.

THE GOVERNOR'S VISIT.

On Wednesday, 15th September, His Excellency Sir Henry Barkly, K.C.B., arrived in Belfast, and was entertained at a public dinner on the same day. On the following day, the 16th September, he was presented with an address from this council, and on the 17th September he took his departure for Warrnambool.

MISCELLANEOUS.

On the 28th April, a deputation from this council met deputations from the Belfast road board and Warrnambool town council, at Yangery, to fix upon the starting point of the road to the interior, but pending negotiations intimation was received from the Government that the Inspector-General of Roads would himself fix on the point, and he has accordingly fixed on the place suggested by the Belfast bodies, viz., to start from the point where the road from Warrnambool through Woodford and the road from Belfast to Spring Creek by Thomson's join, and to pass thence through Woolsthorpe, Caramut, Chatsworth and Wickliffe.

An action was brought by Mr. R. H. Woodward, agent for Mr. James Atkinson, for £31 2s. 8d., for rubble stone taken by the council from Lee's Paddock, and £12 5s. was awarded.

A municipal reform conference was held at Melbourne (councillor Whitehead being the delegate from this council), and extensive improvements and alterations of the Municipal Act were suggested and agreed to; and a bill is to be brought in at the ensuing session of the legislature embodying same. The suggestions, if adopted, will tend very materially to the well working of municipal institutions.

The chambers formerly occupied by the council in the Court House being required for public purposes, the council have taken the premises formerly occupied by the Bank of Australasia in Sackville street, at a rental of £40 per annum.

During the past half-year the permanent levels of the Punt road have been agreed upon with the corporation of Melbourne, and a proposition made by the city surveyor to form and metal that portion of the road between the Domain road and Gardiner's Creek road, was accepted by the municipal council, since which no action has been taken by the corporation of Melbourne, in consequence, it is said, of the want of funds. The municipal council is prepared to carry out this most desirable improvement immediately; but as this cannot be done without the co-operation of the corporation of Melbourne, it remains for the ratepayers on the city side of the road to take such steps as may appear necessary to obtain this object.
