## MUNICIPALITY OF BALLAARAT EAST.

BYE-LAW No. 16.—FOR CONDUCTING ELECTIONS OF MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL, AND FOR ELECTING THE CHAIRMAN OR A SUBSTITUTE PRO TEM.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district has the power to regulate their own elections, the conduct of public meetings, and to elect their chairman as and in manner they may deem expedient, and in his absence or inability to act, to elect another to preside as such: Do it therefore ordered and enacted by the municipal council of Ballarat East, with the assent of His Excellency the Governor—

1. That the chairman shall appoint some public place or booth for the holding of meetings for the nominations at elections, and also one or more rooms or booths as polling places, being within the municipality.

2. That at the nomination the chairman shall have the power to adjourn the meeting to some hour of the day which shall be more convenient for the assembling of the ratepayers; and that in case of a poll being demanded, each candidate shall demand the same for himself, or it shall be demanded for each separately by six ratepayers: Provided always that the chairman shall not declare any one to be elected a member of the council who is not then a ratepayer on the roll, nor admit such person to be a candidate.

3. The chairman shall appoint as many poll clerks as he may deem necessary for each and all of the polling-rooms or booths, and shall furnish to every such poll clerk a copy of the ratepayers' roll, certified by the town clerk to be a true copy; and there shall be affixed over the entrance to each booth certain letters, the entire letters of the alphabet being comprised and divided accordingly; and no person shall be permitted to poll in any booth or room unless his surname shall begin with one of the letters so affixed over such entrance.

4. At every polling booth or room there shall be one or more compartments provided with ink, pens and blotting paper, for the purpose of enabling the ratepayer to mark the voting paper as hereinafter provided, in which booth or room no person other than the chairman, deputy chairman, town clerk, poll clerks, and the scrutineers of the candidates, and the ratepayers who shall then be tendering their votes, shall be entitled to be present.

5. The chairman or deputy chairman shall have a locked box of which he shall keep the key, with a cleft or opening in such box capable of receiving the voting papers, which box shall be on the table at which the chairman, deputy chairman, town clerk, poll clerk and scrutineers are present; and each ratepayer, after having satisfied, as herein provided, the chairman or deputy chairman that he is entitled to vote, shall then receive a voting paper in the form of the schedule annexed marked A, and which voting paper shall be signed on the back by the chairman or deputy chairman; and such ratepayer shall, in such compartment provided for the purpose, strike out the names of such candidates as he does not vote for, and shall forthwith fold up the same so as to conceal the names of the candidates, and deposit it in the box aforesaid.

6. After the nomination of the candidates for the municipality shall have taken place, the chairman shall cause to be printed a number of voting papers in the form A, which he shall have in his own custody; and shall deliver to each deputy chairman such number thereof as shall be sufficient for the number of ratepayers who may poll at the booth or room within such deputy's division, taking a receipt for the exact number so delivered; and shall keep a sufficient number of voting papers for the ratepayers who may poll at the place where he himself shall preside; and he shall sign his name with ink on the back of every such voting paper before it shall be delivered to any ratepayer about to vote; and in like manner each deputy chairman shall sign his name on every voting paper within the division whereat he shall preside; and it shall be the duty of the chairman, and each deputy chairman, to keep an exact account of all such voting papers.

7. Upon delivering of the voting papers to any ratepayer, the chairman, deputy chairman or poll clerk, shall check or mark off upon a certified copy of the ratepayers' roll such voter's name as having voted, which marking off shall be *prima facie* evidence that such voters whose names shall thus appear on such ratepayers' roll have voted at the election at which such voting papers were delivered.

8. The chairman shall preside at one polling place, and he shall appoint by writing under his hand the respective polling places at which any deputy chairman shall preside, and in like manner for each polling place the clerk who shall assist him or either of the deputies, and who in case of need shall act for him or either of the deputies, and preside at any of such polling booths or rooms aforesaid respectively.

9. Each candidate may appoint one person to be a scrutineer at each polling booth or room, and every scrutineer so appointed shall, before entering on his duty as such, make and subscribe the following declaration before the chairman or any deputy, being a justice of the peace:—

I, a scrutineer appointed by a candidate at the present election, do hereby solemnly declare that I will faithfully assist at the same, and that I will not attempt to ascertain for whom any ratepayer shall vote, neither

will I by word or action, directly or indirectly, aid in the discovery of the same, unless in answer to any question which I am legally bound to answer.

10. No enquiry shall be permitted at the time of polling as to the right of any person to vote, except only as follows, that is to say—The chairman or deputy chairman shall, if he think fit, or if requested by the poll-clerk, by any candidate, or his scrutineer, or by any two ratepayers on the roll, put to any ratepayer before he has entered the voting compartment, and not after, the following questions:—

1st. Are you the person whose name appears on the ratepayers' roll as \_\_\_\_\_, numbered \_\_\_\_\_?

2nd. Have you voted before at this present election?

And no person so required to answer said question shall be qualified or entitled to vote until he shall satisfactorily have done so; and any person who shall wilfully make a false answer to any one of the said questions shall, on conviction thereof, be subject to a fine not exceeding Fifty pounds.

11. In case the voting paper as of any ratepayer has been received, and any other person shall tender his vote as the same person, the chairman or deputy shall receive his voting paper, but not allow such vote nor permit it to be put into the voting box, but shall write on the back thereof the word "disputed," with his signature, and shall keep the same apart in his custody: Provided such person shall duly answer the questions hereby authorized to be put to him, and sign his name on the back of the voting paper; and any person personating or attempting to personate any ratepayer or deceased ratepayer, or who shall vote a second time on the same day at any election of members, shall upon conviction thereof forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Twenty pounds.

12. Each deputy chairman shall, immediately on the close of the poll, make out an account of the number of votes polled for each candidate, which shall be verified by his signature and by the signatures of the poll clerks and scrutineers then present, and shall collect and seal up all the voting papers that have been taken, together with the certified copy of the ratepayers' roll, and signed by him and the poll clerk; also separately such voting papers as have not been used, and all disputed voting papers, with all books or papers kept by him or the poll clerk during the polling, and shall forthwith proceed and deliver or cause to be delivered the whole of the same to the chairman; and the chairman shall in like manner make out an account of the votes polled at his division, and shall seal up all the voting papers and books as aforesaid, and shall then make out another account containing the number of all the votes polled for each of the candidates at all the polling places, which shall be verified by his signature and the signatures of the poll clerks and scrutineers then present—and this account shall be the final act of the polling, and shall determine who are the candidates elected by the majority of such votes: Provided always in case of equality of votes being given for two or more candidates, the chairman, who shall not otherwise vote at such election, shall give his casting vote or votes, which shall be recorded on the final account of the votes as aforesaid before being signed.

13. The chairman of the council shall be elected in the manner following:—At the first meeting of council after every annual election, the members shall choose one of their number to take the chair for the time being, at the hour of meeting given in the notice paper, or as soon after as all the members of the council be present, otherwise at the expiry of twenty minutes thereafter, and the council shall then proceed by ballot to elect the chairman for the current year; and the acting chairman, after reading over the ballot papers, and the town clerk taking down the names voted for, shall then declare the councillor who has the greatest number of votes to be chairman of the council for the current year, who shall then take the chair accordingly; and if the highest number of votes be held by more than one member, then another voting shall take place for those holding such highest numbers, and so on to the third voting, if there be not a majority recorded; when, if there be still an equality of votes, the acting chairman shall, in addition to his own, give his casting vote, which shall be final.

14. In the absence of the chairman of the council, the members shall elect another to take the chair for the time being only, and upon the resignation or other disqualification of the chairman of the council, at the next meeting thereafter the remaining members shall proceed in manner provided for in the last clause to elect a chairman for the residue of the current municipal year. In case the chairman of the council be a candidate for re-election at any election of members for the council, he shall not preside thereat, but the council shall proceed to elect a deputy chairman, not being a candidate, from their number, to preside and act in his place at said election, who shall perform all the duties thereof, and whose acts shall be binding and have full force and effect as if performed by the chairman himself; and the council shall also elect from among their number as many deputy chairmen as may be required to preside at the respective polling places, not being candidates at the said election; and in default thereof they shall elect one or more of the municipal magistrates to act as such deputy chairman, and all such elections of deputy chairman shall take place at the meeting of the council next before the day of election, and shall be con-

ducted in manner set forth in the preceding clause for the election of chairman.

MUNICIPALITY OF KILMORE.

BYE-LAW No. 16.—FOR THE ASSESSMENT OF ALL PROPERTY WITHIN THE BOUNDARIES OF THE KILMORE MUNICIPALITY, FOR THE YEAR ENDING THE 31ST OF AUGUST, 1859.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is enacted that all municipal councils are empowered to cause an annual value to be fixed on all properties within the boundaries of such municipalities: And whereas the council of the Kilmore municipality have caused such valuation of all properties situate within the said municipality to be made, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of £14,199 9s., full particulars of which are duly registered and lodged in the council chamber of the said municipality, and open to public inspection: It is therefore enacted by the council of this municipality, That the said valuation or assessment for the year ending the 31st day of August, 1859, be at once carried into effect, and have full force as contemplated in the said Act.

MUNICIPALITY OF KILMORE.

BYE-LAW No. 17.—A BYE-LAW FOR LEVYING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING IN THE POUND FOR THE CURRENT MUNICIPAL YEAR.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to impose a rate on all houses and land within such district, according to its fair average annual value, such rate not to exceed Two shillings in the pound: It is therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council for the district of Kilmore, That a rate of One shilling in the pound be levied on all property in houses or lands within the municipal district aforesaid for the year ending the 31st day of August, 1859; one moiety thereof to be due and payable on and after the 1st day of February, 1859, and the other moiety thereof to be due and payable on and after the 1st day of August, 1859.

MUNICIPALITY OF MALDON.

BYE-LAW No. 2.—TO ENFORCE THE CLEANSING OF CHIMNEY FLUES WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF MALDON.

WHEREAS by an Act of Council, 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to pass bye-laws for the suppression of nuisances, &c.: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the municipal council of Maldon, That the occupier of any premises within the said district whereof any chimney flue shall take fire, shall, on conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay the sum or penalty of not more than Five pounds.

MUNICIPALITY OF PORTLAND.

No. 8.—A BYE-LAW TO REGULATE THE CONDUCTING OF THE ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by an Act of Council, 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to make bye-laws for the conducting of elections: Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district of Portland as follows:—

1. If at any election the chairman of the municipal council for the time being shall be incapacitated from presiding at such election, either from illness, absence from the district, or any other cause, it shall be competent for the council to appoint some other member of the council to act as chairman for the purpose of carrying out such election.

2. That at any such election the chairman shall not call for a show of hands or declare any candidate elected until the hour of Nine o'clock, being one hour after the time appointed for such election, and if a poll shall be legally demanded the chairman shall cause to be provided at the polling place a sufficient number of stalls or compartments, together with ink and pens or pencils, for the purpose of enabling the ratepayers secretly to mark the voting papers as hereinafter provided.

3. The chairman shall cause to be provided for the purpose of such election a locked-up box, of which he shall keep the key, with a cleft or opening therein capable of receiving the voting papers, and which box shall stand upon a table in front of the chairman, and each ratepayer shall receive from the chairman a voting paper in the form in the schedule hereto annexed, and signed upon the back by the chairman with his name, and shall thereupon retire to the stall or compartment provided for that purpose, and there strike out the names of such candidates as he does not intend to vote for, and shall forthwith deposit the same in the ballot box; and in case such ratepayer shall be unable to read or be blind, he shall signify the same to the chairman, who shall thereupon mark or strike out the names of such candidates as such ratepayer shall designate, and no ratepayer shall take out of such polling place any such voting paper either before or after he has marked the same; and any person wilfully infringing any of the provisions of this clause, or obstructing the polling by any unnecessary delay in performing any act within the polling place, shall be deemed guilty of an offence within this bye-law, and on being convicted thereof shall forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

4. Each candidate shall be entitled to appoint, by writing under his hand, to be delivered to the chairman at any time before Eight o'clock in the morning of the polling day, one scrutineer, to be present on his behalf at the taking of the poll.

5. The chairman shall, if required by any ratepayer, put to any person before he shall have voted the following questions only:—

- (1.) Are you a ratepayer on the ratepayers' roll of the municipal district of Portland?
- (2.) Have you already voted at this election?

And if any person shall wilfully give a false answer to either of the questions aforesaid, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence within the meaning of this bye-law, and on being convicted thereof shall forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding the sum of Twenty pounds.

6. At every election it shall be the duty of the clerk to the council, or his deputy, to provide himself with a true copy of the ratepayers' roll, and as each ratepayer demands his voting paper to see whether the name of such ratepayer appears upon the roll as a ratepayer within the meaning of the said Act, and as each ratepayer deposits his voting paper within the ballot box, to mark off such ratepayer's name as having voted at such election.

7. In case a voting paper purporting to be that of any ratepayer shall have been received, and any other person representing himself as the same ratepayer shall afterwards demand a voting paper, the chairman, when such person shall attempt to deposit his paper in the ballot box, shall refuse to allow the same to be put therein, but shall receive the same and write thereon the name of the person tendering the same, and keep it apart, and at the close of the poll decide whether such person has already voted or not, and such decision shall be final and conclusive on all parties; and if it shall appear to the chairman that such elector has not already voted at such election, such vote shall be added to the number already polled, but if otherwise such vote shall not be allowed. And any person personating or attempting to personate any ratepayer or deceased ratepayer, or who shall vote or attempt to vote a second time at any such election, shall be deemed guilty of an offence within this bye-law, and on being convicted thereof shall forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

8. At the close of the poll, or as soon after as conveniently may be, the chairman, in the presence of the clerk to the council, or his deputy and scrutineers, shall count the number of votes polled for each candidate, and if on the state of the poll being ascertained there shall be an equality of votes for any two or more candidates, one or more of whom, but not all, shall by the state of the poll and the number to be elected be entitled to be declared to be elected, the chairman shall by a casting vote or votes, as the case may be, decide which of the candidates for whom the votes may be equal shall be elected, but no chairman shall be entitled to vote at any election except in the case of an equality of votes. And the chairman shall then, in the presence

of the scrutineers, seal up all the voting papers given during the election, and safely preserve them amongst the records of the council.

#### MUNICIPALITY OF SOUTH BARWON.

**BYE-LAW No. 11.**—FOR THE ASSESSMENT OF ALL PROPERTY WITHIN THE SOUTH BARWON MUNICIPALITY, FOR THE YEAR ENDING THE 2ND OF JUNE, 1859.

WHEREAS the council of the South Barwon municipality, in pursuance of clause 30 of the Municipal Act. 18 Victoria No. 15, has caused a valuation of all property situate within the municipality to be made, and which valuation amounts in the aggregate to the sum of Fifteen thousand three hundred and fifty-two pounds ten shillings (£15,352 10s.), full particulars of which are duly registered and lodged in the council chamber of the said municipality, and at all reasonable times open to public inspection: Be it therefore enacted by the council of South Barwon, by and with the sanction of His Excellency the Governor in Council, That the aforesaid valuation or assessment be at once carried into effect, and have full force and effect, as contemplated in the said Municipal Act.

**BYE-LAW No. 12.**—FOR IMPOSING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING AND SIXPENCE IN THE POUND ON THE ASSESSABLE PROPERTY WITHIN THE SOUTH BARWON MUNICIPALITY, FOR THE YEAR ENDING 2ND JUNE, 1859.

WHEREAS the council of the South Barwon municipality, by virtue of the power vested therein by clause 30 of the Act 18 Victoria No. 15, has considered it necessary to levy a rate of One shilling and sixpence in the pound on all assessable property within the said municipality: Be it therefore enacted by the said council, by and with the sanction of His Excellency the Governor in Council, That a rate of One shilling and sixpence in the pound be levied as aforesaid.

### RUSSIAN QUARANTINE REGULATIONS.

THE accompanying notice, which has been received in this Department, is published for general information, at the request of the Russian Government.

The plague having appeared at Bengazi, in the regency of Tripoli, the Imperial Government has decreed the following precautionary measures:—

The coasts of Barbary in Africa (with the exception of Algeria), Syria, Egypt, Gibraltar and Malta, have been declared suspected; in consequence, all vessels coming from those places destined for a Russian port of the Baltic, likewise the vessels which, although coming from healthy ports, have touched during the voyage at places declared to be suspected, or which have been in communication with vessels coming from suspected ports, are required, before entering the Baltic, to stop at Kanso, in the Cattogat, where, with the mutual consent of the Russian and Swedish Governments, those vessels, as well as their crews, and the cargoes which they may have on board, will be subjected to quarantine purification according to the regulations established in Sweden, after which they will be furnished by the local authorities with a clean bill of health or certificate. Without the production of such bill or certificate delivered by the quarantine authorities of Kanso, no vessel coming from the abovementioned places, or become suspected through the circumstances stated above, will be admitted into Russian ports.

The local authorities in the Russian ports of the Baltic are directed, in case of the arrival of vessels coming from places in the vicinity of Tripoli, or from the environs of that town, that should there be the least apprehension regarding the state of health of the place of departure, or the least suspicion of their having been during the voyage in communication with vessels coming from places declared suspected, to send such vessels to the nearest quarantine establishment in order that they may be provided with clean bills of health.

The following measures have been adopted in relation to the Russian ports of the Black Sea and of the Sea of Azoff:—

1. All vessels in general arriving from abroad in the southern ports of the empire, will have to be subjected to a minute quarantine examination, as well as to a medical inspection.

2. Vessels arriving not only from Tripoli, but from other places, without clean bills of health, will be subjected to a strict purification, according to the rules established by the quarantine regulations of the empire.

3. Vessels, although coming from healthy ports, and provided with clean bills of health, but having on board suspected in-

ids, will be treated exactly as it is prescribed by the section 13 of the Russian Quarantine Regulations, confirmed by the Imperial Ministry of the Interior the 10th April of the present year, and of which a copy follows this notification.

EXTRACT FROM THE QUARANTINE REGULATIONS, CONFIRMED THE 10TH APRIL, 1858.

Section 13. If it should result from the captain's declaration that a vessel arriving, although furnished with the necessary certificate of the satisfactory sanitary state of the port of departure, as well as of that of such ports at which the vessel may have touched on her way, should have on board invalids either among the crew or the passengers, the captain of the port, or his adjunct, shall direct the quarantine medical officer on duty to go without delay on board such vessel and inspect it; the captain of the port will then submit for the decision of the quarantine direction the conclusions arrived at by the medical officer.

In the event of there appearing no danger of the disease assuming the character of plague or yellow fever, or if the conclusions of the medical officer should be deemed unfounded, the quarantine direction shall, without the least delay, admit the vessel and the crew and passengers to pratique; in the contrary case, the vessel, with all persons on board, as well as the cargo, will be subject to quarantine purification.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and sixty-six householders and landholders resident at Avoca, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district.

The petitioners state that Avoca is one of the oldest townships on the gold fields; that in addition to its gold field, it is in the centre of a rich agricultural district; that it is well watered and wooded; that it has always been the head-quarters of the district, and that it is on the main road to Adelaide, and sixteen miles distant from any other town of importance.

That in the absence of a recognized or municipal body to watch over its affairs, its interests have suffered seriously, all property being thereby deteriorated in value, and its mineral resources scarcely developed.

That the creation of a municipality would be a certain means of remedying the evils before stated, and rendering Avoca one of the first townships on the gold fields.

The petitioners suggest that the proposed municipal district be as follows, viz.:—"From a point at the south-west corner of allotment 137 of country allotments south-west of Avoca; thence north three miles; thence east three miles; thence south three miles; thence west three miles to the point of commencement;" such area not containing more than nine square miles, in which no one point is distant more than six miles from any other point, and there being three hundred house and land holders therein.

"Your petitioners pray that the limits and boundaries of the said municipal district may be as follows, viz.:—On the west side commencing at the south-west corner of the south boundary road of the special survey and the beach along the beach between the north and south boundary roads of the said special survey; thence eastwardly along the northern boundary road of the said special survey to a road running at right angles therewith, which road is generally called and known as Tucker's road; thence southwardly along the said Tucker's road to its intersection with the red metal road, or more properly called the road from Melbourne to Frankston; thence along the said last-named road to the Plough and Harrow Hotel; and thence at right angles in a westerly direction along the south boundary road of the said special survey to the place of commencement;" and further, "that your Excellency will be pleased to appoint some fit and proper person to preside as chairman at any meeting of the said householders to be hereafter convened, and at all adjournments thereof."

#### MUNICIPALITY OF MARYBOROUGH.

THIRD HALF-YEARLY REPORT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MARYBOROUGH MUNICIPAL COUNCIL FOR THE HALF-YEAR ENDING 4TH OF NOVEMBER, 1858.

DURING this past half-year the bye-laws for regulating the removal of buildings encroaching on the streets having been carried into effect, and the Government levels adopted for the formation of the footpaths, the old class of unsightly wooden houses has given place to handsome buildings of freestone, of which material extensive quarries have been discovered in the immediate neighborhood; and the council cannot but congratulate the ratepayers on the improvement effected, and the general progress made since the publication of the last half-yearly report.

#### EXTENSION OF BOUNDARIES.

In compliance with the substance of a petition, praying for the extension of the boundaries to the full area permitted by the Act, the following was, on the 16th July, proclaimed the municipal district of Maryborough:—"Commencing at a point bearing north 7 chains and 50 links (more or less) from the No. 164.—DECEMBER 3RD, 1858.—4.

north-west angle of the town reserve of Maryborough; thence by a line bearing north 45 degrees east 51 chains (more or less); thence by a line bearing south 45 degrees east 240 chains; thence by a line bearing south 45 degrees west 240 chains; thence by a line bearing north 45 degrees west 240 chains; and thence by a line bearing north 45 degrees east 189 chains (more or less) to the commencing point."

#### ASSESSMENT.

The gross amount of the assessment amounted to £19,222 10s., and the reductions, by appeal, to £175, leaving a net amount of £19,047 10s.

#### ELECTIONS.

Councillors Garland and Levy, who retired by rotation, were re-elected to the council on the 4th day of May, 1858, and Councillor McLandress was on the same day re-appointed chairman.

#### FINANCE.

On the 14th of May, 1858, the council received the first moiety of the grant, amounting to £698, and on the 6th October a further sum of £474 19s. 6d.

A rate of One shilling in the pound was struck on the 3rd day of August, a small portion only of which has yet been collected.

#### BYE-LAWS.

The following bye-laws have been passed by the council:—  
No. 11. For preventing damage to the public footpaths and water-courses, and regulating the formation of private drains and crossings.

No. 12. For levying a rate of One shilling in the pound for the current year.

No. 13. For the appropriation of the grant in aid for the year 1858.

#### PUBLIC WORKS.

Owing to the inadequate grant for the present year, the municipal council has been compelled to suspend extensive improvements until the receipt of further aid from the Government.

The following works, however, have been completed, or are in progress:—

The erection of town-hall, and enclosing the municipal reserve.

Clearing, forming and metalling Inkermann street.

Building stone culvert over creek in Inkermann street.

Clearing, forming and metalling Hospital street.

Building stone culvert over creek in Hospital street.

Forming, gravelling and kerbing the footpaths in High street, from Hospital to Inkermann street.

Building culvert in High street, 1 chain.

Forming and gravelling footpaths in Hospital, Nolan and Inkermann streets (not completed).

Pitching the water channels at the cross streets (not completed).

Fencing in the old and new cemeteries.

Metalling part of Clarendon street.

Repairing and metalling crossings over various leads.
